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Trustees' Annual Report

The trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023.

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2019.

Charitable Purposes

The company was registered as a charity on the Scottish Charity Register on 25 November 2014.

The charitable purposes are:

- 1. the prevention or relief of poverty by tackling the causes of fuel poverty and reducing energy bills for residents in Fife (the operating area);
- 2. to promote and support the reduction of the carbon footprint of Fife;
- 3. to advance environmental protection and improvement by improving energy efficiency within Fife;
- to advance education on environmental issues and energy efficiency, particularly among the residents and businesses of Fife; and
- 5. the provision of recreational facilities within Fife, or the organisation of recreational activities within Fife, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the residents and businesses of Fife.

Objectives and activities

St Andrews Environmental Network is a charity working towards a sustainable St Andrews and the surrounding area. It is led by its members and the wider community.

The charity works locally to bring people together, take positive action to move towards a more sustainable lifestyle and support people through fuel poverty. We deliver a range of projects, events, and skills training to achieve this - building resilience as a community and working towards a future where everyone can live more sustainably. Our activities take place across St Andrews, and we work with partners to deliver projects throughout Fife.

St Andrews Environmental Network was established in 2010 by the Royal Burgh of St Andrews Community Council to deliver an Energy Efficiency project funded by the Climate Challenge Fund. We became a limited company with charitable status in 2012. At the year end we had 11 paid staff members plus 34 regular volunteers. We are independent but work with many local, regional, and national partners in the voluntary, statutory and private sectors.

We are based in the Eco Hub on Kinnessburn Road in St Andrews and are open 5 days each week. Our premises has a community training garden to the rear and we also have a community garden at the rear of the St Andrews Preservation Trust Museum. The Beach Wheelchairs operates April – September from a hut on West Sands Road and the Kernel is situated at the rear of St Andrews Botanic Garden.

In 2022-23, St Andrews Environmental Network's activities included:

- The Cosy Kingdom energy advice service helping Fifers keep warm and save money.
- · Growing and gardening workshops
- Climate change engagement events
- Climate Friendly Homes as part of The Climate Action Fife partnership project delivering activities to tackle the climate emergency.
- Clean & Green improving the appearance of St Andrews and supporting other community groups.
- St Andrews Beach Wheelchairs free hire of beach wheelchairs for use on the West Sands.

- StAnd Reuse collecting small household items for redistribution to those in need.
- Volunteering opportunities in the Eco Hub, our community gardens, helping at our events, social media and blogging for our website.
- Plastic Free St Andrews the launch of the Bring Your Own Campaign.
- Sustainable St Andrews development of the St Andrews Pledge.

Our work in 2022-23 was funded by the generous donations described at note 13 to these accounts, community donations and the customers of our refill shop. We thank them all.

Headlines for the Year

Development of the Eco Hub Since 1 March 2022:

- 1 March 2022 we got the keys of 40 Kinnessburn Road and work commenced immediately to convert it form a betting shop to a modern hub.
- 30 May 2022 staff moved into the office area and work continued to the premises.
- 25 June 2022 the Eco Hub was formally opened by Willie Rennie MSP
- 5 September 2022 the refill shop opened.

Work continued throughout the rest of the year and in January 2023 work commenced on the garden at the rear of the property which was formally opened in June 2023.

Review of the activities, achievements and future developments

The year started with staff moving into our new premises at The Eco Hub. Our membership and Facebook following have been continuing to grow and staff were back attending events. The focus has remained on raising the profile of the charity both within St Andrews and beyond through digital means.

Energy Advice continued to be one of the main activities of the charity; giving in-depth, tailored advice to 1219 households this year. This program not only promotes the reduction of the carbon footprint within the area but also tackles the causes of fuel poverty. Home visits were replaced by tailored advice over the phone during COVID, and this year a blended service (Telephone Advice & Home Visits) was introduced to help the client reduce their energy usage and their energy costs. Total financial saving for clients this year totaled £389,584.

As part of the Cosy Kingdom Partnership, St Andrews Environmental Network carried out 915 telephone advice calls and 65 home visits, with 982 follow up interventions. The handy service installed measures in 357 homes, 248 of which were Cosy Kingdom installations. As a direct result of work carried out under this project clients benefitted from £210,576 of financial gains. Through the Cosy Kingdom Partnership, referrals are made to Citizens Advice and Rights Fife for income maximisation.

Much of the focus was on providing financial support for those struggling with energy costs. This year St Andrews Environmental Network provided £46,623 in fuel vouchers and over £25,000 in fuel top-ups.

The partnership between Transition University of St Andrews, St Andrews Botanic Garden Trust and St Andrews Environmental Network to set up a Community Hub on the site at the back of St Andrews Botanic Garden has continued. The agreement for use of the site was placed on a more formal footing with St Andrews Environmental Network being granted a Licence to Occupy the site. This is great legacy from our CCF funding and will continue to be used as a community space going forward.

As part of our efforts to promote and support the reduction of the carbon footprint of the area, StAnd Reuse provided a collection drop-off point at the front of the Eco Hub and a collection service (by arrangement) for unwanted items to residents and students leaving private rented accommodation at the end of the academic year.

The goods we collect are sorted, stored and redistributed as individual items or made up into household packs which are distributed to those in need throughout the community. We still have a shortage of many household items required as the service is facing increased demand.

St Andrews Environmental Network was engaged by BID St Andrews to deliver the Clean & Green project within the BID area. This project focuses on the appearance of the town and deals with the issues of waste management, waste reduction and environmental clean ups. Due to the Pandemic, BID lost its funding in March 2020 meaning they were unable to fund the project. The BID ballot for continuing for a further 5 years was delayed as a result of COVID. This took place at the end of July 2021 and the result showed overwhelming support for BID continuing, with 5 years of funding confirmed for Clean & Green. BID continues to part fund Clean & Green and are very supportive in helping secure further funding.

Clean & Green continued to devote a substantial amount of their time keeping St Andrews clean and safe. The removal of graffiti and stickers has been on the increase as has anti-social behaviour throughout the town. The provision of support for other charities continued as required. The charity was once again actively involved in the waste strategy for the Dunhill Links Championship. Not only did St Andrews Environmental provide a collection for items to be reused in the community but also provided waste compound supervision to ensure the waste streams were well managed. This relationship meant that this year we also collected items to be reused in the community at the end of The Open Championship.

Towards a Plastic Free St Andrews which was formally launched on 29 June 2019 relies heavily on volunteers and remains unfunded. The project has continued to promote a plastic free St Andrews and launched the Bring Your Own Campaign. Plastic free living is also promoted in the refill area which opened in the Eco Hub in September 2022.

Sustainable St. Andrews (SSA) is an initiative led by St Andrews Environmental Network (StAndEN), in an effort to develop a clear and unified sustainability strategy, supported by all the stakeholders and the wider community in St. Andrews. Following the success of the 'Towards a Plastic Free St. Andrews' initiative which led to the collaboration amongst all the major stakeholders in St. Andrews towards the eradication of single-use plastics, SSA will be looking beyond plastic pollution. SSA aims to promote sustainable practices within the community and the local businesses in accordance with the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and develop further collaboration amongst all stakeholders in St Andrews. A Sustainability Pledge was launched this year and we will continue to encourage all stakeholders within the town to sign up to start the journey towards a Sustainable St Andrews.

Future plans

The charity will continue to deliver and develop the services it provided this year.

Premises at 40 Kinnessburn Road are now well established within the community, The Eco Hub will continue to run focused exhibitions promoting sustainability and the charity's numerous projects. It allowed for a small expansion of StAnd Reuse providing a drop-off point for donations. A warehouse type space is still required to develop this further. Funding was secured from The Open Legacy fund for a small expansion which will take place over the coming year. The further development to take all furniture items, and repair those that need it, would require considerable funding and options are being explored.

The community garden at the back of the St Andrews Preservation Trust Museum was established as a demonstration of food-growing in a domestic setting. Produce resulting from the project was donated to the cafe at the North East Fife Community Hub. The development of the large garden to the rear of the premises on Kinnessburn Road is well underway and it was opened as a second community garden and education space in June 2023.

We aim to expand the use of the Kernel and to host more events from the premises.

Financial position and review of the year

The net expenditure for the year was £26,947 (2022 income - £2,919) including grants and donations of £336,900 (2022 - £289,595). The reserves carried forward at the year end were £69,070 (2022 - £96,017) including tangible fixed assets in use of £19,548 (2022 - £19,786). The reserves were made up of unrestricted funds of £10,897 (2022 - £39,811) and restricted funds of £58,173 (2022 - £56,206).

Reserves Policy

The trustees have set a policy of holding a minimum of £20,000 in reserve, but recognise that this will cease to be adequate as the charity grows. Reserves are monitored closely throughout the year and this policy will be reviewed annually.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those relating to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate the charity's exposure to the major risks. Risk assessments address all key areas of the charity's activities.

The main risk to which the charity is exposed remains its dependence on grant funding. Ways of income generation are under consideration for the long term and, in the interim, the charity will move away from being reliant on one or two major funders.

Investment policy

The trustees do not hold funds for investment.

Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee incorporated on 13 March 2013 and governed by its Articles and Memorandum of Association. The Articles were updated following a special general meeting in February 2019. The charity is administered by a board of trustees which meets as required. The day to day work is managed by the Manager.

The charity must have a minimum of 20 members all of whom must reside within the community. Membership is open to any individual aged 18 years or over. Any member of the charity who wishes to be considered for appointment as a trustee at an Annual General Meeting shall lodge a written notice of their willingness to be appointed (in such form as the trustees require) signed by the member, at any time up to the commencement of the Annual General Meeting with the Manager. Trustees may be appointed by ordinary resolution. The trustees may at any time appoint any member (providing he/she is willing to act) to be a trustee to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee. The maximum number of trustees is 13, the majority of which must be member directors.

The charity has procedures for the induction and training of trustees which include a briefing meeting with current trustees. New trustees are also provided with an induction pack which contains a copy of the Memorandum & Articles of Association, recent minutes, latest annual financial statements and the OSCR publication "Guidance for Charity Trustees – acting with care and diligence".

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

1.1 Basis of Preparing the Financial Statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2019 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} .

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

1.2 Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either unrestricted or restricted in purpose. Unrestricted funds are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Within restricted funds, some costs are not directly attributable to any individual fund and the charity uses a method of apportionemnt to fairly allocate such costs between the restricted funds. The basis of the apportionment is the extent of usage of a resource and, in terms of salary costs, the amount of staff time spent on each activity.

1.3 Income recognition

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the income, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income from savings is recognised on a receivable basis.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. The charity is not registered for Value Added Tax and accordingly all expenditure includes Value Added Tax which cannot be recovered.

1.5 Allocation of expenditure

Costs charged to a restricted fund include direct costs in relation to the restricted activities.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on the following basis: Equipment (all classes) 25% straight line, Motor Vehicles 25% reducing balance.

1.7 Pension

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account in the year they are payable.

1.8 Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily available from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees have made the following judgements:

Accruals

Trustees estimate the requirements for accruals using post year end information. This identifies costs that are expected to be incurred for services provided by other parties. Accruals are only released when there is a reasonable expectation that these costs will not be invoiced in the future.

1.9 Leases

Lease payments under operating leases are recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of a winding up is limited to £1.

3 Control

Control of the charity lies in the hands of the members who elect the trustees.

4 Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains to the extent that these are applied for its charitable objects.
