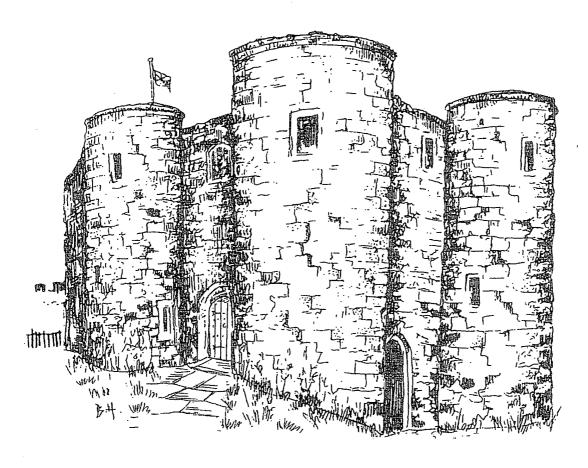

### **Objects and Policies:**

The company was formed in succession to the unincorporated association of the same name. Its objectives are the provision of museum facilities in the Rye area, and the advancement of education and the exhibition of objects and collections with a Rye connection.

### Activities and finance:

The Association owns two museum sites at the Ypres Tower and 3 East Street, Rye.

The Directors are satisfied that the company can meet its financial obligations.

#### Summary of Activities during the Year:

Rye Museum Association continues to fulfil its commitments according to the Objectives and Policies of the Association.

Once again the Rye Castle/Ypres Tower opens throughout the year (with the assistance of volunteer stewards during the lunch break) and visitor numbers reached 22,681 an increase of 10% on the previous financial year.

Visits by school children were 7% up on last year last year at 530.

Visitors to East Street, opened by volunteers during summer weekends, decreased to 7115 which was 16% down on the previous year. East Street continues to operate a policy of free entry with donations welcome.

Once again, the Directors would like to place on record their thanks to the team at the Rye Heritage Centre who greatly assisted the Museum by directing many visitors to the Tower. In addition, the Directors acknowledge the committed and skilled services of our guides, Mike Berry, Ted Emson and Toby Mayor.

A new display of specialist-made replica 15th Century armour was installed in the Tower. East Street has a new display of pottery made in Rye and items related to hop growing. As part of the Rye Arts Festival, we put on an Exhibition called Pottery Made in Rye. Updating of the Collection catalogue has continued under Linden Thomas' direction.

The planning application submitted to Rother District Council for a proposed new museum development in the courtyard at Rye Castle has still not been resolved. Further discussions have been held and reports produced as required. The Directors are unable to say whether the project will proceed. Plans for extending the office at East Street are under active consideration.

The Museum continued with its programme of annual maintenance at the Rye Castle/Ypres Tower (a Scheduled Monument) to the plan prepared by our architects. At East Street the outside of the building has been repainted, ivy has been cleared from the roof the Museum and the kitchen floor was renewed.

Once again, the Directors wish to extend their warmest thanks to the many volunteers amongst their members without whom the Museum could not function.

#### Permanent Collection:

The artefacts, documents and other exhibits are held by the company on loan from the Rye Museum Trust.

The Trustees of the collection on 5th April 2018 were: Sheila Maddock, Jo Kirkham, Geoffrey Mead, Frank Palmer, Brion Purdey, Cathy Walling and Jillian Eldridge.

Some additions to the collection have taken place for which we are most grateful, including a bequest and a donation of pottery made in Rye. Via the museum transfer scheme, two ship models and a set of coopers' tools have been accessioned.

#### Directors' Responsibilities:

Company law requires the Directors to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the company's affairs and of the surplus or deficit for that year. In preparing these accounts the Directors are required to:

Make suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act of 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Under Charity Law, the Directors of Rye Museum Association are considered to have the status and responsibilities of Trustees.

Risk analysis: the major risks to which the charity is exposed have been identified by the Directors, have been reviewed and systems are in place to mitigate those risks.

The Treasurer wishes to record her thanks to Ann and Nigel Antrobus who, once again, have worked so hard on these accounts.

# Independent Examiner's Report on the Unaudited Financial Statements to the Directors and Trustees of the Rye Museum Association Charity No: 1057421 Company No: 3226143

I report on the financial statements for the year ended 5<sup>th</sup> April 2018 as set out on pages 5 to 10

#### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act), and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- Examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act,
- follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act, and

#### Basis of independent examiner's statement

#### 1 Basis of preparation

#### 1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historic cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entitity as defined by FRS 102.

1.2 The company is not registered for VAT. All items in the accounts include attributable VAT.

The above illustrates the effect of the depreciation charge on assets purchased with the Heritage Lottery Fund grant. That charge is included within expenses shown in note 13 and is charged against the Lottery Fund.

During 1997, the freehold of the Ypres Tower was purchased at a cost of £1 plus legal expenses of £500. The Ypres Tower freehold is subject to pre-emption rights granted to Rother District Council and Rye Town Council granting them a right of purchase in the event of a sale.

#### 12 Contingent Liability

Under the terms of Heritage Lottery Funding, RMA must maintain the Ypres Tower for the purposes set out in the grant application for a period of 10 years from 2008. Should the terms of the grant be breached, RMA would be required to repay the greater amount of the grant or the net proceeds of sale.

#### 13 Limited by guarantee

Rye Museum Association is a registered charity. It is a private company limited by guarantee, and does not have a share capital. The liability of each member is limited to £1.
