#### Structure, governance and management

#### Constitution

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

#### Related parties & relationship

The company was established with the express aim of organising the development and delivery of the V&A Museum of Design Dundee (V & A Dundee). The founder members have created Design Dundee Limited which will drive the development and delivery of the project. The founder members are Dundee City Council, the Universities of Dundee and Abertay Dundee, Scottish Enterprise and the Victoria & Albert Museum.

#### **Decision-making process**

The decision-making process is a majority vote of the Directors. In the case of an equality of votes, the Chair will have a second casting vote. Where matters require the approval of the founder members the Chair shall not be entitled to cast a second or casting vote in the case of an equality of votes.

#### Recruitment, induction and training of directors

New directors are recruited and appointed according to the workload of the board in terms of both the business of the company and the needs of Design Dundee Limited Induction information is provided to all new directors, and ongoing training is available to all existing directors as required.

#### Risk management

The risk process is overseen by the Audit and Risk Committee and constitutes individual project and department risk assessments and registers and a strategic risk register. In the strategic risk register, key risks are around funding and financial sustainability, staffing and expertise, and delays to the build project at the 'V & A Dundee'. The directors are satisfied that appropriate systems are in place to mitigate these risks.

#### **Objectives**

The objects of the company are:

- i. to advance the arts, heritage, culture and science;
- ii. to advance education and research;
- iii. to advance citizenship and community development in furthering purposes i and ii;
- iv. to advance such similar charitable purposes as the Directors may consider appropriate from time to time.

#### Our vision:

To create an international centre for design, inspiring people and promoting the understanding of design.

#### Our strategic objectives:

- To champion past, present and future design in a Scottish and global context.
- To be a leader in design education, inspiring creativity and developing future skills for design and business innovation.
- To create a world-class, must-see, sustainable cultural attraction.
- To play an integral role in developing Dundee and the region, generating civic pride and supporting regeneration.

#### Plans for future years

As the first ever design museum to be built in the UK outside London, V&A Dundee will be the first dedicated place for Scotland to celebrate its design heritage and nurture its emerging creative talent.

V&A Dundee will focus on design. It will have more than 1,700 square metres of flexible gallery space, with one of the largest dedicated museum-standard exhibition spaces in Scotland. It will host world-class design exhibitions (in partnership with the V&A and other national and international partners) alongside displays devoted to outstanding Scottish design - historical, contemporary and of the future.

Through its wider learning and outreach programmes V&A Dundee provides inspiring opportunities for people of all ages and backgrounds to learn and get involved in design creativity.

V&A Dundee is developing innovative programmes that aim to contribute to long-term economic growth by promoting the importance of design as an essential ingredient within business and enterprise.

#### Report of the directors (continued)

#### Plans for future years (continued)

In the run up to opening, V&A Dundee is working with a variety of partners to develop understanding of the new museum through a range of learning projects, and to develop its business planning and fundraising activities to complete the capital project and to ensure the new institution's long-term sustainability.

#### **Key achievements**

The principal activity of the company in the year under review was the ongoing development of the V&A Dundee project. The construction work being led by Dundee City Council has progressed on programme and on budget, and has achieved key milestones, including the completion of the museum's external structure, the partial completion to programme of its cladding finishes, and the substantial advancement of its internal works. Progress in the construction programme has allowed full planning to begin for public opening in 2018.

Operational readiness of the new institution has become a major focus within the period, with plans set out for all that needs to be done to achieve a successful opening, and the consequent transitioning of DDL into an organisation responsible for taking forward the day-to-day running of a major new museum and cultural attraction. This has involved the development of the staffing resource required, with further Heads of Department appointed with a responsibility for respectively exhibitions and visitor experience and facilities management. Thus, alongside the ongoing development of the Scottish Design Galleries (now at an advanced stage) plans have been made for V&A Dundee's opening programme of changing exhibitions, learning programmes and required facilities for visitors, such as restaurant and café provision and wider visitor welfare.

Fundraising has continued to be an important part of the project's activities. An ongoing fundraising campaign has continued to raise support towards the project's financial targets through private, corporate and trust and foundation donations. A review was undertaken of our fundraising resource, with changes consequently implemented to begin to move this from one primarily concerned with capital fundraising, to fund income generation for future running costs.

Throughout the year, pre-opening audience development activity designed to engage all communities in the developing project and its key themes have been organised and held. This has included learning projects held with communities locally and regionally, a wide programme of public talks introducing audiences to the museum, and the prototyping of a programme introducing the value of design to business and wider social enterprise. A substantial amount of work has also been developed to progress the audience and media planning for the project through digital and social media platforms, and with local and national partners to develop new tourism interest in support of V&A Dundee, the city of Dundee and the wider region.

• V&A Dundee was also selected in early 2016 as the official UK representative at the XXI Milan Design Triennale, which runs from April to September 2016 to a global audience of up to 500,000 visitors. Supported by the British Council and the Scottish Government, the exhibition featured Adventures in Design, a specially commissioned comic strip created by Will Morris and David MacKenzie, charting the story of some of the UK's most exciting design innovations including Jaguar and Harris Tweed.

#### **Financial Report**

The company has a surplus for the year ended 31 March 2017 of £301,926 (2016 - £198,547). The current accumulated surplus of £938,758 is expected to be utilised during the period of development and operation of the 'V&A Dundee'.

#### Key management personnel remuneration

Directors are recruited via advertising and an interview by the board of directors and are invited to join the board. New directors are offered a full induction programme to the organisation covering all aspects of the business. Directors have an ongoing opportunity to participate in any internal or external training available to the organisation. Directors have regular opportunities to meet with managers and staff in the organisation.

The directors consider only one director, along with other members of the management team to be key management personnel, in charge of directing and controlling the charity. Directors are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them and withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises. The pay of key management personnel is reviewed annually and set by the remuneration committee.

#### Reserves policy

Given the nature of the company's funding and its stage of development it is not realistic to set a categoric reserves policy. The directors will continue to ensure that expenditure is only incurred bearing in mind funding available such that reserves and cash are available to meet ongoing obligations.

In the lead up to the opening of the V&A Dundee in 2018 the directors will develop a reserves policy to take account of the operational risks and uncertainties attached to the management and running of the V&A Dundee including fluctuations in funding or unforeseen unbudgeted costs. It is recognised that it may take some years to build up such reserves to an appropriate level for the size of the project.

#### **Auditors**

So far as each director is aware there is no relevant audit information of which the auditors are unaware. Each director has taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

#### Notes to the financial statements

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Status of the company and liability of members

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee of its members and does not have a share capital. Each member has undertaken to contribute an amount not exceeding one pound towards any deficit arising in the event of the company being wound up.

#### Company information

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is Whitehall House, 33 Yeaman Shore, Dundee, DD1 4BJ.

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and include the results of the operations of the charitable company as indicated in the directors' report, all of which are continuing.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Design Dundee Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest  $\pounds$ .

#### **Going concern**

At the time of approving the financial statements, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

#### Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government or other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Notes to the financial statements (continued)

#### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

#### **Expenditure**

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal obligation to pay for expenditure.

- Cost of generating funds includes all fundraising costs.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the V&A Dundee project.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories.

#### **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### **Creditors and provisions**

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

#### **Pension schemes**

Design Dundee Limited make contributions to the Royal London pension scheme, a defined contribution scheme, the assets of the scheme being held separately from the assets of the company. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to the scheme. The company liability is limited to the amount of the contribution.

#### Notes to the financial statements (continued)

#### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

#### Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Office equipment

3 years straight line

#### Funds 1

All income and expenditure is dealt with through the Statement of Financial Activities. Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

**Restricted funds** are funds subject to specific trusts, which may be declared by the donor or with their authority (eg by the restrictive wording of an appeal). Some are restricted income funds expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of a particular activity. Others are capital funds where the assets are required to be invested for long term use.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the objects of the company.

**Designated funds** are expendable on specific purposes, the purpose of which has been determined by the directors.

A transfer is made from unrestricted funds to restricted funds to compensate fully all restricted funds which would otherwise be in deficit at the accounting date.
