### The Annual Report including Directors Report

### Introduction

V&A Dundee is Scotland's first design museum and a new landmark cultural building for the nation. Its opening on 15 September 2018 marked the culmination of over 11 years of planning to create a new museum that will help our understanding of design creativity as well as contributing to the local community and the redevelopment of Dundee.

Increasingly, design creativity is understood as critical to societal change and improvement, and fundamental to future prosperity and well-being. V&A Dundee is uniquely placed to play a role in this, making a wide and significant contribution through its mission to enrich lives through design. The museum has an ambitious vision to investigate the international importance of design, alongside the outstanding success of Scotland in creativity and innovation.

2018-19 was a year of achievement for V&A Dundee as a series of milestones to realise the museum were met in the countdown to public opening. The early months of opening demonstrated that vision through a vibrant programme which included a public festival, major exhibitions, new design commissions and events. With 500,000 people welcomed as visitors to the museum in its first six months, engagement was significantly higher than originally anticipated.

### The museum development

Design Dundee Ltd was established to develop and operate V&A Dundee. The founding partners are the Victoria and Albert Museum, Dundee City Council, the University of Dundee, Abertay University and Scottish Enterprise.

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity (Registered Charity no: SC041219) governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The objectives outlined in its Articles of Association are:

- · to advance the arts, heritage, culture & science
- to advance education & research
- to advance citizenship & community development

The Articles of Association state that DDL will further these objectives through:

- the establishment, building, construction and promotion of a museum and associated resources and facilities based in Dundee, together with associated infrastructure development and enhancement.
- the operation, management and development of the museum and other resources and facilities which provide the public with access to collections of works of art and design.
- the creation of a local, national and international centre for design & creative excellence based in Dundee.
- the development and delivery of arts & cultural activities and events, workshops, artistic
  programmes, curatorial strategy and educational and research projects.
- the establishment of a culture-based provision to foster civic pride and regeneration in Dundee and beyond.

V&A Dundee has been established in close partnership with the Victoria and Albert Museum (V&A), drawing on its world-class collections of art, design and performance, as well as the V&A's curatorial expertise and exhibitions. It is promoted as part of the V&A's family of sites.

The museum building, the first in the UK designed by Japanese architect Kengo Kuma, is part of the Dundee City Council estate and is operated by Design Dundee Limited rent free.

### Mission and vision

Our mission, Enriching lives through design, summarises the enduring purpose of V&A Dundee.

Our vision sets out the five-year focus established in our Opening Business Plan 2018-23:

To create an international centre for design, inspiring people and promoting the understanding of design.

### Strategic Objectives

To achieve our vision, we aim to:

- 1. Champion past, present and future design in a Scottish and global context.
- 2. Be a leader in design education, inspiring creativity and developing future skills for design and business innovation.
- 3. Create a world-class, must-see, sustainable cultural attraction.
- 4. Play an integral role in developing Dundee and the region, generating civic pride and supporting regeneration.

### Highlights 2018-19

Championing past, present and future design in a Scottish and global context

The capital development of V&A Dundee successfully met all of the National Lottery Heritage Fund Approved Purposes which were set at the early stages of the project to: construct a new V&A museum; create two galleries dedicated to Scotland's design heritage; restore the Charles Rennie Mackintosh Oak Room; and deliver a wide-ranging programme of exhibitions and activities.

The creation of the Scottish Design Galleries tells for the first time in a permanent display the extraordinary story of Scottish design, spanning over 500 years. Featuring 300 objects, the creation of the galleries has ensured that Scottish design heritage has been conserved for future generations to enjoy, experience and be inspired by. Research in the museum during the first three months of opening found that 89% of visitors positively rated the galleries as providing an understanding of Scottish design and 86% for providing an understanding of Scotland's place in the world of design. The museum's publication *The Story of Scottish Design*, one of the museum's best-selling items and the first ever comprehensive history of Scotland's design creativity, is also helping bring Scottish design heritage to a wide audience.

As a result of the development of the galleries, there are now around 12,000 objects that are classified as examples of Scottish design in the V&A's collection. Almost all of the V&A objects featured in the Scottish Design Galleries, around 200 objects, received some conservation work while the conservation of around 20 loaned objects was undertaken.

The centrepiece of the galleries, Charles Rennie Mackintosh's Oak Room, is itself an exceptional achievement, realised through a partnership between V&A Dundee, Dundee City Council and Glasgow Museums. The £1.3m project completed the installation of the room in the museum by May 2018 ahead of the galleries fit-out. This remarkable original tearoom interior by the world-famous architect and designer is now successfully conserved, restored and reconstructed for visitors to enjoy and see for the first time in some fifty years.

The development of the permanent galleries has been accompanied by an exciting changing exhibition programme bringing major V&A-originated exhibitions outside of London in the UK for the first time, responsive displays exploring topical design concerns in the Michelin Design Gallery, an extensive learning programme for diverse audiences, a series of commissions and a Designer-in-Residence programme. These wide-ranging activities have helped to make the galleries and the subject of design accessible, fun and inspiring, providing new opportunities for all who get involved, and in particular those interested in the creative industries.

The exhibitions programme in 2018-19 has been as follows:

Ocean Liners: Speed and Style – 15 September 2018 to 24 February 2019 Scottish Design Relay – 15 September 2018 to 10 February Rules of Play – 15 February to 23 June 2019

A Few Minutes of Design – 4 March to 14 April 2019

The museum's opening exhibition, *Ocean* Liners, gave an unprecedented insight into the design, construction and style of the largest ever moving vessels ever built. Featuring ship-building from around the world, it recognised Scotland's central contribution to this global industry in the first part of the 20th century. V&A Dundee's second national outreach project, the *Scottish Design Relay*, has helped to capture a record of the significance of local heritage to specific areas across the length and breadth of Scotland, its relevance to design today and to inspire new design ideas. This was showcased in the museum's first exhibition in the Michelin Design Gallery.

Scottish Design Relay was part of the ambitious pre-opening programme which culminated in 2018 when the museum celebrated the engagement of over 100,000 people in Scotland, the UK and overseas in design activities at an event in the Scottish Parliament.

Leading in design education, inspiring creativity and developing future skills for design and business innovation

Alongside the exhibition programme, a residency programme was launched to support designers to develop new skills, take risks, undertake research and create exciting new work. Residencies and commissions developed in 2018-19 included:

This, Looped, a new work situated in the museum's striking upper hall by Glasgow-based artist and Turner Prize nominee Ciara Phillips. The commission was to produce an installation inspired by unseen aspects of the V&A's Scottish textile and ceramic collection.

Plain and Ornamental of Every Description is a compelling piece of graphic design created by Scottish designer Maeve Redmond responding to the themes in Scottish Design Galleries, particularly internationalism. The work explores the global business of the 19<sup>th</sup>-century Scottish cast-iron manufacturers Walter MacFarlane & Co, through the contemporary designer's unpacking of their 19<sup>th</sup>-century trade catalogue.

Fragments of a Fictional Place was created by the museum's first Designer in Residence Simon Meek, a mixed-media storyteller and founder of games studio The Secret Experiment. Presented as a unique array of digital artefacts, performances and print, each element depicted an event from within an entirely made-up, yet familiar, Scottish town.

A specially commissioned digital light and sound collaboration between contemporary visual artist and Turner Prize nominee Jim Lambie and the Scottish rock band Primal Scream for the museum's opening festival, the 3D Festival (Design, Dundee, Discovery).

Central to the development of the museum were spaces to support learning. The Inches Carr Trust Resource Centre is a reading area where visitors to the museum can take inspiration from the many books freely available. This includes books on the history, theory and practice of design, as well as beautifully designed children's books.

The Thomson Learning Centre is a dedicated space to deliver learning activities in the museum which are inspired and influenced by the Scottish Design Galleries and the wider programme, as well as the architecture of V&A Dundee. It is also hosts the museum's schools programme, co-designed by teachers and delivered by practising designers. The studios host regular weekend and holiday activities to encourage families to learn and create together, as well as workshops and activities for visitors of all ages.

Since the museum's opening, 10,000 people have taken part in special family workshops. Between September 2018 and March 2019, there were over 2,500 engagements with schools through workshops and tours.

V&A Dundee's Design for Business programme seeks to engage and contribute to the innovation ambitions of Scottish businesses, the Scottish economy and overall national business landscape. It takes the museum's strategic aim of *Enriching lives through design* and translates this into a practical and accessible programme of design-led innovation workshops to help Scottish businesses innovate and prosper. Almost 290 Scottish businesses engaged with workshops in the Design for Business programme.

Create a world-class, must-see, sustainable cultural attraction

Summer 2018 realised the culmination of a £15m capital fundraising campaign to develop V&A Dundee – the biggest philanthropic contribution ever made to date in Scotland for a project of this kind.

During the year, major construction and development milestones were successfully completed: The fitout works were completed in July 2018; the defects period for the Building and External Works completed in January 2019; and the final account for the BAM Contract (building, external works and fit-out) in January 2019.

In parallel to the construction, the development of Design Dundee Ltd moved forward at pace. Systems for IT, AV, ticketing, collections management, visitor counting and building management were configured and installed. A recruitment drive for visitor assistants in May 2018 selected a strong team through an assessment centre and this was followed with two weeks of intensive training in advance of opening including WorldHost customer service.

From public opening on 15 September to the end of March 2019, V&A Dundee welcomed 500,000 visitors, achieving its annual target in just over six months. Over 380,000 visitors enjoyed the Scottish Design Galleries and over 96,000 purchased admission to see the inaugural exhibition, *Ocean Liners:* Speed and Style.

The reach of V&A Dundee's media coverage in 2018/19 increased substantially from the baseline established over the previous three financial years. The potential audience for this media coverage in 2018-19 was 802.4 million for print and broadcast and 12.7 billion online.

A new website was developed to support the launch of the museum with the first stages going live in July 2018. It was agreed that the website for the operating venue would be hosted on V&A infrastructure, becoming part of the V&A digital estate and being represented as part of the V&A family. Since opening, V&A Dundee's website has had over 1.5 million unique page views.

Across the museum's social media platforms, there are 93,331 followers – a 39% increase compared to the previous year. The number of Instagram followers has significantly increased, by 98%, the platform predominantly used by those aged 24 to 34.

To support its development as a visitor attraction, the museum has been positioned in both VisitScotland's *Scotland Is Now* global campaign and the UK Government's *GREAT* Britain campaign. It has also been part of the Tay Country initiative which involved collaboration with Dundee, Angus, Fife and Perth & Kinross to ensure the regional area capitalises on the opening of V&A Dundee and benefits from the visitor ripple effect for the whole area. Under the city's place brand, *Dundee – One City, Many Discoveries*, the museum has worked with local stakeholders to ensure consistent messaging around the city and V&A Dundee.

As a result of sustained effort to promote the museum as part of the city destination experience, the city has featured prominently in a significant number of prestigious international travel guides including Lonely Planet Best in Europe 2018, Bloomberg's Where to Go in 2018, Condé Nast Traveller City Breaks UK: The 10 Best for 2019 and the National Geographic's The Cool List 2019.

The innovative design and installation of a 100% low-carbon heating and cooling system at V&A Dundee is a first in the UK, the museum winning a Carbon Reduction Award at the Scottish Green Energy Awards in 2018 in consequence.

Play an integral role in developing Dundee and the region, generating civic pride and supporting regeneration

Standing at the centre of Dundee's waterfront transformation, the £80.1m museum development has been widely recognised for its contribution to the repositioning of the city as a great place to live, visit, study and invest in. This was reinforced in early 2019 when the city was listed as Scotland's best place to live in The Sunday Times Best Places to Live 2019.

Economic impact research commissioned by V&A Dundee in 2018 indicates strong evidence of a positive impact on the local economy and regeneration in the city. Based on the original estimate that the museum would attract 500,000 visitors in its first 12 months, its economic impact is forecast as at least £10.3m for the Dundee economy alone, supporting the equivalent of 178 FTE jobs. The construction of V&A Dundee has already generated total employment of 501 job years and £35.8m GVA in Dundee – demonstrating the scale of the boost in employment and economic activity in the city over the life of the construction phase. Across the Scottish economy, 981 job years and £70.4m GVA were generated. These are in excess of previous estimates and demonstrate the scale of the boost in employment and economic activity in the city over the life of the construction phase.

Dundee City Council has reported that the city experienced a £187m tourism boost during 2018 – exceeding the tourism strategy figure for 2020. During the year that V&A Dundee opened, the research found the value to the tourism industry was up almost £16m on the previous 12 months. During the same period, there was significant growth in number of overnight stays and the total number of visitors to Dundee.

V&A Dundee's opening was marked by the free-admission 3D Festival in Slessor Gardens, co-curated by the museum Young People's Collective. It attracted significant local and global audiences, and the evening event was broadcast live as a 90-minute BBC Two Scotland programme. Headlined by Scotlish rock band Primal Scream, it included a sound and light finale that used the museum building to create an immersive experience. The Saturday part of the festival included mass collaborative dance and musical performances involving school pupils and students, professional dance companies, a choir by Sistema Scotland, and Dundee musical icon Gary Clark.

22,600 people attended the 3D Festival over two days. The total net impact of the festival was estimated to be £950,000 at the Scotland level, representing 11.4 job years and approximately £360,000 GVA. Audience research carried out for the festival indicates both audience satisfaction and a positive impact on people's impressions of Dundee. 94% of respondents felt that the 3D Festival was an appropriate way to celebrate the opening of V&A Dundee. 84% of respondents who had been to the 3D Festival said that it had affected their impression of Dundee in a positive way. People surveyed from Dundee suggested it was an opportunity to share their pride in their home city.

A public ballot was run to distribute free tickets to visit the museum on opening weekend with over 8,000 people securing these. Around 300 journalists, bloggers and vloggers from across the world attended press previews days. A total of 2,250 stakeholders attended preview and celebration events. The day before public opening, a further 2,100 community guests visited the museum for special tours including those who had previously taken part in V&A Dundee projects, community groups, family groups, nursery and school children, students and youth groups.

V&A Dundee has also ensured that a wide range of communities are engaged with design and the museum. This includes the Amina Muslim Women's Resource Centre who are undertaking two-year training programme supported by the Rank Foundation to train local women to deliver inclusive tours for BAME communities in their native languages. The museum's Young People's Collective, a group of 16 to 24 year-olds from diverse communities across Dundee, has also been central to developing V&A Dundee's strategy for young people's engagement — co-designing the young people's programme and collaborating with professional designers and event planners.

The museum building has been designed to be an inclusive and accessible building, with a range of access provisions. This includes regular tours led by trained guides with the support of interpreters and handling resources, and sensory-friendly morning events.

V&A Dundee has been recognised as a finalist for the prestigious title of Art Fund Museum of the Year 2019. It was awarded the Royal Institute of Charted Surveyors 2019 Award for Tourism and Leisure, the Royal Incorporation of Architects Scotland Award for Architectural Excellence, the Wallpaper\* Design Awards Best New Public Building, and a unique award from the Institute of Directors for Transforming Scotland

The museum was officially opened to the public on 29 January 2019 by HRH The Duchess of Cambridge, the patron of the Victoria and Albert Museum who was accompanied by the Duke of Cambridge.

### Structure, governance and management

### Constitution

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

### Related parties & relationship

The company was established with the express aim of organising the development and delivery of the V&A Dundee. The founder members have created Design Dundee Limited which will drive the development and delivery of the project. The founder members are Dundee City Council, the Universities of Dundee and Abertay Dundee, Scottish Enterprise and the Victoria & Albert Museum.

### **Decision-making process**

The decision-making process is a majority vote of the Directors. In the case of an equality of votes, the Chair will have a second casting vote. Where matters require the approval of the founder members the Chair shall not be entitled to cast a second or casting vote in the case of an equality of votes.

### Recruitment, induction and training of directors

New directors are recruited and appointed according to the workload of the board in terms of both the business of the company and the needs of Design Dundee Limited Induction information is provided to all new directors, and ongoing training is available to all existing directors as required.

As a founding member, Abertay University retain the right to nominate a new Board Director and alternate.

The board of directors met nine times during the year.

### Risk management

The risk process is overseen by the Finance and Risk Committee and constitutes individual project and department risk assessments and registers and a strategic risk register. In the strategic risk register, key risks are around funding and financial sustainability, staffing and expertise, and BREXIT. The directors are satisfied that appropriate systems are in place to mitigate these risks. To assist the work of the committees noted above, a Financial Sustainability Group was established to examine opening year funding pressures and support senior management.

### Plans for future years

As the first ever design museum to be built in the UK outside London, V&A Dundee is the first dedicated place for Scotland to celebrate its design heritage and nurture its emerging creative talent.

V&A Dundee will continue to focus on design. It has more than 1,700 square metres of flexible gallery space, with the largest dedicated museum-standard exhibition space in Scotland. It will continue to host world-class design exhibitions (in partnership with the V&A and other national and international partners) alongside displays devoted to outstanding Scottish design - historical, contemporary and of the future.

Through its wider learning and outreach programmes V&A Dundee provides inspiring opportunities for people of all ages and backgrounds to learn and get involved in design creativity.

V&A Dundee is developing innovative programmes that aim to contribute to long-term economic growth by promoting the importance of design as an essential ingredient within business and enterprise.

### **Financial Report**

The group has a surplus for the year ended 31 March 2019 of £779,924 (2018 - £48,208). The current accumulated surplus of £1,670,474 (2018 - £890,550) is expected to be utilised during the period of development and operation of the 'V&A Dundee'.

### **Group entities**

Design Dundee Limited is the parent company of a small group.

The principal activity of the subsidiary, Design Dundee Enterprises Limited, is the running of the gift shop and receives commission income from the café and restaurant.

### Key management personnel remuneration

Directors are recruited via advertising and an interview by the board of directors and are invited to join the board. New directors are offered a full induction programme to the organisation covering all aspects of the business. Directors have an ongoing opportunity to participate in any internal or external training available to the organisation. Directors have regular opportunities to meet with managers and staff in the organisation.

The directors consider only one director, along with other members of the management team to be key management personnel, in charge of directing and controlling the charity. Directors are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them and withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises. The pay of key management personnel is reviewed annually and set by the remuneration committee.

### Reserves policy

Reserves should be held to service working capital requirements, unexpected events such as an annual operating deficit, unforeseen and anomalous expenditure, as well as, shortfalls in income, for instance the loss a material source of funding. The Board have approved a policy with the intention to build reserves to £500,000 which equates to approximately six weeks' running costs.

It is recognised that it may take some years to build up such reserves to an appropriate level for the size of the project. The target could feasibly be achieved by a strategy covering legacies and discussions with the principal funders and founders.

### **Auditors**

So far as each director is aware there is no relevant audit information of which the auditors are unaware. Each director has taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

### Notes to the consolidated financial statements

### 1 Accounting policies

### Status of the company and liability of members

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee of its members and does not have a share capital. Each member has undertaken to contribute an amount not exceeding one pound towards any deficit arising in the event of the company being wound up.

### Company information

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is Whitehall House, 33 Yeaman Shore, Dundee, DD1 4BJ.

### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Design Dundee Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

### Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the directors are satisfied that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

### Group financial statements

These financial statements consolidated the results of the charitable company and it's wholly owned subsidiary, Design Dundee Enterprises Limited, on a line by line basis.

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the group in the preparation of the financial statements.

### Income

Income is recognised when the company has entitlement to funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government or other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the company has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

In kind support has been valued at the cost of the goods or services provided, and recognised as income when received by the company.

Notes to the consolidated financial statements (continued)

### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

### Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal obligation to pay for expenditure.

- Cost of raising funds includes all fundraising costs.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the V&A Dundee project.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its
  assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories.

### Stock

Stock is valued on the basis of actual cost or net realisable value if lower.

### **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and cash held in a deposit or similar account.

### Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

### Pension schemes

Design Dundee Limited make contributions to the Royal London pension scheme, a defined contribution scheme, the assets of the scheme being held separately from the assets of the company. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to the scheme. The company liability is limited to the amount of the contribution.

### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

### Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Software and content
Network infrastructure

### **Financial instruments**

The company only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

### **Funds**

All income and expenditure is dealt with through the Statement of Financial Activities. Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

**Restricted funds** are funds subject to specific trusts, which may be declared by the donor or with their authority (eg by the restrictive wording of an appeal). Some are restricted income funds expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of a particular activity. Others are capital funds where the assets are required to be invested for long term use.

*Unrestricted funds* are expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the objects of the company.

**Designated funds** are expendable on specific purposes, the purpose of which has been determined by the directors.

A transfer is made from unrestricted funds to restricted funds to compensate fully all restricted funds which would otherwise be in deficit at the accounting date.

### Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are revised on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
