Report of the directors

This is the report of the directors of Design Dundee Limited for the year to 31 March 2015.

The company information set out on page 1 forms part of this report.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Related parties & relationship

The company was established with the express aim of organising the development and delivery of the V&A Museum of Design Dundee (V & A Dundee). The founder members have created Design Dundee Limited which will drive the development and delivery of the project. The founder members are Dundee City Council, the Universities of Dundee and Abertay Dundee, Scottish Enterprise and the Victoria & Albert Museum.

Decision making process

The decision making process is a majority vote of the Directors. In the case of an equality of votes, the Chair will have a second casting vote. Where matters require the approval of the founder members the Chair shall not be entitled to cast a second or casting vote in the case of an equality of votes.

Recruitment, induction and training of directors

New directors are recruited and appointed according to the workload of the board in terms of both the business of the company and the needs of Design Dundee Limited in that they require specific jobs to be fulfilled by their directors.

Directors and organisation structure

Directors and organisation structure (continued)

Moira Gemmill represented Victoria & Albert Museum on the Board of Design Dundee Limited until January 2015 when she moved to another role within the sector. Due to her valuable contribution, she was re-appointed as an Independent Director. She lost her life in a traffic accident in April 2015 and will be sadly missed by friends and colleagues.

The board of directors met five times during the year.

A director may appoint an alternate director who can attend and vote at meetings where the director will not be present. Alternate directors shall remain in place until their appointing director removes them or the appointing director leaves their own position.

All directors are considered to be trustees in terms of Charities Legislation.

The Directors have established committees to assist the Board to fulfil its responsibilities as follows:

- financial impact of all threats, opportunities and risks

Risk management

The directors regularly assess the major risks to which Design Dundee Limited is exposed, in particular those related to the operation and finances of the company, in order to satisfy themselves that systems are in place to mitigate the company's exposure to the major risks.

Objectives

The objects of the company are:

- i. to advance the arts, heritage, culture and science;
- ii. to advance education and research;
- iii. to advance citizenship and community development in furthering purposes i and ii;

Objectives (continued)

iv. to advance such similar charitable purposes as the Directors may consider appropriate from time to time.

The foregoing charitable purposes, which are designed to benefit the people of Dundee, Scotland, the rest of the United Kingdom and the world, are to be particularly furthered by (1) the establishment, building, construction and promotion of a museum and associated resources and facilities based in Dundee together with associated infrastructure enhancement and development; (2) the operation, management and development of the museum and other resources and facilities which provide public access to collections of works of art and design including in particular modern, contemporary and future facing creative design and applied arts; (3) the development of a local, national and international centre for design and creative excellence based in Dundee; (4) the development and delivery of arts and cultural activities and events, workshops, artistic programmes, curatorial strategic and policies and educational and research projects; and (5) a culture based contribution to civic pride and regeneration in Dundee and beyond.

Plans for future years

As the first ever design museum to be built in the UK outside London, V&A Dundee will be the first dedicated place for Scotland to celebrate its design heritage and nurture its emerging creative talent.

V&A Dundee will focus on design. It will have more than 1,700 square metres of flexible gallery space, with one of the largest dedicated museum-standard exhibition spaces in Scotland. It will host world-class design exhibitions (in partnership with the V&A and other national and international partners) alongside displays devoted to outstanding Scottish design - historical, contemporary and of the future.

Through its wider learning and outreach programmes V&A Dundee will provide inspiring opportunities for people of all ages and backgrounds to learn and get involved in design creativity. We began this work with communities in Dundee in 2014.

V&A Dundee will develop innovative programmes that aim to contribute to long-term economic growth by promoting the importance of design as an essential ingredient within business and enterprise.

In the run up to opening V&A Dundee is working with a variety of partners to deliver a programme of exhibitions and activities designed to provide a taste of the world-class shows and events Scotland will eventually enjoy through V&A Dundee.

Key achievements

The principal activity of the company in the year under review was that of the development of the "V&A Dundee" project. This included a competitive tender which led to the appointment of BAM Construction Scotland, securing increased public sector funding to allow the project to go live and the start of construction work in March 2015. Subsequently, the first construction milestone, completion of a coffer dam in the River Tay, was reached on time and on budget by June 2015. The museum construction is being led by Dundee City Council. The building will be owned and maintained by Dundee City Council. It will be operated by Design Dundee Limited.

Report of the directors

A Scottish Government grant of £400,000 was allocated during the year. Additional in kind contributions were received from founder members. The grant and other contributions supported expenditure on a varying programme of pre-opening audience development activity designed to engage people in the museum and design themes. Key achievements included:

- People from across Dundee took part in Living Room for the City, the V&A Dundee's first community engagement project in 2014. Inspired by the museum's architect Kengo Kuma who described the V&A Dundee building as a 'living room for the city'. The project encouraged people to think about what design is and the designs they choose and own in their homes. The programme included free community workshops involving 250 people across eight city wards, family workshops and an exhibition at the Hannah Maclure Centre, Abertay University in August 2014 as well as engagement online and across Scotland.
- A series of joint events hosted by V&A Dundee and Design in Action the Arts &
 Humanities Research Council knowledge exchange hub based at the University of Dundee –
 were aimed at enhancing the reputation, status and understanding of contemporary design in
 Scotland. Speakers included Alice Rawsthorn OBE, the internationally renowned design
 commentator and author of the critically acclaimed book, Hello World: Where Design Meets
 Life.
- A partnership with The McManus, Dundee's Art Gallery and Museum which included
 presenting the V&A exhibition Posters of Protest and Revolution at The McManus from
 November 2014 to January 2015. The display brought together some of the most potent
 and often controversial images used to declare opposition to major events throughout the
 world.
- Almost 12,000 people visited Design in Motion, the first V&A Dundee touring exhibition, taking the work of seven of Scotland's most exciting contemporary designers around Scotland. The tour visited 78 locations from the Western Isles to the Dumfries & Galloway and engaged with schools, colleges and universities across Scotland, highlighting ways in which V&A Dundee will help boost the country's creative industries.

Financial Report

The company has a surplus for the year ended 31 March 2015 of £878 (2014 - £132,891). The current accumulated surplus of £448,468 is expected to be utilised during the period of development of the 'V&A Dundee' project.

Reserves policy

Given the nature of the company's funding and its stage of development it is not realistic to set a categoric reserves policy. The directors will continue to ensure that expenditure is only incurred bearing in mind funding available such that reserves and cash are available to meet ongoing obligations. An updated reserves policy will be created during 2015.

Notes to the accounts

1 Accounting policies

In common with many other charities of our size and nature, we use our auditors to assist with the preparation of the accounts.

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and recommended practice under the historical cost convention and include the results of the charity's operations, all of which are continuing.

The accounts have been compiled in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable law.

Incoming resources

Grants

Grants received towards company fixed assets are credited directly to a deferred capital grant account, thereafter being released to the income and expenditure account at the same rate as the depreciation on the assets to which the grants relate.

Grants and other income towards revenue expenditure are credited to revenue in the year to which they relate.

Resources expended

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal obligation to pay for expenditure.

- Cost of generating funds includes all fundraising costs.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the V&A Dundee project.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories.

Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Funds

All income and expenditure is dealt with through the Statement of Financial Activities. Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific trusts, which may be declared by the donor or with their authority (eg by the restrictive wording of an appeal). Some are restricted income funds expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of a particular activity. Others are capital funds where the assets are required to be invested for long term use.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the objects of the company.

A transfer is made from unrestricted funds to restricted funds to compensate fully all restricted funds which would otherwise be in deficit at the accounting date.

Pensions

Design Dundee Limited makes payments to personal pension plans on behalf of employees.
