STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Board has recently reviewed its Trustee Recruitment Policy and is currently organising Meet and Greet events to enable prospective Trustees to meet representatives of the Board, Management team and clients. The Board has also recently undertaken a skills audit to highlight any gaps in the wide range of knowledge and expertise available to the Charity through its Trustees. The Board intends to align the outcome from the skills audit with the recruitment of additional Trustees to ensure the appropriate and relevant cross section of knowledge and expertise that are required particularly as the Charity grows and diversifies the range of services on offer. Training is offered to all Trustees as appropriate

Organisational structure

Board responsibilities include policy and development proposals

The Trustees hold a minimum of bi-monthly Board Meetings so that they can monitor and guide the Charity's affairs, and carry out continuous management reviews. In addition, a Finance Committee, a Governance Committee, and a Client Participation Committee as sub groups of the main Board meet on a regular basis. The senior management team meet bi-weekly to closely managing the day to day activities.

At the AGM in November 2010 Martin Hodgkinson stepped aside from his position as Chair Trustees and thanks are expressed to Mr Hodgkinson for his dedication and valuable contribution over the past few years. The Trustees formally welcomed Neil McDowall as the new chair. Mr McDowall had served as a Trustee for LEAP for many years and brought a wealth of knowledge to the organisation. Unfortunately, Mr McDowall was unable to continue in this role and thanks are also passed to Mr McDowall for his commitment and involvement. As of 4 May 2011 the Charity has appointed Margaret Serna as the new Chair of the Trustees.

Heidi Walton continues in the role of General Manager of the Charity. She works with the Board supporting the development of the strategic framework and is the responsible officer in respect of the implementation of strategy and the operational management of LEAP. She also implements decisions of the Board and advises on development proposals. Heidi also develops operational policies and procedures and following Board approval is responsible for implementation, reporting and review.

The Project Manager, Val Moore, is responsible for the daily management of the team of Support Workers, accommodation and clients. The role of the Support Worker is to provide clients with individualised packages of support

The views of Clients are critical to the continuous development of the Charity and a range of mechanisms including the Tenant forum, customer satisfaction surveys and house meetings are used to provide valued feedback

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives of the charity, principal activities and organisation of work

Lincolnshire Employment Accommodation Project Limited (operationally known as LEAP) is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The administrative information of the Charitable Company is set out on page 1 of the accounts.

The Charity's objects and its principal activities continue to be that of promoting the social inclusion of any young person at risk by assisting in the provision of housing and support services

Mission statement

To provide housing and support services for vulnerable young people

Objectives

We aim to

- Provide affordable accommodation
- Offer quality support services focusing on developing and encouraging independent living skills
- Provide access to education, training and employment opportunities
- Maintain suitable accommodation at the highest level possible
- Acquire additional supported accommodation provision and, thus, expand the work of the Charity
- Encourage independence in young people by promoting high quality sustained opportunities into education, training and employment
- Harness, through partnership, the skills and resources of private, statutory and voluntary organisations
- Secure finances to fulfil these objectives

Public benefit

Through our actions we will aim to

- Reduce street homelessness amongst vulnerable young people
- Reducing institutionalisation for our most vulnerable young people
- Improve community cohesion and reduce barriers between young people and local residents thus promoting social inclusion
- Offering excellent training opportunities to all employees improving the local skills base
- Reduce anti-social behaviour within local the local community
- Deliver a quality service whilst evidencing good value for money
- Improve the local housing stock through physical improvement and better management
- Reduce costs to the local authority where the authority would otherwise have a housing duty
- Reduce crime and improve community safety

In deciding which activities the Chanty will pursue, the Trustees have regard to the guidance on Public Benefit issued by the Chanty Commission

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Current Services

1 Lincoln Supported Houses

LEAP has 6 multiple occupancy houses dispersed throughout the City of Lincoln - 5 owned and 1 leased Rental income for the bedspaces is negotiated year on year through Housing Benefits Lincolnshire County Council funds the 'support' element through a 3 year contract. This contract commenced in April 2010 and is likely to be subject to a tender process towards the end of March 2013. The contract requires LEAP to deliver a minimum of 96% occupancy annually and to maintain properties to a high standard.

2 Floating Support

LEAP provides support in the development of independent living skills to several young people living in the community who hold their own tenancy. The 'support' element is funded through a three year contract with Lincolnshire County Council. This contract commenced in April 2010 and as part of the consequent negotiations it was agreed that the number of service users under the contract should be increased over the life of the contract. However the number of hours delivered under the contract is required to remain constant. This contact is also likely to be subject to a tender process towards the end of March 2013. The contract requires LEAP to achieve 100% utilisation and 98% sustained independence for the service offered to clients.

3 Emergency Flat

LEAP has leased a self-contained unit from the City of Lincoln Council since 2006. This unit provides emergency accommodation subject to agreed criteria. The 'support' element forms a part of our Supported Housing contract as identified above.

4 Barlow House

Barlow House offers 5 self-contained units and a satellite office. Rental income for the bedspaces is negotiated year on year through Housing Benefits. Until July 2010, Barlow House was used to deliver a direct access, assessment service funded for a period of 2 years. The service and contract was then transferred to Homer House as it was recognised that the service would benefit from 24/7 staffing. Following this transfer, Barlow house has been used as 'move-on' accommodation for those demonstrating readiness for independence as part of our Floating Support contract.

5 Homer House

The facility is funded through part Loan and part Grant via Futurebuilders England. The new building opened in early July 2010 and offers a combination of office space, recreational space and accommodation housed in one half of the newly refurbished building. Through successful negotiations, a 15 year lease has been agreed with the NHS for the remainder of the building. This arrangement offers a number of advantages in respect of the provision of seamless and complementary services as well as providing an additional source of financial security as generated by the aforementioned lease.

The funding for bedspaces at Homer House comes from a number of sources, including spot purchase by the County Council's Children's Services department and the NHS as well as through a formal contract with Lincolnshire County Council to deliver a direct access, assessment service to 3 young people. This contract was due to expire in March 2011 but has been extended until the end July 2011.

6 Review of Performance

Extensive performance and monitoring information is collected on a weekly, monthly, quarterly and annual basis with clear targets set for both the organisation and individuals. These are monitored by Trustees at the bi-monthly meetings and demonstrate continued exemplary performance. LEAP is also closely, monitored by its core funder, Supporting People and in both 2009 and 2010 gained an 'A' Grade in all 5 core objectives for the support service it delivers

7 Raise Additional Funds

As per last year, LEAP secured additional grant and loan funding from Futurebuilders England to purchase a new property to expand the activities of the Charity. The building, known as Homer House, was completed and handed over on the 2 July 2010. Homer House provides 18 new units of accommodation and also houses LEAP's offices and extensive training and recreational facilities.

In March 2010, LEAP also successfully secured grant funding from the Social Enterprise Investment Fund (SEIF). This funding has extended the works that have been carried out at Homer House allowing LEAP to purchase equipment to produce renewable energy in the form of photovoltaic cells and solar thermal panels. The funding also allowed LEAP to landscape the client garden facility and supply IT equipment to meet the needs of the Charity,

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Current Services

LEAP also secured a small grant from Lloyds TSB to develop the client training programme over 2 years. The programme, known as Leap in 2 Learning, is based on the development of pre-basic skills LEAP has worked closely with a local training provider, LAGAT, to deliver the course which commenced in April 2010. The first post delivery review concluded that the programme had been very effective and highly successful. As programme moves forward we continue to develop and strive to improve delivery through consultation and regular evaluations.

In April 2011 LEAP received exciting news of success in a bid to the Big Lottery Fund. The funds will pay for the staff required to deliver services to 6 chaotic young people at any one time who have no recourse to alternative funding to support a service in Homer House. Drawdown of the funds is forecast to commence in September 2011.

8 Staff Structure

Since the move into Homer House, LEAP has become a 24/7 service. We have employed night security workers as well as adjusting our shift pattern to include night sleep-in Support Workers. As a result our team has grown substantially during this financial year.

9 Targets for 2011/2012

Following the significant developments of 2010 the Board of Trustees has agreed that the priority for the coming year is to consolidate and strengthen the current position. The successful bid to the Big Lottery Fund will support the recruitment of additional staff, and the consequent restructuring of shift patterns as we merge two teams of staff following the initial set up period at Homer House that required us to 'ring fence' the development so as to minimise any potential adverse effects on the existing successful services. Although this was paramount at that time, it has now been reviewed and agreed that there is a need to merge the teams as part of the consolidation programme.

10 Policy/Procedure Review

Operational Policies and Procedures are continuing to operate successfully and are regularly updated and reviewed in line with new legislation and the organisation's needs. Nat West Bank Mentor Services also assist us with our Employment Law and Health & Safety Policies and Procedures, and this process is on-going and improving performance.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Reserves Policy continues to be to build up reserves equivalent to 40% of the current year's operating costs. The reserves are to be held to facilitate continuation of the Charity should a major source of income unexpectedly cease. As a result of LEAP's investment into Homer House, the level of reserves has been significantly depleted but the Charities intention will be to increase reserves to an acceptable level over the forthcoming years in accordance with the Reserves Policy.

Investment policy and risk review

The Investment Policy remains a low risk policy

A detailed and extensive review of LEAP's Risk Register was carned out in November 2009. Existing and additional controls and monitoring requirements have been identified, with specific targets to address the five medium risk items identified. These are -

- Potential for loss of key staff has been reduced by improved targets, employment, remuneration and training packages and conditions for all employees
- Dependency on limited income streams is being addressed by meeting requirements of Supporting People and Housing Benefits to guarantee continuation, and an annual validation assessment to demonstrate improvements. New 3 year contracts with Supporting People commenced in April 2010 for LEAP's Supporting Housing and Floating Support Services. Also, we are looking at alternative income streams we can tap into i.e. Children's Services, health funding and Individual Budgets.
- The shortage of skilled staff, a problem in the local market is being addressed by several measures, including a robust in-house training programme and development of skills, employment of trainees to develop into required roles, and the continuance of our Investors in People Accreditation. Links have been established with Lincoln University for students looking for career advancement. In particular, we are now an approved organisation for Social Work students to undertake work placements as part of their degree course.
- Maintaining our position in the market place through membership of relevant local multi-agency strategic groups in Lincoln and Lincolnshire, whilst maintaining our existing quality standards and controls
- Adverse publicity from clients, stakeholders, neighbours, funders, etc. To reduce the impact of adverse publicity, LEAP holds regular meetings with clients, stakeholders, neighbours and funders maintaining excellent relationships all round Regular consultation also reduces potential risk

Good progress is being achieved in reducing all these risks

The Trustees consider the results for the year to 31st March 2011 to be excellent given the continued development of the Chanty. All targets have either been met or exceeded

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the chanty is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Freehold buildings - 2% straight line
Furniture and fittings - 50% straight line
Office equipment - 33 33% straight line

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the peniod to which they relate
