STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Lennoxlove Book Festival is a charitable company limited by guarantee incorporated on 3 July 2009 (Company No. SC362133) and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is a registered Scottish Charity (number SC040911).

Organisational structure

Management is carried out by a Board of Directors which meets regularly throughout the year, with additional personnel contracted around the time of the annual Lennoxlove Book Festival in November in Haddington.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The company was set up to carry out functions in East Lothian similar to those performed in the Scottish Borders by the Borders Book Festival (a separate charitable company limited by guarantee and incorporated in 2006). The self-employed festival management team for Lennoxlove Book Festival includes several people similarly involved in the annual Borders Book Festival. The two companies are legally and operationally separate, but three of the current five Board directors of Lennoxlove Book Festival are also directors of Borders Book Festival.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 July 2013

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Lennoxlove Book Festival uses office premises in Haddington House, Haddington, and has an agreement with the Hamilton and Kinneil Estates whereby it can put on annual book festivals at Lennoxlove House, against payment of agreed fees and expenses.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The company's fourth annual Lennoxlove Book Festival took place on 2-4 November, 2012. After a year of consolidation in 2012, the festival showed good growth again by most yardsticks. Although the number of individual sessions - 41, of which 23 were for adults and 18 in the Family Festival - was lower than the 45 in 2012, this was a planned reduction, and overall ticket sales were up by 22% over 2011. They reached 5,550 - easily a record level - and compared with 4,550 in the previous year. Combined revenue from ticket and book sales reached £57,619, an increase of 14%. Commercial sponsorship, led once again by our invaluable supporters McInroy & Wood, was steady at £21,920, while total grants received from three key public sector institutions (East Lothian Council, Creative Scotland and Event Scotland) rose by 8% to £33,136.

From modest beginnings in 2009, Lennoxlove Book Festival has now become a well-established Scottish literary event. In 2012 we presented a particularly eminent and popular array of speakers, including the novelist J. K. Rowling, and generated favourable publicity for Lennoxlove House and for East Lothian in general. The festivals have a solid cultural and economic impact, and enjoy ever-increasing support from many sections of the local community.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

With total income of £114,388 against total expenditure of £111,305, the company had an annual surplus of £3,083 in its fourth year of operations. This compared favourably with the loss (restated) of £855 in the previous year. Once again, the trustees exercised strict controls on festival expenditure, although advertising/printing/website costs and payments to outside technical contractors rose inevitably given the scope and special features of the 2012 festival. It should however be noted that, after the 2012/13 surplus of £3,083, the company still had accumulated net liabilities of £13,739. This underlines the longer-term challenges faced by the trustees in providing the public with high-quality book festivals in a difficult economic environment.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Lennoxlove Book Festival

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 July 2013 set out on pages four to nine.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. Basis of the independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The charity is supported by Border Book Festival who pledge to continue to support the charity and therefore the accounts are prepared on a going concern basis.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

For their work on the 2013 Lennoxlove Book Festival a one-off wage of £120 was paid to Helen Moffat (daughter of Mr Alistair Moffat) £240 was paid to David Ogilvie and £275 was paid to Andrew Ogilvie (husband and son respectively of Mrs Paula Ogilivie).
