

### Structure, governance and management

Design Midlands Limited is a company limited by guarantee with charitable status governed by its memorandum and articles of association. On 1 September 2019 it changed its name from Architecture East Midlands Limited - known as Opun, when it extended its area of operation to cover the whole of the English Midlands. At the same time the West Midlands based charity, Midlands Architecture and the Designed Environment - known as MADE, ceased trading and resolved to transfer its residual funds to the charity. Three of MADE trustees were appointed to the board of Design Midlands to facilitate all mutually agreed arrangements.

### Objectives and activities

The current objectives of the charity are:

The promotion for the public benefit of best practice in the field of urban and rural regeneration and in particular within Midlands (the operating area), and including the promotion for the public benefit of high standards of design and architecture in the built environment within the operating area.

The promotion of education, particularly among those involved in the design, delivery, engagement or funding of regeneration activities within the operating area.

The promotion, operation and/or support of other charitable projects and programmes for the benefit of the community, and particularly those living within the operating area.

Our Mission is to secure its reputation as a charity amongst our clients in the public, private and community sector as well as our strategic partners in promoting best practice in design and quality in the built environment.

At the launch of the charity's changes in September 2019 Chief Executive Julie Tanner said: "We are delighted to have completed the merger of our two organisations. Opun and MADE have had an enormous impact in their individual areas but we are excited to bring both together under the Design:Midlands umbrella in the form of a new charity bringing together the best specialist design expertise in the Midlands."

Chair of Design:Midlands Gary Hunt, said: "The government has put a renewed emphasis on design and place making uplift, our role in providing independent scrutiny will help to navigate the best outcomes not only in recognising the climate emergency we now find ourselves in, but also in ensuring we leave a proper legacy for our Midlands communities."

### Strategic report

The following sections for achievements and performance and financial review form the strategic report of the charity.

### Achievements and performance

Design: Midlands Limited services focus on design quality, sustainability, neighbourhood/community consultation and arts/cultural sector engagement for public benefit.

### The Design Support Service

Design Review Panels draw participation from over 50 design and built environment specialists. They sit up to three times a month offering targeted, chargeable bespoke services of Design Review, Desktop Review, Walk and Talk and design support/enabling. Demand has centred primarily but not exclusively on large housing schemes and single dwellings in the countryside, and our contribution to place making has been received well in helping shape masterplans and layouts at the pre-planning stages of the determination process. As such, Building for Life 12 has also provided a method of supporting design uplift and we offer that service to the housebuilding community as well as local authorities.

### Design in The Community

Where we tailored any product to help communities engage with the planning process from inviting community representatives to Design Review Panels to identifying specialists to engage with community groups in preparing evidence for Neighbourhood Plans where communities may need support to capture the best quality outcomes for their areas;

### \*Training

In the year we have continued to hold a number of successful training events, noting that demand has increased for in-house bespoke training that meet individual needs, and such delivery has included:

- \* Urban Design Member training
- \* Panel Training
- \* Private Sector Training
- \* Local authority training

Each of Design:Midlands Limited products is measured by at least one Key Performance Indicator (KPI). The Design:Midlands website has been launched and refreshed to highlight case studies but also to make booking design review easier and more transparent. The Panel terms of reference are available as is the list of many of our Panel experts. Design:Midlands Limited uses its website to keep partners and potential clients in touch with our progress. During the year we used it as a platform to generate interest and income from events and tool kits through links with other social media.

### Financial review

### **Performance**

The total turnover of the charity for the year has reduced from £156k to £92k as it focussed resources on organisational change. The financial strategy continued to be the diversification income sources. Funds were received from individual local authorities and public authorities for specific neighbourhood and community projects. The private sector support has replaced government grants through increased contributions to design reviews.

Operating expenditure reduced from £139k to £100k but a further £13k was invested in the process of organisational development. Following the trading cessation of MADE £23k was transferred into the charity's reserves. All financial and operational risks are reviewed by the board.

### Reserves

The free reserves position at the year-end has marginally increased by £2k from £39k to £41k. This is now above the minimum level set by trustees enabling continued investment in new products and services.

### Year ended 31 March 2020

### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is South Annex, PERA Business Park, Nottingham Road, Melton Mowbray, Leicestershire, LE13 0PB.

### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

### 3. Accounting policies

### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

### Disclosure exemptions

(a) No cash flow statement has been presented for the company.

### Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this
  is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost
  to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are
  recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured.
  No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

### Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

### Financial instruments (continued)

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

### 4. Limited by guarantee

The company is a limited by guarantee with members being required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 in the event of the company being wound up.
