REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS/TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The Directors present their annual report with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2020. The Directors of the company are its trustees for the purpose of Charity Law, but throughout this report are referred to as directors.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) effective 1st January 2019.

CHAIR'S REPORT

I am pleased to present the annual report for 2019-20, my first full year as Chair of Trustees.

This proved to be a very challenging period in the organisation's history as we ended the year in the grips of the Covid-19 pandemic. The nature of the illness and the mitigations necessary to avoid its transmission, have proved particularly difficult for organisations that are involved in the performance of live music, such as ours. This pandemic resulted in a slowing down of activity in the last quarter of the year and by the end of March almost all our planned activity had been halted.

Despite these challenges and the impact of cancelled and rescheduled activities, Sinfonia Viva reported a financial performance in-line with its operating budget. This budget included the use of up to £31,400 of unrestricted reserves to support its charitable aims and objectives during the year. Unrestricted reserves at the end of the financial year were £86,168 a reduction of £24,835 on the previous year.

The year had started on a much more positive note and there were a number of memorable performances and a wide variety of outreach and engagement activities were delivered. We were delighted to welcome Sophie Rosa as the Orchestra's new Leader in July 2019 and our performance of Mozart's Requiem at the Royal Concert Hall with the Nottingham Harmonic Choir was attended by one of our largest ever audiences. Once again, Sinfonia Viva performed at the Darley Park summer concert in Derby and returned for the very popular New Year's Eve concert in Nottingham.

Based on the strong demand that we had been experiencing for our educational and outreach activities, we had originally planned to expand our education team in the early part of 2020. Sadly, as a result of the Covid-19 situation, this was not possible but we are committed to increasing our outreach and education activities as circumstances allow. We have already started to adapt the way that we deliver content using new technologies and different formats and this process is on-going through a Board backed strategic review.

Since the early stages of the pandemic the Board, and our Finance & General Purpose sub-committee, have been meeting on a more frequent basis. The Directors are actively engaged with our Chief Executive and management team to ensure the long-term viability of the organisation both from a financial and artistic perspective. Sinfonia Viva has an outstanding track record and the Board is fully committed to ensuring that this strong record is maintained and enhanced.

We have been fortunate that our public funders, Arts Council England and Derby City Council, have maintained their support throughout the crisis, and we have continued to benefit from the generous support of our principal sponsor, Rolls-Royce Plc. In addition, as a result of the reduction in activity levels, we have been able to access the Government's Job Retention Scheme for the majority of our administrative team. We have also benefited from many individual donations, for which we are extremely grateful.

In what has been a very challenging period, I would like to thank my fellow Trustees, our musicians, supporters and the entire management team for their personal contribution to the continued success of Sinfonia Viva.

OUR OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of the company in the year under review were as defined by its Memorandum and charity registration instrument to promote and advance education of the public by encouragement of the Arts in general and, in particular, the art of music. The Directors are satisfied that these aims are being achieved.

To achieve its objects, the company's principal activities are the maintenance and management of the Orchestra; the promotion of concerts by the Orchestra both on its own account and in conjunction with local promoters and the presentation of education and other projects.

The Board of Directors, which met four times during the year, is responsible for the company's affairs. The Chief Executive reports to the Board on behalf of the management and staff. Sub-committees of the Board consider detailed issues and the Directors who are members of these sub-committees are indicated on page 5 (by an asterisk). During the year, there were no material changes in the policies pursued by the company.

The company is a registered charitable company, limited by guarantee and not having a share capital.

Sinfonia Viva is a flexible chamber orchestra delivering original and extraordinary creative musical experiences. Founded in 1982, Sinfonia Viva has a national reputation as a leader in creative music activity in the UK. Its work offers relevant and enriching possibilities for all. Sinfonia Viva:

- Embraces new opportunities and ways of working whilst nurturing the best of existing practice, making music accessible to the widest audience.
- Connects participants, communities and professional musicians through shared creative activities and performances.
- Creates exciting and imaginative performance experiences for audiences and participants.
- Collaborates with partners to devise, develop and deliver original musical opportunities.
- Is an ambassador for music making.

This approach is underpinned by a set of core values:

- Placing the client at the heart of our thinking
- Creating an environment where artistic excellence can thrive, creative thinking is celebrated and engagement is at the core of our work
- Respecting the contribution non-professional artists make to our work, performances, creative thinking and the development of our practice
- Investing in projects that meet the organisation's ethos of equality of opportunity in terms of engagement in our creative work and performance
- Using our financial resources to help realise original, high quality and exciting projects
- Partnership working and making connections
- Ensuring the work remains a key advocate of the organisation

PUBLIC BENEFIT

As stated above the objects of the company are to promote and advance education of the public by encouragement of the Arts in general and, in particular, the art of music.

Outreach Activity between April 2019 - March 2020:

We worked with 1,893 people on creative/education/community projects involving 5,780 attendances across 266 sessions

These formal and informal learning attendances of 5,780 during the year are broken down by age as follows:

The Orchestra played to more than 25,000 people at 51 performances during the year. It employed 217 individual musicians in the year (152 orchestral musicians, 37 conductors, project leaders and soloists, 28 workshop musicians) over 53 orchestral sessions and 251 project sessions.

The Directors confirm that they have complied with their duties under Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 with regard to Public Benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE 2019/20

The Directors were pleased with another strong year of artistic delivery, despite the challenges caused by the impact of Covid-19. Financially the Company used a planned draw-down of up to £31,400 from its unrestricted reserves to support delivery of charitable objectives during the year. The wider operating environment remains extremely challenging as a result of the pandemic. Directors are pleased that underlying demand for the Orchestra's project and produced work remains high. There had been an increase in demand for the Orchestra's project management expertise frequently provided through the Charity's trading arm (Sinfonia Viva Events Ltd.), however this work stream has been severely impacted by the pandemic.

Principal Conductor Frank Zielhorst remained in post during the year and his concert programmes as well as his conducting received critical and popular acclaim.

The Orchestra's long-standing and highly regarded Leader, Benedict Holland stood down in July 2019. An open recruitment process was carried out for a new Leader including an audition with other principal players. As a result of this process, we were delighted to offer Sophie Rosa a one-year trial as Leader, an appointment widely supported by the players. Sophie has already led a number of concerts to great acclaim from audiences and colleagues alike.

A new partnership with BBC Radio Derby saw it become a supporter of Sinfonia Viva as principal media partner for the annual Darley Park Concert.

The Orchestra continued to work across the East Midlands and beyond including work with many of the Government backed music hubs around the region in either delivery or planning of work. The Education Manager and Chief Executive sit on working groups in Derby/Derbyshire, Northampton/Northamptonshire and Leicester/Leicestershire Hubs. Whilst the demand for creative produced work continues, the Orchestra also performed on the concert platform in a number of standalone concert performances. However, it should be noted that delivery became increasingly difficult in the last quarter of the year as the effects of the Covid 19 pandemic increased.

Some highlights of the Orchestra's performance and projects during the year include:

- Another sold-out concert on New Year's Eve at the Royal Concert Hall in Nottingham under the baton of Principal Guest conductor Nicholas Kok
- Continuing concerts in Derby under Principal Conductor Frank Zielhorst in a new venue, the impressive Old Central Library with its fantastic acoustic
- Highly successful concert at the Royal Concert Hall conducted by Frank Zielhorst including a performance of Mozart's Requiem with Nottingham Harmonic Choir. This concert achieved the Orchestra's highest ever audience attendance at its appearances in the Nottingham Classics series
- Directed concerts with the Leader, Sophie Rosa, in Lincoln & Ludham along with a solo performance at Royal Concert Hall in Nottingham
- Continuing to build on the chamber music concerts series at St. James Church in Louth increasing attendances at these
 during the year
- The third of the Orchestra's Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths focused projects in association with Rolls-Royce plc. This project had a specific focus on energy
- Leading the children with special educational needs and disabilities hub as part of the award winning Department for Education funded Opportunity Area project in Derby, including the public sharing of work produced
- Ongoing participation in the RPS Award winning Classically Yours programme in the East Riding of Yorkshire
- As part of the Orchestra's commitment to commissioning new work and focus on female artists, the year saw the premiere of a new piece by Dani Howard (a British composer whose other commissions have included the London Symphony Orchestra, BBC Symphony Orchestra and Royal Liverpool Symphony Orchestra)
- Committed to the PRS Foundation Keychange Manifesto addressing gender balance in the music industry and established a series of targets in terms of female leadership and artist representation in the organisation

The Orchestra's Chief Executive continued as Chairman of the Leicestershire music hub executive as well as being a Trustee for Magna Vitae Trust for Leisure and Culture. The Concert Manager sits as a Trustee on the Board of Music for Everyone and also acts as its treasurer and the Education Manger is Chair of the Tom Dale Company Board.

The year ended with the country going into lockdown, resulting in various work in the last quarter being cancelled at short notice. While some of this work was postponed to the latter part of the 2020/21 financial year, a significant amount had to be cancelled. Funding partners were very understanding and the Orchestra was able to honour its fee commitments to those artists with confirmed bookings.

The Directors were pleased to report that all artistic indicators in terms of performances, education work and commissions for the year were met or exceeded.

The principal funding sources were grants from Arts Council England, used both as core funding and to support activity, and Derby City Council. The Derby City Council grant was used to support two major creative outreach projects in the City. Sinfonia Viva is also supported by an on-going sponsorship arrangement with Rolls-Royce plc plus other grants and sponsorship donations as detailed in the notes to the accounts, plus income generated by the charity from engagements, ticket sales and education projects.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The accumulated unrestricted income fund at 31 March 2020 amounted to £86,168, this includes fixed assets of £2,480. The accumulated restricted income fund at 31 March 2020 amounted to £107,572.

INVESTMENT

The Orchestra operates a deposit account with its bankers and cash not required for day to day payments is invested in this deposit account until required to fund the charity's activities. In the 2019/20 financial year, the deposit account realised £111 in interest. The finance system is managed by an independent accountancy company which reports to the Chief Executive. The Chief Executive reports on all finance management issues to Finance and General Purpose sub-committee which in turn reports to the Board.

RESERVES POLICY.

The Directors have reviewed the reserves policy in the light of the main risks to the charity. The Directors accept that these risks are variable and are also influenced by external factors. The Directors have determined that the charity should plan to hold free reserves representing at least three months operating expenses and sufficient reserves to cover potential redundancy pay liabilities. This would allow the charity time to find new funding for its charitable activities in the event of current sources ending or, if necessary, enable the charity to cease trading in a timely and prudent manner. To this end the Directors have established that as a general policy the free reserves should fall between £25,500 and £53,500 at any one time. The Directors have considered the current operating climate and concluded £53,500 to be an appropriate level of reserves for the coming year. Unrestricted reserves at the end of March 2020 were £86,168.

USE OF RESERVES

The Directors agreed that up to £31,400 of the unrestricted reserves could be used to fund activity to support its charitable aims and objectives in 2019/20. The actual amount of unrestricted reserves used for this purpose during the year was £24,835. The Directors also undertook a strategic review of the organisation to help inform them on how best to develop activity the charity undertakes.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

The Directors are very aware of the changing environment in which the Orchestra operates. In particular, the Directors are conscious of the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic and the adverse impact this will likely have in the 2020/21 financial year and potentially beyond. The Orchestra adopted a four-year business plan at the beginning of April 2018, which was updated at the beginning of the 2019/20 financial year. The Orchestra continued to develop its work during the year and considerable effort went into adapting activity and maintaining financial resilience as the effects of Covid 19 became apparent. A new four-year business plan will be developed for the period 2022-2026 and it will incorporate the conclusions from a recently launched strategic review focused on evolving the organisation's content and delivery platforms.

GOING CONCERN

The Orchestra receives much of its core income from Arts Council England. This financial year 2019/20 was the second year of a four-year National Portfolio Organisation funding agreement. The Directors are fully aware of the wider economic uncertainty in the country caused by the pandemic and will continue to exercise effective control on all financial matters relating to the company.

The Board is confident that the Orchestra has sufficient resources for the next twelve months and on this basis the Accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

Viva Chamber Orchestra Ltd is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission. It was incorporated on 22 January 1985 and registered as a charity on 14 February 1985.

Appointment of Trustees

The Board of Trustees requires breadth and depth of experience to carry out its duties effectively and efficiently. When recruiting new trustees the important attribute is a passion for the work of the Orchestra. New Trustees are recommended for appointment by members of the current board to bring additional skills to the trustee board and additionally Derby City Council, with whom we work in partnership, make up to two appointments to the Board.

In accordance with the Articles of Association, all Trustees appointed since the last Annual General Meeting and one third of the other Trustees must retire at the Annual General Meeting. The one third retiring shall be those who have been longest in office. Therefore, David Gibbons, Carl Muldal and Cllr R. J Wood will retire at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting and are eligible for re-election.

TRUSTEE INDUCTION AND TRAINING

Trustees also act as Directors of the Charity.

All new Directors meet with the Chair and Chief Executive before being appointed at which time all aspects of the charity are discussed, the role of the trustee within the management of the organisation explained and the procedure for decision making outlined. Prospective Directors attend a Board meeting as an observer before officially being appointed. This allows them to meet prospective colleagues, discover how the operation is working against strategic plans and ask any questions based on information gathered. In addition, the new Trustee has the opportunity to meet the management team and player representatives.

RELATED PARTIES

Rolls-Royce plc continued its support of the Orchestra during the year. This was complemented by support from Warrick Matthews as a Director and Chairman of the Board's Finance and General Purpose sub-Committee. Carl Muldal, a Rolls-Royce employee, remained a Director and was part of the Fundraising sub-committee in the year. This long term relationship reflects the company's commitment to supporting the arts and the communities in which it operates. In addition it recognises the Orchestra's contribution to delivering Rolls-Royce's STEM outreach commitment and the engagement & development of its people.

PAY POLICY FOR SENIOR STAFF

The Chief Executive Officer and the two Deputy Chief Executives (programme and operations) comprise the senior management personnel. The pay structure and policy for the senior management are presented to the Finance and General Purpose sub-committee annually for approval. A number of criteria are used in setting pay:

- the role and its responsibilities;
- salary structures for comparable positions;
- trends in average pay

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Directors have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced, so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

The Directors are fully aware of the uncertain public funding position and wider economic situation. Budgets for future years have been reviewed in light of this and the management team continues to explore alternative models as a way of supporting the Orchestra's core work.

STATEMENT OF DIRECTORS'/TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Directors are responsible for preparing financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the Statement of Financial Activities of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will
 continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and henceforth taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of the Companies Act 2006 relating to Small Companies.

MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Members of the Board of Trustees, who are Directors for the purpose of the company law and Trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 6.

Members of the charitable company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2020 was 8 (2019: 9).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the period.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities; Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1st January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS102)), The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) and the Companies Act 2006. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The Charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102.

The accounts are prepared on a going concern basis. If at any time in the future, Arts Council England were to withdraw funding then the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern could be threatened.

The financial statements are presented in sterling (£).

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:-

Going Concern

The Directors are fully aware of the wider economic uncertainty in the country caused by the pandemic and will continue to exercise effective control on all financial matters relating to the company.

The Orchestra receives much of its core income from Arts Council England (ACE). This financial year 2019/20 was the second year of a four-year National Portfolio Organisation (NPO) funding agreement. Funding of £192,107 for the financial year 2020/21 has been confirmed, together with assurances from ACE that funding for the financial year 2021/22 is secure.

Since the start of the pandemic, ACE has actively engaged with key NPO partners, including Sinfonia Viva. This resulted potential additional funding being made available through the Creative Recovery Scheme. Sinfonia Viva applied for additional support from this scheme and has been awarded a grant up to £72,123 from the fund. In addition, Derby City Council has made Sinfonia Viva an ex-gratia award of £25,000 as part of its COVID-19 Discretionary Fund.

A number of the orchestra's employees have been furloughed at various times since April 2020 as part of the Government's job retention scheme. This has resulted in the company being able to access around £32,000 in additional financial support. As a result of the reduced activity caused by the pandemic, the planned recruitment of an additional member of the education team was cancelled.

The company's wholly owned subsidiary, Sinfonia Viva Events Limited (SVE), was closed down at 30th September 2020 the Orchestra purchased its equipment and assets at market value as an arms-length transaction. The remaining cash balances held by SVE have been donated to Sinfonia Viva.

As a consequence, the Directors are confident that the Orchestra has sufficient resources for the next twelve months and on this basis the Accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020 - CONTINUED

Fund Accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes after the year end date.
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

Income

Income represents income from performances and sponsorship thereof, (excluding value added tax), plus grants from public bodies and donations.

Core funding from public bodies is allocated to the year for which it is granted. Sponsorship of, and donations towards specific performances and projects are allocated to the period in which the events occur. Where donors do not specify to which performance donations and grants given to the Charity should be allocated, this income is included in income when receivable.

Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Expenditure and Irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, excluding recoverable VAT.

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income (see note 6).
- Charitable activity expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its musical and educational activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them (see note 6).
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, other costs are apportioned on an estimated basis between charitable activities and support costs.
- Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a total cost against the activity cost centre.

Expenditure relating to specific performances and projects are allocated to the period in which the events occur.

Donated Services and Facilities

Donated services or facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any condition associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of the economic benefit from use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. On receipt donated services and facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market, a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020 – CONTINUED

Tangible Fixed Assets

Capital additions of equipment are written off to the Income and Expenditure Account in the year of acquisition and there is therefore no charge for depreciation. The assets comprise of office furniture, office equipment, computers and printers. This is a departure from the requirement of FRS102, and is necessary to give a true and fair view. The normal requirement would be for capitalisation of office equipment and for depreciation to be charged thereon. This position cannot be easily quantified due to the mixture of purchased, funded, partly funded and donated equipment. Thus for clarity, this policy has been adopted to give a true and fair view. The non-capitalised fixed assets are insured for a total of £24,750.

Leasehold Improvements - 20% - straight line from 1 September 2015

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount owed to the Charity or prepaid.

Creditors .

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the Charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party, and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

Financial Instruments

The Charity has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Taxation

The charitable activities of the company are not subject to taxation.

A government initiative, 'Orchestra Tax Relief' gives rise to a claim for Corporation Tax Relief to £41,881 (2019:£46,780)

Status of Company

The company is limited by guarantee and in the event of it being wound up, every member is liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £10. There are no shares of any class either authorised or allotted.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contributions pension scheme. Contributions payable to the company's pension scheme are charged in the period in which they relate.

Judgements and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of accounts using generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and labilities at the date of the accounts and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period.

The key estimates and assumptions used in the Financial Statements are detailed in the accounting policies.

Essential Life Skills - Delivery and coordination – The balance on this project at 31 March 2019 totalled £13,062. The project delivers workshops and associate performances with young people in SEND schools. Funds of £47,953 were received in the year and all spent during 2019/20.

<u>Hadleigh Elders</u> - This project was completed in April 2019; a balance of £10,153 was carried forward. This money was given to work with elderly people with the onset of dementia.

<u>Carers Choir</u> - A balance of £25,792 was brought forward. A total amount of £12,570 was received for this project in the year from the E & Cadbury Charitable Trust, Headley Trust and other smaller donations. A total of £16,606 is carried forward at the year end.

Renewable Energy Project – An amount of £36,500 was given and spent in the year. This is a schools creative and performance project for delivery of a performance at the Derby theatre.

School of Ba- Rock – This is a creative project for work in Bridlington with Special Needs Schools a balance £13,357 is carried forward.

<u>University of Derby Theatre (Reimagine Project)</u> –Working with disadvantaged people in Derbyshire in conjunction with the Virtual School in Derby. A balance of £26,490 is carried forward.

Bergne-Coupland Charity - This is a grant not spent in the year restricted to work in Lincolnshire. A balance of £1,000 is carried forward.

<u>Destinies</u> – Balance £5,000 – funds from Derby County Council to be used for delivering workshops for children in Derbyshire. This was all spent in the year.

The directors do not believe that any material amounts will need to be repaid in respect of income included in these accounts.

14. MEMBERS LIMITED BY GUARANTEE

As noted in the Trustees Report, the company is a registered charity, limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. Each member's liability is limited to £10 and at the year end date there were 8 current members (2019: 9).

There will be a rent review in Year 5, at which point there is also a break clause.

Total commitment to break clause at 31 March 2020 was £3,750.

17. TRUSTEE INDEMNITY INSURANCE

The overall Insurance policy premiums now include cover for the Charity Trustee Indemnity insurance giving cover of up to £250,000.
