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CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

This has been an exciting year for Kingwood. Plans are well underway for our new College for young people with autism which is due to open in the autumn, we have published research into sensory influences and autism in partnership with The Royal College of Art and we have been in the British Virgin Islands as consultants to their government on setting up an autism service.

People we support have again played a vital part in our research programme, including contributing to our conference on Aspergers Syndrome, following which we have published The Kingwood Guide to Principles and Practice. In recent years we have been asked to support more people diagnosed as having Aspergers and we quickly recognised that although Aspergers is on the autism spectrum a different kind of support was needed. We looked in vain for advice and in the absence of a guide to Best Practice decided to research and write one ourselves.

Parents and families of the people we support have also been involved in our research. At a recent Parents meeting we joined our Royal College researchers in a most enjoyable and productive workshop on gardens and gardening and how they could contribute to health and well-being

Our "Sow and Grow" gardening programme is now in its third year, with seventeen of the people we support taking part, enjoying growing a variety of fruit and vegetables and learning new skills. Our activities programme is now wide-ranging and includes arts and crafts and music as well as gardening. It has recently been filmed for us by The Big Lottery Fund who were pleased to see how well the funds they gave us had been spent.

Fundraising has been a major exercise this year as we needed to secure £892,000 in order to go ahead with the building of Kingwood College. We are grateful for all the donations we have received from charitable organisations and individuals listed below as well as those who sponsored Peter Greengross in the London Marathon or our buy a brick campaign. The College is answering the need to help school-leavers with autism make the transition to adult life. They will have training in the everyday skills they will need to live as independently as possible and also vocational training to enable them to do paid work if only for a few hours a week. The College will be in an annexe of White Barn, the property we own in Reading There will be study bedrooms for five students who will be joined by two or three day students.

The high quality of the service we provide has again been recognised by inspectors from The Care Quality Commission, by our commissioners and by the families of the people we support. For this our thanks go to Sue Osborn, our chief executive and Kate Allen, director of services and to the hard working staff team they lead.

In spite of the current economic climate we remain financially stable. The Trustees made the brave decision to go ahead with Kingwood College and funders responded. I am confident we are fulfilling our mission to pioneer best practice and help the people we support to realise their potential.

The Board of Trustees present their report and financial statements for the year to 31 March 2012

Charitable status and structure

Charitable status was granted to The Kingwood Trust on 3 November 1994

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee. Its governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association

The Board of Trustees sets the strategy of the Trust and monitors all aspects of the Trust's activities Responsibility for implementing the strategy and for all day-to-day operational issues is delegated to a Chief Executive who, in turn, is supported by a team of suitably qualified managers and employees

Sub committees of the Board of Trustees meet ten times a year and make recommendations to the full Board which meets four times a year. The Board maintains regular contact with the Chief Executive

Kingwood's objectives

Kingwood's charitable objectives, as set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association, are to promote the welfare and relief of people with learning, or physical disabilities or psychiatric illness through the provision of care, accommodation, training, occupation and leisure

Kingwood mission

The Kingwood mission is

"To pioneer best practice which acknowledges and promotes the potential of people with autistic spectrum disorder. To disseminate this practice and influence the national agenda."

Kingwood's aims

Kingwood specialises in providing supported living services for people with autism. We aim to enable people with autism to work towards achieving the goals and outcomes they desire in life and to fulfil their potential. Our services are person centred and the people we support live in their own homes in the community. They choose where they live and whether they live on their own or with others of their choice.

We aim to research and pioneer best practice in the support of people with autism and to influence policy on their behalf. We work in partnership with other organisations in the field to ensure proper recognition of the needs of adults with autism and in particular of young people making the transition from children to adult services.

Objectives

The Trustees reviewed the organisation's strategic objectives at an extended Board meeting on 12th April 2011 The Trustees agreed that the strategic objectives for the three year period to 2014 would continue be organised into five objectives

- 1 Quality to strive to deliver excellent quality for the people we support, their families and commissioners
- 2 Expertise to improve the expertise and commitment of our staff
- 3 Policy to contribute to policy development by generating and disseminating evidence about best practice
- 4 Collaboration to enhance the quality of our services and contribute to the well-being of all young people and adults with autism by collaboration with others in the field
- 5 Efficiency to run an efficient and high performing business

Activities and achievements

The Trustees also agreed a Business Plan for 2011-2012 at the meeting on 6th July 2011, describing the actions that needed to be undertaken in the first year to ensure the organisation's strategic objectives would be achieved by the end of the strategic period. Achievement against the key objectives is recorded below.

Raising quality and strengthening autism expertise

Work has continued on developing the 'Kingwood Approach' based on the Active Support methodology, to supporting people with autism, in collaboration with Bangor University with an extension of the roll out of the previous pilot to all people being supported in one of our services. The evaluation of this pilot has shown an increase in community involvement and interaction due to the use of this intervention, in all bar one of the people being supported. The pilot will now be extended to all people Kingwood supports over a three year period, for whom the approach is appropriate. There has been a modification to the contract with Ridgeway NHS Trust for psychological services with the appointment of a senior and basic grade psychologist for one and two days a week respectively. The senior psychologist has been leading on strengthening autism training within the organisation. An Autism Level Two training course was developed with 80% of eligible staff attending during the financial year. Plans are underway to develop a Level Three course for more senior staff. The Support Manager training programme has also focussed on strengthening autism expertise with courses on risk assessment, healthy action planning, the Mental Capacity Act and implementing the Kingwood Approach.

A third lecture series was organised presented by leading international and national experts in the field of autism. The series focussed this year on practical interventions, such as the reduction of challenging behaviour. A total of 200 people attended the 6 lectures.

Actions to further improve the quality of support offered continued with a strengthening of involvement in the organisation by the people we support and through the quality review processes. Kingwood's Forum for the people we support, chaired by the Vice-Chairman of the Board, met on 3 occasions. The fourth meeting that was planned was cancelled as the people who we support who were due to attend were too busy to come. The feedback from these meetings continues to influence how the organisation operates. Discussions were held this year, for example, on the organisation's Code of Conduct.

A further improvement in the quality review reports received by the organisation's Commissioners and two positive reports by the Care Quality Commission, who found the organisation compliant on all standards inspected, is evidence of the positive impact these initiatives are having within the organisation

Policy development and collaboration

The Trust established a Research and Development Programme in 2009 as the vehicle to meet Kingwood's aims to research and pioneer best practice in support of people with autism and to influence policy on their behalf. An extensive programme of developments and action research was undertaken during the year. The second report of the collaboration on housing design for people with autism between Kingwood and the Helen Hamlyn Centre at the Royal College of Art was completed, along with a range of further publications and products such as a 'Ready, Steady Make' booklet to assist staff and families supporting people with autism, and a sensory profiling tool-kit

Although in recent years Kingwood has taken on more contracts for people with Asperger syndrome, we have found little advice of practical use to assist us in our work. In the absence of such practical guidance we decided to research what is known about best practice and write a guide ourselves. Kingwood therefore called together in September 2011, an Expert Reference Group of people with Asperger syndrome of different ages, gender and ethnicity together with leading national and international experts in the field with research and practical experience, providers of services and parents. This work has been pulled together into a guide which will be circulated widely and put onto our web site. It will also assist us in improving the quality of service we provide to the people we support who have a diagnosis of Asperger syndrome.

Kingwood was asked to provide advice to the British Virgin Islands Government on how best to establish a service for people with autism within their country. Agreement was reached with the BVI Government on a

set of proposals, which subsequently received funding from the Maria Holder Memorial Trust. This allowed plans to be drawn up for a service to be established from the beginning of the 2012/13 financial year.

Through the use of charity monies Kingwood has been able to continue with its extensive programme of activities for the people we support

Kingwood College

Planning permission was finally received from the Reading Planning authorities to permit the establishment of a Transition Unit for young people aged 18-25 with autism. A fundraising campaign was commenced to raise £892,000. By the end of the financial year donations amounting to £109,767 had already been received. A bank loan was agreed on 18 April 2012 the amount of which is to be determined depending on the scale of future donations. Donations received by the end of June 2012 amounted to over £320,000.

Efficiency and financial stability

The organisation was able to deliver its core services with a small surplus during the 2011/12 financial year, as detailed elsewhere in the report. The organisation's financial stability is for the most part due to a further reduction in agency staffing usage and the rate paid to the staff agencies following a renegotiation of rates in the previous financial year. Agency usage fell to 9% with vacancy rates below 12%

The organisation retained its Investors in People status

Fundraising

As was the case in the previous financial year, no assumptions were made about the level of charitable income the organisation expected to receive. Vigorous fundraising activity continued in addition to that undertaken to fund the building of Kingwood College, which has resulted in a total voluntary income of £213,987 which permitted the organisation to fund valuable project based activities beyond our core funding provided by our Commissioners, such as the extended activities for the people Kingwood, and projects such as horticulture, creative activity and music

Factors influencing the achievement of our objectives

The key challenges for the year continued to be the need to ensure the percentage of permanent staff available to support the services further increased, there was a further strengthening of autism expertise in the organisation, and that the organisation should maintain financial balance and stability. This was achieved, and permitted the organisation to improve consistency and the quality of service despite the increasingly difficult financial situation faced by the Commissioners of Kingwood's services. All our key objectives were achieved because of the hard work and commitment of the staff right across the organisation.

Future plans and key objectives

The Trustees reviewed the organisation's strategic objectives at a Board meeting on 18th April 2012. The Board reconfirmed the 5 key strategic objectives and as detailed on page 2 as the basis of the organisation's direction in the coming three years. The Business Plan for the 2012/13 financial year has been constructed to ensure that timely progress can be made towards achievement of the broader objectives by the end of the strategic period.

Reserves policy

The Trustees believe that, to ensure continuity of care for people we support, it would be prudent and adequate to hold readily available reserves equivalent to a minimum of one year's contribution to core costs of two major contracts. At the April 2012 board meeting the Trustees agreed that the reserve could be £200,000 comprising cash balances and finance facilities. The Trustees have designated a development fund for the funding of projects including a transition programme, improving housing design for people with autism, strengthening autism expertise and redesigning the website

After providing a further £138,252 for the development fund, remaining general free reserves at 31 March 2012 stood at £439,146 (2011 - £561,112)

Investment policy

It is the policy of the Board to hold any available funds in the form of cash and cash equivalents

Risk review

The Trustees have conducted their own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks

Procedures for appointing Trustees

Kingwood's memorandum and articles of association allow for one third of Trustees (or the number nearest to one third) to retire from office at each annual general meeting. Retiring members are eligible for reelection. Powers also exist to appoint any additional person either to fill a casual vacancy or as an addition to existing numbers. Such people are then eligible for re-election at the next annual general meeting. When recruiting new Board members, Trustees aim to undertake an open recruitment process based on a clear role specification. It may also approach individuals who may be able to make a particular contribution and invite them to be considered. The Trust applies its equal opportunities policy to the appointment of Trustees. The Chairman has prepared a comprehensive induction programme and Trustee manual.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

12 incoming resources

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities. Gifts in kind are taken into account on a prudent assessment of their fair value.

All other income (including income received under deeds of covenant) is recognised on a receivable basis. All income is related to the continuing activities of the charity

Deferred income comprises domiciliary, residential care and welfare income which relates to future accounting periods

13 Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Expenses are allocated to activities in the Statement of Financial Activities where the expenses relate directly to those activities. Support costs constitute the costs of supporting the other activities of the company and include the staff costs of the central administrative staff. These support costs have been reallocated to the direct charitable activities in the same proportion as the direct staff costs attributable to those activities.

Governance costs are the costs incurred in maintaining the company as a separate legal entity. This includes the cost of servicing trustees' meetings

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

Freehold land is not depreciated

Freehold buildings 50 years straight line
Freehold improvements 10 years straight line
Leasehold improvements 5 years straight line
Equipment and motor vehicles 3 years straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment periodically if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying values may not be recoverable

15 Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the payment

18 Accumulated funds

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives if the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside for specific purposes at the discretion of the Trustees
