Rural Arts North Yorkshire Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2002

The trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the period ended 31 March 2002.

Legal and administrative information set out on pages 1 and 2 form part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Objects of the Charity

The object of the Charity is to promote the Rural Arts, in all their forms, in the area of North Yorkshire. The charity contributes to the quality of life of the people in the local authorities making up the County of North Yorkshire through the provision of a challenging and accessible programme of community arts projects and 'On Tour' – a scheme of professional touring companies that are engaged to play in village and community hall venues in North Yorkshire.

Trustees

It was with great sadness that the Trustees learnt of the death of Mr John Bloom and his presence has been sorely missed at Management meetings. However, the Trustees were delighted when Mrs Hannah Bloom agreed to serve on the Management Committee from December 2002.

It is with pleasure that the Trustees welcome other appointments to the Management Committee, namely Mr Tom Mould and, in an advisory capacity, Mrs Ann Dale and Ms Gayle Sutherland.

Mr Mould comes from the farming community around Masham and has been involved in local activities for a number of years having served on Harrogate Borough Council and as a Town Councillor.

Mrs Ann Dale was invited to support the Management Committee as a representative of Askham Bryan College, a college that has a rural outreach programme similar in nature to Rural Arts.

Ms Gayle Sutherland represents North Yorkshire County Council and the North Yorkshire Cultural Officers Group

Organisation

The Council of Management, made up of a minimum of three members, meet at regular intervals throughout the period to administer the charity. There is a sub committee covering Personnel. Further sub committees for developing the Courthouse and Finance have been established to streamline and focus the management of the charity during this period and into the future.

The Arts Director continues to manage the day to day operations of the charity.

Rural Arts North Yorkshire Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2002

Investment Powers

Under the memorandum and articles of association, the charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit.

Related Parties

The charity continues to let the first floor of the Courthouse to Shirtcliffe and Co., Solicitors, of which Mr C. Shirtcliffe, a member of the Council of Management, is the Senior Partner. This is an arm's length transaction with the rent being set at an open market rate. Permission and approval for this arrangement was sought from the Charity Commission and this was given in November 2000. This arrangement is expected to come to an end when Shirtcliffe & Co., Solicitors find new premises.

Review of the Activities and Future Developments

Since the last Trustees report Rural Arts has been successful in obtaining funding from Yorkshire Forward under the Single Regeneration Budget, Round 6 and the Learning and Skills Council under Objective 3 Co financing. These two strands of funding have allowed the charity to appoint two development workers and a training officer. The development workers, based in the east and west sides of North Yorkshire, work with local community and voluntary groups within their areas to engage them in creative activities. The development workers are supported by the training officer who helps in devising interesting activities that encourage the participants to seek further education or training. This development work has been supported and enhanced by the mobile classroom of ten laptops, funded by a TargIT grant from the DfES, which has introduced a wide range of groups to the world of computer technology and the internet.

Rural Arts has continued to participate in a wide variety of community projects across the county including the Whitby Fish Quay mosaics, Scruton Village Banner and newspaper body sculpture with the Hawes Museum for the re opening of the National Parks after the Foot and Mouth epidemic. Two interesting youth projects have been undertaken – the first with Nidderdale High School involved year 9 students writing and producing a performance exploring issues surrounding drugs and young people. The charity also supported Thirsk's Ritz Cinema in their Young peoples Film festival by making available the Courthouse and the mobile laptop classroom for the animation element of the festival. This project culminated in a performance of the work produced by the young people during the week at the Cinema in Thirsk.

The Autumn and Spring 'On Tour' scheme continues to offer an interesting range of performances to new rural audiences. The three seasons since the last Trustees Report has included such artists as Tango Siempre – a stunning display of dance that sold out in nearly all the venues involved (an outstanding achievement after the effects of the Foot and Mouth outbreak)- the Eduardo Niebla Guitar Duo and the Ukulele Orchestra of Great Britain.

Rural Arts North Yorkshire Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2002

Spring 2002 included a number of performances that were directed at specific target groups. These performances were put on as part of a pilot project funded by the Learning and Skills Council looking at how to engage young people and older people within a community through the Arts.

Reserves Policy

The Council of Management has established the policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets are held as general funds at such a level that there are free reserves to provide financial flexibility over the next financial period. This policy will be reviewed on a regular basis.

Risk Management

The Council of Management has conducted its own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Risks to external funding were identified by the Business Plan and this has led to the company seeking other sources of funding to support its artistic programme and develop other aspects, such as training, of Rural Arts' work. Internal risks are minimized by the close involvement of the Council of Management in decision making.

Responsibilities of the Directors in relation to the Financial Statements Company Law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the financial period and its surplus or deficit for the financial period. In doing so the Directors are required to:

- 1. select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- 2. make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- 3 .prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enables them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The Directors are responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective March 2000); the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2000) issued in October 2000. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

b) Donations, legacies and similar incoming resources

Donations, legacies and similar resources are included in the year in which they are receivable, which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

c) Grants receivable

Grants receivable, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) in the year for which they are received. Deferred income represents amounts received for future periods and is released to incoming resources in the period for which it has been received.

d) Rental income

Rental income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is receivable.

e) Interest receivable

Interest is included when received by the charity.

f) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis. The company is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories.

g) Pension costs

The charity participates in a defined contribution scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the period.

h) Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:

i) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Council of Management for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

2. Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £1.

4. European Union Community Development Fund

A scheme for the promotion of events in upland areas was approved by the North Yorkshire County Council acting in conjunction with the Department of the Environment and the European Union. Grants totalling £30,000 over the three year period ending 31st March 2001 were available to the company in support of these events. Grants up to 50% of attributable expenditure were available. £ 2317 was used to purchase IT equipment that have been included in Fixed Assets.

5. Development of the Courthouse

Lottery funding was received for the preparation of a business plan and scheme of works to develop the Courthouse into a suitable artistic and administrative base for the Company. The business plan was then used as the basis of a bid to the Arts Council for funding of the proposed development. This subsequent bid proved to be unsuccessful.
