### Structure, governance and management

Scottish Network Churches (SNC) was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee (registered in Scotland) on 26 March 2010 and was registered as a charity on 13 April 2010. The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established its objects and powers as a charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. It is a both a registered Company (No. SC375655) and a Scottish Charity (No. SC041393).

### Recruitment, appointment and training of Directors

Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the members of the Board are recruited and appointed by the existing directors which must be re-elected at each Annual General Meeting. Directors are appointed on the basis of their wisdom and experience and awareness of the responsibility and obligations of a Board Director.

### Day-to-day management

Day to day management of the Charity is undertaken by the Network Administrator.

### **Objectives and activities**

The SNC is an organisation comprising churches and church leaders who have formed a relationship and work together to strengthen and encourage the Church in Scotland and its missionary endeavours internationally.

The purposes of the organisation are delivered by:

- The activity of the Board and volunteers of the Charity itself; and
- The activity of its member churches.

There is a reciprocal relationship between the Charity and its member churches as all of the Directors are involved with the leadership teams of member churches.

### Report of the Directors for the year ended 31 March 2023

The objectives are delivered through:

- One on one mentoring of church leaders;
- · Church leaders' meetings;
- · An annual conference; and
- Smaller local conferences in individual churches.

At each of these meetings, the purposes of the SNC and of member churches are discussed and reviewed. Member churches are also encouraged to give feedback on how they are providing a public benefit to their local communities as well as on the spiritual enhancement of their members. The annual retreat and Fellowship Day are to held to encourage and strengthen leaders and include some teaching. Communication with member churches also takes place via email, Facebook, newsletters and the website.

### Achievements and performance

During the financial year ending 31 March 2023 the Scottish Network held monthly regional hub meetings in Edinburgh and Glasgow with the addition of an online hub hosted in Inverness. These have been well attended, averaging 12 leaders at each hub. The two-day Annual Gathering in March 2023 was a fantastic in-person event held at Kings Church in Inverness, where we explored the theme of 'Adventuring Together.' We Also ran a Network Day in September 2022, exploring relevant church leadership issues. The Scottish Network team continued meeting on Zoom once a week and between us, continued online support for church leaders and their teams, and their outreach and church planting projects. We have also started a 'Network Roadshow,' where we visit local churches to share the vision of the Network. The leadership team members have increased by two and were able to meet twice in person, in addition to our weekly Zoom meetings. Ignite, a one-year discipleship course was run as a hybrid course for the first time and folks met on Zoom once a week and three times in person. We also have a growing partnership with Communitas, an international missions organisation. Plans to train and equip pioneer ministers and church planters are now in an advanced stage, and we have received grant funding, a pilot course will commence in January 2024 for Scottish students only, but will be open to international students from September 2024. We have partnered with Westminster theological centre and promote the training available to anyone at any stage of their ministry development. We have appointed an operations and development director, this is a part time post (16 hours per week), in addition we have increased our administrators' hours from 10 to 15 hours a week, to handle the increasing work load.

### **Volunteers**

The trustees are extremely grateful to all those who volunteer with the charity and give of their time freely to fulfil the charities aims.

### **Future plans**

We plan to offer the following resources in the coming year:

- Church Health Checks, to help churches to assess how they are meeting their charitable aims, ensuring that they are compliant with all current legislation.
- Advice on restructuring local church leadership to ensure that there are appropriate levels of accountability, enabling leaders and churches to flourish.
- Missional laboratories, to further equip churches in their mission and outreach.
- The forgotten ways a guided conversation over 8 monthly Zoom meetings to enable leaders to explore mission and church planting, commencing in September 2023.
- We continue to look for opportunities to use the Seed Fund for outreach and church planting projects.
- In addition, we will be looking to raise funding and appoint a course director for Launch, the training programme for pioneer ministries, seeking to equip young leaders in a rapidly changing culture and world.

### **Financial review**

### Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are church donations, personal donations and income from conferences and events.

### Results for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out on pages 5 to 10. The Statement of Financial Activities on page 5 reflects a net surplus of £7,257 (2022: net deficit of £1,506).

### Reserves

The Company held unrestricted funds amounting to £10,146 (2022: £7,558) and restricted funds of £6,792 (2022: £2,123) at the year end. The Trustees aim to have reserves to cover three months expenditure. The current level of reserves meets this target.

### Statement on Risk

The Board will review the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Where appropriate, systems or procedures will be established to mitigate the risks the charity faces.

### Statement of Directors' responsibilities

The Directors (who are also Trustees for the purposes of charity law) are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice). Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Director's Report has been prepared having taken advantage of the small companies' exemption in the Companies Act 2006.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2023

### 1. Accounting policies

### Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with FRS 102, the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting & Reporting by Charities (SORP 2019) (FRS 102), the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Companies Act 2006. In compliance with FRS 102 1A, we have not prepared a statement of cash flows. The charity is a public benefit entity.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. The financial statements contain no material uncertainties so have been prepared on the going concern basis.

In compliance with FRS 102 1A, we have not prepared a statement of cash flows. Scottish Network Churches meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

### Company status

The company is a private company limited by guarantee and registered in Scotland. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company. The members of the company are the Directors named in the Trustees Report.

### Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on the accruals basis.

### Income and debtors

All income is included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the Company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Debtors are valued at cost at the year-end and adjusted for any amounts considered to be irrecoverable.

### Expenditure and creditors

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Creditors are valued at cost at the year-end and split between amounts due in less than one year and amounts due in more than one year.

### **Taxation**

The Company is exempt from Corporation Tax on its charitable activities.

### Cash at bank

Cash at bank and in hand comprises immediate access bank accounts used by the Company and a small amount of petty cash.

### Statement of Financial Activities

For the purpose of the Statement of Financial Activities, funds are defined as follows:

Unrestricted funds comprise income received for the objects of the company without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Restricted funds comprise income which has been received for the objects of the company and specified for a restricted purpose within these objects by the donor.

### **Explanation of funds**

### Unrestricted funds:

The General fund represents all income and expenditure relating to the primary focus activities of the charity, other than those for which funding is designated or restricted.

### Restricted funds:

The Seed fund represents all income and expenditure relating to the setting up and supporting of new church plants.

The Turning fund represents money donated and collected to be spent on the Turning events.

The Gift for Member Churches fund represents money donated to be given to member churches.

The Gathering fund represents the offering taken at the Annual Gathering to be passed on to the intended recipients.

The Third Party Collection fund represents charitable fundraising initiatives that the network collects on behalf of others.

The Launch Scotland fund represents money collected for a one year church planting and leadership training programme offered to the Scottish Network churches and friends.

The *Ignite Programme fund* represents money collected and used for a one year discipleship programme offered to the Scottish Network churches and friends.

### 10. Trustee and related party transactions

No Trustees received any remuneration in their capacity as directors. Philip Arbon, a director, received consultancy fees of £1,250 (2022: £1,800). Travel and subsistence expenses reimbursed to directors totalled £448 (2022: £264).

Unrestricted donations by Trustees to the Charity amounted to £nil (2022: £180).

There were no transactions with other related parties during the year (2022: nil).

### 11. Pension commitments

The Charity operates a pension for staff members with NEST. All contributions made on behalf of staff are charged to the SOFA in the year they are incurred.

### 12. Liability of Members

The company is limited by guarantee, with the liability of each member limited to £1. There were 5 (2022: 4) members at 31 March 2023.
