Structure, governance and management

The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The trustees of the charity are appointed in accordance with the terms and conditions as detailed in the Memorandum and Articles of Association. Nominations of persons to become trustees are proposed and seconded by members of the charity at the Annual General Meeting.

The charity is limited by guarantee, limited to £1 per member. The charity is non-profit making and is a registered charity (Charity Number SC042797).

The charity had 74 members on 30th November who fulfill a variety of roles, including direct general advice provision and administration support. Some members are also involved in more specialist advice giving and also as part of the Board of Trustees.

Objectives and activities

Our charity continues to work towards a sustainable future and financial self-sufficiency.

We have spent time developing comprehensive plans and feasibility studies supported by professionals in the field of property, land and finance. Thanks extended to BRAG Enterprises and Fife Council Expert Help Scheme. Also thanks to Community Enterprise and the Branding for Growth initiative for helping us to create a digital vision of an off-road facility. These plans are very encouraging and map out options and details for an all-weather purpose-built facility. Although the plans are detailed comprehensive and feasible, we continue to encounter some difficulties in terms of obtaining suitable land. Explorations and conversations have been held with Fife Council Minerals planning service and other private developers, including those who own Westfield, St Ninians opencasts and Comrie Bing. Our plans are to obtain derelict brown site land, which is an eyesore to the community and we would like to make these sites usable, exciting and productive. We want to address a gap in the market and cater for a sport which has been neglected and stigmatised.

During the short-term (2years) we continue to provide Coaching, Practice and Race opportunities for young people. We also continue to raise awareness and change behaviour through established group work programmes. The group work programmes are continuing to develop as we attract new business from schools, Local Authorities, Youth Work organisations and Social Services. We are in the process of setting up accreditation options, so young people can get qualifications. We will provide opportunities to learn basic mechanics and motorcycle maintenance, this will enhance their interest and knowledge of STEM, (science, technology, engineering and mathematics), it will also increase Young People's employability and future career prospects.

Achievements and performance

2019 to 2020 has been an interesting and challenging year for Kingdom Off Road Motorcycle Club, our charity has continued to grow and develop, despite difficult times. We are proud to have been short listed as finalists in The Scottish Charity Awards. We also featured on BBC Scotland, and The Nine Show. This was mainly to highlight our efforts to involve more women and girls in our sport and past-time. Also, to acknowledge our community safety efforts. Another achievement we are very proud of is that we were approached by Buckingham Palace staff, HM Lord Lieutenant of Fife to see if we may be in a position to host a Royal visit with Prince William and Kate. Unfortunately, we were not short-listed due to our visual presentation. Our bikes were tired, our track had manure close by, our workshop was in a run-down industrial estate. These things are now changing, the Lord Lieutenant and provost of Fife have been charged with supporting our charity to be in a better position to accommodate a future visit.

Through lockdown, we had to adapt to the circumstances. We ran online sessions, weekly motorcycle maintenance sessions and workshop workout, which was both targeted to children and parents, who could engage during the lockdown period of the Covid-19 pandemic. It also gave us valued opportunity to reflect, evaluate and further develop our business approach, our strategic plans and recruit further Board members, which has enhanced our development and vision. We had time to focus on our facility too, our motocross track had various improvements and investment. Our workshop was improved too, ready for welcoming members and programme participants.

"Fix bike nights" resurrected after lockdown where young people and parents came into our workshop and learn how to maintain and fix their motorcycles. Many of these parents also volunteered to help our charity, whether that be helping out marshalling or officiating up at the track or indeed helping out at the workshop fixing and helping to maintain our growing fleet of motorcycles. Some young volunteers embarked on to our Youth Scotland Youth Achievement Awards Scheme. This is an SQA accredited programme, which bronze equates to a Nat 4. Given the crisis in education due to lockdown non schooling, this was a great opportunity to continue education.

This year we were fortunate to recruit two young people, one through Community Jobs Scotland and the other was the Bank of Scotland Foundation - reach programme. Their learning experience was good quality and their contribution valued, albeit, interrupted due to covid restrictions. One of the employees has went onto an apprenticeship with Cupar Motorcycles, a long-established reputable motorcycle sales and repairs shop.

Our coaching pathways programme, after lockdown, increased and has had a steady growth, this may have been helped by the increase in outdoor sports. Unfortunately, we have not been able to fully capitalise on this due to having limited staffing and accredited coaches.

We continued to be part of the Levenmouth anti-social behaviour diversion group which is chaired by Police Scotland. This was a local Police and Local Authority initiative, however, scaled back through this period of lockdown. It was acknowledged that this joint approach to anti-social behaviour and illegal motorcycling within our communities is successful, at the year-end a reduction of a huge 60% was achieved. Anti-social behaviour diversionary programmes run in collaboration with partners included: Two On The Right Track Programmes, these were Young people referred through youth workers, Police Scotland, Social Work and Education.

Our In 1st Gear programme was due begin in our workshop - This programme was due to launch in 2020 after a successful pilot. This employability programme is to give young people opportunities to learn STEM skills, through motorcycle mechanics and a bronze Youth Achievement Award, an SQA accreditation to kick start their employment prospects. Secondary to these objectives the programme will generate trading income for our charity and help us to work towards financial sustainability. The launch was postponed until after lockdown, this resulted in lost projected finance.

Again, we were looking forward to supporting 56 North, Scotland's motorcycle magazine team to enter and complete the prestigious Scottish Six Day Trial at Fort William. Unfortunately, this event was cancelled, but we look forward to not only supporting the team, but one of the young members has been selected to be competing in the team. This is an amazing opportunity for our charity and more so, the young person, who has a full sponsorship deal.

Our own fundraising efforts have been more challenging this year, our usual Pittenweem coffee morning was cancelled, however plant sales went ahead by Mary Paton, and sales of motorbikes and other kind donations continued despite the covid crisis.

We are still looking to lead the way helping to change the way we engage in off-road motorcycle sports, helping to introduce more electric powered motorcycles. We will increase the engagement in this, but electric motorcycles are still very expensive, which is inhibiting our progress.

After the first lockdown, late Summer, we had an Enduro Summer Camp for 3 days, which was family orientated and very successful, which we will look to repeat. October 2020 we had several young people enter the long awaited return to racing at the Scottish Twinshock Championships.

Lastly, a huge thank you to all our members, partners, sponsors, funders and most of all to all our dedicated volunteers who turn up week in week out, regardless of the weather.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 30 November 2020

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is 1 Lochtybank Cottages, Thornton, Fife, KY1 4DE.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Disclosure exemptions

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemptions available under paragraph 1.12 of FRS 102:

- (a) No cash flow statement has been presented for the company.
- (b) Disclosures in respect of financial instruments have not been presented.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505(1) of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
 contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
 requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case
 it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Plant and machinery

20% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

25% reducing balance

Equipment

20% reducing balance

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the charity will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Where the grant does not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income when the grant proceeds are received or receivable. Where the grant does impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income only when the performance-related conditions have been met. Where grants received are prior to satisfying the revenue recognition criteria, they are recognised as a liability.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at the carrying value plus accrued interest less repayments. The financing charge to expenditure is at a constant rate calculated using the effective interest method.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

4. Limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital. Each member's guarantee liability is limited to £1.
