ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The period covered by this financial year saw growth again in the range and amount of activity undertaken by Urban Roots. By securing further funding from the Scottish Government's Climate Challenge Fund we were able to employ Abi Mordin as Project Manager, a Project Food Co-ordinator (Roz Corbett until September 2011 and then Emma Iller from October 2011) and Juliet Buckner as a Project Support Worker. This generous assistance to help communities to take action on climate change continued to be the main source of funding for most revenue (staff salaries) and most of the capital expenditure. Our efforts to reduce our reliance on this funding by securing monies from a more diverse source of funders, allowed us to employ a sessional Woodlands Officer (Tom Cooper from September 2011) after the Climate Challenge Fund stopped funding the role from the start of this financial year. We continued to investigate the possibilities of developing a social enterprise to reduce our reliance on grants and how we could increase our own fundraising activities to increase our unreserved deposits. Towards the end of the financial year the staff initiated flexible contingency plans reducing their hours with the support of the Urban Roots Board if the further 3 years funding applied for from Climate Challenge Fund was not granted. These plans had to be implemented for Urban Roots to continue as CCF funding was not granted in April 2012.

THE COMMUNITY GARDENING VOLUNTEER GROUP

This group continued throughout the year with 6 to 10 volunteers meeting on a Tuesday and Wednesday. They continued to develop the main community garden at St. Brigid's Chapel and also worked on the gardens at Glenmore Avenue and the Community Halls. A steering group was formed for developing a Market Garden on Toryglen Park. They completed a permaculture design for it. Frustratingly a purpose built care home was granted permission to use the land. An alternative site for the Market Garden between the high rised flats in Prospecthill Circus and Polmadie cleansing depot was agreed. Unfortunately we weren't given leave to use it until the very end of this period.

MALLS MIRE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEER GROUP

A large number of volunteers continued to attend on a Thursday doing a variety of work maintaining the diversity of this area and associated woodland related activities. Tom Cooper was employed as a Woodlands Officer from September 2011 which led to a much more planned and systematic approach such as a comprehensive forestry plan which allowed the securing of further diverse funding.

ECO KIDS CLUB

This group for 5 -12 year olds continued to meet on a Monday 4 - 5pm to carry out an array of activities based on an environmental theme such as gardening and art and crafts. Also they had used the woods more as an area for activities and exploration.

BLOSSOM FESTIVAL

Our annual celebration of the coming of the cherry blossom to Toryglen, and the biggest social event to showcase the activities of Urban Roots, was a roaring success in late April 2011. Again this year the theme of performing arts proved popular and was all powered by our renewable technology.

PARTNERSHIP WORKING / INTERNS / SESSIONAL WORKERS

Urban Roots continues to concentrate its core activities in Toryglen but to spread the environmental message we have done more partnership work across the southside of Glasgow. Liere Aliende and Craig Mulhern became interns in January 2012 and they did lots of work with schools setting up gardens mainly at Shawlands Academy and Kings Park Primary as well as in Toryglen. Sessional workers continued to do much of our partnership work with other organisations. Lusi Alderslowe carried on working with Cassiltoun Housing Association in The Stables at Castlemilk. In the Gorbals, Mark Hesling worked with the Healthy Living Network there. One of our most successful collaborations was with the Prince's Trust during the autumn of 2011. We employed Alice Warren and Lucy Cunningham as sessional workers who delivered a very successful 6 week programme of activities for a group of local young people. A few found employment whilst on the course whilst some others developed such an interest in conservation work that they started training courses in the subject. One of the highlights of the programme was young people engaging with children from the crèche by working with them on woodland arts and crafts

GREAT GRUB / YOUR MONEY YOUR PLANET / GROW YOUR OWN

These short courses continued to be run by Urban Roots and proved to be very popular. We were also able to raise funds by selling the format for the courses to other organisations.

OTHER COURSES

Urban Roots hosted an introduction and a full design course in Permaculture that started during this period. Permaculture is an innovative design process that incorporates a compassionate value system with a positive "can do" attitude to readdress environmental issues and live as sustainably as possible. Other workshops delivered by us included a popular living willow structures weekend and compost masterclasses.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

Another fine example of collaborative partnership working was the hosting of The Glasgow Southside Harvest Event in September 2011 on Toryglen Park. Co-ordinating an array of organisations this was a hugely popular event promoting growing your own and eating local and seasonal food. Urban Roots also organised two big events promoting sustainability: Green Streets (transport) in September and Save Yer Energy in November. Upcycling (jazzing up old clothes etc) events were enthusiastically attended as was a Halloween event which included a lantern parade through Malls Mire wood. Urban Roots brought the Scottish Government Healthier Scotland Campaign Food Bus to Toryglen in November so that the hands on healthy cooking experience could be experienced by school children, teachers and volunteers.

In September 2011 there was a barbecue for volunteers in the Woods and also a trip to an orchard in Lanarkshire to pick plums. Urban Roots staff cooked a Christmas lunch in Toryglen Community Hall for over 20 volunteers to say a big thank you for all their efforts in 2011.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Directors continue to closely monitor the Charity's finances, with the agreed policy objectives of securing the future of the Charity's projects by establishing a working reserve to provide at least three months. operational core costs.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
