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### Directors' report

The directors present their annual report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2022.

#### **Directors**

The directors who held office during the year were as follows:

K Fisher (resigned on 31 December 2021) P Lindblad C Chantrey

#### **Principal activities**

The principal activities of the company during the year were the provision of management services to companies within the Ingredients division of Associated British Foods plc ("ABF").

#### **Business review**

The company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Associated British Foods plc.

#### Trading results and reserves

The profit on ordinary activities before taxation was £181,000 (2021: profit of £199,000). After a tax charge of £254,000 (2021: charge of £111,000) the company has reported a loss for the financial year of £73,000 (2021: profit of £88,000). The directors do not propose a dividend for the period (2021: £nil).

#### United Kingdom charitable and political contributions

No contributions were made to charitable organisations during the year (2021: £nil).

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

A full description of the principal risks and uncertainties applicable to the Associated British Foods plc group, of which this company is a wholly owned subsidiary, are disclosed on pages 94 to 101 of the 2022 Annual Report, which is available at www.abf.co.uk.

### Going concern

The Company has received a letter of support from its intermediate parent company, ABF Investments plc, indicating that it will receive the financial and other support necessary for the Company to trade and meet its liabilities as and when they become due for a period of twelve months from the date of approval and signing of these financial statements.

After making enquiries and considering the support available from the intermediate parent company described above, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operation for 12 months from the date of approval and signing of these financial statements. These considerations included the ABF group's directors' assessment of going concern (set out in the Annual Report and Accounts dated 8 November 2022 and available at www.abf.co.uk), which included the significant levels of cash and undrawn committed long-term facilities available to the group and the ABF group's directors' stress testing of cash flow forecasts through to 2 March 2024, and an assessment of any developments since that date that would adversely affect that conclusion. Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

#### Supplier payment policy

It is the Company's policy to agree terms of business with suppliers prior to the supply of goods and services. In the absence of any dispute, the Company pays in accordance with these terms. On average our terms are 30 days.

#### Disclosure of information to auditor

The directors who held office at the date of approval of this directors' report confirm that, so far as they are each aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditor is unaware; and each director has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a director to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditor is aware of that information.

The directors are an integral part of these routines and regularly monitor impact and focus resources on the areas where improvement would derive the most benefit for our people.

We have also understood the controls in place to reduce the opportunity for fraudulent transactions.
- We assessed the susceptibility of the company's financial statements to material misstatement, including how fraud might occur by meeting with management and those charged with governance to understand where it considered there was susceptibility to fraud. We considered the procedures and controls that the company has established to address risks identified, or that otherwise prevent, deter and detect fraud and gained an understanding as to how those procedures and controls are implemented and monitored. We determined there to be a risk of management override in relation to the posting of non-standard manual journal entries in respect of expenses, as these are recharged on to group entities.

  supporting source documentation. To address the risk management override, we have used data analytics and
  obtained the entire population of journals for the year and identified specific transactions for further
  investigation based on certain criteria. We understood the transactions identified for testing and agreed them to
  source documentation.

# Notes to the financial statements as at 31 August 2022

## 1 Authorisation of financial statements and statement of compliance with FRS 101

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 101 Reduced Disclosure Framework ("FRS 101"). The Company's financial statements are presented in sterling and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand pounds except when otherwise indicated. The Company has taken advantage of the exemption under section 400 of the Companies Act 2006 not to prepare group accounts as it is a wholly owned subsidiary of Associated British Foods plc. The results of the Company are included in the consolidated financial statements of Associated British Foods plc which are available from Weston Centre, 10 Grosvenor Street, London W1K 4QY and at www.abf.co.uk.

The principal accounting policies adopted by the Company are set out in note 2.

#### 2 Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to the years presented in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements, unless otherwise stated.

The Company's activities are set out in the Principal activities section of the Directors' report on page 1.

#### Basis of preparation:

The Company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions under FRS 101:

- The requirements of IAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- The requirements of paragraphs 17 and 18A of IAS 24 Related Party Disclosures in respect of disclosure of key management personnel compensation;
- the requirements in IAS 24 Related Party Disclosures to disclose related party transactions entered into between two or more members of a group, provided that any subsidiary which is a party to the transaction is wholly owned by such a member;
- the requirements of paragraphs 30 and 31 of IAS 8 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors which deals with IFRSs issued but not yet effective;
- the requirements of paragraphs 10(d), 10(f), 16, 38A, 38B, 38C, 38D, 40A, 40B, 40C, 40D, 111 and 134 to 136 of IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements; and
- the requirements of paragraph 45(b) and 46-52 of IFRS 2 Share Based Payment, because the share-based payment arrangement concerns the instruments of another group entity

### 2 Significant Accounting policies (continued)

Other exemptions are available under FRS 101 but these have not been set out above as they are not relevant to the Company's financial statements.

#### Going concern

As set out in note 17, the smallest group in which the results of the company are consolidated is that headed by Associated British Foods plc, which confirmed in the Annual Report and Accounts dated 8 November 2022 that its directors have a reasonable expectation that the Associated British Foods plc group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

The Company has received a letter of support from its intermediate parent company, ABF Investments plc, indicating that it will receive the financial and other support necessary for the Company to trade and meet its liabilities as and when they become due for a period of 12 months from the date of approval and signing of these financial statements.

After making enquiries and considering the support available from the intermediate parent company described above, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operation for 12 months from the date of approval and signing of these financial statements. These considerations included the ABF group's directors' assessment of going concern (set out in the Annual Report and Accounts dated 8 November 2022 and available at www.abf.co.uk), which included the significant levels of cash and undrawn committed long-term facilities available to the group and the ABF group's directors' stress testing of cash flow forecasts through to 2 March 2024, and an assessment of any developments since that date that would adversely affect that conclusion. ### Turnover

Turnover represents the amounts (excluding value added tax) derived from the provision of services to group companies during the year.

#### Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation, calculated on original cost, is provided on a straight-line basis over the anticipated life of the asset. The anticipated life of fixed assets is set out below:

Plant, machinery, fixtures and fittings 5 years Motor vehicles 4 years

#### Foreign currencies

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated using the rate

of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date and gains or losses on translation are included in the profit and loss account.

#### **Taxation**

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities based on tax rates and laws that are enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax is provided on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes. The amount of deferred tax provided is based on the expected manner of realisation or settlement of the carrying amount of assets and liabilities, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

#### Intangible Assets

Purchased goodwill (representing the excess of the fair value of the consideration given over the fair value of the separable net assets) acquired in respect of acquisitions since 1 January 1998 is capitalised. Positive goodwill is assessed for impairment annually or whenever there are indicators of impairment.

Software amortisation, calculated on original cost, is provided on a straight-line basis over the anticipated life of the asset.

#### Pension costs

The Company is a member of the UK defined benefit scheme of Associated British Foods plc, the assets of which are held in trustee-administered funds. As the Company is unable to identify its share of the scheme's assets and liabilities on a consistent basis the scheme is accounted for by the Company as if it were a defined contribution scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Company.

The Company also operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the Company in an independently-administered fund. The amount charged to the profit and loss account represents the contributions payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period.

#### Share-based payments

The Associated British Foods plc group operates a share incentive plan which allows employees to receive allocations of shares subject to the attainment of certain financial performance criteria and typically after a three-year performance period. The fair value of the shares to be awarded is recognised as an employee expense by the Company, with a corresponding increase in reserves. The fair value of the shares allocated is measured taking into account the terms and conditions under which the shares were allocated. The amount recognised as an expense is adjusted to reflect the actual number of shares that vest.

## Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from the estimates. The directors believe that there are no estimates or judgements that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements for the periods presented.

## 3 Segment information

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The Company has one class of business which is the supply of services to other entities in the ABF Ingredients division.

#### Fair values

#### 8 Pensions

The Company is a member of the Associated British Foods plc pension scheme which provides benefits based on final pensionable pay. As the Company is unable to identify its share of the scheme's assets and liabilities on a consistent basis the scheme is accounted for by the Company as if it were a defined contribution scheme. On 30 September 2002 the scheme was closed to new members and a defined contribution arrangement was put in place for other employees. Employer's contributions to the defined benefit scheme for the year totalled £113,993 (2021: £97,779) and are recorded as a cost in the profit and loss account. For the defined contribution scheme, contributions for the year amounted to £195,967 (2021: £138,952), also recorded as a cost in the profit and loss account. No pension contributions were accrued at the period end (2021: nil).

The UK defined benefit scheme represents 90% (2021 - 91%) of the Group's defined benefit scheme assets and 86% (2021 - 88%) of defined benefit scheme liabilities. The scheme is governed by a trustee board which is independent of the group and which agrees a schedule of contributions with the Company each time a formal funding valuation is performed. Full IAS 19 disclosures can be found within the annual report and accounts of the ABF group, which are available for download from the group's website at www.abf.co.uk. The most recent triennial funding valuation of the Scheme was carried out as at 5 April 2020, using the current unit method, and revealed a deficit of £302m.
