REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE For the period to 31 December 2000

The executive committee presents its report and financial statements for the period ended 31 December 2000.

INCORPORATION

The company was incorporated on the 8 June 2000 and commenced to operate from that date. Prior to this Handicap International UK operated in the UK as an unincorporated organisation and as a branch of Handicap International France.

ACTIVITY

The company is a charity and exists to relieve and assist people in charitable need in particular but not exclusively in situations of deprivation or disability irrespective of the nature or cause and irrespective of the religious, ethnic or political origin of beneficiaries, both nationally and globally.

MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Members of the executive committee, who are directors for the purpose of the company law and trustees for the purpose of the charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 3.

Members of the charitable company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of winding up. The total number of guarantees at 31 December 2000 was 4.

RELATED PARTY

Handicap International UK (HI-UK) is a section of the international charity Handicap International. An agreement has been signed between Handicap International France and HI-UK providing a licence to the UK to use the name Handicap International. The French organisation has agreed to meet any shortfall of funds for the next five years whilst the charity becomes established in the UK.

REVIEW

During the period September 1999 to December 2000, HI made its first steps in the UK. Based on the conviction that HI-UK should smoothly find its place in the British Charity landscape, the choice was made to start by initiating contacts and taking sufficient time to define what might be the best plan of actions. In addition, until the Charity Commission recognised HI-UK as a Charity (September 2000), HI-UK has been advised to keep a low profile. The major activities during the period were:

NGOs networking

Many contacts have been taken with British NGOs specialised on disability issues. This action aimed at informing British NGOs knowing already HI from field contacts that they had now a focal point in the UK to facilitate contacts.

HI-UK became a member of the UK Working Group on Landmines (now called Landmine Action).

The decision was taken that HI-UK should become a member of BOND (British Overseas NGOs for Development).

HI-UK has taken over IDDC administration in September 2000, and is temporarily in charge of the co-ordination as well.

Programmes

Sierra Leone: HI-UK has developed a close partnership with One Love Sierra Leone, a small British charity specifically aiming to raise funds to support activities in Sierra Leone. A joint visit of the HI programme was organised followed by deskwork on the design of an orthopaedic workshop.

Recruitment: further to several exhibitions, displays and advertisements in the media, five people were recruited for HI overseas programmes. The first HI-UK expatriate left for Kosovo in December 00, and a proper contract of employment and conditions have been set up for British expatriates.

Promotion and fund-raising

100 Miles on the South Downs Way: this first experience of the sponsored walk allowed us to define the limits and constraints of such an event, in order to better prepare future events. We would like the Walk to reach a national audience, and to become the major annual event of HI-UK.

During Landmine Action Week in September, HI-UK had the opportunity to get a free advertising campaign with 250 posters displayed in 24 train stations in South London, Kent and Sussex.

Launching of the Tree Tidy: after Help the Aged decided finally it was not ready to contribute to the Tree Tidy operation, the English packaging was designed and 300 Tree Tidies sent to journalists in December.

The Mirror: preparatory phase of a 2001 partnership with the second British daily newspaper aiming at raising money for the Sierra Leone programme.

As well as these activities, HI-UK was active in building a tangible associative life. The Chairman and the Director contacted a few selected people in order to enlarge the board of Trustees. Peter Coleridge, Michael Jeewa will be advisors. Su Jenkins is joining us as a Trustee. This action is seen as a critical step towards an active associative life for HI-UK.

At a global level, HI-UK has been fully involved in the thought on the growth of the HI movement, the creation of a Federation and the possible shapes the latter could take.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Company law requires the executive committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for

the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the executive committee should follow best practice and:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The executive committee is responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The executive committee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

 - the company satisfied the conditions for exemption from an audit of the accounts for the year specified in section 249A(4) of the Act and did not, at any time within that year, fall within any of the categories of companies not entitled to the exemption specified in section 249B(1).

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDING 31 DECEMBER 2000

1 Accounting Policies

a Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective March 2000), the Companies Act and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by charities: Statements of Recommended Practice (SORP 2000) issued in October 2000.

b Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Computer equipment Office equipment 33% on a straight line basis 25% on a straight line basis

c Funds

General Funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure, which meets this criterion, is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.

d Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

e Resources Expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

f Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the SOFA over the period in which the cost is incurred.

g Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All exchange differences are taken to the SOFA.

An agreement has been signed between Handicap International France and HI-UK providing a licence to the UK to use the name Handicap International. The French organisation has agreed to meet any shortfall of funds for the next five years whilst the charity becomes established in the UK. Due to this financial support Handicap International France has a significant amount of control over HI-UK. During the period to 31 December 2000 Handicap International France contributed £41,313. HI-UK also provided services to Handicap International France totalling £11,373 to assist with their charitable operations. See notes 9 and 11 for the amounts outstanding between the organisations at the period end.

The trustee, Dr Jean-Baptiste Richardier, is also a director of Handicap International France.
