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Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2015

This is the fourth time I have made a report on Catalyst's activities for its accounts and on reflecting on the previous year's statements once again 2014/15 has been a challenging year for all of is in the voluntary, community and social enterprise sector (VCSE). The continuing austerity programme from Government and its impact in reducing resources for our public services is real and we know this is likely to continue for the immediate future. This reality and the limited economic growth locally mean that opportunities and funding remains limited.

At Catalyst we remain sensitive to these realities and constantly strive to ensure that all VCSE organisations are provided with information and support that can help them to continue to provide and develop the services and support that help our communities to thrive. As a strategic organisation we will also continue to advocate on behalf of our sector with funders and commissioners to help maintain and grow VCSE services and increase the social value gained as a result. Challenging times mean that we need to work ever harder and I am proud that throughout 2014/15 Catalyst continued to sustain the work of:

- Capacity Building for the VCSE The Centre of Excellence is the training, research and development hub for voluntary, community and social enterprise sector in Stockton-on-Tees and is backed up by continued bid writing support, access to GrantFinder, the most extensive funding database available, and continued support through the SBC funded Step Change Programme.
- Catalyst Communications the Catalyst website has seen a dramatic increase in activity driven by links from the weekly eBulletin and other social media outlets. This is backed up by continued use of print material, especially the Catalyst Chronicle.
- The Voice Forum Providing a forum for organisations in Stockton to come together and talk about the issues that matter
- Awards & Events Catalyst Achievement Awards were held in June 2014 during Volunteering Week and was attended by over 120 people.
 The annual conference was also held in October 2014 and attracted over 100 people and 30 stall holders.

New projects also began during the year including VCSE Health Initiatives, the delivery of a programme to meet CCG and Public Health outcomes, developing a VCSE role in the new Better Care Fund, being a lead partner in a national pilot in Integrated Personal Commissioning as well as being a full strategic partner in the development of new European Funding opportunities for employment across Tees Valley. These projects augment the ongoing developments shown in work started the previous year including Health & Wellbeing Fellowship, A Fairer Start and Children & Young People's Mental Health services.

None of our work would be possible without the support of our partners and funders. We thank all the VCSE organisations who help us in our work and for the difference they make to people's lives within the Borough. We are also indebted to Stockton Borough Council and the help and support from other public sector bodies.

We may live in a challenging and constantly changing world but our passion and resilience to work for the people of this Borough's is undiminished. We remain inspired by the work of our sector and the innovative way people within it respond to the challenges faced and we will continue to strive to help them succeed.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Catalyst's year 2014-15 showed a continued pattern of growth and adaptation to the strategic needs of key partners in the public sector, particularly Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council (SBC). Catalyst ensured that the voluntary, community and social enterprise sector (VCSE) was supported and informed to be strong and effective in delivering services for the most needy and marginalised in various communities in the borough.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Catalyst objectives for 2014-15 were clearly itemised in the organisational action plan as part of the business planning process. The main objectives were:

- a) Delivery of the Third Sector Strategy for Stockton
- b) Organisational Excellence
- c) VCSE Capacity Building
- d) New ideas and projects
- e) Strong networks
- f) Clear communication
- g) Awards & Events

Summary of Performance

- a) Delivery of the Third Sector Strategy for Stockton: the Action Plan for delivery of the Third Sector Strategy was approved by the Catalyst Board and Council of Interest and scrutinised throughout the year. The main targets were met in terms of all the items described below and also the development of a new VCSE Strategy for the borough to be launched in 2015-16.
- b) Organisational Excellence: the Catalyst Board and staff continued their work towards achieving the first stage of a PQASSO quality mark. This has been delayed and is hoped to be achieved during the coming year.
- c) VCSE Capacity Building: A new approach to training and support was introduced through the multi-agency Centre of Excellence. Originally a programme introduced in 2013 under the Transforming Local Infrastructure Programme this has successfully consolidated all training and support offered by a number of VCSE and public sector partners to ensure that individual and organisational capacity is increased at all levels of the sector. This is backed up by continued bid writing support, the purchase of a licence for GrantFinder, the most extensive funding database available, as well as continued support through the SBC funded Step Change Programme.
- d) Volunteering: An in-depth study of volunteering practice and support needs was undertaken throughout the latter part of 2014-15 and will result in a new strategic initiative in early 2015-16 involving a range of VCSE partners And the public sector.
- e) New ideas and projects: As a result of the previous year's development under Transforming Local Infrastructure Funding two new organisations were established as separate from catalyst. These were the Synergy VCS Consortium and OnSite Community Building Trust; the latter being an organisation that owns and manages premises that have been asset transferred from the local authority.

Other new projects include VCSE Health Initiatives, the delivery of a programme to meet CCG and Public Health outcomes, developing a VCSE role in the new Better Care Fund, being a lead partner in a national pilot in Integrated Personal Commissioning as well as being a full strategic partner in the development of new European Funding opportunities for employment across Tees Valley. These projects augment the ongoing developments shown in work started the previous year including Health & Wellbeing Fellowship, A Fairer Start and Children & Young People's Mental Health services.

- f) Strong networks: Stockton Voice is a project managed by Catalyst. The regular Voice Forum and resulting task & finish groups have proved a successful replacement for the former structures. Stockton's new locality forums have been supported by Catalyst in the recruitment and training of VCSE representatives. (See below.)
- g) Clear communication: Catalyst website has seen a dramatic increase in activity that is mostly driven by links from the weekly eBulletin and also social media outlets. This is backed up by continued use of print material, especially the Catalyst Chronicle.
- h) Awards & Events: Catalyst Achievement Awards were held in June 2014 during Volunteering Week and was attended by over 120 people with full coverage in local press. The annual conference was also held in October 2014 and attracted over 100 people and 30 stall holders. Other events included a small recognition of cultural and religious festivals as well a number of meetings and forums, some described below.

Restricted funds and contracts income showed an increase, with particular growth being in Health related projects and thus providing a significant increase in management income.

Consolidation of restricted funds was carried out, with ULO, QA Pilot, SBC Investments and Projects transferred to SBC VCSE Capacity Building Project for ease of reporting.

The reduction in sub-contracted work related to the completion of Transforming Local Infrastructure Fund projects.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees review the charity's reserves policy on a regular basis and consider that the charity should maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equates to between three and six months recurring unrestricted expenditure. This provides sufficient funds to cover any unexpected reduction in income or additional, non-recurring, expenditure. Unrestricted funds were maintained at the lower end of this range during the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The ongoing grant from Stockton Borough Council represents around 45% of core funding which is augmented by projects management fees and grants.

Stockton Voice in more detail.

Stockton Voice: giving a Stockton's voluntary, community and social enterprise sector a say in strategic developments in the Borough

The Stockton Voice project provides the voluntary and community sector in the borough with an opportunity to in?uence decisions on policy and services in their area, and helps to identify assets and skills within communities that can be used to tackle issues in a positive way. It does this through supporting the Voice Forum, organising Task & Finish Groups and Stockton Voice themed workshops, providing information direct to the sector and providing a channel through which any organisation can have its voice heard.

Voice Forum

Providing a forum for organisations in Stockton to come together and talk about the issues that matter through Stockton Voice Forum.

Voice Forum is a bi-monthly open meeting for all voluntary and community organisations in the Borough to come together. There is usually a relevant guest speaker and organisations are able to discuss the issues that are important to them and to hear about other projects and work in the Borough.

It is an ideal forum to showcase and promote the work of your organisation and also provides a valuable networking opportunity.

Voice Forum: Task and Finish Groups

Providing a forum for organisations in Stockton to come together and talk about the issues that matter through Stockton Voice Forum.

A key element of Stockton Voice Project are the Task and Finish Groups. Similar to Voice Forum, these are smaller 'action' focused sessions where people from the sector have the opportunity to come together in small groups to discuss specific issues and make real change together. If an issue is raised at Voice Forum or elsewhere in the Sector that warrants further more detailed discussion/debate then a Task and Finish meeting is called to look specifically at this issue.

Holding follow-up meetings such as these allows other interested parties and those with real expertise in the issue to be invited and have some input.

Examples of recent Task and Finish work include:

- Fuel Poverty
- Increasing participation in the Western and Eastern Locality Forums
- Tobacco Control
- Local Council Tax Support Scheme
- · Housing for the most vulnerable in the Borough
- Volunteering

Voice: Themed Workshops

Voice Themed Workshops, facilitating networking and information sharing across the borough.

A key element of Stockton Voice is to provide the VCSE Sector with an opportunity to come together to talk about specific issues in greater detail.

These conversations allow for the sector to really think deeply about the issues facing the people they represent in Stockton-on-Tees and consider how, as a wider sector, we can come together to offer solutions.

The workshops offer an opportunity to network, learn and share information across the wider sector on important issues and problems.

Topics discussed include:

- Fuel Poverty
- The voice of those seeking asylum
- BME Engagement
- Engagement with the LGBT community
- Community Safety
- Volunteering

Centre of Excellence

The Centre of Excellence is the training, research and development hub for voluntary, community and social enterprise sector in Stockton-on-Tees.

We offer a full range of training and workshop opportunities as well as support around organisational development in areas such as governance and sustainability.

Catalyst Communications

Part of the role and vision of Catalyst in the VCSE sector of Stockton-on-Tees is to function as a connector; an intermediary. Our job is to communicate advances in the sector, developments in strategy, good news, great ideas, funding opportunities and, in general, useful information to the charity sector in Stockton-on-Tees.

In the past year there have been 50 eBulletins being circulated to over 400 people each week. Three Newsletters and one printed Annual Review have been produced and circulated to over 1,000 people. The Catalyst website has been redesigned to be able to accommodate the greater demands now being placed upon it as the key tool for communicating with the VCSE.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view ' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statements below.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

- 5% on cost

Plant and machinery

- 33% on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Revaluation Reserve Fund

The revaluation reserve fund is required by the Companies Act 2006 and represents the amount by which the carrying value of tangible fixed assets exceed their historical cost.

VCSE Capacity Building: a suite of support for the VCSE from the local authority - broken down in discussion with them into the following themes of work

- ULO Development: User-led Organisations Development
- QA Pilot: Offering support to smaller agencies to develop formal quality assurance accreditation
- SBC Investment Fund: funds from local authority to assist organisations through grants or loans to become more competitive in the public sector contract market (now ended for new projects)
- Bursary: support of up to £500 for training or travel to national conferences
- Procurement: assistance, especially for smaller organisations, to effectively operate in the public sector procurement market
- Bid Writing: bespoke support for organisations in their bid writing

- Patient Engagement: Hartlepool & Stockton CCG funding to use Catalyst to improve engagement with individuals and communities around healthcare provision and services

Funds held as agent

In addition to the above, the charity administers funds as agent in respect of a number of projects. Total income and expenditure administered in respect of these projects during the year amounts to £782,000 (2014: £1,083,000) (income) and £559,667 (2014: £0) (expenditure). As the charity acts only as an agent in respect of these projects these amounts do not appear in the statement of financial activities for the year. At 31 March 2015 the charity's balance sheet included cash at bank of £1,498,888 and a related creditor of £1,305,620 in respect of these projects.
