FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

Report of the Council

The members of the Council, who are also trustees of the Charity, have pleasure in presenting their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31st August 2013. The legal and administrative information set out on pages 1 and 2 form part of this report

Objects of the Charity

The objects of the charity are:

The relief of persons who are in need, hardship or distress and who are either widows or dependants of former members (either alive or dead) of The Armed Forces of the Crown, or widows or dependants of other persons who have been killed or incapacitated in or through war or civil disaster, other exceptional circumstances, or former members of The Armed Forces of the Crown, or retired members of the Nursing profession

The relief of persons in need who are sick, convalescent, disabled or infirm by relieving their suffering or assisting their recovery

In furtherance of these objects

The League of Remembrance cares for dependants of all who have given service to their country in the Armed Forces, to retired Armed Forces personnel and also to retired members of the Nursing profession

The League recruits suitable people as Remembrance Workers to help in a variety of ways in major London Hospitals. This provides useful work, companionship, a sense of purpose and a small but welcome income to the Remembrance Workers who are in need of help through bereavement, slender means or loneliness

No significant change in activities is foreseen

Taxation

The League is a registered charity and as such is not liable to corporation tax on its charitable activities

Organisation Structure

Under the governing document, the Council shall consist of no less than seven trustees and no more than twelve at any time. The Council members during the year are shown on page 1 Council members are elected and appointed to the Council by proposal and approval of the members. No remuneration is paid to any trustee

The trustee recruitment policy of the League involves the discussion of the skills and qualities required to best serve the League Appropriate persons are then approached by the Chairman and Secretary who give the potential trustee information about the League and the responsibilities involved. If the trustee is appointed, then the Secretary will go through an induction process with them

The organisation is administered by the Secretary who is the Chief Executive officer, reporting directly to the Council

Reserves Policy

The Council has reviewed the reserves of the charity. This review encompassed the nature of the income and expenditure streams, the need to match variable income with fixed commitments and the nature of reserves.

The review concluded that to allow the charity to be managed efficiently and to provide a buffer for uninterrupted services, a general reserve of a minimum of £1,000,000 be maintained

This reserve will give sufficient income from the investment base to cover operating expenditure to keep the charity going indefinitely

CHAIRMAN'S AND TRUSTEES' REPORT

Investment policy and performance

The Council reviews the investment performance of its portfolio three times per year. At each of these meetings, a representative from CCLA Investment Management Ltd (CCLA) has attended and CCLA's report has been discussed and reviewed in detail. The charity's intention is to earn the maximum from its investments that is possible in current economic conditions and considers a four monthly review will satisfy its needs.

The League's portfolio is invested in a number of COIF Charity Funds which are monitored and supervised for the benefits of participating charities by an independent board of individuals with considerable investment, legal and other experience. As part of its responsible approach, the COIF Charities Investment Fund Board has formally agreed to take into account social, environmental and economic factors as part of the investment process. The three fold approach encompasses firstly the Fund's exclusions, secondly a pro-active strategy with companies, and thirdly an active corporate governance policy.

The COIF Charities Investment Fund aims to avoid investing in companies whose main business is gambling, tobacco or armaments, where there is 50% or more of turnover from gambling and tobacco, and 20% or more from armaments. The COIF Charities Fixed Interest Fund will not hold corporate bonds issued by companies that are excluded by the COIF Charities Investment Fund. The SRI policy followed by the COIF Charities Property Fund focuses more upon environmental issues

Risk assessment

During the course of the Council meetings which take place throughout the year, Council members ensure that adequate measures are being implemented to identify and mitigate the effects of any major risks to which the charity is exposed. The financial risks associated with the charity's investments have been addressed by regular review of the portfolio performance in the presence of a representative from the investment advisers.

As part of the League's contingency planning, the role of the Assistant Secretary has been broadened to provide continuity of service should the Secretary be absent from work for any length of time

Disclosure of information to the auditor

So far as each trustee at the date of approval of this report is aware

- there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditors are unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information

Statements of Council's responsibilities

The council confirms that they have had due regard to guidance published by The Charity Comission in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 on public benefit

The Council is required by UK company law to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs and the net surplus/deficit of the company as at the end of the financial year

The Council confirms that suitable accounting policies have been used and applied consistently, and reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates have been made in the preparation of the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2013. The Council also confirms that applicable accounting standards have been followed and that the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The Council is responsible for keeping proper accounting records to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The report of the Council is prepared in accordance with the special provisions in section 415A of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies

The Christmas bonus for the Remembrance Workers was again helped by a generous contribution from ABF, the Soldiers' Charity, for which we are most grateful. This bonus helps with the extra expenses that come at Christmas time and is greatly appreciated by the Remembrance Workers

The Festive lunch was again held at the RAF Club, Piccadilly (courtesy of Mr Frank Hughes) on 17th January 2013 The Chairman, Mrs Redman-Brown, Mrs Anthea Stock, and Members of the Council, attended the lunch to meet the Remembrance Workers and a great time was had by all. The lunch was once more sponsored by Mr Derek Sayer and we record our sincere thanks for his continued generosity.

The 92nd Annual General Meeting was also held at the RAF Club. The website was available for viewing and the Remembrance Workers were delighted and intrigued to see themselves on-line! A delicious buffet lunch was enjoyed by all as well as the opportunity to meet with each other and exchange stories of working in the different hospitals

The Chairman presented Mrs Pamela Bertrand and Mr Iqbal Hussein with long service badges. Mrs Bertrand has worked at the Eastman Dental Hospital and Mr Hussein at St. Mary's Hospital and both have given 10 years valuable service. The Chairman congratulated them both on behalf of Council and expressed the hope they would continue for at least another 10 years!

This year's summer outing was to Blenheim Palace, a magnificent 18th century baroque palace, and home to the 11th Duke and Duchess of Marlborough. It is also famed as the birthplace of Sir Winston Churchill. The palace is surrounded by wonderful parkland designed by Capability Brown. Finance

The Council is pleased to present the accounts for the League of Remembrance for the year ending 31st August 2013, details of which are to be found in the audited financial statements included in the Annual Report. I would like to record our thanks to our Auditors, Spofforths LLP, for their invaluable help and advice and to Mr Richard Coulson, CCLA, for his management of the League's investments.

The League is extremely grateful for the generous support received from all our donors and benefactors without whom the work of the League could not continue

Future developments

One of the League's longer term aims has been to extend the League's services outside the London area when finance permits

The Chairman and Sir Tony Baldry recently met with Sir Evelyn de Rothschild to discuss the possibility of extending services to the Home Counties. Sir Evelyn expressed interest in the concept, particularly for Buckinghamshire, and provided funding for research into the feasibility of such an expansion with the possibility of further funding if the project is viable.

The research is underway and an interim report is very positive. We therefore hope that a pilot scheme can be introduced in Buckinghamshire early 2014

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

1 Principal accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of investments and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006. The principal accounting policies are set out below

Incoming resources

Donation and investment income is accounted for on a receivables basis. Income tax recoverable on gift aid is accounted for on an accruals basis.

A value of notional rent has been accounted for as donation income and rental expenditure, in respect of the use, rent free, of the property at 55 Great Ormond Street until the rent commencement date of the 24 June 2012 This figure was calculated by John Gould & Co who are Chartered Surveyors

Resources expended

Cost of charitable expenditure includes those expenses incurred directly by the Remembrance Workers and costs from fundraising activities. The remaining expenditure is classified under governance of the charity and includes costs incurred for the maintenance of the charity.

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which the obligation arises Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered

Tangible fixed assets

The cost of tangible fixed assets is their purchase cost, together with any incidental expenses of acquisition. The cost of furniture, fittings and other office contents is charged to income and expenditure in the year of acquisition, where such costs per item are less than £500.

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual values, on a straight line basis over the expected useful economic lives of the assets concerned. The annual rate used for this purpose is 20% on computer equipment

Fixed asset investments

Fixed asset investments are recorded at market value at the balance sheet date. Changes in value during the year, and profits and losses on sales, are reported in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Fund structure

The Council of the League acts as Trustee of the League of Remembrance (1914-45) Endowment Trust Fund, which is a restricted fund which must be preserved for the purpose of endowment. All contributions to the Fund are invested in the name of the League, and the investments must be kept separate from the other funds of the League. The income from these reserves is expendable.

The remaining reserves relate to an unrestricted operating fund, generating income for the charity to use in accordance with its objectives

15 Endowment Fund

The Council of the League acts as Trustee of the League of Remembrance (1914-45) Endowment Trust Fund, which is a restricted fund which must be preserved for the purpose of endowment. All contributions to the Fund are invested in the name of the League, and the investments must be kept separate from the other funds of the League.

The capital of the Trust Fund has been placed in the care of the charity commissioners COIF as the best way of securing the perpetuity of the Fund

The income of this fund is to be paid to the League and to be used for general purposes in accordance with the establishment of the Fund on 26 November 1931 and is therefore unrestricted

16 Operating Fund

The Operating Fund is an unrestricted fund that is used to further the charity's objectives. The fund has arisen over many years of the charity investing large donations and legacies into various types of investment to give the charity a regular return in order to carry out its charitable activities.
