### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The objectives of The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech ('the Federation') are to advance, promote and encourage participation in all branches of performing arts.

The benefits to individuals and communities of participation in performing arts are widely recognised. Participation hones and develops life skills, quite apart from developing skills in the performance art itself. For many people, a performance offers a real sense of achievement which may not be equalled in their experience of other activities. In earlier years, participation in performing arts is a key component of a balanced education.

### **Principal activities**

The principal activity of the Federation is as key support organisation for those involved in festivals featuring amateur performers. It provides a wide range of services and resources to facilitate delivery of fulfilling, inspiring and educational performance opportunities for everyone. The services and resources on offer continually evolve and develop to reflect current best practice and to meet ever changing needs and expectations.

Festivals play an important role in keeping alive local interest in the arts. They strengthen and support community activities by providing a meeting place for amateur artists of all ages. They encourage cooperation among various artforms for the common purpose of achieving higher standards of performance. While the practice of an artform may remain a source of valuable recreation for many performers, every professional began as an amateur. Many distinguished artists acknowledge that their first performance platform was provided by their local festival.

### **Public benefit**

The trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit, published by the Commission, in exercising their powers or duties. The trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the Federation's aims and objectives.

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

### **Charitable activities**

The Federation engages in wide-ranging activities to support festivals, to help them to develop and grow, and to promote implementations of best practice in many important areas. In addition to festivals, the Federation has adjudicators, accompanists and supporters among its members. It actively encourages new members in all its membership categories.

A small staff team at Festivals House provides year-round support for members. The team responds to enquiries and develops guidance and information which is regularly circulated. It produces regular newsletters which include updates on relevant topical issues and news from festivals across the UK and around the world.

For those starting a festival or who are new to organising an established one, the Federation offers members extensive resource materials and guidance covering almost every aspect of festival organisation. The Federation provides information about becoming a member on its website and new festivals join each year

Many member festivals work with children and some also work with vulnerable adults. The Federation has developed extensive guidance on safeguarding and has prepared materials that festivals may use when formulating, implementing and communicating safeguarding policies. In addition to offering support and advice on safeguarding matters, the Festivals House team provides a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checking facility for festival members.

### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2019

Child performance licensing legislation has been causing significant problems for member festivals over the past two years. This legislation was introduced to deal with potential exploitation of children in, for instance, commercial entertainment, and as an unintended consequence, festivals have been caught by it because of the use in many cases of premises with entertainment licences and the nominal admission charges made to audiences. In contrast, the legislation does not apply to amateur sports events involving children.

The legislation is being inconsistently applied across local authority areas which has led to uncertainty and confusion. In some areas, the requirements of the local authority have created a heavy administrative burden for festival organisers and could affect the long-term viability of festivals in the future. In April 2018, the Federation's General Manager met with representatives of the Department of Education to discuss the matter.

Under the auspices of the Music Education Council (MEC), the Federation along with Making Music, Music Mark, the Association of British Orchestras, Music for Youth, the Incorporated Society of Musicians and Brass Bands England have established a working group which meets regularly to gather information and present a united voice on this important issue. The MEC has put together a survey to explore the experiences of members of these organisations. The purpose of the survey is to collect data on the scale of the problem, and the impact it is having on opportunities for children and young people to participate in performing arts at a local, regional and national level.

The Federation recognises the importance of professional adjudicators and accompanists to festivals. Skilled adjudicators inspire and educate performers and audience alike. Each performer should leave a festival with some useful advice for further development and a real sense of achievement. The Federation encourages all adjudicator members to attend annual conference where new skills, approaches and ideas are explored.

The Elena Cobb Star Prize Festival is held annually at the Royal Albert Hall and features young pianists from around the world. Through an innovative collaboration between the organisers and the Federation, some 45 young pianists who took part in Federation member festivals have had the opportunity to perform at the Royal Albert Hall. It is an exciting opportunity and an experience designed to build confidence, character and self-esteem.

The Federation supports a UK-wide network of Regional Forums. These meetings, which are open to all Federation members, are held twice a year and are facilitated by voluntary forum officers. Members share experience and practice, and additional meetings may be held to give further time to individual matters of interest and importance to forum members. Members of Federation staff attend a number of these meetings to talk about areas of concern and development, and as an opportunity to meet members. Forum officers also undertake a rolling programme of visits to festivals in each region.

The busy annual conference organised by the Federation provides members with opportunities to meet together, to learn, share and develop in pursuit of their common purpose of supporting performing arts opportunities for people of all ages. The 2018 conference was held over two days in Blackpool in the historic Imperial Hotel. There were presentations and workshops on a wide range of themes including: topical aspects of performance in music, dance, and speech and drama; a youth ambassadors' programme; readiness for GDPR; festivals from the perspective of teachers; and what makes a good accompanist. Davin Needham, a celebrated choreographer, presented an inspiring overview of his career and his development as dancer and choreographer. Delegates also experienced the Blackpool trams and illuminations and a number took the opportunity to visit the Blackpool Tower Ballroom. Overall, the conference was very successful with 94% of feedback respondents rating it outstanding or excellent.

The Federation has adopted new branding to reinforce its presence in the performing arts sector. It has adopted the strapline "perform, educate, inspire" which the trustees believe encapsulates the shared goals of the Federation and its members.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

A new website has been implemented to improve communication with and among members, and to support and publicise the work of members and the Federation. Interfacing with the website is a customer relations management (CRM) system which allows members to review and update their own information and provides tools for communication with members. An important objective of the CRM system is to reduce effort and time spent on member administration and to allow that time to be directed to supporting members and developing the Federation.

The majority of member Festivals are organised and operated by volunteers, a number of whom also actively support and engage in the work of the Federation. In recognition of this, a fellowship category, "Festival Fellows" was introduced and members were invited to nominate people who have made outstanding contributions both to the work of the Federation and to their own festival. Seven people were appointed Festival Fellows at the annual conference in October.

The Federation is privileged to have Her Majesty the Queen as Patron. The trustees acknowledge publicly the valuable work undertaken by the Festivals House team, past and present, and the tireless efforts of members and volunteers throughout the Festival movement to ensure that many thousands of amateur performers will continue to have opportunity to take part and to benefit from professional adjudication. The trustees will continue to work together to deliver and enhance services to the membership and to fulfil the vision and aims of the Federation.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **Financial review**

It is pleasing to report that, in a period of uncertainty for all business enterprises, we are in a position to report a surplus of income over expenditure that has resulted in a small increase in net worth. There has been a strong investment in IT and website update, which the Board considers will produce a long-term benefit by providing greater internal efficiency and significantly improved means of communication and information to members.

Due to prudent internal management and strict oversight by the Board, we have maintained a positive cash flow throughout the year with no reliance on our overdraft facility; consequently, the overdraft has been reduced to a nominal sum.

A primary aim is to keep cost to members as low as possible; as such we are reliant upon our investments to generate income. With the challenging economic climate and the potential effect on global stock markets the Board considered it prudent to bring forward the annual investment review with Brewin Dolphin. Normally the review is conducted in February each year; however, for this financial year, the review was held in November. Whilst it is considered a long-term investment in a managed portfolio remains a sound strategy the Board, following the review, instructed Brewin Dolphin to change our risk strategy to a slightly more cautious spread of investments.

#### Reserves policy

The Board currently maintains a reserve policy set at £150,000 for unrestricted funds.

At the year end, excluding tangible fixed assets, the value of unrestricted funds is £295,658. The Board recognises that it holds a surplus of funds in investments, which is considered necessary to generate a return on investment to aid working capital and to protect against any consequence that threatens continuity of the organisation's work.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Company and charity information

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech is a private company, limited by guarantee, and registered in England and Wales, number 00177744. Its registered office, which is also its principal office, is Festivals House, 198 Park Lane, Macclesfield, SK11 6UD. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission, charity number 213125.

## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2019

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The Federation is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which were last amended on 5 October 2014. The company was formed in 1921.

#### Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Trustees are elected by members of the Federation and may be proposed by members or identified by serving Trustees. A skills analysis of trustees is conducted and where a shortfall is identified a recruitment plan is devised to address it. All trustees, including those elected honorary officers (chair, vice chair and honorary treasurer), retire at the Annual General Meeting following the third year of their appointment. A trustee who is not elected an honorary officer may serve continuously for a maximum of nine years. In normal circumstances, an honorary officer may serve continuously for a maximum of nine years from the date of first election to the honorary office.

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the Federation is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The risk management strategy is managed by the Board of Trustees and comprises an annual review of the risks the organisation may face; the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks; and the implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the organisation.

The Board of Trustees maintains a risk register, which is reviewed annually. Insurance covers the major financial risks and is reviewed annually. Systems of internal control are designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material mis-statement or loss. The controls are:

- Regular consideration of financial results in comparison to budgets
- Regular review of non-financial performance indicators
- Appropriate levels of delegation of authority to staff and segregation of duties
- Identification and management of risks across a wide range of headings
- Safety and fire risk assessments meeting legislative requirements

### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st March 2019

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### **Tangible fixed assets**

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

- On cost

Office equipment

- 25% on reducing balance

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of any restricted fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

### Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
