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DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2021

The directors present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 October 2021.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the company's Memorandum & Articles of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

We took the decision not to become a charity ourselves, as we wish to keep our options open for the longer term, for example to support tourism, local businesses or other commercial activity. However we feel it is important to follow similar standards of governance and accountability as a charity might, hence our accounts are presented in a charitable format.

Objectives and activities

The company's objects are to provide community benefits in the area of benefit.

The area of benefit is defined by the Community Council boundaries of Cairnryan, Castle Kennedy, Cree Valley, Garlieston, Isle of Whithorn, Kirkcolm, Kirkcowan, Kirkmabreck, Kirkmaiden, Leswalt, Lochans, New Luce, Old Luce, Port William and District, Portpatrick, Royal Burgh of Wigtown and District, Sorbie, Stoneykirk, Stranraer, Ochtrelure and Belmont, The Royal Burgh of Whithorn and District, in Dumfries and Galloway; and the communities of Ballantrae, Barr, Barrhill, Colmonell and Lendalfoot, Dailly, Girvan and District, and Pinwherry and Pinmore, in South Ayrshire.

The company achieves this by receiving, administering and distributing the community benefit sums provided by ScottishPower Renewables (UK) Limited in relation to the Kilgallioch Wind Farm, in accordance with the community benefit agreement.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2021

Achievements and performance

This is the company's fourth set of annual accounts, marking a fourth year of successful operation and learning.

This year has continued to be challenged by the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. Despite the government restrictions relating to Covid-19, the Directors have continued to meet regularly - online - throughout the year to make decisions on spend and to review ongoing activity. Applications were different in that public events were unable to happen and funding to support these was not being sought. But other projects and project planning were clearly still going on apace in the community.

In 2020-2021, we awarded 44 grant offers to 43 organisations grants totalling £493,384.27. Unfortunately due to circumstances beyond their control, one organisation had to withdraw from their offer before it was paid out, reducing the amount awarded by £10,000 to £483,384.27. Grants ranged from £1,000 to £99,988, and addressed a range of community aspirations and needs from across Wigtownshire and South Carrick.

Alongside this grant-making activity, the four communities of Barrhill, Kirkcowan, New Luce and Old Luce, known as the Primary Communities, each received 15% of the annual fund payment to support activity within each of their local areas. This year, the sum paid out was £190,636.85 each which took into account the primary communities' financial contribution to the costs of the Fund Review which took place during 2021.

This year we were pleased to receive our first Fund Review Report, delivered by respected academic institution SRUC, Scotland's Rural College. SRUC made a number of important recommendations to help us build on the firm foundations of the Fund, improve our reach and impact, and broaden understanding of the impact and developing legacy of the Fund.

The Review found that our Fund priorities for the Community Fund remain appropriate but these may be reworded in 2022 to ensure they are more easily understood. In 2020-2021 the Fund Priorities remained:

- Engage and empower young people, increase employment opportunities for young people and/or attract young families to the area
- · Reduce poverty and disadvantage
- Improve connectivity, including transport, access to services and opportunities
- · Improve quality of life, health and well-being
- Build capacity for local groups and promote community spirit
- · Build sustainable community assets, including capital assets.
- Promote, protect and celebrate natural and cultural heritage

Financial review

The company received its fourth year community benefit payment of £1,277,473.67 from Scottish Power Renewables (UK) Limited (SPR) in December 2020. KCBC again wishes to express its thanks and appreciation to SPR for its investment in our communities, enabling community led action and decision making across the entire area of benefit. We are confident the investment will have a legacy far beyond the operational life time of the wind farm that has enabled this funding opportunity.

A total of £483,384.27 was administered in grants by Foundation Scotland on behalf of KCBC Ltd. A total of £39,455.15 went towards Kilgallioch Community Benefit Company support costs which included £23,500 to Foundation Scotland for its administration and grant-making services; and £7,973.64 for the cost of the Fund Review; and the remaining £7,981.52 for running costs for the Company including accountants fees, legal advice, insurance and communications costs.

KCBC's sole purpose is to distribute funds, and we have few liabilities, so we do not consider it necessary to maintain reserves equivalent to three to six months running costs. The Board's reserves policy is to retain £4,000, after expenses for the year have been met, as a contingency against unexpected costs.

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

Structure, governance and management

The company is a company limited by guarantee and our Memorandum & Articles of Association can be downloaded from Companies House or from our own website www.kilgallioch.co.uk. Our Memorandum & Articles of Association were updated in 2021 after our AGM, to remove the requirement to appointment a Company Secretary, which is not required under Company Law.

Our structure reflects a consultation process undertaken by SPR prior to establishment of the company, which identified Barrhill, Kirkcowan, New Luce and Old Luce as the communities surrounding the Kilgallioch wind farm. We adopted the term 'Primary Communities' to describe them, and they play a central role in our governance. We have up to 44 individual company members who are all resident within the area of benefit. Kirkcowan, New Luce, Old Luce and Barrhill Community Councils can nominate up to 10 people to become members of the Kilgallioch Community Benefit Company. The governing documents encourages that as far as possible there is an equal number of members across the four primary communities. Members are not required to be serving Community Councillors. Further members are drawn from the wider area, with the maximum number of members being 44.

The committed work of the eleven members of the Board throughout the year should be acknowledged. We thank Clifford Smithers, a wider area Director from May 2018 to February 2021, for his contribution to the Board. In accordance with the Company's Articles, the Board approved the appointment of a new wider area Director, Callum Sinclair, in October 2021. At the time of preparing these accounts, we are pleased that the remaining vacancy on the Board had been filled with the appointment of Patricia Veevers which brings the Board up to its permitted 12 Directors.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2021

1 Accounting policies

Company information

Kilgallioch Community Benefit Company Ltd is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is 1 Dashwood Square, Newton Stewart, Wigtownshire, DG8 6EQ.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the company's Articles of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The company is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The company has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Company funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the company's objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the company.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the company is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the company has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the company has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1.5 Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the company's balance sheet when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised-cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the company's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.
