STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

CONSTITUTION

T.O.F.S is a charity which was also established as a Company Limited By Guarantee and not having a Share Capital on October 20th, 1987. Its Articles of Association describes its constitution; its Memorandum of Association summarises its objects as relieving in cases of needy children and young persons suffering from trachea-oesophageal fistula, oesophageal atresia and oesophageal and related disorders including the VACTERL association.

In May 2016, T.O.F.S. held an Extraordinary General Meeting at which revised Articles of Association were adopted. This was done with the agreement of the Charity Commission and the revised Articles were lodged in the same month with both the Charity Commission and Companies House.

ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The overall direction and management of TOFS is overseen by the Trustees who form the Council of Management (C.O.M.), and who are also Directors of the Company. This Council is accountable and legally responsible for the work of the organisation and for ensuring that all aspects of the management and work comply with current legislation. The Council is supported by three administrative staff, headed by the Office Manager, and by volunteers.

We also engaged the part-time services of two mature medical students from St George's Hospital, London to support two specific initiatives described later in this report.

POLICIES AND DOCUMENTATION

Appropriate policies and procedures are in place to support the effective operation of TOFS. These include, but are not limited to: Governance, Health & Safety, Protection of Vulnerable Persons, Financial & Commercial Management, Personnel, Guidance & Training, IT & Data Protection, and Communications.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud or error.

Risks are reviewed and mitigated by:

- An organisational commitment to standards of good management and operational practice
- · Established policies which commit to compliance with all relevant legislation and good practice
- Regular review of all policies and procedures
- · Establishing adequate financial reserves

RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

TOFS welcomes eligible people who have an interest in helping the organisation achieve its objectives by becoming a Trustee. Whilst the majority of TOFS members are parents or grandparents of TOF children, TOFS welcomes potential trustees from all walks of life.

The Articles of Association state the eligibility of Trustees, which, in summary, state that those eligible must:

- be over the age of 18
- already be or become members of the organisation
- · not be undischarged bankrupts

- not previously have been removed from trusteeship of a charity by a Court or the Charity Commissioners
- not be under a disqualification order under the Company Directors' Disqualification Act 1986
- not be disqualified by the Charities Act 1993 (Section 72) from acting as a charity trustee
- undertake to fulfil their responsibilities and duties as a trustee of TOFS in good faith and in accordance with the law and within the objectives of TOFS
- not have financial interests in conflict with those of TOFS (either in person or through family or business connections) except where formally notified in a conflict of interest statement

INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF NEW TRUSTEES

To ensure Trustees are fully competent, TOFS will:

- Provide an up-to-date Trustee Induction Pack
- Support induction, in a manner tailored to the experience of the individual, by the use of a 'buddy' system whereby each new Trustee is guided by an experienced Trustee or recently retired Trustee
- Provide access to and where appropriate cover the costs of induction training
- Conduct de-briefing of retiring Trustees in order to review, and amend where necessary, the Induction of new Trustees
- Provide a job description for honorary officers

Objectives and aims

The principal objective of TOFS is to improve the lives of individuals (hereinafter referred to as "TOF individuals" or "TOFs") suffering from tracheo-oesophageal fistula, oesophageal atresia and oesophageal and related disorders including the VACTERL Association (hereinafter referred to as "oesophageal disorders"), as well as the families of such TOF individuals.

Tracheo-oesophageal fistula and oesophageal atresia (OA) are rare congenital conditions of the oesophagus (food pipe) and/or trachea (airway) that affect newborn babies. Babies with TOF/OA need to have intensive neo-natal care prior to corrective surgery, normally within days of birth. Some children have to undergo additional surgical interventions later on in their lives. It is now recognized that life-long follow up is essential.

Activities and Achievements:

Pastoral support and information exchange

Pastoral support and information exchange have traditionally been the core activities of TOFS and in 2018 we continued to supply information both to new members (240 in total joined during the year) and to existing TOF parents and carers with leaflets, brochures, which are also available in PDF format through our web-site. All members receive our newsletter, 'CHEW', which is published three times per year by our in-house editorial team.

The TOFS website was given a complete refresh and the enhanced version went 'live' in May 2018. It continues to be visited on a frequent basis predominantly from the UK but also from all over the world. Many members were instrumental in offering sound advice and guidance to new parents and the TOFS 'Facebook' group plays an increasingly supportive (and 'real-time') role in the exchange of parents' experiences with their TOF / OA babies and children. Facebook also provides a very useful forum for our growing number of Adult TOF members, whereby they can share information and experiences on issues which continue to affect them. TOFS continues to operate its own on-line "forum" as well.

In June 2018, we held a seminar, (with over 70 attendees) which focused on the adult survivors of TOF/OA. A number of specialist clinicians, including one from abroad, addressed this conference. The issues presented and discussed at this event supported our intention to increase our focus over the coming years on both the life-long medical issues (physiological and psychological) faced by a significant percentage of TOF/OA survivors and in pressing the health service for a lifelong screening programme for all survivors. We successfully engaged with the largest gathering ever of Adult TOFs (38 bookings with 31 attending on the day). Six Adult TOFs (two of whom were doctors) presented to the audience about the impact TOF/OA has had on them. We also showcased the impact of TOF/OA through 20 individual's summaries on PowerPoint slides. We are hoping that this will be a useful record to engage medics. Whilst attendee numbers were comparatively small, videos of the presentations were made available on the website, and continue to be viewed.

Key messages from this Adult seminar were presented at a successful family conference in October 2018. Over 100 attendees were addressed by specialist clinicians, TOFS Trustees and other members. A range of topics were covered including causes of OA, post-repair ops and procedures, feeding, respiratory issues and getting the best from your GP. TOFS Trustees presented on the clinical research and development activities that TOFS is currently supporting. In evaluation, 100% of attendees said the conference met their expectations, and that they would not only attend another one, but would recommend the TOFS conference to others.

The Trustees have committed to organise another conference in October 2019 (and planning from this event commenced almost immediately after this year's conference). The agenda for this conference will cover all age ranges of TOF/OA patients and their families.

We are grateful to our fundraisers and continue to offer them support with fundraising packs. Finally, volunteers continue to play a key role in the support TOFS offers new parents and carers. We would not be the organisation we are without the valuable support from our TOFS Local Contacts (TLCs) especially, and our volunteer members who assist in many other ways such as contributing to Chew, sending out birthday cards etc. We continue to benefit from the improved co-ordination of our volunteers and our support activities. TLCs are a small group of volunteer members, all parents, with experience of caring for a TOF child on a day-to-day basis. Spread across the UK, TLCs are available to listen, talk and offer support to new TOF parents, organise local informal get togethers, and take posters and leaflets into hospitals, especially where TOF surgery takes place. Some TLCs have shown further commitment by giving talks on behalf of TOFS. TLCs are themselves offered information on basic listening and counselling and are given support from both the TOFS office and a Trustee. There are currently three TOFS Overseas Contacts (TOCs) one in Jordan, one in Canada and one in New Zealand. All are active in offering support to TOF families within their own country and they share TOFS knowledge when applicable. This has been mutually beneficial, resulting in translations of some TOFS leaflets into Arabic. [It should be noted that these Overseas Contacts do not in any legal sense represent TOFS in these countries; they are - as the name implies - purely our contacts in these countries.]

The new 'TOF Book', published in November 2016, continues to sell although, understandably not quite at the level of the prior two years. Nonetheless, there is evidence that a significant proportion of the new members who joined in the year (276) purchased the book.

Following an agreement reached during 2017 for it to be translated by OA Support Groups in other countries, the 'sister organisations' in Germany and The Netherlands made considerable progress in this matter liaising with local clinicians to ensure country-specific issues were appropriately addressed.

Progress was also made in re-writing our information leaflets and overhaul the way in which associated information is presented on the web-site. This is an extensive programme of work which is being resourced in part, by two medical students who will work under the guidance of certain members of the newly established Medical Advisory Group and with a sub-group of Trustees.

Liaison with the medical profession

We continued in our commitment to disseminating information to practitioners from health, education and social care. We continue to be assisted by members in distributing posters to hospitals to display in their local neo-natal wards to increase awareness of TOFS when new parents and carers most need help.

TOFS continues in its efforts to increase its profile within the medical community. We decided during 2016 to establish a Medical Advisory Group, which is intended to provide us with a leading group of medical professionals across all relevant disciplines, who can provide advice and guidance, and support our publications with medically approved input. A number of medical professionals have agreed to be part of this group and at the Family Conference in October, we held our second meeting of this Group.

In July, we exhibited at the BAPS (British Association of Paediatric Surgeons) conference in Liverpool and participated in the first meeting of an embryonic group of representatives from a number of rare disease patient support groups set up by the newly elected President of BAPS (Mr Richard Stewart).

We continue to support two medical research projects at GOSH (Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital)/ICH. One is an ongoing tissue-engineering project using stem cells to develop an oesophagus - a project featured in the media in August 2018. The other is a study into the feeding issues for patients up to the age of 12 months. In 2017, we agreed to support a University of Bath project which will research the psychological impact of OA on both patients and their families. This project will be conducted by a psychologist who is also an OA survivor herself and in 2018 we agreed the terms of reference for this study and agreed to provide some funding towards this researcher's PhD which will be based on this research activity.

In December 2017, we also agreed to instigate our own research project entitled 'Should children born with TOF/OA have a mandated transition and adult care pathway?' This project is supervised by GOSH, and is being carried out by the two medical students we have engaged.

The involvement of TOFS in research programmes into OA reflects the almost mandatory requirement for relevant patient group support to be given to such projects. In some instances, this support is characterised purely by endorsement of its relevance and priority to OA patients and in other cases, support may also additionally require some funding contribution.

In addition TOFS is actively supporting the European Reference Network (ERN) known as ERNICA (ERN for Inherited and Congenital Anomalies) through our membership of EAT (The Federation of Esophageal Atresia and Tracheo-esophageal Fistula support groups e.V.) TOFS Trustee Graham Slater is a member of the ERNICA Advisory Board and Patient representative on the Management 'Work-package' of this programme, together with the ERNICA Co-ordinator (Prof. Rene Wijnen, head of paediatric surgery at the Sophia Children's Hospital in Rotterdam

GOSH is also heavily committed to ERNICA and this project is strengthening our collaboration with and recognition by, clinicians both nationally and internationally.

Use of Information Technology (IT)

The use of IT continues to be a powerful tool in support of our operations. Whilst our web-site remains well visited, we note the ever growing use of Facebook as a means by which members and non-members communicate on TOF matters, and we have increasingly used this form of 'social media' to augment communication with our members. TOFs Facebook membership currently stands at well over 3,000 including a substantial number of members from outside the UK and provides instant self-help support amongst its very active participants.

Altido (formerly CRM Labs) of Cheltenham remain our primary IT service provider for Email, Web-site and our Data-base, and we hereby note our gratitude for their provision of some enhancements to these services on a discounted or 'free of charge basis. [We note for reasons of transparency that Trustee Dennis Harvey is the father-in-law of the Altido Managing Director.]

Co-operation with other organisations

During 2018 we continued to play a leading role in EAT (the Federation of Esophageal Atresia - Tracheo-oesophageal fistula support groups). TOF Trustee Graham Slater was re-elected to the Board of EAT in April 2017 for a period of two years and continues to be EAT's Chairman.

EAT's key successes during 2018 were:

- (i) An ongoing and significant commitment to ERNICA [the recently approved European Reference Network of leading hospitals focused on Rare Congenital Diseases, in particular Gastro-intestinal diseases; see also the above section on 'Liaison with the medical profession']
- (ii) Increasing its involvement with EURORDIS (the European Rare Disease organisation, with which TOFS is indirectly linked by its membership both of EAT and RD UK (Rare Disease UK, the umbrella organisation across the UK for all rare disease patient support groups)
- (iii) Invited to participate in an INoEA (International Network on Esophageal Atresia) study into transition from paediatric to adult care.

Funding, Financial Management and Governance

TOFS can again report a very positive year. Total income in 2018 again significantly exceeded £100,000. The largest factor, once more, was funds raised by our members and their friends, much of this at their own initiative. In 2018, just over half of the charity's income came from members' and friends' fundraising efforts. The Trustees continue to see this as a vote of confidence in and of thanks for what TOFS does to help the TOF/OA community.

One exceptional item in 2018 was a bequest left by the late Peter Pretious, grandfather to a young TOF. During 2018, TOFS received a magnificent £17,693 and we expect a little more to arrive in 2019. Even excluding this, the underlying income in 2018 was gratifyingly above £100,000 at £108,870.

The London Marathon is the World's largest fundraising event and remains our single most significant fundraising activity. TOFS allocates its "Golden Bond" places to suitable members or their friends in return for a fundraising commitment. Marathon-related fundraising in 2018 was approximately £14,576 a little down from the excellent outcome of 2017, but great nonetheless. Our 5-year commitment for Golden Bond places in the London Marathon was renewed during 2018, so we look forward to the continuation of this income stream.

We again obtained and allocated Charity places for the Great North Run, the World's greatest half-Marathon. Fundraising from this event was approximately £5,194, somewhat below the staggering £ 9,000 plus that was raised in 2017.

Other fundraising by members and their friends, via many, many other events, which they themselves organised, totalled some £45,666, an increase of approximately 8% from 2017.

We recorded some 87 unique member-organised events to raise money for TOFS in 2018 (82 in 2017). The average raised per event was £525 (same in 2017). Only eleven events raised more than £1000: the vast majority of events raised a few hundred pounds. The Trustees are especially grateful to members who organise these events and raise so much for TOFS.

TOFS asks members to make a donation in respect of their membership, and many do so, especially upon joining. A significant number make regular monthly donations, and for this, we are very grateful. Membership donation income was very similar in 2018 to the 2017 level.

TOFS receives no public-sector support at all, and (in 2018) nothing by way of grants from fundraising bodies. However, the number of donations from companies and clubs and societies such as Rotary clubs, Freemasons' lodges and local faith groups has held up well in 2018, albeit at a level dwarfed by our members' efforts. The Trustees regularly ask members to mention TOFS in the context of their employer's or club's charitable efforts. This appears to be increasingly effective. Indeed, we have been notified that another corporate organisation will raise funds for TOFS in 2019, as a result of a TOF/OA family having nominated TOFS!

The TOFS book went on general sale in January 2017. The great majority of the sales were via Amazon, which represents a convenient sales channel for all. Unsurprisingly, sales in 2018 (£1637) were far below those of 2017 (nearly £7,000), which had represented a lot of pent-up demand. A further 1000 of the books were printed during 2018, and revenue to date considerably exceeds printing costs to date.

The Trustees decided to retain the original pricing of the book, namely £15. This price is relatively low (it is a substantial book of 250 pages) in order to make the book accessible to as many members as possible.

The Trustees had planned for a small budget deficit in 2018. However, fundraising was far greater than had been cautiously anticipated and not all of the aspired-to projects materialised, partly because TOFS has run out of management capacity to handle projects. Thus, we ended the year with a material surplus again.

Overall expenditure in 2018 was some 34% higher than in 2017. Amongst other things, we spent significantly more on the 2018 conference, a professionally-edited video recording and sound system being some major features. We also ran a seminar for Adult TOFs in mid-year, again with professional video recording, and this represented a significant net cost to the charity.

Some £20,000 in all, has now been designated to pay for sponsorship of relevant medical research over several years. In 2018, we started to spend this, with a donation to EAT, the main body through which we liaise with the World's medical experts. Moreover, two PhD research projects are underway with significant TOFS input and support, and in one case, a commitment of partial funding.

Public benefit

The Trustees have had due regard to the guidance published by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Financial Review and Reserves policy

Like other charities, TOFS requires reserves in order to operate in the short term and to satisfy legal obligations in the event of the end of funding, a major reduction of funding or a delay in further funding becoming available. In the event of having to close the charity, the reserves would enable proper notice to be given to the beneficiaries and staff and for all legally due payments to be made to staff, volunteers and the organisations with which we do business. In line with Charity Commission recommendations, the Trustees have set the minimum level of reserves at an amount sufficient to cover all normal operating expenses for a six-month period. At the end of 2018, TOFS has significantly more in reserves than this policy demands, however some of the apparent excess has been set aside for special projects, such as sponsorship of research, as already mentioned.

Investment policy and objectives:

For the whole of 2018, TOFS has held current bank accounts with Lloyds Bank Ltd and CAF Bank Ltd (a part of the Charities Aid Foundation). For accepting payments and donations it also has accounts with PayPal, Amazon Smile, Facebook, Just Giving, Virgin Money Giving and My Donate.

A new "investment" policy was adopted in February 2018. This enables (but does not commit) TOFS to invest up to approximately half of its apparently-excess reserves in risky assets – in pursuit of a meaningful return – via charity-specific diversified pooled investment funds with reputable financial institutions. However (in view of the uncertain/troubling investment horizon in early / mid 2018), the Finance Sub-Committee of TOFS decided to hold all reserves as cash in FSCS-protected savings accounts during 2018 at least. The TOFS savings accounts are with Cambridge and Counties Bank, Mansfield Building Society, COIF Charities Investment Fund and Virgin Money.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements and assessment of going concern

TOFS is a charity in England and Wales. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 1 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are stated on page 3 of these financial statements.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £. The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Income

Voluntary income is received by way of donation and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible Fixed Assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rate to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Office equipment

33% on cost

From January 2012, the Trustees decided to write off the cost of office equipment in full in the year of purchase

Current asset investments

The charity holds cash on deposit for investment purposes, in order to obtain a better rate of return, thereby increasing their income enabling them to meet their objects.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Debtors and Creditors

Debtors and Creditors receivable and payable within one year are recorded at transaction price.

Cash at Bank

The charity holds sufficient funds in order to meet its short-term cash commitments as they fall due.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

During the year, TOFS engaged and remunerated Hayley Slater, a medical student, to work on information leaflets and research into transition/adult care pathways. Hayley is the daughter of Graham Slater, one of the Trustees.

During the year, some of the expenses reimbursed to Trustees were donated back to the Charity, which totalled £705 (2017 - £956).
