TRUSTEE'S REPORT

The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 March 2021 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

CHAIR'S REPORT

Throughout the year ending 31 March 2021 we faced new, unexpected and unusual challenges due to the Covid19 Pandemic and the subsequent Lockdown and social distancing issues.

We amended and developed our support network from face-to-face Counselling, Support and Therapies to Telephone, and Remote Therapies. This proved to be a benefit to the people we support, and we were able to provide one-to-one counselling, telephone counselling and holistic therapies using our volunteer and paid sessional counsellors and therapists.

We were able to continue to provide our essential support due to the funding award of the Big Lottery Medium Grant and the Grant Award from the Scottish Government Victims and Witnesses Group (VAWG).

The initial constraints and difficulties we experienced were related to technology issues for all our Staff, Practitioners and Board when we moved to providing Telephone Counselling and Remote Therapies. The award of additional funding from Big Lottery for six Mobile telephones for each of our Practitioners was a clear benefit. The generous donation of seven 7 Laptops from Capito via the Scottish Government (SG) VAWG Work Group have also been of major benefit to our Outreach Coordinator and six 6 Practitioners.

The period of Lockdown was not fully appreciated at first, and not all Practitioners and Therapists requested phones or Laptops. The ongoing Lockdown and social distancing identified the need for additional mobile phones and laptops, and we are delighted that we have been able to secure all the essential equipment needed. These IT & Media resources helped address a difficult situation and provided positive outcomes since it was essential the Manda Centre continued to support people through isolation.

The new reality of reduced social contact, self-isolation and disruption of services was having a disproportionate effect on people who were already in need of our support. The provision of the mobile phones and laptops has allowed us to hold conference/video calls for operational matters with Our Staff, Management Board Members, Practitioners & Volunteers. We were also able to host support, training and conference/video calls with the people we support. The continuation of our remote support had a very positive improvement to the mental health and wellbeing of those we support and this is particularly evident in the face-to-face support we are able to provide with our Peer Support Groups: The SafeTime Group and Freedom Programme.

Initially, the transfer from face-to-face to remote support was stressful for all concerned. However, after a few teething problems, everyone adapted to the new service. The people we support were happy to receive remote support & therapy. This was of direct benefit to their mental health and wellbeing. These benefits also included continued access to support, less time & travel for the people we support and a disinhibition effect which allowed people — especially men — to share more.

All these conditions resulted in an increase in the number of hours of support provided by all our Practitioners.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

ACTIVITIES, PURPOSES & STRUCTURE

Charitable Purposes

The purposes of the Charity are to assist in relieving the mental and physical suffering and distress and support to those experiencing a high level of loss, isolation and loneliness due to Trauma, Loss & Personal Crisis.

These include those affected by:
Murder or Culpable Homicide and Suicide

Road traffic (RTA)

Families with family members diagnosed with profound and multiple learning disabilities (PMLD) where there is a feeling of "loss" of an expected childhood experience

Carers who have "lost" their loved one through dementia or other issues.

Through our support programmes we look to help the people we support manage and understand the effects of significant change, loss and grief. With our support they are able to identify ways to take control over their lives and build resilience. We encourage them to improve life skills by discussion, reflection and techniques, to identify their own needs and consider a range of solutions to make positive changes in their lives. Improve their life chances by raising their self-esteem and increase their confidence and motivation to interact with social and other networks.

The people we support will be more able to deal with many related issues such as the legal system and former areas of concern which they can process over the short, medium and longer term. Building this type of resilience will help relieve the loneliness and isolation that those affected by trauma, loss and personal crisis experience.

We aim to reduce their dependency on mainstream health services and medication associated with depression which could reduce the visits to GP's, reducing the use of medication and save the NHS resources and money. We assist them to return to work and to deal with day-to-day issues in a more competent way.

Charitable Activities

We encourage the people we support to utilise our Centres by either dropping in or by pre-arranged visit. The people we support provide positive comments and feedback following their regular attendance indicating that they have benefitted from an increase in their self-esteem, have increased confidence and motivation which has encouraged them to interact socially and widen their networks.

With the level of support received from The Manda Centre they felt they were able to deal with difficult issues such as the legal system and former areas of concern including accessing other services. The people we support have also informed us that their skills have increased and that they are now able to identify their own needs to consider a range of solutions to make positive changes in their lives.

At the Manda Centre we treat everyone that attends with confidentiality, dignity and respect and develop our service in response to the demand of all those we support.

We are a Registered Charity with no affiliation to any religious or political party and we are open to all sections of the community.

Service Provision and Outreach

The Manda Centre provides telephone support/counselling when the people we support are unable to travel to our Support Centre in Hamilton. For those unable to attend The Manda Centre in Hamilton we have an agreement with Victim Support Scotland for the use of their premises in Glasgow on a partnership basis. We also have an ad-hoc rental agreement in alternative premises within Glasgow City Centre.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

Service Provision - Support, Advocacy & Therapies

We concentrate on Practical and Emotional Support, Advocacy, Group Support, Counselling and Holistic Therapies.

We provide Face to Face Counselling and Telephone Support/Counselling. Our Counsellors and Therapists dedicate time to each person, using positive and therapeutic techniques to help individuals manage and understand the effects of significant change, loss and grief. Our service users also receive a mix of one to one and group peer support. Our comprehensive range of alternative therapies promotes stress reduction and supports and enhances progress with counselling and development.

Counselling & Therapies

We deliver a range of support techniques to help our service users overcome stress, emotional difficulties, relationships and other areas which trouble their lives. The common element is that they are based on a therapist and service user talking and interacting with each other.

- Person-Centered Counselling (PCT)
- Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT)
- Alternative (Holistic) Therapies

Organisational Structure

The Manda Centre provides a safe and confidential environment where those affected by trauma, loss, personal crisis and grief can meet with others in similar circumstances, to share mutual thoughts, feelings and experiences. The Support Services and Network available from the Manda Centre has proved to be successful and beneficial to our members regarding support, confidentiality, accessibility and location.

The introduction of our service is in line with the Aims and Objectives contained in our Articles of Association and The Scottish Government guidelines for the support for victims and their families

We have the flexibility to meet the demand for services by utilizing the services of a range of vastly experienced Counsellors and Therapists to provide a comprehensive range of support services from an easy to access location with public transport links and suitable car parking

Centre Premises and Location

The Manda Centre continues to be in the Hamilton Business Centre, 194 Quarry Street, Hamilton, ML3 6QR.

We are located in an excellent, very central location in fully equipped premises which are fully accessible with kitchen and toilet facilities and easy access to Hamilton Central Train Station & Bus Station and Pay & Display Parking locally.

Throughout the year ending 31 March 2021 we faced new, unexpected and unusual challenges due to the Covid19 Pandemic and the subsequent lockdown and social distancing issues.

We developed a clear roadmap to move out of Lockdown. Due to the Vaccination Program successful roll out we made the necessary preparations and alterations to our premises to welcome the people we support back to for face-to-face Support and Therapies. Throughout the Pandemic we have learned that there will be an ongoing need for a more flexible service provision, particularly for those who prefer telephone support or by Zoom/ MS Teams. Our premises will allow us to provide a continuity of support to the people we support and further develop out range of support services.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

Our Funding and Fundraising

The Charity's main funding source is from the 3-year Medium Grant Award from Big Lottery and the annual grant from the Scottish Government Victims and Witness Group. These grant awards meet our core operating costs including salaries.

We raise additional funding from a range of sources, which are not based around specific projects and not essential to Core Funding.

We had planned a number of Fundraising events however; these were virtually non-existent during the year ending 31 March 2021 due to the Covid19 Pandemic and the subsequent lockdown and social distancing issues. We put our calendar for fundraising events on hold. We did receive donations and voluntary contributions; however these were considerably less than we had originally planned for. We continued to pursue links for alternative sources of funding from other charitable trusts and community planning partnerships and had success in receiving additional funds for winter utility costs to assist a number of the people we support.

Achievements and Progress

We receive referrals from a wide range of sources and we provide our funders with detailed referral reports to outline the increase and developments.

We continue to provide positive/improved outcomes to the people we support who have been affected by trauma, loss and personal crisis. We help these individuals manage and understand the effects of significant change, loss and grief through our support programmes to enable them to identify ways to take control over their lives and build resilience. We provide support and encourage them to improve life skills by discussion, reflection and techniques and identify their own needs and consider a range of solutions to make positive changes in their lives. By raising their self-esteem and increasing their confidence and motivation this leads them to improve their life chances to interact with social and other networks. They are more able to deal with many related issues such as the legal system and former areas of concern which they can process over the short, medium and longer term. Building their resilience helps relieve the loneliness and isolation of those affected by the trauma of being a victim of crime

The Manda Centre works in partnership with other organisations and charities by the sharing of referrals, sharing information, signposting, and liaising to ensure the people we support are aware of other support services available to them. We forward appropriate referrals to relevant organisations which also helps raise awareness of the Manda Centre and highlights the level of our support services.

Financial Position

The statement of financial activities shows a net inflow of £15,454. A full detailed report of the income and expenditure is available in the notes.

The Board of Trustees is satisfied with the performance of the Trust during the year and considers that the Trust is in a strong position to continue its activities during the coming year and that the Trust's assets are adequate to fulfil its obligations.

Reserves policy and going concern

The Trustees consider the level of reserves to be adequate. We have a 3-year Grant Award from Big Lottery and we have a close working partnership with the Scottish Government Victims Group for match funding on an annual basis.

The Trustees are confident that we will continue to implement plans with both funders and additional sources of funding to secure the ongoing future and development of the Charity.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

During the period we recruited two new paid staff members, an Administrator and a part time Outreach development worker.

Induction and Training of New Trustees

We have a full application process for Volunteers, Sessional Practitioners and Management Committee/Trustees. Everyone completes an application form, provides two references and meets for an interview with the existing Board of Management/Trustees.

Everyone requires a full Enhanced Disclosure and /or PVG Scheme Membership before they can work or volunteer with the Manda Centre

We provide a full Induction and provide relevant training courses which are delivered in-house and based on Psychotherapeutic Interventions that include the legal processes involved with murder, culpable homicide and suicide, introducing any changes to legislation and the criminal justice process.

Pay policy for Senior Staff

We currently employ two members of staff, an Administrator and a Part-Time Outreach Development Worker. The funding for these posts is from the Grant Award from Scottish Government and all remuneration is in agreement within their agreed salary structure.

Salary reviews are carried out on an annual basis and in consultation with our Board Members and our Funders, who allocate the funds.

Related Parties

The charity does not have any formal relationships with any other charitable, commercial or other organisation but receives funding from various sources, for the operation of the charity's activities.

During the period Kate Duffy received £16,335 (2020: £7,190) in payment for services as a self-employed

practitioner to the charity.

Partnerships and Collaboration

The Manda Centre has close partnerships and collaborates with several voluntary and statutory agencies that provide complementary services and where possible we align the services provided for the benefit of our service users. We also participate in several support, community and strategy groups predominately across Lanarkshire.

Risk Management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Covid 19 Support During Lockdown

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and the ongoing situation we amended our support network from Face-to-Face Counselling and Support and Therapies to Telephone and Support and Remote Therapies. This proved to be a positive benefit to the people we support. To improve the quality of our support, we expanded the remote support to include Peer Support using a mixture of video conferencing via Zoom, MS Teams and Duo. This has allowed us to have a form of "Face to Face" support and to also continue with our Peer Support Groups: SafeTime and Freedom Programme.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

We were committed to our staff, management, volunteers, board members and all the people we support during this difficult period and we had:

- Implemented change and reconfigured how and where our service is delivered.
- Altered rather than reduced our service while operating more remotely.
- Provided a continuity of service.
- Taken direct positive action to reduce isolation, promote community spirit and belonging.

This allows the Manda Centre to provide as close to our normal level of support as possible. We developed a clear roadmap to move out of Lockdown to ensure we had the necessary preparations to welcome the people we support back to the Centre for face-to-face support when applicable. We have established a phased and wellplanned Rota to ensure that we keep all staff, practitioners and the people we support are kept safe.

Trustee's responsibility for the financial statements

The charity trustees (who are also the directors of The Manda Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2021

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Accounts been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the The Statement of Recommended Practice (applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)) (issued in October 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006,

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment - straight line over 3 years

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the Trust and is, therefore, included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
