REPORT of DIRECTORS for YEAR ENDED 31 March 2012.

The Directors, who also act as Trustees for the charitable activities of the company, present their report with the financial statements of the company for the period ended March 31 2012

Legal and Administrative Information.

The legal and administrative information set out on Page 3 forms part of this report. The governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and the company is constituted as a Company limited by Guarantee It is also a Registered Charity.

Principal Activity.

The principal activity of the company is to continue to preserve for the benefit of the communities of Teddington and the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames, the Grade II* listed former church building of St Alban the Martyr at Teddington Lock and its curtilage and to continue the development of the building as an arts and community centre

Who We Are.

The Landmark Arts Centre is housed in a magnificent Grade II* listed building. It operates to preserve the building and uses it to foster the development and celebration of the arts within the borough of Richmond upon Thames and

increasingly beyond Through a varied programme of events and activities within the building, it specifically aims to

- Enrich the quality of cultural life for all residents and visitors,
- Encourage wide participation in the performing, visual and literary arts,
- Educate, inspire and encourage creative activity for all sections of the community

Visitor footfall for 2011-12 was approximately 37,000, slightly lower than the previous year, but still a creditable performance in difficult economic times. However we are especially encouraged that there has been an increase in visitors who attend the Landmark's own classes and events. At the end of the year on which we are reporting we had 154 individual members and 9 business members.

Highlights of the Year.

The new Visual Arts Studio, the product of a highly creative conversion of loft space within our building, was finished and went into use

The Studio has been an undoubted success and very popular with class leaders and members who comment on its pleasant atmosphere and its excellent light. Some of the classes taking place in this purpose built and well equipped studio include Botanical Art, Painting with Acrylics, Illustration, Felt making, Exploring Drawing, Life Drawing, Photography, Creative Sketchbook and Print making. We also have been able to double the number of art classes for children

1. Legacies and Grants.

During the year we received an important legacy of £72,609, the largest we have ever received

The legacy was left to us by the late Jean Brown who was formerly our President Jean, who died at the end of 2010, was deeply influential in the preservation of our building and its onward future development. Her campaign to save the former St Alban's Church from destruction is legendary and spanned a quarter of a century of her life culminating in a successful public campaign and the creation of the Landmark Arts Centre. Everyone involved over the years with our enterprise has cause to be hugely grateful to Jean Brown. In life she spared no effort to support this project and by leaving us such a generous legacy she has enabled us to complete our Visual Arts Studio, which in itself will be a lasting memorial to her commitment both to our building and to everything that goes on inside it

Part of Jean Brown's legacy topped up funding that we had already obtained for the new Visual Arts Studio, but a balance of legacy still remained. A special sub committee of the board of Trustees was assembled to debate and develop ideas for use and we shall report further on this in the 2012-13 Directors' Report

We were also very grateful to receive a grant of £3,000 from The Gosling Foundation which will be used to support the community elements of the third Landmark Festival of Song due to take place in Autumn 2012

2. Our First Quinquennial Review

One of the Trustees' main roles is to oversee the preservation and protection of our Grade II* listed building and this process remains high on our agenda. The decision had been taken to commission a formal Quinquennial Review. The inspection was carried out using a standard format normally applied to the inspection of Church of England churches in use in accordance with the Care of Churches and Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction Measure 199. That review was carried out for us in April 2011 by Peter Dalling Associates of Hatfield, Hertfordshire

The full report indicates that the reviewers were intrigued and impressed by our building's history. The building emerged from this Quinquennial Review reasonably successfully. The writers reported "the building is well over a century old and, bearing in mind its passage through one of what must have been the most polluted periods in Teddington's history, it has survived reasonably well. With one or two exceptions, it is in good heart"

Although there are always issues which will need monitoring, the only urgent project concerned parts of the building's stained glass where remedial work may be required

<u>Finance</u>

The main financial event of the year was the receipt of the Jean Brown legacy. It was decided to use this as a Designated Fund for projects which maintained the building and its development as an Arts and Community Centre. In 2011 -2, it was used to complete the Visual Arts Studio and the remaining £41750 of the legacy will be used to follow through the major items from the Quinquennial Review and projects which

enhance the visitor experience for our events and arts education. We will report further on this in the 2012-3 Directors' Report. The 2011-2 year saw an increases in General Funds of £17309. A full risk analysis was conducted in the year and appropriate steps taken to handle them. The Reserve level for 2011-2 was adjusted to £90k following this risk analysis and the Quinquennial Review outcome.

Public benefit.

"The aims of each and every charity, whatever their size, must be for public benefit Public benefit is therefore central to the work of all charities." Charities Commission

The Trustees of the Landmark Arts Centre keep the issue of providing appropriate public benefit at the forefront of our minds. No project or new strand of activity is undertaken without assessing how it will support our charitable objectives and who will benefit

We now offer a full year round programme of events and activities The diversity of our users continues to grow and whilst many live within the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames, we have seen a continued increase in users coming from outside the borough, particularly Kingston. As a non-subsidised organisation we have to charge for many of our activities, but we have striven to keep charges affordable and offer concessions where possible. In addition a number of our events are free of charge, for example the Landmark Show and most of the other visual arts exhibitions in that take place in our gallery. As a community arts venue, we have continued to ensure that our programming includes local groups such as the Twickenham Choral Society and the Richmond Art Society, providing them with a low cost platform for their events.

We have also maintained our commitment to promoting the individual through our policy of only allowing artists and makers to exhibit at our art fairs, unlike many similar events which allow galleries and other commercial organisations. Our biennial Landmark Festival of Song, provides opportunities for young school choirs to perform in front of other schools, families and the local community. Participating in these showcases, which remain to the best of our knowledge the only ones of their kind in the area, remains free of charge.

We have continued to develop the range of our arts education programme and in August 2011 held our first Art Course Show to showcase work produced by people attending our visual arts classes. In November 2011, our two choirs, the Landmark Sound and the Landmark Singers also joined forces to perform for free within the local community and we hope to be able to build upon this in 2012.

Landmark People

At the end of the 2011-12 financial year, after six years service, Barbara Shorter Beckwith stepped down as Chair of Trustees, although she agreed to continue to serve on the Board Tony Nieper took over as Chair from April 2012 and acknowledges, on behalf of his fellow Trustees, the important contribution Mrs Beckwith had made during her time as Chair

We acknowledge our highly valued employees in each year's Directors' Report Lesley Bossine, our indefatigable Arts Centre Manager, is responsible for all our activities, staff and volunteers—She is assisted by our only full time member of staff, Sylvie Talbot, who looks after administrative matters as well as developing our arts education programme—Tim Cannings, our Operations and Technical Manager and our longest serving employee, spares no effort in bringing his experience to mount a wide variety of activities in a building which, though magnificent, was designed for another purpose and presents many challenges

We also pay tribute to our splendid team of volunteers who carry out a broad range of tasks including serving in our bar and cafe at events, meeting and greeting audiences, assisting with administration and event planning and grounds maintenance. We are extremely grateful to them all and could not run the Landmark Arts Centre without their support

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statements of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows.

Incoming resources

Commercial trading activities

Income from commercial trading activities is included in the period in which the group is entitled to receipt

Donations

Donations are regarded as income on a received basis

Interest receivable

Interest is included on a received basis

Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Affairs on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows

Building fixtures 10% Fixtures and equipment 25%

Funds Accounting

Funds held by the charity are either-

Unrestricted general funds- these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside by the Trustees for a specific purpose

Restricted funds - these are funds donated for a specific purpose

2 LEGAL STATUS OF THE CHARITY

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £10.
