Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

The Foundation For Christian Communication ("The Foundation") is a company limited by guarantee (registered number 1375941), and a registered charity (registered number 276286) it was established on the 29 June 1978, the governing document being the Memorandum and Articles of Association as amended and adopted on the 11 December 2000, 16 December 2002 and 14 December 2004

The Foundation's activities are carried out under the name of CTVC

Corporate Governance

Appliance of the principles of the Combined Code

The Foundation seeks to comply with best practice with regard to corporate governance. The Trustees have reviewed the requirements of the Combined Code. The principles of the Combined Code relevant to The Foundation have been applied as follows.

Statement of Directors' responsibilities

The directors are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the surplus or loss of the company for that period

In preparing these financial statements we are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- make reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless in our view the company will be unable to continue in business

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and the group, to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the group and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregulanties.

Directors

The names of the Directors who served during the year are shown on page 1 and The Chairman should like to thank all of them for their support and continuing interest in the work of The Foundation

Mrs L G Fox who had been a Director since 1992 resigned due to additional commitments with the parent undertaking. The Board would like to thank her for the years of service and important contribution she made.

During 2006 we welcomed as new Directors, The Hon Mrs C Twiston-Davies, and Mr G C King to the Board

Appointments to the Board

Members of the Board are appointed either by The Rank Foundation Limited ("The Rank Foundation") or by the existing Board. There are no set procedures for selecting new members and to this extent, The Foundation does not comply with the requirements of the Combined Code but makes appointments on the basis of the particular skills required by the Board.

Given the ability of The Rank Foundation to appoint a majority of the Board Directors and The Foundation's circumstances, the Board are satisfied that this non-compliance does not have a detrimental effect on the corporate governance of The Foundation

Re-election

The members of the Board are required to be re-elected to the Board annually

In accordance with the articles of association, the Directors in office at that time will retire at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting and offer themselves for re-election

Board balance

At the commencement of the year the Board comprised nine Directors. Six were elected by The Rank Foundation, and the balance appointed by the Board.

The Rank Foundation has the right to appoint a majority of the Directors and to remove any Directors it appoints. Any other Directors can be appointed either by the Board or by the shareholders

Induction and Training

All new Directors receive on appointment an induction pack. This contains copies of the Governing documents, all committee constitutions, the previous year's annual report and financial statements, a book detailing the history of the charity, and a profile of all Directors and staff

The Foundation provided during the year a formal trustee-training day that was attended by a majority of current trustees and additional training is provided as and when required or appropriate

Directors' remuneration

The Directors' remuneration is set by the Board and is based on the number of days required to perform their duties

The Directors' emoluments are detailed in the financial statements

Decision Making and Committees

Chairman and Chief Executive

The roles and responsibilities of the Chairman (Mr V A L Powell) and Chief Executive (Mr N J E Stuart-Jones) are separate and are clearly defined

The Board

The Board is responsible for leading and controlling The Foundation. The Board achieves this by

- setting the long term strategic objectives of The Foundation
- the annual preparation, approval and adoption of medium term business plans, which guide The Foundation's activities in the periods to which they relate,
- · the annual preparation, approval and adoption of annual budgets, based on three year business plans,
- monitoring actual performance against budget and business plans,
- · monitoring the results, key performance indicators and variances on a quarterly basis

The Board meets three times a year

It is to be noted that the Board is comprised solely of non-executive directors. The combined code would require a senior independent director be identified, and that directors are not considered independent once they have served for over nine years. However, given that the Board is comprised solely of non-executive directors, they are all independent of management.

Supply of information

The Board receives detailed management accounts prior to each board meeting

Additional information is also provided to members of the Management Committee on a monthly basis

Minutes of all Management and Audit and Remuneration Committee meetings are distributed to members of the Board on a regular basis

Further information and analysis required by any Board member is provided to them whenever they request it

Structure, Governance and Management (continued)

Management committee

The Board has delegated specific responsibilities to the Management Committee, which comprises two non-executive directors The Rev E M Shegog and Mr G C King, the Chief Executive, the Company Secretary and the Finance Director Mr G C King replaced Mr G B Ackery who served until his retirement

The committee meets monthly throughout the year. The purpose of the committee is to ensure the business of The Foundation is conducted on a day to day basis within the limits delegated by the Board and in accordance with the policies and strategies prescribed by the Board. The committee members report to the Board three times a year.

Audit committee

The Audit Committee presently comprises three directors and meets twice a year. The purpose of the committee is to create a formal conduit between the external auditors and the Board, it has the authority to appoint the external auditors and to fix their remuneration.

The auditors have reported to the committee on, inter alia, their independence and the procedures they undertake to maintain their independence. The committee has reviewed these in conjunction with the non-audit fees paid to the auditors and have satisfied themselves as to the auditors' continuing independence.

It also has the power to fix the salary and expense allowances of the Chief Executive

Committee members also advise as to the content and presentation of the annual report, so as to ensure that financial reporting requirements are met

The purpose, functions and responsibilities of the committee are clearly defined and where authority has been delegated to the Committee, the Board as a whole will not unreasonably withhold approval of the committee's decision

The members of the Audit Committee throughout 2006 were Mr G B Ackery (until his retirement), Mr A E Cowen, and Mr J R Newton Mr G C King replaces Mr G B Ackery

Parent undertaking

The parent company is The Rank Foundation Limited (registered number 516434), a registered charity (registered number 276976), whose address is 12 Warwick Square, London, SW1V 2AA

The Foundation is a wholly owned subsidiary of The Rank Foundation. The Rank Foundation prepares consolidated accounts, which incorporate the results of The Foundation, and it's subsidiary company (Hillside Studios Limited).

Structure, Governance and Management (continued)

Subsidiary undertaking

The Foundation has a wholly-owned trading subsidiary which is incorporated in the United Kingdom, Hillside Studios Limited (registered number 1782130) Following the relocation of its operations to Central London its principle activity is the making of video productions

All the profits of Hillside Studios Limited are donated to The Foundation by way of gift aid

A summary of Hillside Studios Limited's trading results for the year is shown on page 23. Audited accounts will be filed with the Registrar of Companies

Internal control and risk management

The Board has overall responsibility for The Foundation's system of internal control and for monitoring the effectiveness of the controls

It should be noted that any system of internal control can provide only reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material mis-statement or loss

The Foundation has put in place an organisational structure with formally defined lines of responsibility and delegation of authority. Within that structure, key aspects of the system of internal control are

- A tri-annual preparation of medium term business plans, incorporating annual operating and capital budgets, which are formally approved by the Board
- Annually, the budget for the year, as set out in the medium term business plan, is revised to take account of changing circumstances and formally adopted and approved by the Board
- Performance is monitored against budget, by way of monthly management accounts and a review of key performance indicators, with all significant variances being investigated

The Board receive quarterly accounts

Given The Foundation's size and nature of operations, the Board does not consider that an Internal Audit function is warranted

As set out above, the Board is closely involved in the implementation of the internal controls. The Board has reviewed the operation of the internal controls and is satisfied that the key internal control functions operated effectively during 2006.

in addition the Board has confirmed that the major risks to which the charity is exposed, as identified by the Directors, have been reviewed and systems established to mitigate those risks

Objectives and Activities

The Foundation is a registered charity and its principal activities are

- The production and distribution of television and radio programmes, films and videos, and media training for Christian and educational purposes, in furtherance of
- The advancement and promotion of the Christian religion and the advancement of Christian religious education of the public
- To advance the public knowledge and understanding of the other historic world faiths with significant communities in the United Kingdom
- To promote the understanding of the shared values, traditions and practices of the Christian faith and the faiths
 referred to above, and their application in a secular environment
- To stimulate and motivate people to think about moral and spiritual issues in their everyday lives

The Foundation fulfils its chantable objects primarily by informing people about Christianity and christian values through broadcast and web-based programmes. Founded by the late Lord Rank, it is also involved in media training and educational projects which tie in with the religious aims of the charity.

Television

In order to achieve as wide an audience as possible, programme ideas are submitted to commissioning editors of the UK terrestrial and digital channels. Ideas which have been originated and developed by The Foundation, will be partially funded by the broadcaster concerned for a licence to transmit the programme.

The Foundation also enter into co-production agreements with other independent companies in projects that reflect the aims of the charity. The contribution can be financial and editorial assistance whilst in others just editorial. The Foundation retains ownership to certain secondary sales rights in the programmes made.

Radio

The Foundation has targeted BBC national and international radio stations as an outlet for our programming. As with TV, ideas are generated and developed internally and submitted to the commissioning editors of the radio stations.

Education / New Media

The approach taken to date is to team up with an established supplier of educational material to educational establishments. Two interactive CD-ROM's for use in schools, designed to encourage educational learning about the perspectives of different religions through interactive computer programmes, have been produced and are in distribution.

Research into available uses of the Internet has led The Foundation into a new venture that will make use of this medium. A three-month trial takes place during the first half of 2007 in an attempt to interact with young people who previously. The Foundation have not managed to reach through broadcast. An interactive website www truetube columns are up to facilitate this new venture.

Training - Videoschool

To provide production training for Christian and youth charities to help them make their own videos. The aim is to provide the sector with an ability to communicate more effectively in the video-age, as more and more opportunities are made available to grass root organisations through the internet and local broadcasting

Report of The Directors' for the year ended 31 December 2006 (continued)

Achievements and Performance

2006 was the first full year in our new offices next to Tower Bridge following the restructuring of the company Built around a core fulltime staff of five people, supplemented with short-term staff brought in for specific productions, the more flexible business model enabled The Foundation to put resources into developing a new web-based product, "TrueTube" to help take advantage of the new interactive opportunities for communication that the web brings. A new Head of Production joined the company at the end of the year from one of the country's most successful specialist factual independent production companies, bringing new business skills and web experience which will strengthen our position in the rapidly changing media markets.

The Foundation had its best ever year for radio and the best ever year for new television commissions, 18 of which will be broadcast in 2007 Further evidence of the new company model delivering was the re-awarding of the "Investors in People" accreditation, which complimented the company on its effective management structure and

Television

The Foundation made 11 hours of broadcast programming in 2006, reaching an audience of 6 million viewers Programmes were broadcast on Channel 4 (6 hours) – ITV 1 (4 hours) – and More 4 (1 hour) 18 commissions were won during the year for programmes that will be shown in 2007

Programmes included the Channel 4 Christmas Day prime time two hour special "The Secret Family of Jesus" which looked at the power-struggle after Christ's death and explored the different interpretations of Jesus' teachings by Jesus' earthly family and Paul "7/7 Remembered" with Sir Trevor McDonald was a two hour special for the anniversary of the 7 July bombings. The programme included an interfaith act of worship from the parish church of St Pancras "Shariah TV" returned for its third series on Channel 4, contributing to our understanding of Islam and the issues faced by young Muslims living in Britain at a time of heightened tension.

Radio

More than 13 million listeners tuned in to our programmes broadcast on BBC Radio 4 during 2006 – by far the highest annual figures achieved by The Foundation to date

Programmes included "Real World", a five part series that took nuns and monks from Christian and Buddhist traditions into the "real world" to see how they coped and what impact they would have on those around them The series was so successful that it was repeated on "The World Service" and will be repeated again on Radio 4 in January 2007 "Who Killed Christianity?" with the historian David Starkey drew an audience of 6 million over five programmes that explored the contributions of leading figures from Church history, debating with theologians how close to Jesus' teachings they actually were. Five more programmes were commissioned during 2006 for broadcast in 2007.

Report of The Directors' for the year ended 31 December 2006 (continued)

Achievements and Performance (continued)

Training - Videoschool

Videoschool was sub-contracted out to the CFM Trust, a Christian media chanty that had been working with The Foundation to develop video-training courses for church and youth organisations over the past three years

CFM Trust took courses to ten organisations, training over 100 students on weekend courses, including The Bible Society, the Churches Media Council and the Manchester based "Message" Christian Youth mission. Six students are now pursuing a media career, and videos were made to help raise funds and raise awareness of homeless projects and prison work in Aberdeen, Newcastle, London and Manchester.

Education

Sales for the CD Roms "Learning from Religion" and "Understanding Religion", have begun to reduce, and The Foundation was also unable to break into the market for broadcast education channels such as "Teachers TV" Rather than spread too thinly we decided to refocus our educational strategy by combining our educational remit with a new product for the web

New media - Web TV - TrueTube:

To reach the teenage audience that has tuned to the web rather than broadcast TV, The Foundation spent part of the year developing a new product that would attract a young audience and take advantage of the interactive potential of the web Developing a web presence would also enable The Foundation to be its own "commissioner", rather than having to win commissions from broadcasters

The result is "TrueTube", a video-based web site for teenagers that lets them upload their views on right and wrong, using web cams, mobile phone cameras and DV cameras. The site encourages them to think about moral and spiritual issues and gets them debating them with each other over the web. Five schools are helping us develop the content so as to fit in with skills and issues required by the national curriculum. In this way The Foundation will continue to have an educational presence as well as developing a product for the web, the platform now being seen as the future for all video distribution.

We look forward to evaluating the success of this initiative to enable us to focus our priorities in the future

Report of The Directors' for the year ended 31 December 2006 (continued)

Financial Review

The Foundation received from third parties reduced levels of contribution for television £ 593,918 (2005 £ 885,322) and radio £ 25,497 (2005 £ 27,475) programmes

Reserves policy

The Foundation aims to achieve a balanced budget in the long term and retain sufficient reserves to meet its working capital requirements. Television programme production requires the producer to "cash flow" the making of any programme, in order to assist this a cash reserve is held.

The Directors consider the level of reserves as at the year end £ 1,297,562 (2005 £ 784,540) is higher than required and this will be reduced over the next two years

Funding

A grant was received from our Parent undertaking, The Rank Foundation, of £ 1 3m (2005 £1 8m) The Rank Foundation has committed to provide an annual grant of £ 1 3m through to 2008 and £ 1 5m for 2009 to 2011

Property

The property now occupied by The Foundation is under a tenancy agreement for a term of three years (July 2005 to July 2008), with an option for a further two years. The annual rent is £ 50,560 plus an annual service charge currently set at £ 3,430 per annum. There is also a covenant to reimburse the landlord for costs associated with removing any alterations made to the property and any repairs and decoration required up-to a maximum sum of £ 22,870. The Rank Foundation stands as guaranter for the term of the agreement.

Equal opportunities

The Foundation is committed to equality of opportunity for any applicants and all staff, and will endeavour to ensure that no individuals are treated less favourably on the grounds of age, sex, sexual orientation, race, ethnic origin, nationality, mantal status, religion or disability. This principle applies to recruitment, transfers, and procedures and all terms and conditions of employment. We also take account of government policy on the employment of people registered as disabled.

The Board of The Foundation wishes to express its gratitude to the staff for their continuing dedication and hard work during the course of the year

Going concern

In the light of the continued financial support of The Rank Foundation, the Directors are satisfied that The Foundation is a going concern

Share capital

The Foundation is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of members is limited to £1 each in the event of The Foundation being wound up. There are 13 members

Statement as to disclosure of information to auditors

The Directors who were in office on the date of approval of these financial statements have confirmed, as far as they are aware, that there is no relevant audit information of which the auditors are unaware. Each of the Directors has confirmed that they have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as directors in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that it has been communicated to the auditor

Auditors

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. They comply with the "Statement of Recommended Practice. Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005".

Recognition of income and expenditure

Income is recognised on the accruals principle. Intangible income is not recognised in the consolidated statement of financial activities as the directors have no basis of valuation.

Expenditure is recognised on the accruals principle

Basis of allocation of costs

Generating funds

Until the closure of Hillside Studios and the subsequent relocation to Central London in 2005, funds were generated by the commercial exploitation of excess studio capacity

The costs of generating such funds comprised all direct costs incurred and the relevant proportion of the costs of running the studios, which were allocated on the basis of standard rates, including relevant overheads

Costs of Charitable activities

Costs of activities in furtherance of the chanty's objects includes all costs relating to the production, sale and distribution of religious programmes plus attributable overheads

Governance

Includes those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

Support costs

Support costs includes expenditure associated with the management and administration of the charity, and includes the IT support costs

Support costs have been allocated across the chantable activities, in proportion to the relevant actual costs under the same grouping

Exceptional costs relating to staffing are treated as support costs, this includes pension finance costs

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprise The Foundation for Christian Communication Limited and it's trading subsidiary, Hillside Studios Limited (the "Group") A summarised profit and loss account and balance sheet of Hillside Studios Limited is given in note 5

Advantage has been taken of the exemption available under section 230 of the Companies Act 1985 not to present an individual profit and loss account for the company

Basis of capitalisation

Amounts capitalised relate to costs of acquisition of assets expected to be used by The Foundation in the longer

Depreciation - Assets for the Charity's own use

Depreciation of fixed assets is calculated by reference to cost at rates estimated to write off the relevant assets over their expected useful lives, taking into account normal commercial and technical obsolescence

The annual rates used are

Plant and equipment

10% to 50% on cost

Motor Vehicles

25% on cost

Fixtures and fittings

Technical 10% to 50% on cost Office 10% to 20% on cost

Any assets considered impaired are written down to their value in use

Pieces of equipment that have a cost price of less than £250, are treated as additions with a depreciation rate of 100%

Archive

The Foundation owns a considerable Film and Television programme archive, which has potential for further exploration to the benefit of The Foundation Due to the unique nature of the archive, the excessive expense that would be involved in its valuation, and the uncertainty over any future revenues there from, the directors have not valued the archive for inclusion in these financial statements

Foreign currency

Cash at bank and in hand includes amounts held in foreign currencies. The amounts held are re-valued against sterling quarterly, and any surplus or loss ansing from exchange rate fluctuation is posted to the statement of financial activities.

Notes To The Financial Statements (continued) 31 December 2006

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Defined benefit pension scheme

The scheme was closed during 2002. There are no regular contributions now being required for this scheme. The amount charged to the statement of financial activities in respect of this scheme, is the estimated increased cost of providing the historical benefits accrued. The interest cost and expected return on assets are included within other finance costs in support costs.

The assets of the scheme are held separately from the group in separate trustee administered funds. Full actuarial valuations, by a professionally qualified actuary, are obtained at least every three years, and updated to reflect current conditions at the balance sheet date. The pension scheme assets are measured at fair value. The pension scheme liabilities are measured using the projected unit method and discounted at the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency. A pension liability is recognised on the balance sheet to the extent that the group has accepted the obligation to settle the estimated liability.

Defined contribution pension schemes

Employer's contributions are charged to the income and expenditure account and accrued as they become payable
