Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 1985.

Easington Lane Community Access Point as a Company Limited by Guarantee (4299792 England & Wales), and a registered charity (1093390).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Our constitution provides for representation from local residents who manage the project for Local people. We have access to advice and information from the Area Community Development Co-coordinator from City of Sunderland. There are 15 seats on the Board (people who have signed up with Companies House) and provision for local people to sit on the board as committee members.

Annual meetings are held and facilitate the presentation of the projects annual reports and Accounts, the election of Directors and the Appointment of the Auditor.

Board members are re-elected on an annual basis by local people based on their performance the previous year. Rigorous attempts are made to recognise skills and commitment to the project through our volunteer, training and youth schemes. At the AGM these people are encouraged to join the Board, which regularly participates in governance training.

Induction and training of new trustees

All Directors are invited and encouraged to attend training sessions. The training covers Legal responsibilities, Individual and Board roles and responsibilities, strategic management and finance planning, employment law, policies and procedures and Quality and Evaluation.

Wider network

We have successful working partnerships with the local primary and secondary schools and also have a representative on the Children's Centre Management partnership.

Our Chairperson is our elected member on the Sunderland Community Voluntary Sector Forum.

A review of the direction of the organisations, and of the risks to which it is exposed is constantly taken at the monthly Board Meetings. The Directors are aware of the threats that the Company faces and have implemented a risk management strategy which reviews the risks that the charity might face, introduce systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified, and following up to ensure that those procedures are implemented.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal objective of the organisation is to promote and create regeneration opportunities in the area and to deliver services to local people such as training, social activities, childcare, youth work and family activities covering a host of areas including health & well-being, confidence building, free access to IT and internet, outdoor activities, local community transport scheme and conference facilities. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

Purposes and aims

Our Charities purposes as set out in the objects contained in the company's memorandum of association are:

- To advance the education of residents of Easington Lane, Hetton, Houghton-le-Spring and surrounding areas in the provision of training and education opportunities with a view to relieving conditions of hardship and unemployment.
- The preservation and protection of good health.
- The improvement and development of public and community facilities with particular reference to environmental issues. Our aims fully reflect the purposes that the charity was set up to further.

We respond to local need and offer a variety of services/amenities such as training, social activities, childcare, youth work and family activities covering a host of areas including health & well-being, confidence building, free access to IT and internet, outdoor activities, local community transport scheme and conference facilities.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We constantly review our aims, objectives and activities and we have rigorous systems of monitoring and evaluation in place. This involves looking at what we have achieved and the outcomes of our work. We look at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to the groups of people we are set up to help. This helps us to ensure our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes.

Who used and benefited from our services

At ELCAP we are committed to fair treatment for everybody, and are against any form of discrimination or ill treatment. We know that in our society people are sometimes treated unfairly. We want to make sure that no one is treated badly because of these things and to make sure that anyone who behaves unfairly towards others is challenged and encouraged to change. This applies to all ELCAP staff, volunteers and people who use our services. Our beneficiaries include social groups such as Senior Citizens, Ladies club and Disabled Club which has strengthened our partnership work with those named in our Related Parties.

Ability to pay fees charged

A small fee is charged for some activities although most are free ensuring no-one is excluded from the opportunity to benefit.

Significant activities

We have been awarded the Silver Quality Assurance award for delivery of Youth Work and opportunities for young people.

A strong presence from Job Linkage has enabled local people to strengthen their skills and further seek employment.

Thanks to Gentoo and volunteers who enabled the 50 year celebration of the Hall this year to be a huge success.

We are a Digital Community, City of Sunderland Digital Challenge Team have funding to develop the facility in our building. We continue to develop the Garden Project.

The Hall has been upgraded and the Wellness equipment is now in the Annex.

A contract has been established at a discounted rate with Muckle LLP, which is a commercial law firm based in Newcastle upon Tyne, in partnership with SVSYF (Sunderland Voluntary Sector Youth Forum) which gives help and support with employment law.

Volunteers

We have helped 13 volunteer drivers to pass their Midas assessment; this enables them to drive our Mini buses. Our existing Community Groups continue to recruit new members - some celebrating being established for over 40 years.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

We are constantly promoting our ethos 'run by local people for local people', this makes it possible for us to continually meet and exceed the targets set by our funders.

ELCAP currently has 19 employees - full time, part time and sessional. We employ our own crèche workers who are all local people. Most of the Youth Development Group targets were exceeded in 2008/09 as follows:

The contact figure of 419 was the highest achieved in comparison with all previous years.

Following on from the YPULSE project, our Youth provision in the area has continued in its development working with the Youth Development Group.

We have received funding from Surestart for our Transport Project and we continue to look at the future sustainability of this essential service that we provide.

This year the Community Transport Project has over 560 new passengers using the mini buses on a regular basis. We continue to train and assess staff and volunteers to a recognised standard to enable them to drive our buses.

We have transported 59 local community groups regularly this year.

ELCAP hosted the End of Urban celebration at the end of June 2008 with over 400 attending.

Internal and external factors

Citywide networking enables us to promote and increase services available at ELCAP.

We continue with our internal funding strategy meetings.

Feedback from funders continues to indicate that partnership and consortia bids will be more effective. Voluntary Sector organisations in the Coalfields have began to work together to identify their strengths, ELCAP Directors have attended these meetings hosted by the Coalfield Forum.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Trustees have assessed the level of Reserves that it feels are necessary to sustain and develop its activities at around £50,000.

This would cover costs for six months. Allowance must be made for funding awarded for 2008/09. The majority of funding is paid contemporaneously with the expenditure to which it relates.

The current level of Reserves is thought to be sufficient, but the Directors are mindful of the need to replenish funding as projects come to an end.

Redundancies

Unfortunately, due to the end of our Urban II funded projects in June 2008 (YPULSE, Lets Go and Driving Force) it has been necessary for 5 members of staff to leave due to redundancy. Costs of this were covered by ELCAP reserves.

Principal funding sources

Details of our current funding sources are available upon written request.

Investment policy and objectives

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charity has the power to make any investment which the Trustees/Directors see fit.

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are a few funds for long term investment.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Board are looking to develop health issues raised and access to services.

The Wellness continues to be successful.

The Sunderland City Council Compact is currently being refreshed, ELCAP have contributed to this by attending various events. We are continuing with our fund raising strategy.

Partnerships continue to be developed with many services continuing to be delivered from our buildings including Job Linkage, Digital Challenge, Childrens Centres, Lifeline, and Sunderland Teaching Primary Care Trust.

FUNDS HELD AS CUSTODIAN FOR OTHERS

Easington Lane Community Access Point received the sum of £380 during the year (2008 - £126) by way of Big Boost Awards on behalf of two beneficiaries. Under the terms of this arrangement, Easington Lane Community Access Point are used as an intermediary for the expenditure to be incurred on behalf of the beneficiaries of the Big Boost Funding. At 31st March 2009, an amount of £3,321 (2008 - £2,941) remained in the Bank Account and is reflected within accruals.

In addition, Easington Lane Community Access Point received the sum of £925 (2008 - £3,113) by way of Christmas Lights donations on behalf of a beneficiary. Under the terms of this arrangement, Easington Lane Community Access Point are used as an intermediary for the expenditure to be incurred on behalf of the beneficiary of the Christmas Lights Funding. At 31st March 2009, an amount of £31 (2008 - £2,996) remained in the Bank Account and is reflected within accruals.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Easington Lane Community Access Point for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 234ZA of the Companies Act 1985) of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make them aware of any audit information and to establish that the charitable company's auditors are aware of that information.

We have audited the financial statements of Easington Lane Community Access Point for the year ended 31 March 2009 on pages seven to fifteen. Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2009

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007), the Companies Act 1985 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has been included in these accounts.

Investment income is included when receivable.

Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. floor areas, per capita or estimated usage as set out in the notes.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

-20% on cost and -15% on cost

Motor vehicles

-25% on reducing balance

Computer equipment

-33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments
