Structure, governance and management

Status

Appointment of Trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association the Board of Trustees may appoint a person who is willing to act to be a trustee either to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee providing that he or she is recommended by the Board of Trustees and the agreement of the Holding Charity has been given. A trustee so appointed will hold office only until the following Annual General Meeting.

Trustee Induction and Training

New trustees are encouraged to spend time with the chair of Board, who will guide them through the induction process which includes time with the senior management team.

Organisation

The Board of Trustees administers the Charity. The trustees have delegated the day to day management of the operations of the Charity to the leaders of the Small Missional Communities (Households) and the Chairs of their Local Support Groups.

Governance and Internal Control

During the year, management and trustees kept under review the financial and other risks of the Small Missional Communities (Households) and the Charity. All risks are managed as part of the on-going operation of the Charity.

In July 2013 The Council of Lee Abbey Movement agreed, on the recommendation of the Household Communities Board, that in future Households should be known as Small Missional Communities (SMCs) and the Household Board as the Small Missional Communities Board.

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects are the advancement of the Christian faith worldwide through the ministry of communities of Christians whose shared lives in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit communicate the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ and for the relief of the needs of those living or working in the local area served by local Christian churches.

These objects are currently fulfilled through Small Missional Communities in Aston (Birmingham) and Knowle West (Bristol). These SMCs are places for prayer and healing and, through a variety of ministries offered by Community Members, provide valuable support to local churches and their communities.

The participation and prayer support of the Lee Abbey Friends continues to be a powerful tool for meeting these objectives.

Achievements and performance

Personnel

The Knowle West community is led by Ed Palairet with his wife Aggy and two children. Aggy is training for ordination at Trinity College Bristol. Tim and Jill Jones are also part of the community, and there have been many visitors for shorter or longer periods. In Aston there are three members - James Hicks, Paul Lacey and Lesley Lacey- and Will Simonette and Jo Joseph Hunter have joined them at different times during the year. Both Communities are supported by Local Support Groups chaired by Ron Pool (Knowle West) and Jill Waters (Aston). Susan Edmondson is the Chair of the Board. We are grateful to all Board and Local Support Group members who give so generously of their time and energies. The Rev Andy Wooding Jones is the Advocate for Lee Abbey Small Missional communities, and he has spent several days each month on a freelance basis on this role. It has involved working with the existing communities on their ethos and mission and meeting many other groups and organisation who are involved in small missional communities, for example, St Anselm in London, Eden, and dioceses which are launching communities. He also fields enquiries from other people who are interested in forming communities, and his research during the year has helped us to clarify further our vision and values.

Review of activities

At both Aston and Knowle West, the basis of an SMC is to "BE" a Christian presence, and thus to serve both the community and the local churches. The Knowle West SMC has been involved in a wide range of activities, including supporting the local church, where the incumbent and her husband are now both involved in the LSG and in missional activities in partnership with the Community. Activities have included The Noise in Bristol, church activity days and support for local schools and community centre. All of this has been underpinned by prayer. Members of the community work with local charities and organisations to enhance the life skills of people in the area. At Aston, the smaller number in the community had somewhat restricted activity this year, but each member is closely involved in the life of the local church and community. The new member Lesley works in a care home. The Board has continued its ministry partnership with the Acton Vale Missional Community led by Rev Mark Bishop, though Mark has now moved on in his diocesan role, and the community links with Lee Abbey will cease.

Public Benefit

In setting our objectives and reviewing the activities of the two household communities we have had regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and its supplementary guidance on the advancement of religion.

Both Knowle West and the Aston communities are ministering in areas in Birmingham and Bristol where there are significant needs. In all their activities the communities have been seeking to communicate the love of God in Jesus Christ through their ministry and have done much valuable work in relieving the needs of those living and/or working in the areas served by the local churches in a wide variety of ways, some of which have been referred to in this report. Most of their work is in benefiting those at the lower end of the income scale; and no one is debarred by their financial circumstances from benefiting from the ministry of the SMCs.

Having carefully reviewed the activities carried out by the Knowle West and Aston Communities in furtherance of this charity's object, we have concluded that those activities are of clear and significant public benefit.

Financial review

Financial review

The year to 30 April 2018 generated a surplus of £72,638 (2017 deficit £11,241).

Principal Funding Sources

Our principal funding sources continue to be donations £112,368 (2017 £31,662) and contributions from the Communities £20,683 (2017 £16,013). We are very grateful to all those who support us in the demanding work that living in an SMC entails, and in particular the Friends of the Lee Abbey Movement.

Reserves

We seek to maintain liquid unrestricted funds at the level of at least three months expenditure to provide funds to cover unexpected costs. In addition we seek to build up funds against future building maintenance needs. At the year-end there was 12 months (2017 12 months) of expenditure in cash and free reserves. The trustees have approved the designation of the fixed asset and it is now shown as a separate reserve.

Investment Powers, Policy and Performance

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association the charity has power to make any investment which the trustees see fit. The trustees make and hold investments using the general funds of the Communities.

Plans for future periods

The trustees will continue to seek new opportunities to establish SMCs either directly or in partnership with other suitable bodies.

Qualifying indemnity provision

The trustees (who are also the directors of Lee Abbey Household Communities for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and the income and expenditure of of the company for that period.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 30 April 2018

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Lee Abbey, Lynton, Devon, EX35 6JJ.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and investments measured at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the FRS102 SORP, and the requirements of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the FRS102 SORP

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specific purpose and which the charity may use for its purpose at its discretion.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Tangible assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land and buildings

- 2.5% reducing balance

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

4. Limited by guarantee

Lee Abbey Household Communities is a company limited by guarantee and accordingly does not have a share capital.

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of its being wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member.
