Report of the Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2021

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, present their report and their financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2021. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102 applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (second edition October 2019).

Objectives, Activities and Public Benefit

The charity's objects and its principal activities are to work towards the elimination of all forms of discrimination on the grounds of race, gender, disability, sexual orientation or religion and to provide awareness education and to promote activities which foster understanding between people of diverse backgrounds in order to cultivate good community relations, which is considered by the trustees to be a defined public benefit under the Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011.

This is achieved by carrying out a work program in the following areas:

To provide an effective service to individual complainants of discrimination using all equality enactments. To tackle direct and institutional discrimination, undertaking policy and practice development, with employers and service providers.

To aid the victims of Institutional Discrimination in the area of Immigration and Nationality Law.

To help provide an efficient service to victims of hate incidents, attacks and abuse working on a multi - agency basis in Northamptonshire.

To undertake public legal education.

The Northamptonshire Rights Equality Council could not operate without the help and time given by unpaid volunteers and the Board recognise the invaluable assistance this makes in furthering the aims of the charity.

Achievements and Performance

The trustees consider that the performance of the charity this year has been satisfactory. Highlights of the work done by the charity during the year include:

Produced six videos with local poets and young people to commemorate Stephen Lawrence Day which were viewed 656 times.

Commemorated Windrush Day with a watch party event and the release of a new short film featuring Roger Robinson's Poem, "Citizen 1" Which has had 109 views.

Developed three short films to raise awareness of pregnancy and maternity discrimination on the themes of working during pregnancy, maternity leave and dismissal which have had collectively 168 views.

Developed two films and an online event over hate crime week with 46 online participants. The event was undertaken in collaboration with Support Northamptonshire and was filmed and has had 70 views

Hosted an event focusing on Stop and Search in Northamptonshire. This event was recorded and has since had 168 views.

Supported Black Lives Matters demonstrations in Northampton, Wellingborough, Kettering, Corby and Higham Ferrers which involved over 1200 participants.

The organization developed and published a Nine point plan to take forward the Black Lives Matter movement's call for action.

Undertook an event in collaboration with Northampton Hope Centre featuring Tre Ventour facilitating a poetry event exploring race, poverty and disproportionality.

For the period 2020/2021 13 cases were opened and closed, and six cases currently remain open.

It was agreed in January 2021 that a higher donation percentage would be asked from Clients who are successfully represented by NREC to achieve a financial settlement from the original 10% to 20% of what is achieved during the settlement.

NREC Represented in one full two day hearing by video conference but was unsuccessful in winning that case.

Three Case Management Discussions were attended by telephone conference.

One Preliminary Hearing was attended by video conference, and another was attended by telephone conference.

Immigration service restarted in June 2021 with two workers registered to undertake OISC Level One Immigration, and Level One Refugee and Asylum.

There were 11 appointment visits to NREC office during this period.

112 enquiries were received and responded to, most were received by telephone enquiries from potential clients, or email. Of these enquiries 13 became clients with opened cases. Of these 112 enquiries it was recorded that 81 were from women, and 32 were from men. 62 enquiries were from Northampton, 16 from Wellingborough, 2 from Daventry, 9 from Kettering, and 3 from Corby and 2 from East Northants.

15 enquiries were in relation to racial discrimination, 16 were in relation to disability, 6 were in relation to pregnancy, 1 was religion and belief, 3 were sexual harassment, 2 were sexual orientation, 2 were enquiries about unfair dismissal, 64 were for advice about legal processes, policies, or procedures, 2 for immigration and 1 for whistleblowing.

Subject to funding the charity aims to deliver the same benefit to the community in the coming year.

Financial Review

The Statement of Financial Activities shows net income for the year of £20,584. The reserves at the end of the accounting period stand at £60,771 in total, of which £31,487 relate to unrestricted funds.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document
The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee, and is therefore governed by articles of association, latest version 16.07.2012.

Organisation
The charity is organised so that that the trustees meet regularly to manage its affairs. There was a full time Chief Executive who managed the day to day administration of the charity, organised fund-raising initiatives and deaft with the objects and principal activities of the charity in conjunction with other members of staff. This post was made redundant on 31.12.2018 and its function shared between part time staff and unpaid board members from 01.01.2019 onwards.

The Board comprises 12 persons elected by ballot by the company at its Annual General Meeting and up to another 5 persons may be co-opted by the board itself, including representatives from any sub committees that are from time to time in existence. The elected members of the Board are chosen by means of a secret ballot at the Annual General Meeting or by postal ballot immediately prior to the Annual General Meeting of the company. One third of the elected members are chosen this way every year. They serve for three years and at the conclusion of the third Annual General Meeting after their election they are required to resign. They are however eligible to stand for re-election at that same Annual General Meeting.

For the purposes of enabling the Board to fulfil its functions more effectively the Board may during each year co-opt persons to serve as members of the Board until the next Annual General Meeting .

The nominees of one or more local authorities to the Board serve for one year from the time of their appointment and are eligible for re-appointment if the local authority so wishes. The local authorities may at any time replace one or more of their nominees.

Board decisions are made by the vote of the majority of the members of the Board present and voting at any given Board Meeting. The quorum for the meetings is three directors present and able to vote. Co-optees who are members of the company are voting members of the Board, Co-optees who are not members of the company have the right to speak but not to vote at the meetings of the Board.

Investment Policy

The charity has no investments except its bank balance which earned no interest. The Unity Trust Bank was chosen by the Board as being the most appropriate bank since its ethical values and goals are congruent with the ethos of the charity.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately 3 months' expenditure, together with the sum needed to cover potential redundancy costs of employees should funding lines significantly reduce. This provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs. The charity aims to maintain funds at this level throughout the year. Unrestricted Funds are £31,487 at 31.03.2021 which is less than one year of expenses.

Directors and trustees

All directors of the company are also trustees of the charity, and there are no other trustees. All of the trustees named on page 4 served throughout the period unless otherwise stated.

The Board has the power to appoint up to six persons as co-opted trustees as it considers fit to do so.

Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

The trustees are required by company law to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the charity and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and with applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Small company rules

Notes to the Accounts For the year ended 31 March 2021

1. Accounting policies

1,1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and also in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102 applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland.

1.2 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that future funding will be available. At the date of signing of the accounts certain grant providers have not indicated the level of funding for the next 12 months. If significant material grants are not forthcoming at their renegotiation and renewal dates nor replacement funding found there could be significant concern about the appropriateness of the going concern assumption underlying the preparation of the accounts.

1.3 Fund accounting

Income and expenditure is allocated between funds in the Statement of Financial Activities Income and Expenditure Account as follows:-

Restricted funds where the donor has restricted the way in which the income can be spent.

Unrestricted funds where the donor has made no stipulation in the way the income is spent and where the charity may use funds in any way it sees fit in order to pursue its charitable objectives.

Designated funds where unrestricted funds have been earmarked by the Board for a particular charitable purpose.

1.4 Incoming resources

Voluntary income and donations are included in incoming resources when they are receivable except when donors' conditions have not been fulfilled, then the income is deferred. The income from fund-raising ventures is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fund-raising costs.

Grants for capital items are released to revenue over the period of the life of the assets to which the grants relate. Deferred grant income is carried forward at the balance sheet date equivalent to the net book value of the related asset.

1.5 Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in these cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of these resources .

1.6 Pension costs-defined contribution schemes

Contributions made are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they become payable. All pensions are paid to independent pension providers where the pension fund assets are administered separately from the company.

1.7 Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:

Computer equipment 33

33.33% straight line basis

1.8 Charitable activities

These include the direct salary, national insurance and pension costs involved in the employment of members of staff who within their various fields of competence and experience deliver front line advice and training on discrimination and associated matters.

1.9 Charitable activities - governance

This includes independent examination fees.

1.10 Charitable activities - indirect support costs

Indirect Support Costs include all expenditure not directly related to the charitable activity or fund-raising ventures. This includes costs of running office premises staff salaries for administrative staff and depreciation.

1.11 Voluntary work and services received

The charity benefits from the many thousands of voluntary hours and unclaimed out of pocket expenses contributed by a large number of supporters. It would be impossible to place a value on all these gifts in kind, without which much of the work undertaken by the charity could not be achieved.
