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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2019. The charity has opted to prepare its accounts using the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and follow the appropriate Charities SORP (FRS 102). As a charity registered in Scotland, the charitable company also reports in accordance with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Objectives and Aims**

Since Easterhouse Phoenix's inception over 10 years ago the charity's aims and objectives have been clear and have remained relatively unchanged. Our objectives are to engage with the residents of Easterhouse and surrounding areas. According to the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD), Easterhouse remains in the lowest decile for all areas of deprivation making the need for our Community Centre greater than ever. We especially focus on the vulnerable, deprived, excluded and marginalised residents aiming to re-engage them in our local and wider communities. These are the people who are hardest to reach and most in need of our help and support. We aim to assist these residents by providing alternative channels for their energies, addressing the entrenched cultures of unemployment, unhealthy lifestyle choices, territorialism and drug & alcohol abuse by supporting, educating and encouraging them to make real changes to their lives.

Our aim is to create a culture of healthy bodies and healthy minds. These are interlinked and play a major part in our holistic approach to improving the lives of those who come through our doors. We aim to continue to provide a community and opportunity centre that is a focus for the community and plays a major role in the regeneration of the wider community by guiding, supporting and nurturing people of all ages, engendering a true sense of community.

### Significant activities

The centre is in the building that used to be the Council run library at 5 Shandwick Street in Easterhouse Glasgow. The transformation of the derelict building into the Phoenix Centre is the result of years of hard work by Richard McShane and a small group of dedicated volunteers. We are now into our third fully functioning year in the building and h to make are now making changes as we have grown and developed, adapting to the needs of our clientele.

The Centre is open every week of the year and most days of the week as required. People now know that we are offering a comprehensive and growing range of activities and that they are welcome to come and join in irrespective of age or ability. Leaflets on activities are available within the Centre and at other venues in the local community.

One of the major changes this year was in the room that had been previously used by the Women's Centre before they relocated to another room in our building. It has been successfully converted into a large fully functioning catering kitchen. Most of the fixtures and fittings were donated by Glasgow City Buildings and other local trades' people.

One of the significant activities that started this year was the Cycle Club which began as a result of consultation with Gayle Weir the Links Coordinator for the Easterhouse Health Centre. She is fully supportive of the work that our Centre is doing and actively encourages people who attend her practice to become involved in activities in our Centre. On a number of occasions the Cycle Club has taken people on local cycle rides in the Seven Lochs area which borders the area around the Centre and is an ideal location for people to regain confidence in cycling. Since then the club has got busier and busier. We were successful in attaining a grant from Cycle Scotland to purchase bikes suitable for the needs of all, including three wheelers. Two local volunteers were trained as bike mechanics to maintain the bikes. There is a great deal of interest and support for the cycling club and it will, we are sure, continue to grow.

### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

### **Charitable Activities**

The Phoenix Community Centre currently has: a function hall, a main hall, a seating area, a large kitchen and a small kitchen, a library/meeting room, a counselling room, a squash/racket ball court, a fitness room and an office. These areas are available for the use by the various clubs and groups and people from the local community.

The Centre continues to be one of Easterhouse's Community Hubs along with 7 other organisations. With the support and encourage of Glasgow Life we are continuing to develop our expertise and what we are able to offer. We have worked very closely with their Sports Coordinator Liam Baird who has helped with funding for a range of activities and equipment and we look forward to continuing to work with Glasgow Life in the future. Through them we are also continuing to develop our links with local primary schools.

Currently the range of activities on offer in the centre include: a women's support group that meets 5 days a week, a club for children with special needs and their siblings two evenings a week, a cycle club, yoga classes, a pensioners club, low tech gym with a fitness/weights trainer on hand at least once a week, a boxing club and a burlesque fitness class. We also now have a badminton club which operates out of the local secondary school.

The Easterhouse Phoenix boxing club has had over 600 people join in the year or so that it has been fully operational. One of the boxers who came to the club when she was sixteen and had never boxed before has been selected to box for Scotland. The boxing club won the Glasgow City Council Club of the Year Award in February and the Easterhouse Phoenix Community Centre won the Community Impact Of The Year Award at the same event. These were two prestigious awards which we were proud to receive as they recognise not only the work being done by the boxing coaches but the fantastic work that the Centre is doing in reengaging people in the community.

Easterhouse North Community Council now holds its monthly meetings in the Centre. This has brought new people into the Centre and has helped establish us as a real focal point in the community.

### Charitable activities

Funding, as always, continues to be an issue but progress continues to be made. Liam from Glasgow Life provides great assistance in sourcing grant opportunities.

The Centre has been used to host a number of community groups including the North East Glasgow Health Improvement Team, the Easterhouse Community Sports Hub and Kelvin College. We see this as an important part of our remit, opening our doors to the wider community and encouraging cross agency engagement.

Currently we have submitted an application for a new heating system with Land Trust. This will make a significant difference to the groups that use the Centre and help unsure that during the winter months the Centre remains fully operational and available for hire.

As in previous years everyone connected with the Phoenix Centre is a volunteer and it is hoped that it will soon be possible to acquire funding for staff. We remain committed to providing access to activities and support

Now that the Centre is operational there has be an increase in expenditure and it remains our intention to be able to establish a reserve based on three months operating costs.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

Awareness and support for our efforts remains excellent across most sectors. We continue to attracted a great deal of positive publicity for the charity with stories appearing in local and national press and on television and this has helped raise awareness of the work that we are doing across the wider Glasgow community and across Scotland.

Funding remains of the highest priority for the trustees who are continuing to make progress in this area. There are more rooms to be renovated, and we hope to approach the Area Partnership for funding help. The lease we secured 3 year ago has helped us to apply for some funding but we are making significant progress in the renegotiation of the terms of our lease.

We will continue to work with members of the community to provide a facility that they can utilise and that they can be proud of.

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
