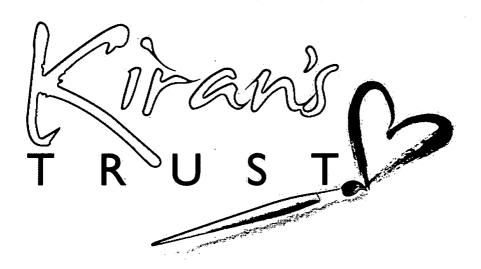

Introduction

The Directors, who are the charity trustees for the purposes of Charity Law, have pleasure in presenting their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2022.

The directors are satisfied with the performance of the charity during the year and the position at 31st December 2022 and consider that the charity is in a strong position to continue its activities during the coming year, and that the charity's assets are adequate to fulfil its obligations.

Objectives and Activities of the Charity

Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year

The objectives of the charity are to provide young people in Scotland with opportunities to advance their education and participation in creative expression and sport. These are achieved by providing support and access to tuition, scholarships, awards, and materials in the various creative arts, including but not limited to art, music, writing, and drama, as well as sporting activities. We work with local schools and recognised youth organisations to ensure both need and talent are equally considered and assisted.

Falkirk Area

Larbert High School, Kiran's former secondary school, is a positive and proactive outlet for Kiran's Trust to support creative arts education. Four school prizes are awarded each year (£25 voucher, along with trophies valued at £10 each) in the subjects of creative art and design, music, creative writing, and the Jessie Kidd Award for Photography. A three-year scholarship is also awarded to support a creative design/art pupil (monies increase each year through to sixth year.) This is the second year for our current recipient, with a £150 award to be used towards art supplies. Our music scholar is also in the second year and was awarded £100.

Falkirk Area (cont)

Carrongrange High School's expressive arts team requested funding (£1,056) to enhance the music and performance experience of their young people across the school: four person Nymrod Communications Kit, PA system with Wireless Microphones and Betopper Stage Lights. This equipment can be used by all of the students regardless of their disability. It was put to good use for their end of year show.

Forth Valley Sensory Centre received £250 for materials and tuition to create Christmas crafts.

This past November we partnered up once again with Master David Bailey and Central Taekwondo Academy to provide support on a request basis and will return our focus to the grassroots ensuring athletes of all levels are encouraged and supported to participate. For the last competition of last year, the Poomse Nationals in Worcester, we provided the entry fee (£100) for a young sister and brother, who are performing very well in Poomse (these are technical forms or patterns) at club level. Edinburgh Area

Best Bib n Tucker are a social enterprising, not for profit organisation based in the Oxgangs area of Edinburgh. They have developed a range of professionaly produced protective clothing, including bibs, smocks and tabards particularly for adults but also children who have additional needs at mealtimes. We have provided funds (£200) to allow four young people to attend a ten-week course to learn hand sewing, machine sewing, patchwork, up-cycling of fabric, and arts and craft projects.

We have been the charity partner for Edinburgh MagicFest's Magic Workshops and Schools for a number of years now. This year we were excited to be part of the next phase of this evolving resource (£1,000), in the form of a Virtual Magic School. MagicFest are launching a brand new primary school teaching resource called 'Virtual Magic School' Using cutting edge 'choose your own adventure' video technology, they have Britain's Got Talent star Kevin Quantum as the magic teacher! Kevin will reveal the real secrets behind magic tricks, and using science, maths and literacy, young people will learn how to master these tricks, presentation skills and much much more. Aligned to both Scottish and English Curricula, the 8 lesson programme is free to all schools and works 'straight out of the box'.

Argyll and Bute Area

Kiran's Trust continues to support rural and remote schools where budgets are slashed or simply no longer exist. Lochgoilhead Primary School took up piano lessons for the 'Wee Class' (10 pupils). A classically trained concert pianist is providing these lessons (£400). Strachur Primary School wished to have a theatre group perform a pantomime for Christmas. The Hopscotch Theater Company performed Jack and the Beanstalk (£725). Some of the elderly people who lunch in the school as part of the rural community service, and the toddler group have been invited to join the pupils and staff for the show (Pictured below).

National

For the sixth year in a row, Kiran's Trust has provided support (£1,000) for the Carers Trust Summer Festival. The festival provides young carers with the opportunity to have fun, meet new friends, offer a meaningful break from their caring responsibilities, as well as the chance to share their thoughts on key issues impacting young carers' lives. In August the festival returned to an in person event after two years of alternative online activities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. After initial consulation with young carers and their services, the Festival resumed the sucessful event format of one location over three days and returned to Fordell Firs Scouts Camp in Fife. An online offering was also available for those Young Carers who could not attend in person.



We have also agreed to fund (£120) marketing materials for Young Carer & Young Adult Carer Advisory Group who are leading a campaign called 'Right to Rest'. Members of this Group attended the Scottish Young Carers Festival as peer researchers. Their findings indicate that 1 in 4 young carers feel guilty taking a break from their caring role and over a third do not understand their rights around taking a break. In response to these findings, the Group have launched their campagn 'Right to Rest: Supporting Young Carers to Take a Break' Their campaign goal is to support young carers to take a break from caring when they need to.

National (cont)

In partnership with Silly Wee Films, Kiran's Trust is an executive producer of a showreel for the prospective TV series Origins of the Laoich. In February, we set up a matched fundraiser to raise £300 to have a theme tune composed for the reel. Prominent Scottish composer Philip Curran, known for scoring TV hits for Children's BBC, Demon Headmaster reboot and EVE among others, was commissioned to write and perform a theme tune for the showreel. It is a terrific and dramatic soundtrack that suits the mythology of the story line! (Photo of the cast in 2020 below).



Fundraising and Sponsors

In 2022, we had 8 friends (a minimum £10 donation), of which three make a recurring monthly payment to Kiran's Trust.

Earlier this year we were nominated to be part of the Asda Foundation Green Token Giving online vote through the Asda store in Stenhousemuir, Falkirk. Thatrogh that vote we received the fantastic sum of £300.

The directors recognise the importance of diversity in how we raise funds and as such have a variety of platforms available. There is a Kiran's Trust 'shop' on eBay (PayPal), where we sell new or second-hand items donated to us. Kiran's Trust is also actively using EasyFundraising and AmazonSmile for people to support us while doing their normal online shopping. Kiran's Trust is registered with the Charities Aid Foundation (CAF). They provide a facility to make one-off donations, recurring donations, and campaign pages. As a charity themselves, they understand the kind of support charities need, and for those of you in the UK, they process all Gift Aid payments, and there is only a small fee charged per transaction.

The Kiran's Trust website (www.kiranstrust.org) provides information regarding the charity, about Kiran (and some of her artwork), objectives and funding, upcoming fundraising events, and access to newsletters and company reports. The Gallery section provides past and current scholars a location to display their work. The new virtual gallery allows us to exhibit collections in a more interactive way. Information outlets are provided via direct mail/email of newsletters, Twitter and Instagram.

The directors express their gratitude to the many individuals who have become Friends, made donations, and attended or supported fundraising events. The directors also wish to acknowledge the support of IDEAS for our virtual platform.

Plans for future periods

The Directors' recognise the difficult times that everyone has been experiencing lately, so we have chosen to limit any focussed fundraising and provide support with the capital available. Market volatility has prevented us from looking to make investments, however the rise in interest rates has meant we have put monies into fixed term savings. We will maintain this approach into 2023 while we watch for exhanges in the financial environment.

Structure, Governance and Management

Nature of the Governing Document and constitution of the charity

Kiran's Trust is a company limited by guarantee, and is governed by the regulations set out in the memorandum and articles of association, incorporated on 15 September 2009, and is recognised as a charity by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator.

The directors meet in person for an annual general meeting and conduct business throughout the year via email, videoconference and in person as required. The directors, on behalf of Kiran's Trust, award prizes, scholarships and support in the area of creative arts, design, music and writing, and for participation in Taekwondo. The recipients are selected by the administrative staff within those organisations to which Kiran's Trust provides support.

Training of Directors/Trustees

Directors' training in developments affecting the charity's areas of activity is addressed as part of the directors' meetings.

All directors are familiar with the work of the charity. If there are any areas where additional training is required this would be discussed at a directors' meeting and a suitable solution identified.

The major risks to which the charity is exposed and reviews and systems to mitigate risks

The Directors have used this time to review various company requirements including policies for privacy and safeguarding. We are data protection certified, and the Scottish Business Resilience team have completed a review and certified us. All documentation pertaining to this activity is lodged on the company section of the website.

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operation and finances of the charity and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

Transactions and Financial position

The financial statements are set out on pages 12 to 17. As stated in the introduction to this report, the trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year to have been satisfactory.

The Statement of Financial Activities show net incoming resources for the year of £2,360 (prior year £24,458). The resources expended were £7,206 (prior year £12,658), giving a deficit of £4,846 (prior year surplus £11,800).

The total reserves at the year end stand at £38,204 (prior year £43,050).

Free unrestricted reserves amounted to £31,789 (prior year £36,685). These reserves are held to ensure that the company's commitments to their scholarships and prizes are able to be fulfilled until such time as additional funding can be put in place.

The designated reserves amounted to £6,415 (prior year £6,365). These are set aside for use during the next financial year to ensure that commitments are met.

Share Capital

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital.

Method of preparation of accounts

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime.

Independent Examiner's Report to the trustees of the charity on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 December 2022

I report on the financial statements of the Charity on pages 12 to 17 for the year ended 31 December 2022 which have been prepared in accordance with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 (The 2005 Act) and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (The 2006 Accounts Regulations) and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRS102), effective January 2016, as modified by the Charities SORP (FRS102), under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on page 14.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's trustees, who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of The 2005 Act and The 2006 Accounts Regulations.

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) The 2006 Accounts Regulations does not apply.

Basis of opinion and scope of work undertaken

I conducted my examination in accordance with Regulation 11 of The 2006 Accounts Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters.

1 Accounting policies Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Revised 2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement, on the grounds that it is a small company.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

Incoming Resources and resources expended

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred.

Governance costs include the general running expenses of the company and consist mainly of those relating to statutory requirements.

Investment Income

Bank Interest received is included on an actual receipts basis.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds structure policy

Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the directors' discretion to apply the fund.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above.

2 Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
