1 Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

1 2 Compliance with accounting standards

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), which have been applied consistently (except as otherwise stated)

1.3 Turnover

Turnover represents the fair value of services provided under contracts with customers to the extent that there is a right to consideration. It is measured at the fair value of the consideration due. Where a service is incomplete at the year-end, turnover represents the value of the service provided to that date based on an appropriate proportion of the total expected consideration at completion.

Invoices are not raised until a contract is complete so the value of incomplete services is included as Amounts recoverable on contracts in the balance sheet

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

25% - 33% straight line

1.5 Stock and work in progress

Work in progress is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises all costs in bringing the finished products to their present location and condition. Net realisable value is calculated as the selling price of the finished product less any costs to completion.

16 Long term contracts

Amounts recoverable on long term contracts, which are included in debtors, are stated at the net sales value of the work done after provision for contingencies and anticipated future losses on contracts, less amounts received as progress payments on account Excess progress payments are included in creditors as payments on account

Community Energy Solutions (CES) became a community interest company on the 30th March 2006. This report covers the financial year 1st April 2012 to 31st March 2013

The activities of its subsidiaries, CES Yorkshire and Humber, CES North East and Domestic Energy Solutions (t/a GoWarm) are now all managed under the single organisation of the parent company, CES Dormant company accounts are being filed for these subsidiaries

CES has continued to deliver projects which tackle the principle causes of fuel poverty – energy inefficient housing, lack of access to mains gas and limited household income—to better enable people to afford to keep warm. Poorly heated homes have an adverse effect upon the health and well being of those living in them, increasing the incidents of cold related illness and deaths.

Our work also improves the local environment for people by reducing pollution and emissions and introducing renewable and sustainable energy usage. In most cases work is free of charge for people who are in fuel poverty. If possible, grants are offered to other householders. Additional benefits include employment opportunities for local people.

By pooling the resources of funding organisations and delivery partners, CES has, delivered cost effective energy efficiency and affordable warmth measures in urban and rural communities, continued to deliver its fuel poverty alleviation projects through the volume installations of microrenewables, particularly air source heat pumps; and through the extension of the gas network into low income communities providing the opportunity for efficient central heating to be installed

- This year, under its GoWarm brand, CES delivered CESP measures, primarily external wall insulation and heating systems, to over 2,000 homes in Stockton and Middlesbrough on behalf of CESP obligated partners, Eggborough Power, Eon Energy Services and Drax Power
- We are now engaged in delivering ECO insulation and heating measures, working with obligated partners to build on the success of CESP
- GoWarm, has a highly successful, proven track record of delivering area-based CERT and CESP programmes in 26 local authority areas across the country

CES has continued to demonstrate effectiveness in helping households access affordable warmth in deprived areas off the gas network through the strong relationships formed with key partners

- Gas Network extensions and connections
 - Aimed at the most deprived communities, a scheme in partnership with Northern Gas Networks provides financial assistance to extend the gas network CES facilitates community engagement and installation of thermal insulation measures and heating systems together with energy efficiency and welfare benefits advice. We are preparing for an increase in delivery from a targeted 750 to 1,500 gas connections each year
- Heat Pumps

A leading company in this field, we have installed almost 100 within the year 2013 is already lining up to become one of the most successful years to date and we hope this will help more households off the gas network obtain affordable warmth with reduced heating costs from more advanced and efficient heating systems

- MCS
 - CES has become a certified installer for solar PV and heat pump through the Micro Certification Scheme
- RHPP Communities scheme

CES successfully applied and obtained funding for four schemes We are aiming to install over 100 renewable energy systems, including biomass, heat pumps and solar thermal, with the funding we have received from DECC

Heat Storage

We were also successfully in obtaining project funding from DECC, we created a partnership with Newcastle and Northumberland Universities to test a number of different phase change materials in their ability to store and discharge heat. The primary use of the material would be within a domestic heating system with the purpose of storing heat which could be used within peak energy use times. The project was a success and the outcomes reported back to DECC.

Since December 2012 Government incentives, Warm Front, CERT and CESP have come to an end These have been succeeded by a new single scheme, the Energy Company Obligation (ECO) The funding from this scheme will be vital to support vulnerable households obtain heating works once a gas connection has taken place We are still in the process of agreeing solutions to establish effective delivery

CES projects provide services to the general public and are built upon working partnerships with stakeholders ranging from corporate organisations and public bodies, to community, voluntary and charity groups
