The directors present their statutory report together with the financial statements of The A Team Foundation Limited for the year ended 5 April 2012

This report has been prepared in accordance with Part VIII of the Charities Act 2011

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 13 of the attached financial statements and comply with the Memorandum and Articles of Association of The A Team Foundation Limited, applicable laws and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice on "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

#### **GOVERNANCE, STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

#### Constitution

The A Team Foundation Limited is a company limited by guarantee (Registration Number 03775136) and a registered charity (Registration Number 1077094)

#### **Directors**

The names of the directors who served during the period are set out as part of the reference and administrative information on page 1 of these Annual Report and Financial Statements

The Articles of Association require a minimum of two directors and a maximum of seven Directors may co-opt any person duly qualified to fill a vacancy in their number or as an additional director. Co-opted directors hold office only until the next Annual General Meeting. Decisions on investments and donations are taken by all directors.

#### Directors' responsibilities statement

The charitable company's directors (who are also trustees of the Foundation for the purposes of charity law) are responsible for preparing the annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and the United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of The A Team Foundation Limited at the year end and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the financial year then ended Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditures, of the charitable company for that period In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- ♦ observe the methods and principles in the Statement of Recommended Practice (Accounting and Reporting by Charities) (the Charities' SORP),
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,

#### **GOVERNANCE, STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT** (continued)

#### **Directors' responsibilities statement** (continued)

• prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The directors are responsible for maintaining adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Each of the directors confirms that

- so far as the director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware, and
- the director has taken all steps that he/she ought to have taken as a director in order to make himself/herself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charitable company's auditors are aware of that information

This confirmation is given and should be interpreted in accordance with the provisions of s418 of the Companies Act 2006

#### Risk management

The directors have identified the major risks to which the charity is exposed and remain confident that they have in place systems and procedures to mitigate the risks. They feel that the main risk to which the charity is exposed is the protection of assets and income. The income of the charity is mainly derived from the portfolio of investments held within the charity. The directors monitor the performance of the investments and regularly review their investment policy, meeting on a quarterly basis to consider the investment yields and capital growth.

#### **OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND RELEVANT POLICIES**

## Charitable objectives and activities

The charity's principal activity is its grant-making programme. In accordance with its Articles of Association the charity is to promote any charitable purpose or support any charity selected by the directors. The directors seek through their grant-making programme to support charitable projects in areas identified as being of particular interest to them. These areas include the promotion of a greater understanding of the links between the consumption and production of foods and their effects on human health, social wellbeing and the environment. The directors do not anticipate any changes to their grant making priorities.

### **OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND RELEVANT POLICIES** (continued)

### Charitable objectives and activities (continued)

The directors confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year Whilst the directors are mindful of their own obligation to ensure that the charity benefits the public generally, they take some assurance from the fact that recipients of grants are themselves regulated to ensure that they operate for the public benefit

Potential recipients of grants are identified by the directors individually, in areas where it is perceived that public benefit will be achieved. The opportunity to benefit is not restricted in any way except that grants are principally made to charitable, not-for-profit and non-governmental organisations, as well as universities and colleges in the UK and Ireland, not least to facilitate the directors being able to follow up on efficacy of the grants made

#### **Investment policy**

The investment strategy is set by the directors, who consider the charity's income requirements, the risk profile and the view of economic and market conditions. The investment objectives are to obtain a balanced return from both capital growth and income. The directors meet on a regular basis to consider the charity's portfolio and investment performance.

## **Grant making policy**

The A Team Foundation seeks to develop relationships with like-minded organisations, which share the vision of encouraging a better understanding of the relationship between our approach to food, its production and consumption, and its implications on health and social wellbeing

The directors take a strategic approach to grant-making and do not therefore suggest sending unsolicited applications. Instead, if an organisation identifies that it has strong links to The A Team Foundation's funding objectives, the directors would encourage the organisation to contact them via the charity's website www ateamfoundation org before submitting a proposal

If it is then determined that the objectives of the two organisations are strongly aligned, the grant making process is staged in two parts. The first stage involves completion of an application form and submission of a concept note briefly stating the background, objectives, activities and budget for the project, to be assessed by the directors. Should an organisation be successful at this stage, the second stage involves a meeting with the directors and provision of additional information.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Achievements in the year

During the year ended 5 April 2012, grants payable amounted to £225,722 (2011 - £291,897) Details of grants are included in Note 3 to the financial statements

Significant grants awarded during the year were as follows

#### First Steps Nutrition Trust - £22,000

The directors funded First Steps Nutrition Trust for the production of a practical photographic guide on nutrition for young women in pregnancy. This explains how to achieve the food and nutrient intakes required in pregnancy and uses foods and drinks that are appealing, practical, cost effective and available. There is evidence that the diets of teenagers who are pregnant are not significantly different to those of other teenagers, suggesting that teenage girls do not modify their diets in response to pregnancy and fail to recognise the need to do this

The UK has a significantly high rate of teenage pregnancy compared to other European countries and the fact that many young women are still developing physically, combined with poor diet, seriously impacts on the health of future generations. Inadequate diet in pregnancy is linked to poorer outcomes in terms of both a successful pregnancy, lower birth weights, greater levels of disability in newborns and longer term physical, behavioural, cognitive and mental health problems. First Steps Nutrition Trust works for the advancement of health through provision of information and resources about better nutritional health across the population. Its aim is to benefit the public through evidence based research and dissemination of information, support and resources relating to good nutrition for the period from pre-conception to five years

#### Food Cycle - £24,500

The directors funded Food Cycle's Pie in the Sky Community Café, a five day-a-week social enterprise that supports children, young people and adults who live in Bromley By Bow, Tower Hamlets Tackling the issue of food waste by using surplus food to create nutritious meals, the café is run in partnership with the Bromley By Bow Centre. The Centre is a unique organisation that takes a holistic approach to improving health, wellbeing and skills development within the local community. As the Pie in the Sky Community Café is a project based within the Centre, the project engages with lone parents and their children who access the crèche, ESOL students learning English at the Centre, local unemployed people who access the employment services, and people with health conditions that access the health centre.

The Community Café is the only healthy eating option in the area where the community can have a nutritious, three-course meal in a communal setting for under £4 and have the option to take home surplus fruit and vegetables for free with recipe cards to cook nutritious meals at home. The café supports around 60 volunteers per year from the local community through a training programme in which they develop work-related skills, an increased understanding of the links between food and health and encourages behavioural changes to food through education about nutrition, cooking and food waste

## **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE** (continued)

### Achievements in the year (continued)

Slow Food - £46,766

The directors awarded a second year of funding to Slow Food UK for the continuation of Slow Food Baby, a programme to inform and engage families about how good food is central to well-being, and how early taste development in children builds the foundation for 'informed food choice' throughout life Developed by Slow Food UK with input from experts and their membership, Slow Food Baby is a programme in which parents and carers are presented with the Slow Food family approach to the introduction of solid foods and mealtimes. In the second year of the pilot Slow Food UK explored and confirmed a project delivery partnership with the National Childbirth Trust.

### Soil Association - £50,000

The Food For Life Partnership (FFLP) is an initiative led by the Soil Association, working with three other charities. The Health Education Trust, Focus on Food, and Garden Organic FFLP is a health and education programme which helps transform school meals and food education in schools and communities. It aims to give pupils and their families the confidence, skills and knowledge they need to cook, grow and enjoy good quality affordable food by providing schools with expert professional support on each element of the programme, growing, cooking, visiting farms, school catering, school food policy and community engagement. Over 4,500 schools are engaged in the programme in England so far The directors' grant helped to bridge a financial gap when dedicated 'delivery' funding from the Big Lottery came to end. This enabled FFLP to retain skilled and experienced staff during an intervening period before further funding was secured to assist their transition to a viable economic model as a bespoke commissionable package for Local Authorities or clusters of schools to implement

## Sustain / Baby Milk Action - £29,941

The directors funded Sustain in the continuation of the Infant Feeding Project, carried out by Baby Milk Action Baby Milk Action is a non-profit organization, which aims to save infant lives, and to end the avoidable suffering caused by inappropriate infant feeding Working as part of the International Baby Food Action Network (IBFAN) to strengthen independent, transparent and effective controls on the marketing of the baby feeding industry. Baby Milk Action has over 30 years of experience of monitoring the baby food industry against internationally agreed marketing standards and working to protect infant health, supporting breastfeeding and babies that have to be fed on breast milk substitutes by improving compliance with these measures. A key part of the work is the highlighting of conflicts of interest and the need for information systems to be free from commercial influence. The funding supports core staff hours and administrative support, assisting Baby Milk Action's campaigning, advocacy, education and training in the UK, EU and globally

### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE** (continued)

#### Investment performance

There were various acquisitions and disposals on investments made during the year. The unrealised loss on investments for the year ended 5 April 2012 was £125,526 (2011 – gain of £335,538) and the realised loss on disposals was £154,989 (2011 – loss of £160,982). Investments yielded income of £330,555 (2011 – £272,778) during the year. The directors consider investment performance to be in line with market conditions. The interest received during the year on cash held in short term deposit accounts was £1,654 (2011 – £2,370).

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Results for the period

During the year ended 5 April 2012, the unrestricted funds generated income of £332,209 (2011 - £275,148) mainly from investments, and incurred expenditure of £322,220 (2011 - £388,100) of which more than 98% related to charitable activities. This resulted in a surplus of £9,989 (2011 - deficit of £112,952) which, together with a gain on foreign exchange of £9,979 (2011 - loss of £13,929), gave a balance of £52,199 (2011 - £32,231) on unrestricted funds at the year end

The expendable endowment fund totalled £9,455,304 (2011 - £9,735,819) at 5 April 2012, giving total funds at this date of £9,507,503 (2011 - £9,768,050)

#### Reserves policy and financial position

It is the directors' intention to spend all the income generated by the endowment each year. The directors have decided that should suitable opportunities arise to award grants, which would exceed the level of income during the year, it is in order for some funds from the endowment to be used in support of this

The endowment will be invested with the intent to, as far as possible, retain its capital value and produce an annual income

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

The directors look forward to continuing to support a wide number of charities, particularly in the areas of food and health

#### Independent auditor's report to the directors of The A Team Foundation Limited

We have audited the financial statements of The A Team Foundation Limited for the year ended 5 April 2012 which comprise the statement of financial activities, balance sheet, the principal accounting policies and the related notes. ## Principal accounting policies 5 April 2012

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value and in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 Applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and the Statement of Recommended Practice on "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) have been followed in the preparation of these financial statements

#### **Incoming resources**

Incoming resources are recognised in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is included in the statement of financial activities when incurred and includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered

Resources expended comprise the following.

- a Charitable activities comprise grants payable and related support costs. Grants payable are included in the statement of financial activities when approved and when the intended recipient has either received the funds or been informed of the decision to make the donation and has satisfied all related conditions. Grants approved but not paid at the end of the financial year are accrued for. Grants where the beneficiary has not been informed or has to meet certain conditions before the grant is released are not accrued for but are noted as financial commitments in the notes to the financial statements. Support costs comprise staff and office costs.
- b Governance costs include costs which are directly attributable to the organisational procedures and the necessary procedures for compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

#### Fixed asset investments

Fixed asset investments are included on the balance sheet at their market value at the end of the financial period. Realised and unrealised gains (or losses) are credited (or debited), to the statement of financial activities in the period in which they arise

### Foreign currency transactions and balances

Cash assets held in foreign currency accounts are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction.

## **Principal accounting policies** 5 April 2012

## **Fund accounting**

The unrestricted funds represent funds available for the general charitable purposes of the charity at the discretion of the directors

The expendable endowment fund represents monies retained as capital in accordance with the donor's wishes

### Cash flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charity, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 1 'Cash flow statements'
