#### 1 Introduction

- 1.1 I, Mark Reynolds, of Valentine & Co, Galley House, Moon Lane, Barnet EN5 5YL, was appointed as Liquidator of F & M Garden Machinery Limited (the Company) on 2 July 2021. The affairs of the Company are now fully wound-up and this is my final account of the liquidation, which covers the period since my last progress report to 27 June 2023 (the Period) and should be read in conjunction with any previous progress reports that have been issued.
- 1.2 The principal trading address of the Company was Park View Nursery, Crews Hill, Enfield, EN2 9BQ.
- 1.3 The registered office of the Company was changed to c/o Valentine & Co, Galley House,, Moon Lane, London, EN5 5YL and its registered number is 03299635.

#### 2 Receipts and Payments

2.1 At Appendix A, I have provided an account of my Receipts and Payments for the Period, and cumulatively from the date of my appointment, with a comparison to the directors' statement of affairs values, together with a cumulative account since my appointment, which provides details of the remuneration charged and expenses incurred and paid by the Liquidator.

#### 3 Work undertaken by the Liquidator

3.1 I would comment on the work undertaken in the period as follows;

#### Administration (including statutory compliance & reporting)

- 3.2 The Liquidator must comply with certain statutory obligations under the Insolvency Act 1986 and other related legislation. Details about the work undertaken in this regard has been outlined previously and I would confirm that in the final period of the liquidation, the only matters that have affected the costs in this area to any particular extent are
- 3.3 As noted in my initial fees' information, this work has not necessarily brought any financial benefit to creditors, but is work required on every case by statute.
- 3.4 The time spent on this case during the liquidation period relates to the following matters:
  - Attending to correspondence and telephone calls with creditors
  - Recording and acknowledging creditors' claims
  - Investigations into the affairs of the Company
  - Preparation and submission of statutory report to the Secretary of State
  - Obtaining bonding and completing bond reviews to enable the Liquidator to continue to act
  - Cashiering and updating insolvency computer system
  - Reviews of case
  - Statutory compliance which includes submissions to Companies House
  - Liaising with valuation agents



#### Realisation of Assets

- 3.5 The work that has been undertaken to recover assets brings a financial benefit to creditors through the distribution of funds available to creditors after settlement of properly authorised costs and expenses.
- 3.6 All assets have now been realised as previously reported.
- 3.7 All funds received within the liquidation are placed in a specifically designated interest-bearing account and the gross interest received in this reporting period totals £0.26.
- 3.8 In this case all monies were defrayed in the costs of the estate and no distribution has been made to creditors.

#### Creditors (claims and distributions)

- 3.9 Further information on the outcome for creditors in this case can be found at section 4 of this report. A liquidator is required to deal with correspondence and claims from all classes of creditor.
- 3.10 Claims from preferential creditors typically involve employee claims and payments made on behalf of the Company by the Redundancy Payments Service following dismissal.
- 3.11 Secondary preferential claims represent monies deducted from wages or VAT which has not been paid over to HMRC.
- 3.12 The above work will not necessarily bring any financial benefit to creditors generally and the more creditors there are on an assignment, the higher the resultant cost will usually be; however, a liquidator is required by statute to undertake this work.

#### Investigations

- 3.13 My investigations and statutory reporting duties have been fulfilled as previously reported.
- 3.14 There were no matters that justified further investigation in the circumstances of this appointment.
- 3.15 All funds have been received into the estate and are reflected in the attached receipts and payments account.

#### 4 Outcome for Creditors

#### Secured Creditors

4.1 The Company did not grant fixed or floating charges over the Company's assets to any secured creditors and no distributions have been made to such creditors as a result in the liquidation. The provisions to create a fund out of the Company's net floating charge property for unsecured creditors (known as the Prescribed Part) do not apply.

#### **Preferential Creditors**

- 4.2 In accordance with Section 386 of The Insolvency Act 1986 and Schedule 6 Category 5 of the Act debts in respect of employees' remuneration and holiday pay, subject to limitations of statute, rank as preferential creditors and in priority to the claims from other unsecured creditors.
- 4.3 The employees made claims under the provisions of the Employment Rights Act 1986 which have been met substantially by the Redundancy Payments Service, who have a subrogated claim, in place of the employees for an element of the total claim. I have not received a claim



from the Redundancy Payments Service which was anticipated to be £4,898 as per the Statement of Affairs.

4.4 There is no prospect of a dividend to preferential creditors.

#### Secondary Preferential Creditors

4.5 Secondary preferential claims are claims from HMRC in respect of VAT and other amounts due to HMRC paid by employees or customers through a deduction by the business such as student loan payment, PAYE, Employee NIC and Construction Industry Scheme deductions.

A summary of secondary preferential claims is detailed below.

4.6 No dividend to secondary preferential creditors is anticipated.

#### **Unsecured Creditors**

- 4.7 I received claims totalling £165,029.88 from thirteen creditors in the prior period. No further claims were received during this Period.
- 4.8 There are no funds available after costs to enable a distribution to be paid to the unsecured creditors.

#### 5 Liquidator's Remuneration & Expenses

#### Pre-appointment costs

- 5.1 The creditors authorised the payment of £7,500 plus VAT and disbursements for my assistance with preparing the statement of affairs and convening the decision procedure to seek the creditors nomination for the appointment of a liquidator.
- 5.2 These fees were paid from asset realisations and are shown in the enclosed receipts and payments account.

#### Post appointment Costs

- 5.3 The basis of the Liquidator's remuneration was fixed as a set amount £15,000 plus VAT followed by a percentage of the value of 20% of the assets he has to deal with.
- 5.4 The Liquidators fee information was originally provided to creditors when the basis of the remuneration was approved and was based on information available at that time.
- 5.5 The Liquidator has drawn £4,762.54 against the total set fee of £15,000 as agreed and approved by creditors.
- 5.6 The Liquidator has made the following realisations upon which creditors have approved a percentage be taken as remuneration. Details of the realisations to date and associated remuneration drawn on account of those realisations is set out below:

- \* Agents costs were estimated to be £500 which represented the costs incurred in attending the Company's premises to prepare an inspection and valuation of the Company's assets.
- 5.13 The Agents additional expenses relate to 10% commission on the sale of assets, dealing with retention of title claims, expressions of interest and negotiations, 5 additional visits to site, supervising clearance of the Company's premises over a 2-day period and liaising with the landlord to prevent distraint. There were also additional costs incurred in hiring 2 x 7 cubic yard skips, Luton van hire, performing a secure destruction of data files (38 boxes of paperwork), delivery of pallet from Stevenage to Stockport, as well as travel, telephone and miscellaneous expenses.

## CHARGE OUT RATES & POLICY REGARDING THE RECOVERY OF EXPENSES PURSUANT TO STATEMENT OF INSOLVENCY PRACTICE 9

#### 1. POLICY ON FEES

Fees are either fixed by reference to time costs, or as a percentage of realisations and distributions, or a set amount or any combination of all three. #### 1.2. FIXED AND % FEES

Where fees are authorised and approved as a fixed fee and/or % fee this fee is to cover the costs incurred by the Insolvency Practitioner and his staff and does not include any additional direct costs.



#### 2. RECOVERY OF EXPENSES

An expense is a directly attributable cost to the estate which is neither an office holder's remuneration nor a distribution to creditors or members. Expenses can include disbursements, payments met by the office holder and subsequently recovered from the estate, and are divided into those that do not need approval before they are charged to the estate (category 1) and those that do (category 2).

Category 1 expenses are payments to independent third parties and do not have to be approved prior to payment, but when reporting to the creditors committee and creditors during the course of the liquidation the actual expenses incurred will be compared with the original estimate provided with any material difference explained (e.g., where legal costs rise due to escalated recovery action).
