NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2000

1. Accounting policies

a. Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. The accounts follow the recommendations in Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting by Charities (SORP).

b. Turnover

Grants and donations are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are received.

c. Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor, and expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund.

d. Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds represent income received or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

e. Depreciation

Depreciation is charged at the following annual rates to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives.

25% on reducing balance basis

f. Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

World Voices is a project, started on 1 October 1999, which aims to enable local pupils and teachers to meet and learn from people from Africa, Asia and Latin America.

Building on Local Expertise is a project, started on 1 January 2000, which aims to develop our resources centre, volunteer involvement and regional activities.

Children's Our World Festivals are annual events where local pupils and teachers can celebrate and learn about our multicultural world.
