Strategic Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present their strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2023, in compliance with \$414C of the Companies Act 2006.

Achievements and performance

Sports and Leisure committee Due to the news from WDC confirming they would not renew the lease of the Leisure centre attached to the school, all plans to open a swimming pool within the centre were halted. Money which had previously been raised by HPT for the swimming pool over years was voted on and £10,000 of funds were transferred and donated to 4 local primary schools for the use of Laptops for those underprivileged pupils that had no access to a computer during the covid pandemic along with a larger donation to the Cross in Hand School swimming pool. The partnership made another donation to the swimming pool alongside the Parish council, which leaves no funds left in this account.

ICT committee The Partnership recognise the need to update the current website in order be more user friendly and streamlined with the Chamber of Commerce and the Parish council websites, ensuring all three sites are working in conjunction with each other with limited duplication. Funds have been allocated for the redesign of the site and the business has been placed with a local web developer located on the high street and is currently work in progress.

The Partnership website is a hub of local information detailing current activities within the Parish of Heathfield and Waldron. This includes all Businesses and services in the Parish plus all Societies, Groups and clubs. The website incorporates the history of the area and cultural information.

The HPT Facebook page will continue to share and promote local events, activities and news to the local community alongside other local organisations such as the Chamber of Commerce, The Parish Council, Churches Together the Heathfield Rotary and other such organisations.

Inward Investment Committee In previous years the Partnership have been very successful in gaining funding for Inward Investment within the parish and are always looking at ways of securing further funding. With the HPT's charitable status we are able to apply for grants where other local organisations may not be able too, with this in mind HPT wish to partner with these other local organisations in order to aide them to raise such funds where the objective is to be a benefit to the residents and businesses within the town. HPT supply and update annually the tourist information boards located throughout the town, listing all current high street retailers and High Street. Businesses, these are also used for the promotion of local events.

Farmers Market aim is to maintain the success of this outlet for local agriculture and craft produce. To ensure that Health and Safety of all produce is maintained to the highest standards and to continue to promote the marketing with advertising and promotion schemes to surrounding towns and villages to ensure a sustained footfall for the traders. The stall erectors gave the market notice at the beginning of the year and are no longer able to commit to storing or assembling the stalls, the traders now come with their own gazebos and tables. The initial concern was that this may impact on how many stall holders would attend but the change has been successful and has had no impact on the numbers of stall holders attending, in fact the feedback received regarding this recent change is that this in an overall improvement and has improved the overall appearance of the market.

The Local Action Team is joined by representatives from all areas of the Parish. This Police Inspector has always attended these meetings to discuss policing in the parish and has listened to concerns raised by the members. There is a new Police Inspector in post who will be sending a report instead of attending with crime statistics and information, we will be able to discuss the report and respond to the inspector with any concerns. There is some duplication to the CSAG meetings which take place, however the CSAG includes otherwise neighbouring towns and Villages whereas the Local Action team is specifically for Heathfield and Waldron Parish.

Strategic Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

Youth Community Initiative - For the past few years The Partnership Trust has become the Accountable Body to bring together strategic partners (Parish Council, Street Pastors, Churches Together, Rotary, Chamber, Kings Church and the Partnership) in the Parish to try and provide additional activities for the youth, either held at the Youth Centre and also external trips. The partnership wish to raise the profile of the youth within the parish. With the pandemic behind us, and staffing changes within the youth centre finalised we have recently held a meeting and received an update on the youth centre development. The building will be knocked down and rebuilt to a purpose led building. HPT currently hold just under £8000 within the youth community fund and will be working closely with the youth centre team on how they will want to use this money in order to benefit the youth of Heathfield. As a committee we will be supporting the youth centre in finding alternative accommodation for their sessions whilst the building is not in use. There are ongoing discussions with the youth service team to nominate a youth council who will be the voice of the overall youth within the community, these members will have a representative from each year group of senior school.

Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

The Heathfield Partnership Trust is a company limited by guarantee by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is a registered charity with the Charities Commission:

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Trustees are appointed by the Board from the community and those with appropriate experience and skills.

Members of the Executive are those nominated by bodies that are members of the Partnership and support its objectives, plus those offering professional assistance on a voluntary basis.

Induction and training of trustees

On first appointment Trustees are advised of their legal responsibilities by the Company Secretary. Trustees are defacto members of the Partnership Executive and they can attend all meetings of the working committees to acquaint themselves with the work of those committees.

Organisational structure

A Board of Trustees of 7 members, which meets in private session four times a year. In addition there is a public AGM where the Public being served or their representatives are invited to attend. That Board administers the charity and is responsible for the policies and projects and the appointment of the Chairman of the Executive.

There are committees covering the Farmers Market, The Local Action Team Committee dealing with Police liaison and the Youth committee:

A Partnership Co-ordinator is appointed by the Trustees to assist the management of the day to-day operations of the charity, including the Executive and all committees.

Trustees' Report

Relationships with related parties

East Sussex County Council, Wealden District Council, the Heathfield and Waldron Parish Council, the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary, the College and other local voluntary bodies. They provide some of the funding to enable the charity to carry out its charitable objectives. Since the creation of the Heathfield Partnership in 1995, first as a steering Group, then a charity and also a limited Company, the Partnership has ensured that all partners in the Parish act collectively to provide harmony with strategies and who the lead provider should be in each instance. That policy is then supported by all of the institutions in the Parish; no public money is then wasted or clashes of opinions obstruct the objective:

Major risks and management of those risks

The Trust Board considers the risk implications of each running project at each of the quarterly Board meetings. Decisions taken are then summarised for easy access at the conclusion of each meeting. In addition the viability of the Trust is taken as a separate risk assessment item on the agenda every spring meeting. Here the strategic plan is also reviewed along with all of the Trust's policies. Each project currently running is carried as an agenda item at each Board meeting to review progress of possible future developments or directions. The wider wellbeing of the community is also considered with implications regarding the Local Development Plan, the economy of the High Street, opportunities for facilities for citizens in the community and reviewing the activities of strategic partners where the Trust may lend support.

This procedure took place most recently at our Board meeting on the 16 May 2019

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors of The Heathfield Partnership Trust Limited for the purposes of company Iaw) are responsible for preparing the trustees report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources; including its income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- · observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards, comprising FRS 102 have been followed, subject to any material
 departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount hot exceeding £1 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities' Statement of Recommended Practice (applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)) (issued in October 2019); (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of preparation

The Heathfield Partnership Trust Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost of transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes:

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying values of assets held by the charity.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin I published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Income and endowments

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

Investment income

Dividends are recognised once the dividend has been declared and notification has been received of the dividend

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities

Chaitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them:

Grant provisions

Provisions for grants are made when the intention to make a grant has been communicated to the recipient but there is uncertainty about either the timing of the grant or the amount of grant payable.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources; for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £0.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Debtors

Debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the charity-will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

Foreign exchange

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate of exchange at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the balance sheet date are reported at the rates of exchange prevailing at that date.

The results of overseas operations are translated at the average rates of exchange during the period and their balance sheets at the rates ruling at the balance sheet date. Exchange differences arising on translation of the opening net assets and results of overseas operations are reported in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity (attributed to non-controlling interests as appropriate).

Other exchange differences are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which they arise except for:

- 1) exchange differences on transactions entered into to hedge certain foreign currency risks (see above);
- 2) exchange differences arising on gains or losses on non-monetary items which are recognised in other comprehensive income; and
- 3) in the case-of the consolidated financial statements, exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation), which are recognised in other comprehensive income and reported under equity.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.
