#### Introduction

This annual report covers the period from August 1998 to July 1999.

The Foundation for Conductive Education ("the Foundation") is a company limited by guarantee. The charity registration number is 295873.

# Charitable Objects

The objects for which the Foundation is established, all of which shall be exclusively charitable, are for the development and advancement of the science and skill in the United Kingdom of Conductive Education as has been developed at the Petõ Institute in Hungary, and especially the teaching thereof.

#### **Trustees**

The trustees are the directors of the company. During the year 1998/99 the Foundation has maintained indemnity insurance for trustees and officers, currently under review following advice from the Charity Commission.

# Organisation of the Charity

The Trustee board met four times over the course of the year (15.10.98, 14.1.99, 15.4.99 and 1.7.99).

During the year the Trustees' Board was supplemented by three co-optees, two users of the Foundation's services (one adult disabled person, one parent of a disabled child), plus one member of the staff. The Foundation is managed, since reorganisation in May 1999, by a Director and two Assistant Directors who report directly to the Trustees' Board. One Assistant Director is responsible for Operations (conductive services and training) and one for Corporate Services (administration, fundraising and finance).

#### YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 1999

#### Staffing and Volunteers

The bulk of the Foundation's practice depends upon professional services to national and international quality standards. The training of new professionals working with very vulnerable children and adults pre-empts the use of volunteers in the Foundation's direct client services. The Foundation is able to use volunteers in the following way:

Gifts-in-Time for professional projects (DfEE secondment and year-out undergraduate placements) and for general administrative support e.g. fundraising.

# **Partnerships**

The Foundation has strong links with Barnardo's. It has a Memorandum of Agreement with Wolverhampton University with respect to training and a Grant Agreement with the City of Birmingham.

# Policies and Key Achievement for 1998-99

## • Financial result

The total incoming resources of the Foundation increased during the year to £1,357,652 (1998:-£1,066,492) mainly due to increased donations received to fund the refurbishment of Cannon Hill House.

At the balance sheet date the value of unrestricted funds, after the prior year adjustment (see note 16), has increased to £315,980 (1998 as restated:-£284,728). The trustees consider this to be a satisfactory position, consistent with the charitable objects of the Foundation.

• To develop and expand the National Institute of Conductive Education as the national centre of excellence, to demonstrate practice and serve as a training base.

In September 1998 the second cohort of degree students (15) commenced their studies and in the same month we began in-house staff-training at the Milestone School, Gloucester (20 staff trained to date). The second-year of staff-training at Birmingham Social Services Moseley Day Centre (mentally and physically disabled adults) was subject to formal evaluation.

Thanks to generous donations, Parent and Child services have been provided free-of-charge since January 1999 helping children under the age of three years, and from June services for children with Dyspraxia were also provided free. Also in January 1999 the Foundation recruited a second Senior Conductor as a curriculum specialist, charged to develop and formalise an integrated curriculum uniting the philosophy and practice of Conductive Education with the formal requirements of the National Curriculum. At the end of 1999 that task is almost complete. During 1998/99 the Foundation provided termly consultation to Heliomare School in Holland. The above developments are in addition to the continuation of existing services.

# • To develop the conductive community

Over 1998/99 the Foundation led detailed discussion with three Conductive Education centres about possible affiliation or association. By the end of the year discussion with two of these establishments were proving most promising, one had dropped out but approaches had been made to two others. In September 1998 the Foundation hosted a national conference on the future of education for children with physical disabilities and in May 1999 sponsored an international syposium on research and enquiry into Conductive Education. Over the year the Foundation played a leading role in the Conductive Education Higher Education Group (CEHEG) for which it organised a national Swapmeet in June 1999. The Group will prepare a formal report on the future of Conductive Education in the UK in 2000.

The Foundation's website launched at the end of 1997/98 grew and developed to become the major internet resource on Conductive Education. In October 1998 an Open Discussion Forum was introduced and other interactive features now include a job market for conductors and other staff.

## To strengthen the Foundation's business base

From November 1998 to March 1999 we enjoyed the secondment of a civil servant from the Department for Education and Employment to act as the Foundation's Business Manager. In January 1999 he presented the Trustees with a new model for annual operational planning which was adopted and now forms the basis for Trustees monitoring the work of the Foundation. He also proposed a new costing model for the Foundation's services.

A new strategy for voluntary fundraising was introduced in March 1999 to diversify the Foundation's appeal and strengthen income from voluntary sources. Additional fundraising staff were recruited towards the end of 1999 as part of this strategy.

# • To develop Cannon Hill House and to secure freehold of the site

Work began on the first stage of refurbishing Cannon Hill House in August 1998, this work being completed in January 1999. In February 1999 the City of Birmingham agreed that the work done would qualify for completion of the Development Agreement on this site. As a result of this the freehold of the Cannon Hill site was transferred to the Foundation at the beginning of January 2000.

During the latter half of 1999 the Foundation commenced work to fund the remainder of the refurbishment as part of its new fundraising strategy.

#### **Future Development**

# • Organisational - distinguishing the difference between the Foundation and NICE

Towards the end of 1999 we began to investigate the distinction between the Foundation for Conductive Education (FCE) and the National Institute of Conductive Education (NICE), and the advantages for costing and pricing, appeals, awareness and the administrative development of separating the two. A formal report with recommendations will be presented by the end of 1999 - 2000.

# • Expanding the training course

The undergraduate training course will see its first graduates in June 2000. The Assistants' course will be revised and discussions will open on franchising assistants' training. Discussions with the Norwegian Board of Health may lead to a contract to train Norwegian conductors.

The Foundation took the leading role in the Conductive Education Higher Education Group (CEHEG) in 1999 and has produced the working papers from which CEHEG will develop a formal report on entry-level competencies for a UK conductor profession.

Jointly with institutions from Austria and Germany the Foundation has applied to take part in a three-year EU-funded project to establish European standards for conductor-training, due to commence in September 2000.

## • Towards a national system

Discussion which began in 1999 with other Conductive Education organisations will bear fruit in formal associations/affiliations in 2000, as a basis for a national network of organisations working towards common standards.

In 1999 written evidence to the House of Lords Select Committee on Science and Technology stressed the need for the professionalisation of conductors, with specific proposals for the measures to be taken towards creating a recognised profession. In 2000 these proposals will be filled out through discussions within the Foundation, in CEHEG, with other professional bodies and possibly with the Department of Health.

In 2000 the Foundation will continue to expand its membership base.

# • Undergoing an Ofsted inspection successfully

An Ofsted inspection has been notified. Necessary documentation and other preparation is already well in hand and will be completed early in 2000, with confident expectation of a successful result.

## Premises

Cannon Hill House will be completed for occupation in the Autumn term and detailed design will begin on the next phases of development in anticipation of finance being available to commence construction.

# • Public awareness

In 1999 the Foundation re-entered the field of publication with a new newsletter, *The Leader*, and a biography of András Pető. It also developed a unique interactive and international website for Conductive Education.

In 2000 these developments will continue with consideration of the relaunch of *The Conductor* as a refereed, open-access, international journal for Conductive Education which will be available on the Internet. There will also be further development of the Conductive website.

In 1999 the Foundation sponsored an international instructional seminar on research in Conductive Education. In 2000 the Foundation will appoint a research co-ordinator and have an international conference on research and developments in Conductive Education. Initial exploration is in hand to create an international centre for Conductive Education research.

# Expansion of marketing and fundraising activities

There will be a general expansion, qualitative and quantitative, in our marketing and fundraising activities in the year 2000 and inauguration of a rolling capital appeal.

Developing the distinction between the activities of NICE (training and conductive provision) and the FCE (all other powers under the Foundation's Mems and Arts) will enable the Foundation to make a more varied appeal for funds from a wider range of donors

## • Year 2000

During 1999 we assessed and reduced any risks of the Millennium bug as far as is reasonable. During the year 2000 we shall seek to upgrade our IT systems to meet the new requirements and opportunities of new technology.

#### Basis of preparation

The directors' report is prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies.

# Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described on page 7 the trustees are responsible for the preparation of financial statements. It is our responsibility to form an independent opinion, based on our audit, on the financial statements and to report our opinion to you.

# Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Auditing Standards. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the judgements made by the trustees in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Foundation's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Foundation as at 31 July 1999 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, in the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies of the Foundation are as follows:

## (a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. The Foundation has adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting by Charities", issued by the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales. The trustees consider the subsidiary undertaking as immaterial and so the Foundation has taken advantage of exemptions provided by section 248 of the Companies Act 1985 not to prepare group accounts. The financial statements present information about the Foundation as an individual undertaking and not about its group.

#### (b) Income

Fee income is accounted for on a receivable basis.

Donations are accounted for when received.

Grants are included in the accounts as they become receivable.

Membership fees represent monies received from members. Membership fees are taken to the income and expenditure account when received.

Other income includes conferences and fund raising.

## (c) Taxation

The Foundation is a registered charity and is therefore not liable to United Kingdom taxes on its income.

# (d) Leases

Leasing charges in respect of operating leases are recognised in the income and expenditure account over the lives of the lease agreements using the straight line method.

# (e) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged on fixed assets on a straight line basis at the following rates:

Leasehold buildings - 2% per annum
Fixtures and fittings - 20% per annum
Computer equipment - 25% per annum
Motor vehicles - 20% per annum

# 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

# (f) Leasehold property

Building work on the National Institute commenced on 28 November 1994. Income received specifically for the purpose of developing and building the premises was previously treated in a Permanent Endowment fund and was recognised as so in the Statement of Financial Activities. As described in note 16 the trustees have decided it is more appropriate to treat the income as restricted funds through the Statement of Financial Activities. Income in respect of Cannon Hill House is also treated in the same manner. Depreciation of the Institute's buildings is apportioned between and charged to unrestricted and restricted funds as appropriate. No depreciation has been charged on the Cannon Hill House work, as the building is still under construction and not yet in use.

## (g) Restricted funds

Where income is received for purposes specified by the donor or by the terms of appeal under which it was raised, that income is shown as restricted in the Statement of Financial Activities. Expenditure for the specified purposes is shown as restricted fund expenditure. Any unexpended balances at the balance sheet date are carried forward as restricted funds.

# (h) Explanation of the categories of expenditure

#### Conductive services

All direct costs which have been incurred by the charity in providing Conductive Education services and meeting its charitable objects.

# Promotion and publicity

This includes expenditure incurred in promoting the work of the charity and generally raising awareness of Conductive Education.

## Fund raising

This includes direct expenditure on fund raising applications and activies and is charged to the income and expenditure account when incurred.

# Management and administration

This includes expenditure incurred by corporate services, which manage the central and core administrative activities of the Foundation.

# 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## (i) Pension costs

The Foundation operates a defined contribution scheme and the pension charge in the income and expenditure account represents the amounts payable by the Foundation to the scheme in respect of the year.

# (j) Gifts in kind

Where the Foundation receives goods or services by way of gifts in kind the market value of the gift is accounted for in the Statement of Financial Activities as an incoming and outgoing resource.

## 2. TRUSTEES' EMOLUMENTS

The trustees did not receive any remuneration during the year (1998:- £nil).

Travel and accommodation expenses incurred by two of the trustees on behalf of the company have been reimbursed. The total expenses reimbursed were £1,271 (1998:£nil).

On 31 July 1999 the Foundation's buildings were situated on land owned by Birmingham City Council. Under the original terms of a Development Agreement, the Foundation was to be granted a lease for 125 years, with the option to purchase the freehold for £10,000, provided that it had undertaken refurbishment of a listed building on the land within two years of the start of the Agreement on 25 January 1994. In January 1997 Birmingham City Council granted two years' extension to the Agreement.

Work on the first phase of the refurbishment of the building commenced in August 1998 and this was completed in January 1999, at a cost of £410,302. At 31 July 1999 trustees estimated that a further £550,000 would be required to complete the interior fitting-out of the building.

In February 1999 the City of Birmingham agreed that work to date was sufficient to meet the conditions of the Development Agreement and the formal process to purchase the freehold of the site was commenced. The freehold of the site was transferred to the Foundation at the beginning of January 2000.

#### 16. PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT

During the year the trustees reviewed the documentation pertaining to the income for the development of the National Institute and Cannon Hill House buildings. Their conclusion was that the incoming resources did not constitute a permanent endowment fund and consequently a prior year adjustment has been made transferring £1,045,320 to restricted funds and £481,295 to unrestricted funds. At the same time, the trustees decided that it was not appropriate to charge depreciation on the Cannon Hill House building until it is in use. The depreciation charge of £735 made in 1998 has been reserved as a prior year adjustment.

The financial statements have also been restated to include the 50% holding in Petõ (UK) Limited, which had been omitted in prior years.
