TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the group and the company for the 1 April 2017 to 31 March 2018. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES

Our overall aim was to recognise and support carers in Bath and North East Somerset. We worked to promote their rights and to enable them to make positive choices to improve the quality of their lives.

A carer is someone who, without payment, provides help and support to a partner, child, relative, friend or neighbour, who could not manage without their help. This could be due to age, physical or mental illness, addiction or disability.

Taking on a caring role can mean facing a life of poverty, isolation, frustration, ill health and depression. Many give up an income, future employment prospects and pension rights to become a carer. Many also work outside the home and are trying to juggle jobs with their caring responsibilities. The majority of carers struggle on alone and do not know there is help available to them. Carers say that access to information, financial support and breaks are vital in helping them manage the impact of caring on their lives.

Our charitable purposes were as set out in the Memorandum of Association. Our organisation provided benefit to the public with the services that we offer.

b. STRATEGIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES

During this year, we completed our 2014-17 strategy. We have launched a bold new strategy for 2018-24 which we will use to measure our progress for the next six years. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when setting our strategy and our future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The Carers' Centre aimed to provide services to anyone who needed them. The four aims of The Carers' Centre from our 2014-17 strategy were development; support; involvement; and sustainable organisation and have been demonstrated in our performance over the past year and through our diversified funding.

1. Development

- To create new and innovative ways of identifying and working with carers such as outreach roadshows.
- b) Improve practice of professionals in working with carers through training.

2. Support

- c) To continue to develop appropriate services that support carers' physical and mental well-being such as breaks.
- d) Be recognised as the leading coordinator of support services for carers locally.
- e) Enable carers to have choice and control over the services they need.
- f) Ensuring young carers are protected from inappropriate or harmful caring roles.

3. Involvement

- g) Empower carers to have a voice in the planning and delivery of services in B&NES and the Carers' Centre
- h) Promote and support carers to be recognised as expert care partners.
- i) Lead an on-going, proactive campaign for carers rights locally and nationally

4. Sustainable Organisation

- j) Diversify our funding base to ensure sustainable growth.
- k) Continue to act as a model employer within the charity sector and recruit and support a thriving volunteer team.
- I) To ensure quality standards, policies and procedures are appropriate to meet local and national standards such as PQASSO.
- m) Meet our promises and measure our achievements.

c. SERVICE DELIVERY AND PERFORMANCE

The main objectives and activities for the year were achieved through four main contracts and additional grants that enabled us to achieve over and above our aims:

- The Carers Support Service commissioned by Bath & North East Somerset Council & North East Somerset Clinical Commissioning Group and subcontracted to us by Virgin Care. Additional funds were gratefully received from Big Lottery Reaching Communities Fund, Triangle Trust 1949 Fund, Comic Relief, Big Lottery Awards 4 All, Carers Trust, The Norrie Trust, Golden Bottle Trust, The Alchemy Foundation, The Souter Charitable Trust, The Elmgrant Trust, Westfield Town Council.
- The Young Carers Service is commissioned by Bath & North East Somerset Council Children's Services and additional funds were gratefully received from Friends of Young Carers, Lloyds Banking Foundation, St James's Foundation, Children in Need, D'oyly Carte Charitable Trust, Hedley Foundation, Carers Trust, Pentland Stalls Charitable Trust, and Sylvia Waddilove Foundation.
- The Dementia Challenge Service commissioned by Bath & North East Somerset Clinical Commissioning Group subcontracted by Virgin Care to run the Home from Hospital support for carers and the people with dementia they are caring for.
- The Parent Carer Facilitator Project commissioned by Bath & North East Somerset Council Children's Services and Parent Carers Voices.

d. THE SERVICES AND ACTIVITIES PROVIDED WITHIN THESE WERE:

The Carers Support Service offered services to provide support and improve the health and wellbeing to 4,700 carers registered with the Charity, improved access to support for harder to reach carers and facilitated partnership working around the needs of Carers. 1017 accessed one to one and facilitated group support. 498 adult carers have taken a break during the year on 204 break activities. 7 peer support groups gave ways for carers to gain support from each other. 30,000 copies of Caretime magazines were distributed, in addition the magazine was available as an e-version and by email to professionals who requested a copy. Funding from Comic Relief enabled participation work with carers to be extended to have greater influence on local services, a new evaluation process was launched to gain ongoing feedback about services.

The Dementia Challenge Service identified and supported carers in the local acute hospital.

The Young Carers Service offered services to provide support and improve the health and wellbeing to 540 young carers registered at the Centre. Young carers have taken a break during the year on 63 break activities with a total of 2012 attendances. In addition, 23 young carers have taken part in their arts award and attended the young carers youth club which takes place every other week. Young Adult Carers were supported through a specific project which improved their health and wellbeing.

A Parent Carer Facilitator supported parent carers to continue running the Bath Parent Carers' Voice which has been developed to ensure parent carers are involved in decisions made by Children's Services which affect their disabled children.

The Carers' Wellbeing Centre

The Carers' Centre is working on a roof appeal to ensure there is funding so the roof can be replaced to maintain the premises. A refurbishment programme was completed this year of the inside of the premises and the garden to improve accessibility and usability to increase the appeal of renting the premises for local organisations and businesses.

Bath Carers' Enterprises

A three year grant from the Triangle Trust 1949 has provided start-up funding to develop an assessment tool to be sold as a software service. This will provide the dual function of improving the efficiency of Carers' Assessments and support planning for carers and to generate income long-term.

b. FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES/INCOME GENERATION

Our services were mainly provided through contracts with Virgin Care & Bath & North East Somerset Council amounting to £507,124. We also received £367,284 from the other funding sources.

Our total income from all sources was £874,408.

Our total expenditure on all projects amounted to £883,976.

c. BANKING AND INVESTMENTS

Our funds are automatically moved between a CAF Bank Current & Gold account to ensure there is always a minimum of £3,000 in the current account and to maximise the interest earned by the funding we receive. Reserves are kept in a mix of high interest accounts with a maximum of 100 day access, allowing easier access to our reserves with minimal loss of interest, charibonds and investments. Trustees review investments to ensure they maximise the income possible in challenging financial times.

Bank interest rates remained low throughout the year and are expected to stay at a low level in 2017/18.

Financial review

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. RESERVES POLICY

As at the balance sheet date the free reserves held by the charity (the unrestricted, undesignated funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets) were in surplus to the amount of £29,090 (2017; £55,361).

Every year the Trustees examine the requirement for an appropriate level of reserves and review the designated funds, their purpose and amounts in each. This is done in the context of the main risks the organisation is exposed to, the cuts facing social care and health and the commissioning intentions which affect any plans for future growth. The current level of free reserves (the unrestricted, undesignated funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets) is equivalent to less than three months of core operational costs, and has reduced in the last year. This is contrary to the trustees key performance indicator to increase reserves to at least 3 months of core operational costs. The trustees have committed to developing a clear plan over the coming 5 years to ensure that reserves do increase to a more appropriate level, alongside improved monitoring to ensure that this is achieved.

c. PRINCIPAL FUNDING

The Carers' Centre thanks our funders:

We have had a new contract this year with Bath & North East Somerset Council and Bath & North East Somerset Clinical Commissioning Group supporting our work through a sub contract with Virgin Care for adult carers, and through Bath & North East Somerset Council for parent carers and young carers. We have received support from St John's Foundation through a social investment loan to purchase the Bath Carers' Wellbeing Centre.

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION -

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 10th December 1996 and registered as a charity on 10th January 1997 as the successor organisation to Wansdyke Volunteer Bureau. The company is established under a Memorandum of Association which sets out the objects and powers of the charitable company and governed under the Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10. The total number of guarantors as of the 31st March 2018 was 27.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the Company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. New Trustees can be co-opted subject to reappointment at the next AGM. One third of Trustees retire on rotation at each AGM according to how long they have been in office but can be re-elected if vacancies still exist. The Management Committee seeks to ensure that the needs of carers are represented and reflected in the Trustee body. There are four people with personal caring experience on the Management Committee.

c. POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

Prospective Trustees are sent information about the responsibilities of charity Trustees and a profile of the Carers' Centre. They attend an informal discussion with the Chair and Chief Executive and are invited to attend Management Committee meetings as observers. If there is agreement for them to continue they are co-opted until the next AGM at which the Members vote for their reappointment. Trustees are provided with an induction pack and made familiar with the guidelines provided by the Charity Commission. In addition, staff members provide verbal and written reports about services and developments and Trustees are invited to attend any of the activities provided by the Carers' Centre. There is joint working with staff on the Finance Sub Committee, Personnel, Policies and Procedures Sub Committee and the Service Provision Sub Committee. The Carers' Centre continually seeks to improve the induction process and provide better access to ongoing training and development so that Trustees are enabled and empowered to carry out their role. The Trustees had training on Social Enterprise, How to Influence Decision Makers, Insights and Impact.

d. PAY POLICY FOR SENIOR STAFF

The Trustees have set pay levels across the organisation based on roles. The CEO grade is level 1 and the Senior Manager grade is level 2. The Senior Management Team must have a Level 5 Qualification or above or relevant experience or willingness to gain. The Trustees review all pay annually and for Senior Managers annually taking into account the size and income of the charity and comparing with similar jobs locally. For further information, contact the Carers' Centre.

e. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

At the date of this report there are nine Trustees from a variety of backgrounds. Five full Board Meetings were held last year including the AGM. Each Sub-Committee met quarterly and the Board had an away day to plan writing the new impact strategy and to plan a recruitment evening as part of the succession planning for the Board.

Day to day responsibility for service provision rested with the Carers' Centre Chief Officer, the Senior Operational Manager and Senior Development Manager. The Chief Executive had overall responsibility for ensuring high quality services were delivered, performance targets were met, supervision and training of staff and volunteers and the management of the premises. There were eighteen part-time staff, eight full-time staff and one hundred and four registered volunteers. Volunteers continue to provide practical help through befriending, counselling, transport, telephone support, breaks, and administrative support. Pro bono support was provided to provide advice on maintenance and development of Woodlands, financial mentoring, Insights training and workshop.

f. RELATED PARTY RELATIONSHIPS

In so far as it is complementary to the charity's objects, the charity was guided by both local and national policy. The National Strategy for Carers 2008 provided a framework for developing support services for carers across the country. Government legislation including the Care Act 2014, the Children and Families Act 2014 and the (Equal Opportunities) Act of 2004 provided the legal framework and guidance on Carers Rights which the Carers' Centre seeks to implement with local statutory and voluntary sector partners. The Carers' Centre has been supporting the writing, launch and implementation of the local Young Carers Strategy 2016-19 with voluntary and statutory partners. The Carers' Centre has been active in pressing for a new Adult Carers' Strategy as there is currently no strategy in place.

g. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Management Committee implements a continual process of organisational risk assessment. The risk register is reviewed monthly by the Senior Management team and presented quarterly to the Board, where new risks are identified actions are put in place where possible to mitigate the risks. The 2014-2017 Strategic Plan has been written with input from carers, staff, Trustees and volunteers. Through the Plan known risks have been addressed. These include the need to ensure projects are well funded, planned, managed and monitored to continue to develop our good reputation and that our future funding is secured. Financial procedures are monitored by the Finance Sub Committee and internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. This is assured by an annual internal audit. Procedures are also in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, clients and visitors to the Centres or in relation to the Carers' Centre activities.

Plans for future periods

a. FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Carers' Centre is planning to continue developing our premises now we have purchased it to improve the accessibility and space for carers and maximise the income generating potential. The Trustees had an away day to learn about impact and to begin planning how the writing of a new strategy. Due to contract certainty for the next 7 years with a 7 year sub-contract from Virgin care the trustees decided to be bold and plan for a strategy to align with the length of the contract, 2017-2024.

MEMBERS' LIABILITY

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees as at 31st March 2018 was 27. The Trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

The Trustees (who are also directors of Bath and North East Somerset Carers' Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF BATH & NORTH EAST SOMERSET CARERS' CENTRE (the 'company')

I report to the charity Trustees on my examination of the accounts of the company for the year ended 31 March 2018.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Bath & North East Somerset Carers' Centre meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Company status

Bath & North East Somerset Carers' Centre is a incorporated charity in England and Wales limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the company. The address of the registered office is given on page 1 of these financial statements and the nature of its operations and principal activities are given on page 4.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the company has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the company of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the company which is the amount the company would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Fundraising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the company and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Costs of generating funds are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the company's operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company apportioned to charitable activities.

1.6 Intangible fixed assets and amortisation

Intangible assets costing £NIL or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets are initially recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost net of amortisation and any provision for impairment.

Amortisation is provided on intangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Assessment software

3 years straight line

Website expenditure

3 years straight line

1.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account.

Tangible fixed assets are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Freehold property

50 years straight line

Motor vehicles Office equipment 4 years straight line

Woodland garden equipment

25% reducing balance 25% reducing balance

1.8 Investments

Fixed asset investments are a form of financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction cost and subsequently measured at fair value at the Balance sheet date, unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and shown in the heading 'Gains/(losses) on investments' in the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account.

1.9 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.10 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.11 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.12 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.13 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.14 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.15 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

PURPOSE OF DESIGNATED AND RESTRICTED FUNDS

DESIGNATED FUNDS

Woodlands garden equipment

During the 2016 financial year the charity received funding from Awards For All and the People's Postcode Trust and some of this money was spent on a cabin and equipment for the garden at the charity's premises in Bath, known as the Woodlands property. As the ongoing use of these assets has not been restricted by the funder the trustees have carried forward the net book value of these assets at the balance sheet date as a designated fund.

The expenditure from this fund reflects the annual depreciation of these assets. The fund will continue to diminish each year, by way of depreciation, over the useful life of the assets.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

Bath & North East Somerset Council Sports & Active Lifestyles - To fund cycle racks and lockers and a bike maintenance course to encourage sustainable transport.

Big Lottery Celebrate - Funding for 8 carer parties in the community.
