Directors' report for the year ended 31 December 2019

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2019.

Dividends :

During the year no dividend was declared or paid (2018: 3,522.4p per distributable share totaling £75,602,000).

Post balance sheet events

The outbreak of the novel coronavirus ("COVID-19") has affected all of our brands since March 2020. Please refer to the Going Concern section below for more details.

Directors and directors' interests

The directors of the Company who served in the year and to the date of this report, unless otherwise stated, are shown on page 2.

Going concern

The company is a holding company within the PE Compass Holding II Group ("Group") and is accordingly impacted by the Group's performance. The impact of the novel coronavirus ("COVID-19") on the Group has been set out below.

COVID-19 affected many areas of the global economy, including travel and tourism. The industry was materially impacted across Europe where temporary border closures, self-isolation, strict social distancing regulations and air travel restrictions were adopted to slow and limit the spread of the virus. Our priority has been to protect the health and safety of our employees, guests and owners whilst best positioning the business for the longer term and recovery through management of risk and conserving cash.

The Group had a very good start to the year with healthy growth in bookings across all our products and markets up until the outbreak of COVID-19. The Group was then impacted by lower vacation bookings rates, lower vacation arrivals figures and increased incidence of cancellation. Management took early action to manage risks and preserve cash. The extent and timing of government restrictions varied across our main markets and impacted our brands differently.

For example, in the UK, the non-essential travel prohibition impacted domestic travel from 22nd March to 4th July for England and slightly later in Scotland and Wales. The Foreign and Commonwealth office ("FCO") of the UK government issued advice against all non-essential international travel from 17th March and established air bridges with a number of countries from 10th July.

In Denmark, domestic travel has been permitted throughout the period and Denmark opened its borders to the majority of European countries on 27 June.

In the Netherlands, the restrictions varied by region and many of the Landal parks were closed from mid / late March until various dates in June.

The Group bounced back strongly after the governments across Europe lifted the majority of the travel restrictions. The demand for domestic and drive-to destinations has benefitted our business and we expect higher third quarter occupancy levels than prior year in our key markets.

Hoseasons Limited Directors' Report (continued)

Going concern (continued)

The Company is wholly dependent on the intercompany loan and support arrangements for access to the cash flows necessary for the day-to-day running of the company and to support the going concern assertion. The company has received written confirmation that Awaze Limited intends to continue to provide the Company with the financial support necessary to enable the company to meet their debts as they fall due, including intercompany balances for a period of at least 12 months from the date of these financial statements.

Group management has prepared a base case scenario for the next twelve months that reflects the latest information on travel restrictions, the bookings already taken for future arrivals and the recent booking trends. In addition Group management has applied the experience of the second quarter and modelled downside scenarios that include a complete lockdown in the fourth quarter of 2020 and the first quarter of 2021.

Under base case and downside scenarios, the Group has sufficient liquidity to maintain operations and provide support if required by the Company. After making enquiries, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and have received written assurances from a fellow group company that they will continue to provide support for at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Future developments

The directors do not expect any changes in the activities of the company in the forthcoming year.

Financial risk management policy

The financial risk management policy is included within the financial statements of the Company's ultimate parent, PE Compass Holding II, which manages the liquidity risks associated with the whole group.

Independent auditors and disclosure of information to auditors

Having made enquiries of the Company's auditors, the directors confirm that:

- · There is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditors are unaware; and
- · The directors have taken all the steps a director might reasonably be expected to have taken to be aware of relevant audit information and to establish that the Company's auditors are aware of that information.

The independent auditors, PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, have indicated their willingness to continue in office and a resolution concerning their re-appointment will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting.

Hoseasons Limited Notes to the Financial Statements

. 1. Corporate information

Hoseasons Limited is a private company that is limited by shares and incorporated and domiciled in the United Kingdom. It was incorporated on 13 July 1999. The address of the registered office is given on page 2. The nature of the Company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' report on page 3.

2. Significant accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, as applicable to companies using Financial Reporting Standard 101 'Reduced Disclosure Framework' (FRS 101).

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis. The financial statements are presented in pounds sterling and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand (£'000), except when otherwise indicated.

The Company is included in the consolidated financial statements of PE Compass Holding II Limited, which are publicly available. Therefore the Company is exempt, by virtue of section 400 of the Companies Act 2006, from the requirement to prepare consolidated financial statements. The address of PE Compass Holding II Limited's registered office is 100 New Bridge Street, London, EC4V 6JA, United Kingdom.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with FRS 101 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies. The director believes that there are no areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, as disclosed in note 3.

The accounting policies which follow set out those policies which apply in preparing the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2019. These have been applied consistently other than where new policies have been adopted in the year.

On 1 January 2019 the company adopted the requirements of IFRS 16. The adoption of IFRS 16 did not have a material impact on the company as the company does not have any lease agreements.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

2.2 Going concern

The Company is wholly dependent on the intercompany loan and support arrangements for access to the cash flows necessary for the day-to-day running of the company and to support the going concern assertion. The company has received written confirmation that Awaze Limited intends to continue to provide the Company with the financial support necessary to enable the company to meet their debts as they fall due, including intercompany balances for a period of at least 12 months from the date of these financial statements.

The director's full evaluation of this in described in note 14. Having assessed the principal risks, the directors consider it appropriate to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

2:3 Summary of significant accounting policies

a) Turnover

The company acts purely as a holding and investment company and as such records no turnover.

b) Current tax

The tax expense for the year comprises current tax. Tax is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in shareholders' funds. In this case, the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in shareholders' funds, respectively.

The current tax charge is calculated on the basis of the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulation is subject to interpretation. It establishes provisions, where appropriate, on the basis of amounts expected to be paid to the tax authorities.

c) Dividends

The Company recognises a liability to pay a dividend when the distribution is authorised and the distribution is no longer at the discretion of the Company. As per the corporate laws of the United Kingdom, a distribution is authorised when it is approved by the shareholders. A corresponding amount is recognised directly in equity. Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

d) Investments

Investments in subsidiary undertakings are held at historical cost less any applicable provision for impairment.

3 Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

Judgements other than estimates

There are no critical judgements.

Estimates and assumptions

There are no key sources of estimation uncertainty.

4 Operating result

The audit fee relating to the audit of the financial statements, for the current and prior year was borne by another group company for which no recharge was made, and for 2019 was £4,000 (2018: £4,000).

5 Employee costs and directors remuneration

The directors were remunerated by fellow group companies, and it was not practical to allocate the remuneration out to the other individual group companies.

The company did not have any employees during the year (2018: nil).

'A' and 'B' ordinary shares rank pari passu in respect of profits available for distribution and for voting purposes. Each 'A' and 'B' share rank equally for any distribution made on a winding up of the company. 'C' shares are not entitled to vote and are not entitled to profits available for distribution. 'C' shares rank equally for any distribution made on a winding up of the company.

During the year the company paid dividends of nil (2018: 3,522.4p per distributable ordinary share).

11 Related party disclosures

The Company has taken advantage of the exemption under paragraph 8(k) of FRS 101 not to disclose transactions with fellow wholly owned subsidiaries within the PE Compass Holding II Limited Group. The company has no related third party transactions outside of those with wholly owned subsidiaries of the PE Compass Holding II Limited Group.

12 Ultimate group undertaking

The Company's parent company is English Country Cottages Limited, which is registered in England & Wales. In the directors opinion, the Company's ultimate parent undertaking and controlling party is Platinum Equity Capital Partners International IV (Cayman) LP, a Cayman Islands limited partnership, which is a private equity investment fund ultimately controlled by Platinum Equity LLC.

The largest and smallest group of undertakings, for which group financial statements have been drawn up is that headed by PE Compass Holding II Limited. Copies of its group financial statements, which include the company, are available from 100 New Bridge Street, London, EC4V 6JA.

13 Post balance sheet events

The outbreak of COVID-19 during the early months of 2020 will have an impact on the Company, which cannot be reliably predicted at this moment. It will depend, inter alia, upon the duration and scope of any further outbreaks; governmental, business and individual actions taken in response to those outbreaks; the impact of those outbreaks on the financial markets and economic activity generally, as well as the effect of the outbreak on our customers, home-owners, business partners, and employees. The impact of COVID-19 is considered in more detail in note 14.

14 Covid-19

impact and response

The company is a holding company within the PE Compass Holding II Group ("Group") and is accordingly impacted by the Group's performance. The impact of the novel coronavirus ("COVID-19") on the Group has been set out below.

COVID-19 affected many areas of the global economy, including travel and tourism. The industry was materially impacted across Europe where temporary border closures, self-isolation, strict social distancing regulations and air travel restrictions were adopted to slow and limit the spread of the virus.

Our priority has been to protect the health and safety of our employees, guests and owners whilst best positioning the business for the longer term and recovery through management of risk and conserving cash.

The Group had a very good start to the year with healthy growth in bookings across all our products and markets up until the outbreak of COVID-19. The Group was then impacted by lower vacation bookings rates, lower vacation arrivals figures and increased incidence of cancellation. Management took early action to manage risks and preserve cash.

The extent and timing of government restrictions varied across our main markets and impacted our brands differently.

For example, in the UK, the non-essential travel prohibition impacted domestic travel from 22nd March to 4th July for England and slightly later in Scotland and Wales. The Foreign and Commonwealth office ("FCO") of the UK government issued advice against all non-essential international travel from 17th March and established air bridges with a number of countries from 10th July.

In Denmark, domestic travel has been permitted throughout the period and Denmark opened its borders to the majority of European countries on 27 June.

In the Netherlands, the restrictions varied by region and many of the Landal parks were closed from mid / late March until various dates in June.

The Group bounced back strongly after the governments across Europe lifted the majority of the travel restrictions. The demand for domestic and drive-to destinations has benefitted our business and we expect higher third quarter occupancy levels than prior year in our key markets (UK, Netherlands and Denmark).

14 Covid-19 (continued)

Going Concern Analysis

The Company is wholly dependent on the intercompany loan and support arrangements for access to the cash flows necessary for the day-to-day running of the company and to support the going concern assertion. The company has received written confirmation that Awaze Limited intends to continue to provide the Company with the financial support necessary to enable the company to meet their debts as they fall due, including intercompany balances for a period of at least 12 months from the date of these financial statements.

Group management has prepared a base case scenario for the next twelve months that reflects the latest information on travel restrictions, the bookings already taken for future arrivals and the recent booking trends. In addition Group management has applied the experience of the second quarter and modelled downside scenarios that include a complete lockdown in the fourth quarter of 2020 and the first quarter of 2021.

Under base case and downside scenarios, the Group has sufficient liquidity to maintain operations and provide support if required by the Company. Further information on the cash, liquidity and covenants of the group is provided below.

Cash and Liquidity

The Group has access to a €105m Revolving Credit Facility ("RCF") which was undrawn at 31 December 2020. At 30 June the Group had liquidity (cash and cash equivalents and RCF) of €421m.

Covenant

The term loan debt of the Group does not have any covenants. The sole springing financial covenant in connection with the Revolving Credit Facility requires testing each quarter only in the event the RCF is drawn over 35%.

The Group was within the covenant ratio for the second quarter of 2020 and does not expect a springing covenant test in the next 12 months.

Conclusion

After making enquiries, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and have received written assurances from a fellow group company that they will continue to provide support for at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.
