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STRATEGIC REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 26 SEPTEMBER 2020

The directors present their strategic report for the period ending 26 September 2020.

Principal activities

The Company's principal activity is that of provender milling and straights trading, and trading in nutritional feedstuffs.

Business review and results

The directors are pleased with the Company's performance for the period ended 26 September 2020.

Turnover for the period ended 26 September 2020 was £31,988,000 (2019: £33,044,000), with a gross profit of £4,590,000 (2019: £4,968,000). The profit on ordinary activities before taxation was £675,000 (2019: £1,039,000) and the profit after taxation for the financial period amounted to £517,000 (2019: £800,000). Turnover has decreased which is predominantly a reflection of the one mill being being closed for the expansion project. The Company's costs have also decreased during the period but this is considered to be appropriate for the decrease in trade during the period.

Net assets at the period end amounted to £3,759,000 (2019: £3,742,000).

Unsurprisingly COVID-19 dominated the year for the Company and its customers. Duffields was identified as part of the food chain on day one of the pandemic which meant all Duffields' employees were classified as key workers and were helping to feed the nation. This classification meant that despite the issues all business activities could remain fully operational and very quickly management implemented a range of measures to ensure the safety of all our staff and customers.

The Directors are so proud of all our staff and customers on how we dealt with the early days of being open in the first lockdown and how we continue to deal with the pandemic's problems today.

The feed industry remains highly competitive in all sectors with threats coming from the uncertainty of COVID-19, weather, Brexit and economic situations to name a few. Against all that background, volumes remain strong at all sites lead by excellent customer service which the Company prides itself on.

During the summer we completed the major expansion of one of our mills at a cost of £2m, with some of this cost being offset by a grant from the RPA. The expansion will future proof the mill and gain some much needed extra capacity to ensure we can meet customer demand for now and the future.

In the past few years, the Company has focused on its delivery blueprint from all its mills. This focus keeps costs under control and ensures the best possible customer service. To help do this, trackers were installed in all lorries to manage routing and planning with the sales force. With a strong financial base our investment in the fleet has never been higher, with the total fleet number continuing to increase during the year.

With the extreme volatility in the raw material markets there is a huge amount of time being spent on raw material management which is very challenging. We are confident the 2020-21 year is forecast for profit at similar levels to 2019-20.

The Directors continue to be very proud of our dedicated, professional and talented employees, and would like to thank them all for their continued hard work and commitment. Their skill and experience help to ensure that Duffields remains one of the leading suppliers of agricultural products and advice to the agricultural industry.

Key performance indicators

The Directors consider that the key financial performance indicators are those that communicate the financial performance and strength of the Company as a whole, these being turnover, gross profit margin, and balance sheet net assets.

These are discussed within the business review above. The Directors are satisfied that the performance under these is very much in line with expectations.

Principal risks and uncertainties

It is the aim of the Board to minimise the exposure to risk in all areas of the business but as is common with most businesses in our industry we are subject to various risks. The Board consider the most important of these risks to be price, credit and health and safety. In addition to these we are also facing a period of great uncertainty with the effects of Brexit and COVID-19 impacting upon the wider economy and the operations of the business.

We do not feel the true effects of Brexit have fully materialised yet but the uncertainty surrounding the changes is affecting customer confidence. The risk posed by COVID-19 has continually changed since it started. We have dealt with the risk it has on our customers, the risk to the health of our staff and also the day to day risk to our operations. Despite this we remain confident that our approach to what we control has mitigated these effects and reduced the impact upon our business.

Health and Safety

It is the Group's policy to ensure, so far as is reasonably practical, the health and safety and welfare of all its employees, customers and other visitors to its premises and to comply with relevant health and safety legislation. The Group has a comprehensive health and safety policy, which is reviewed and updated regularly. Risk assessments are undertaken to assess hazards and whom they affect. A formal structure of audit and management reporting exists with a monitoring process, which is regularly reviewed.

Financial Risk Management Objectives and Policies

In common with other businesses, the Company aims to minimise financial risk. The measures used by the Directors to manage this risk include the preparation of profit forecasts, regular monitoring of actual performance against these forecasts and ensuring that adequate financing facilities are in place to meet the requirements of the business. Trade debtors are closely monitored to keep the risk of bad debts to a minimum level. Levels of stock are also regularly scrutinised to reduce the risk of slow moving stocks being held.

Price Risk

The Directors consider the principal risk of the business to be centred on commodity prices which have been subject to significant volatility in recent years. This volatility can affect all areas of the business but the Directors believe its continued focus and ability to respond quickly to this volatility protects us from significant short term risk.

Credit Risk

All customers are credit checked before any trade takes place. In addition to these checks, credit limits are also put in place. Significant time is also invested by a number of key employees in the business. All of these controls are considered to minimise our exposure to significant bad debts.

Future Developments

The Company's focus is on providing our customers with excellent service levels supported by continued, significant investment in the business. Whilst continued organic growth and consolidation is the priority, the Board also monitor acquisition opportunities to grow the business.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 26 SEPTEMBER 2020

1. General information

Duffields (South West) Limited is a private limited company incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office address is Babylon View, Pen Mill Trading Estate, Yeovil, Somerset, BA21 5HR,

The Company's principal activity is that of provender milling and straights trading, and trading in nutritional feedstuffs.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the Company's accounting policies (see Note 3).

The financial statements are presented in Sterling (£) and are rounded to the nearest £1,000.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

2.2 Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The Company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirements of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of Section 11 Financial Instruments paragraphs 11.42, 11.44 to 11.45, 11.47, 11.48(a)(iii), 11.48(a)(iv), 11.48(b) and 11.48(c);
- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26 to 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of Duffields Mills Limited as at 26 September 2020 and these financial statements may be obtained from Companies House.

2.3 Group financial statements

The Company is itself a wholly owned subsidiary company and is exempt from the requirement to prepare group accounts by virtue of section 400 of the Companies Act 2006. These financial statements therefore present information about the Company as an individual undertaking and not about its group.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.4 Going concern

The Group of which this Company is a member has considerable financial resources and continues to trade profitably in the current financial period. As a consequence, the directors believe that the Company is well placed to manage its business risks successfully despite the current uncertain economic outlook. Accordingly the directors believe it remains appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

2.5 Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, rebates, value added tax and other sales taxes. The following criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

• Revenue from the provender milling and straight trading is recognised at the point of despatch of the finished goods to the customer.

2.6 Operating leases: the Company as lessee

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight line basis over the lease term.

2.7 Government grants

Grants are accounted under the accruals model as permitted by FRS 102. Grants relating to expenditure on tangible fixed assets are credited to profit or loss at the same rate as the depreciation on the assets to which the grant relates. The deferred element of grants is included in creditors as deferred income.

Grants of a revenue nature are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in the same period as the related expenditure.

2.8 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The Company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the Company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in profit or loss when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Statement of Financial Position. The assets of the plan are held separately from the Company in independently administered funds.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.9 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in profit or loss except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the Statement of Financial Position date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.10 Intangible assets

Goodwill

Goodwill represents the difference between amounts paid on the cost of a business combination and the acquirer's interest in the fair value of its identifiable assets and liabilities of the acquiree at the date of acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. Goodwill is amortised on a straight line basis to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over its useful economic life.

Other intangible assets

Intangible assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, intangible assets are measured at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

At each reporting date the company assesses whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined which is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. An impairment loss is recognised where the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.

All intangible assets are considered to have a finite useful life. If a reliable estimate of the useful life cannot be made, the useful life shall not exceed ten years.

The estimated useful lives range as follows:

Customer relationships - 10 years Goodwill - 10 years

2.11 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Plant, machinery and transport - 3 to 25 years (including office equipment)

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in profit or loss.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.12 Valuation of investments

Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost less accumulated impairment.

2.13 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is based on the cost of purchase on a first in, first out basis. Work in progress and finished goods include labour and attributable overheads.

At each reporting date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stock is impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell. The impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

2.14 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

2.15 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

2.16 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.17 Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are made where an event has taken place that gives the Company a legal or constructive obligation that probably requires settlement by a transfer of economic benefit, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are charged as an expense to profit or loss in the year that the Company becomes aware of the obligation, and are measured at the best estimate at the Statement of Financial Position date of the expenditure required to settle the obligation, taking into account relevant risks and uncertainties.

When payments are eventually made, they are charged to the provision carried in the Statement of Financial Position.

2.18 Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in ordinary shares.

2.18 Financial instruments (continued)

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of Financial Position when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

2.19 Dividends

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Final equity dividends are recognised when approved by the shareholders at a general meeting.

3. Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the Company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised, if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The estimates and assumptions which have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities are outlined below:

Amortisation & Depreciation

The annual depreciation & amortisation charge for tangible & intangible fixed assets is sensitive to changes in the estimated useful economic lives and residual values of the assets. The useful economic lives and residual values are reassessed annually. They are amended when necessary to reflect current estimates, based on technological advancement, future investments, economic utilisation and the physical condition of the assets. See Note 2.10 and 2.11 for the rates applied.
