# Report of the Trustees (incorporating the Report of the Directors) for the year ended 31 December 2006

The Trustees of The Lord's Taverners Limited have pleasure in presenting their report and the audited consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2006 This report should be read in conjunction with the information on pages 1 and 2

### Structure, Governance and Management

### **Club and Charity**

Founded as a Club in 1950 at the Old Tavern at Lord's by a group of actors, who wished to put something back into the game of cricket, we have evolved over 56 years into a Club and Charity Our fundraising is principally events-led through our 4,000 strong membership. We have three fundraising groups — Lord's Taverners, Lady Taverners and Young Lord's Taverners. Our 16 staff drive our London-based national events. A significant proportion of our fundraising each year is attributable to our all-volunteer 27 Lord's Taverners Regions and 22 Lady Taverners Regions.

We aim to give away in the form of grants most of the money we raise each year. For the past five years this has amounted to between £1 5million and £2million each year, the Charity also receives donations and grants for specific purposes which are not included in these figures. Since 1950 our total grants have exceeded £40million.

### Membership

Our Members are drawn from the world of entertainment, sport, the professions, commerce and the arts. There are approximately 2,000 Lord's Taverners, 1,000 Lady Taverners, 200 Young Lord's Taverners and 800 Associate members.

HRH The Prince Philip has been Patron and Twelfth Man since our founding in 1950 Mr Mike Gatting OBE is our 34th President Mr Bill Tidy MBE will succeed Mr Gatting in May 2007 Rachael Heyhoe Flint MBE is President of The Lady Taverners and Mr Andrew Flintoff MBE is President of the Young Lord's Taverners

### **Constitution and Trustees**

We are governed by our Memorandum and Articles of Association (most recently those adopted pursuant to Special Resolutions passed on 24 April 2006) They can be viewed via a link on the Home Page of our website <a href="www.lordstaverners.org">www.lordstaverners.org</a> The Articles of Association require the Charity to be managed by the Trustees. The Trustees, who are elected by full members of The Lord's Taverners in annual elections, serve for a three year term. One third of the elected Trustees retires each year but is eligible for re-election up to a maximum of three consecutive terms. The Trustees who have served during the year are listed on page 1.

### **Induction and Training of Trustees**

Trustees receive details of the responsibilities of charity Trustees on nomination for election. On election Trustees are briefed by the Chairman and receive an induction briefing by the Chief Executive

### Organisational Structure and Decision-making Process

The Trustees of The Lord's Taverners are responsible for the management of the Club through an Executive Committee, which meets monthly The Chief Executive and senior executive staff report to the Executive Committee Supporting the fundraising and grant making work of the charity are volunteer committees serviced by the Executive staff

The Executive Committee delegates day to day administrative responsibility to the Chief Executive and his team but, in keeping with the Club ethos, there is a tradition of hands-on oversight by the volunteer-led committees

The administrative costs of our charitable activities have been calculated at 4p in the £ (2005 5p) Costs directly attributable to fundraising add a further 11p (2005 14p) and governance costs were 1p (2005 1p) Thus the overheads for running the Club and the Charity were 16p in the £ (2005 20p) as a proportion of our overall income

### **Risk Management**

The Trustees continually assess the risks to which the Charity is exposed, in particular those related to the staging of events and other fundraising initiatives. They are satisfied that there are systems in place manage exposure to major risk. The charity has an Audit Committee, chaired by a Trustee, which reports to the Trustees following the annual audit of the accounts as well as at each meeting of the Trustees.

### Objectives and Activities, including Achievement and Performance

### Charitable Mission

"Giving young people, particularly those with special needs, a sporting chance"

- by providing incentives to play cricket in schools and clubs.
- by enabling young people with special needs to participate in sporting activities,
- by supplying minibuses to special needs' organisations, and
- by creating recreational facilities in conjunction with the National Playing Fields' Association

The Lord's Taverners is recognised by the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) as the official national charity for recreational cricket

### **Fundraising Activities**

The Club, both centrally and in the Regions, puts on around 300 fundraising events each year. Many of these are annual events where the income is able to be predicted with some certainty. These form the core of the annual budget, which in recent years has forecast a net income of about £1.5 million. The charity constantly strives to achieve higher surpluses than this through the ingenuity and commitment of both volunteer Members and the executive staff.

The range of events put on includes Lunches and Dinners, Cricket Matches and Golf days, and Concerts We are also alert to opportunities both to be nominated as charity of the year by companies and other organisations and to be nominated as the charitable beneficiary of commercial and other events. We seek, wherever possible, to engage commercial partners for all our fundraising activities.

The role of our volunteer Members is crucial to all our fundraising activity both with central events and, especially, in the Regions which are 100% volunteer-led

### Fundraising Highlights in 2006

One-off events during the year (with approximate funds raised in brackets) included a concert at the Royal Albert Hall (£7,000), a dinner during the Football World Cup (£22,000), Tribute Dinners to Mike Gatting at the Tower of London (£35,000), Jim Laker at The Savoy (£70,000) and Sir David Frost at the Mansion House (£42,000) The Lady Taverners put on a lunch at Trinity House with HRH Princess Royal (£9,000) and a Ball at Cliveden House (£35,000) We were also nominated as a charity beneficiary of the cricketer, Andrew Flintoff's Benefit year, with the promise of a donation of at least £50,000

### Grants Policy and Committee - The Foundation

The Foundation, which meets four times a year, is invited by the Trustees to give away each year as grants an amount approximately equal to the net funds raised. The Trustees have determined that for the time being grants are made on the following basis.

- 50% to Youth Cricket.
- £30,000 of the balance to The National Playing Fields Association,

with the balance being distributed as follows,

- 70% to supplying minibuses to special needs' organisations, and
- 30% to supplying sports and play equipment to organisations looking after young people with special needs

Recommendations to Foundation are made by three sub-committees, each chaired by a volunteer Member, which cover the three principal areas of our giving – Cricket, Minibuses and 'Sport and Recreation for Young People with Special Needs'

### Grant Giving Highlights in 2006

#### Cricket

Grants to Youth Cricket in 2006, excluding the restricted grants made possible by the England & Wales Cricket Trust, The National Sports Foundation (see below) and others, totalled £738,608

In 2005 the Trustees committed, subject to certain conditions, the charity to spending 20% of our Cricket grants each year on the Cricket Foundation Appeal's *Chance to shine* project to take cricket back to our state schools, up to a total of £1 million on the project. In 2006 we made grants totalling £175,000 to *Chance to shine*, bringing the total donated to date to £350,000.

Following the unprecedented interest in cricket in the wake of England's Ashes victory in the summer of 2005, we found ourselves, for the first time, unable to meet the demand for our grants of cricket equipment bags and towards Non-Turf Pitch installations. We are grateful to the newly constituted England & Wales Cricket Trust, which helped us alleviate this situation by making a grant to us of £177,500 and to the even newer National Sports Foundation, which provided matched funding for this grant.

### Minibuses

In 2006 we spent £511,297 towards the provision of 46 Minibuses. This figure excludes the donations from recipient self help and supplier rebate.

In November 2006, our Patron and Twelfth Man, HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, presented our 800<sup>th</sup> Minibus to the Holyport Manor School, Maidenhead at Windsor Castle

### Sport and Recreation for Young People with Special Needs

In 2006 we made 58 grants of special needs sports and play equipment and 73 grants towards the purchase of Sports Wheelchairs These totalled £232,772 This figure excludes donations from recipient self help

In January 2006 we made a grant of £25,000 to Green Park School, a special needs school in Wolverhampton, towards the installation of a multi sensory play room

### **Subsidiary Companies**

The Lord's Taverners operate a trading subsidiary, Lord's Taverners Enterprises Limited, through which trading income in respect of merchandise and property leases are managed. Profit from this company is gift aided to the charity each year.

In addition, The Lord's Taverners is the sole Corporate Trustee of The Brian Johnston Memorial Trust, which raises funds to enable financial support to be given to young cricketers with potential to succeed in the game, who are in financial need, as well as to cricket for the blind. The Lord's Taverners assist the Trust with a grant of £15,000 each year.

The results of both subsidiary companies are consolidated in these financial statements. Further details are provided in the notes

### **Financial Review and Outlook**

The overall surplus before unrestricted grant aid for the Group was in line with Budget at £1,822,320 (2005 £1,627,584) Further details are shown on page 11 in the Statement of Financial Activities, but a summary is set out below

During the year the fundraising activities of The Lady Taverners raised £702,511 (2005 £717,712) before any overhead allocation, and The Young Lord's Taverners raised £16,950 (2005 £20,965) on the same basis. The Budget target surplus for 2007 has been again set at £1.5 million.

### **Reserves Policy**

The Reserves Policy of the Trustees is, as far as is prudently possible, to commit all the funds that are raised by the Charity in the year in which they are received, having regard to the need for funds to cover a normal level of working capital. The reserves of the Group are almost entirely represented by the freehold building occupied by the Charity and the subsidiary companies, which cost £2 08m and has been revalued to £2 75m. This sum is not, therefore, currently available to be given away.

### Investment policy and performance

The only investments held by the charity in recent years have been gifted shares. Trustee policy is to liquidate such investments as soon as they can be sold

### Plans for the Future

The Trustees are proposing to review our governance structure during 2007 with a view to streamlining it if possible

The key components of The Lord's Taverners will continue to be a well-balanced mix of Club and Charity, ensuring the enjoyment of our Members and their friends at our events and thereby maximising our fundraising

### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

### Notes to the financial statements For the year ended 31 December 2006

### 1 Accounting policies

### a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the charity and its subsidiary undertakings, Lord's Taverners Enterprises Limited and the Brian Johnston Memorial Trust, on a line by line basis. The Lord's Taverners is the sole member of Brian Johnston Memorial Trust; the Trust has been consolidated in these financial statements for the first time in 2006. 2005 figures have been restated accordingly.

### b) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donors or which have been raised by the charity for specific purposes

### c) Incoming resources

Donations are recognised when the charity is entitled to the money and the amount receivable is certain All other receipts from fundraising are reported gross, and are recognised in the period to which the fundraising event related. Annual subscriptions and entrance fees are treated as income when they are received. Related gift aid is recognised when a claim is made to Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs.

Legacies notified by the balance sheet date are included as income for the year, provided that they have either been received or otherwise are known and can be measured with certainty

Income from events and regions is recognised in the period in which the event occurs

Investment income is accounted for when receivable and includes the related tax recoverable

All other income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when the conditions for receipt have been met and there is reasonable assurance of receipt

The value of assets donated for use at events is recognised when the related income is received

# Notes to the financial statements For the year ended 31 December 2006

### 1 Accounting policies

### d) Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised on an accruals basis, and exclude recoverable VAT

Costs of generating funds comprise expenditure directly attributable to fundraising events, the costs of fundraising staff and a proportion of attributable overhead costs

Expenditure on charitable activities comprises all expenditure directly related to the objects of the charity and includes grants payable, which are recognised at the time they are approved. Charitable activities also includes the costs of staff directly involved with the grant making process as well as a proportion of attributable overhead costs.

Governance costs comprise expenditure relating to the governance and strategic management of the charity and its subsidiaries, and include the costs of statutory compliance, audit fees, trustees' expenses, legal fees where these are related to strategic issues and a proportion of overhead costs where these can be attributed to the governance arrangements of the group. Governance costs also include the costs of the meetings of trustees, and the awards and other committees.

The charity's overhead costs include staff costs, premises and other related costs. Such costs are allocated between the categories of costs of generating funds (including fundraising), charitable activities and governance costs. ### 17 Taxation

As the Lord's Taverners Limited is a registered charity under the Charities Act 1993 it is entitled to the exemptions from tax afforded by sections 505 ICTA 1988 and 256 TCGA 1992 so far as its income and gains are applied for charitable purposes

### 18 Commitments

In 2005 the Charity pledged to donate £1m to the Cricket Foundation's Chance to Shine Appeal, subject to certain conditions. Up to 31 December 2006, a total of £350,000 had been accounted for, leaving a conditional commitment of £650,000.

### 19 Related party transactions

Transactions and balances with the Lords Taverners Enterprises Limited and the Brian Johnston Memorial Trust are not disclosed, as advantage has been taken of the exemptions available under FRS 8

### 20 Constitution

The Lord's Taverners Limited is a company limited by guarantee with 18 members (2005—18 members). The maximum liability on winding up for each member is £1. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member.
