The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the financial statements of Love Music Productions Ltd (the charity) for the period ended 31 July 2022. The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

#### **PURPOSES & ACTIVITIES**

#### **Objectives**

The charity is established to provide public benefit in Scotland and elsewhere to promote, maintain, improve and advance education, appreciation, understanding of and access to the Arts, in particular to provide high quality access for children, young people and the wider community to create, participate in and perform music, not limited to any particular genre or style.

#### **Activities**

The charity undertakes both concert and theatrical presentations of new and original music works in collaboration with international artists, and develops and delivers music workshops for amateur musicians and young people, culminating in opportunities for them to perform in public events alongside professional musicians.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE**

The 2021-22 financial year was extended to 14 months to better align our reporting to fit with our projects, which tend to sit within an academic year.

Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) have continued to be integral values in our planning and delivery. We have further developed our EDI Action Plan, and have held focus groups with choir members to inform improvements in processes and resources with the aim of ensuring full accessibility across our projects. Our volunteers and paid staff attended Unconscious Bias and Anti-Racism training, and we collected EDI statistics from participants and freelance contractors which enables us to make informed decisions on how to reach a more diverse range of people in terms of both project participation and recruitment.

We have revised our Environmental Sustainability Policy and Action Plan and will begin structured monitoring of travel, waste and energy use over the coming year to inform decisions on where we can reduce any negative impact. We are revising our budgets to allow more time to travel in a sustainable way, both as part of our day-to-day work and for future tours.

We have updated our 3-year business plan and our strategic aims have shifted towards better use of our skills and experience in connecting with other organisations nationally to build strategy and networks. We aim to bring systemic positive changes to the community singing and school singing sectors on a national scale by supporting and facilitating their development. We want everyone in our communities to have inclusive access to the highest quality musical encounters that help them to feel confident, nourished and inspired. Our ongoing projects will inform this work.

#### **Love Music Community Choir**

We started the 2021-22 year with a celebratory outdoor singing event to help our choir members transition from online only rehearsals to meeting and singing in-person again. For the whole year, we ran the choir in a flexible hybrid format, with in-person rehearsals broadcast for those who were unable to attend in the Usher Hall. As feelings about social distancing were changing, our key priority was to ensure optimal accessibility for those who remained particularly vulnerable by continuing to offer a range of distancing option alongside online access.

Hybrid is more expensive than the traditional format of rehearsals and we chose to invest some of our reserves to provide the best outcomes for our members, in consultation with them, during this difficult transitional time. We bought tech equipment and trained ourselves to operate it, and we engaged professional singers and created learning resources to provide strong vocal lines which enabled distanced learning for people of all abilities. We used a rota system for singers, with two shorter rehearsals each week and distanced seating.

This was a fantastic opportunity for us to grow the size of the choir and to include people from outside of Edinburgh in our online cohort. During the year, we held an online-only concert and a hybrid concert with in-person and online audiences, allowing people from across the world to share in our music-making. We also took part in the Queen's Platinum Jubilee concert produced by the City of Edinburgh Council in Princes Street Gardens, which enabled our singers who weren't yet ready to return to indoor singing to sing songs they'd been learning online alongside others in a safer outdoor environment.

Feedback has been wholly positive from those returning to the Usher Hall and those taking part online and we have received many comments about how included and part of the community they feel regardless of how they are accessing choir.

#### **Love Music Junior Choir**

Our flagship city-wide singing project for 8–12-year-olds was on hold due to social distancing requirements. One of the key aspects of Junior Choir is an opportunity to meet and sing with other children from right across the city, from different backgrounds and schools, however during the pandemic and throughout 2021-22 it was advised that children mix in smaller bubbles and retain 1-metre distancing during activities outside of school time. Because of this, bringing children together from so many areas of the city on such a large scale was not practical for most of the academic year, and so we made plans to relaunch in September 2022.

To celebrate Junior Choir's return, with funding from the Usher Hall, we commissioned new work from three emerging Scottish songwriters who represent positively in terms of musical genre, racial and neuro diversity. They will inspire our young singers and help them to imagine their own pathways to music making.

At the end of the school year, restrictions lifted enough to allow us to trial a new project for 8-12 year-old children called This School's Got Soul. We ran workshops at the Usher Hall for over 500 children from seven Edinburgh schools, introducing them to the joy of singing soul music with the backing of a professional band. The project aims are to build children's confidence in singing together whilst having fun with children from other schools.

#### **Love Singing**

Funded by Creative Scotland, the first stage of this project was designed to support and inspire community choirs to keep singing online throughout the pandemic. We supported and guided five choirs to work with five professional songwriters to create accessible new music especially for community singers. We created a suite of professional audio and video learning resources to accompany each of the five commissioned songs. These are freely available for any choir to use to support their online or in person programmes. Each choir received any tailored support they needed to take part in the project in the best way for their group and the feedback from participants has been incredibly positive. We held a celebratory online event to launch the songs and the resources, enabling singers from the five choirs to connect with each other and share experiences of the project.

At the end of the year we also received funding from Creative Scotland for the second stage of Love Singing, an event for community choir leaders to gather, sing, learn from each other and to discuss the needs pertinent to the community singing sector. The need for this event and its related research became evident through surveys and consultation we carried out with community choir leaders across Scotland who have been working in isolation, keeping their communities together over the pandemic without structured organisational or peer support. With this event and its associated evaluation, we want to support the health and wellbeing of our singing sector's leaders, find out what they need to feel stronger and more resilient as community leaders, and to then help facilitate training, resources, skill sharing, and peer to peer support over the coming years. The event is planned for September 2022. We have formed an event steering group of respected choir leaders from a wide range of musical genres and styles to ensure that we are as representative of the community singing sector as we can be.

#### Sing For Wellbeing

Once distancing restrictions in schools were lifted, we worked closely with academic research partner, Queen Margaret University (QMU) and two Edinburgh schools to deliver a targeted singing intervention for children most heavily impact by Covid-19. This pilot of singing workshops brought the most vulnerable children across each school together to take part in weekly group singing to enhance their wellbeing and confidence following two very difficult years. QMU researchers studied the benefits of singing as a personal recovery tool as well as the overall benefits of group singing on children. They evaluated how the work was delivered as well as its impact with a view to us sharing singing delivery skills with and increasing confidence in primary school teachers who haven't received musical training.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity extended its financial year so it now ends on 31 July in line with academic year which better reflects the seasonality of a charity. Please note these Accounts, as a result, cover a fourteen month period.

#### Reserves

The charity's unrestricted reserves at the year-end were £42,407 (2021: £90,573).

#### **Investment Policy & Performance**

The trustees, having regard to the liquidity requirements of operating the charity, have kept available funds in an interest-bearing deposit account and seek to achieve a rate on deposit which matches or exceeds inflation as measured by the retail prices index. Due to wider economic circumstances deposit rates have been depressed and so this aim was not achieved in the year.

#### **Reserves Policy & Going Concern**

A reserves policy has been adopted, based on aiming to maintain unrestricted reserves at a level at least equivalent to 3 months' running costs. The financial challenges created by the Coronavirus pandemic have required that reserves were directed towards ensuring that adequate resources were available to assist in funding the activities of the charity through the crisis. The trustees are aware that there will be a financial impact of both the Coronavirus pandemic and the cost of living crisis on Love Music Productions. However, they believe that the prudent policy of maintaining a sustainable level of unrestricted reserves, combined with a stable cash flow position and sound financial management has placed the charity in a strong position to continue to operate as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

#### PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Our strategic priorities over the next year are:

- 1. To develop and produce our own inclusive community projects, evaluating to increase the impact of our work and to inform how we support others to do the same;
  - We are planning a celebratory 10th anniversary for Community Choir during 2023, involving special events, collaborations and enhanced evaluation including case studies of the impact that the choir has on its members.
  - We will relaunch Junior Choir, retrain and expand our chaperone team, and work with inspirational, professional young musicians.
- 2. To support other grassroots communities to provide inclusive, accessible work building on our own knowledge, skills and networks;
  - We will produce a gathering weekend for community choir leaders as part two of the Love Singing project in autumn and winter 2022. We will create and collate resources to support community choirs and their leaders, and will research and consult with the Scottish singing sector on how the sector can best support itself and what additional support is required to make it more resilient and stronger.
- 3. To increase access to better quality inclusive music making at primary school level to increase the confidence, wellbeing and aspirations of all children.
  - We will further develop our Sing For Wellbeing research project, joining with academic organisations across Scotland to expand and enhance the quality and quantity of data collected on the impact of group singing on children to inform our future plans. Our ultimate goal is to increase the skills and confidence of primary school teachers in delivering quality music-making in their classrooms, which will in turn enable many more children to access inclusive singing on a regular basis, improving their wellbeing and confidence.
  - We will engage in research with primary schools to create accessible digital music resources, some of which may be based on our newly commissioned songs for Junior Choir.
  - We will tour This School's Got Soul, and work towards further partnerships for our Winter's Night and Punkit projects, re-introducing local authorities to our work and building the musical confidence and wellbeing of more children.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing Document**

The charity, which is a recognised charity in Scotland, is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by Articles of Association on 30 April 2010. The Articles of Association were modified in December 2016 and again in July 2019.

#### Membership

Full membership of the charity is open to:

- i) individuals of 18 years of age and over who are interested in furthering the work of the charity; and
- ii) national, international and local voluntary or other non-profit distributing organisations, whether corporate or unincorporated, which are interested in furthering the work of the charity.

Honorary members may be appointed by the trustees at their discretion, but these members are not entitled to vote at general meetings.

#### **Board of Trustees**

The policy and management of the charity is directed by a Board of Trustees which meets at least 3 times per year. Trustees must be full members of the charity. The minimum number of trustees is five. New Trustees are appointed by unanimous approval of existing Trustees.

During this financial year:

• There were no new Trustees appointed for the period.

#### **Risk Management**

The Trustees continually assess the major risks to which the charity is exposed. These risks are collated on a Risk Matrix which records who has delegated responsibility and what controls and mitigations are in place, and reviews the systems to mitigate them.

### LOVE MUSIC PRODUCTIONS LTD NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 JULY 2022

#### **Accounting Policies**

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

#### **Going Concern**

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The Trustees have assessed the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern and have reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. There are funds currently available to meet all liabilities when they become due and if there are any changes in position the Trustees will make the necessary adjustments. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing these accounts.

#### Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 5. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

#### **Grants Receivable**

Grants are recognised when the charity has met all the conditions attached to the grant. Grants received of a general nature are treated as voluntary income. Grants for the performance of specific services are treated as incoming resources from charitable activities.

#### Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

#### **Fund Accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

#### Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Donated facilities and services are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deed of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

#### Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. It has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources. Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

#### **Taxation**

Love Music Productions Ltd is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and expenditure therefore includes irrecoverable input VAT.

#### **Purposes of Restricted Funds**

#### **Junior Choir**

Love Music Junior Choir provides participant-centred, no-barrier, creative learning experiences for 8-12 year olds in Edinburgh. Participants are introduced to different kinds of singing, to a variety of languages and to diverse music from across the world, broadening cultural horizons in a fun and educational way. The choir is entirely open access with no requirements to audition, or have any previous musical experience. It provides opportunities to work with professional musicians and improves participants' musicianship, confidence, and social skills. Specific fundraising will continue to take place to support the choir, including securing donations from individuals and grants from trusts and foundations.

#### **Beautiful Bones**

Beautiful Bones is a street theatre and music spectacle written for an orchestra of community trombonists of all abilities aged 14 and above. It is performed with professional trombonists and street theatre actors in outdoor festival settings, produced in partnership with Scotland's circus and street theatre development agency, Surge. The majority of the restricted grant funding received to develop the project was received in the financial year 2017-18 and spent in the 2018-19 year. The completion of the piece was delayed due to the pandemic, and is scheduled for 2022-23.

#### **Community Choir**

The majority of the restricted element of the Community Choir activity reflects the in-kind support provided in the form of a donated venue. Grants from trusts and foundations have also been received this year to support the more expensive hybrid format of the choir.

#### **Love Singing**

An ambitious national community singing project, this project fosters resilience and creative engagement opportunities for the community choir sector across Scotland to mitigate and address the continuing challenges of remote and online singing. The first part of the project commissioned five online creative collaborations between professional songwriters and diverse singing groups from across the country, with each resulting in an original song with its own suite of audio and video learning resources for any choir to use for free. The second part of the project will bring community singing leaders together to network, learn from each other, and discuss solutions to support the future resilience of the community singing sector in Scotland.

#### Transfers

Transfers between funds can only be made with the approval of the board of trustees and must be in accordance with the terms of reference agreed with the donor organisation.
