The Cedarwood Trust Report of the Directors/Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2011

Structure, Governance and Management

Organisation of the Charity

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee and its governing document is its memorandum and articles of association

The Charity operates through its Board of Trustees (who are also directors for the purpose of the Companies Act) The Trustees have delegated the day to day management of the Charity to the Project Leader, the Rev'd Canon D C Peel, who is also the Company Secretary

Trustees

Details of all the Trustees who have served throughout the year are given on page one of this report. New Trustees are recruited by existing Trustees and appointed by election by the Board. The Board ensures that Trustees have an understanding of good governance.

Objectives and Activities of the Company

The Charity is a pastoral care organisation, set up in 1980 jointly by Newcastle (Church of England) Diocese and North Tyneside Council The objective of the Charity is to promote the well-being of the inhabitants of the Meadow Well Estate, North Shields

Risk management

The Trustees are responsible for identifying and managing major risks to which the company is exposed. The established procedure for reviewing risks is through Board meetings, and policies for managing risks are carried out by Trustees, and on a day to day basis by the Project Leader.

Achievements and Performance

Meadow Well's community is amongst the 1 5% most deprived in the country, and Cedarwood has served local people for more than thirty-one years in many different ways. Visitors to the drop-in find a welcome and the opportunity to use other facilities and services, some provided by Cedarwood, some by other organisations. The former include a parents' group and a bingo session, both of which follow on from drop-in sessions, and a volunteer hairdresser. The latter include the monthly presence of a finance specialist from North Tyneside Council, who gives advice and help in matters concerned with Housing Benefit and Council Tax, twice weekly councillor's 'surgeries', and Citizens' Advice Bureau sessions, these were monthly, but since 7th November 2011, thanks to a grant from the Church Urban Fund, they have been increased in frequency to weekly. The drop-in also serves as a credit union collection point, thereby helping people to save and to make the best possible use of very limited resources.

The Cedarwood Trust Report of the Directors/Trustees (continued) for the Year Ended 31 August 2011

Services provided directly by Cedarwood included supporting forty-two suppliants at incapacity-related benefit tribunals, thereby helping them to gain £208,468 to which they were entitled (these figures are lower than the equivalent ones for last year because of the increased contribution of the Citizens' Advice Bureau), supporting at the County Court and speaking for fourteen tenants to whom had been issued repossession orders, in each case achieving a suspension of the order and thereby preventing twenty-two adults and sixteen children from being made homeless, successfully seeking charitable grants for twelve individuals, in the form of white goods and money, and visiting or otherwise supporting thirteen people in prison, and in some cases their families

Cedarwood is not target-driven. Workers' starting point is being alongside local residents in the ordinariness of life, and responding to situations as they arise. Doing this involves developing a family-type feeling about the many relationships that are formed – indeed, for some people workers become quasi-family. I wish you were my mother', said a woman to a worker, 'Best dad in the world' says a prisoner of another. This transference usually comes about because the people concerned have had really difficult childhoods, and perhaps been subject to abuse. This is certainly the case with virtually all the people Cedarwood knows who have received long prison sentences.

Cedarwood has continued to contribute to the work of Church Action on Poverty, the national ecumenical campaigning organisation set up in the early eighties. This year workers helped to arrange and lead a series of three seminars focused on *The Spirit Level* (Wilkinson and Pickett, Penguin, 2010), which argues, on the basis of many statistics, that social problems affect all levels of society most in countries where the difference between the highest and the lowest incomes is greatest, on this basis, the UK is one the worst of about two dozen western-type nations. The seminars were hosted by, and arranged in conjunction with, Shepherds Dene, the Newcastle and Durham dioceses' retreat house.

During the year Cedarwood was pleased to welcome on placement two social work students at the University of Northumbria, Suzannah Lui and Hannah Brough

The trustees were pleased and grateful to be granted £103,298 by the Henry Smith Charity This money will be used to fund the Team Leader post, Newcastle Diocese being unable to do so after September 2011 (the title is being changed from Project Leader)

The trustees are grateful to several people who have helped in the background the teams' work consultants, Tom Friend, John Sadler, Carol Wark and Alan Weatherley, Mary Kelly, always ready with informed advice, and Alan Wolf, who handles applications to H M Revenue and Customs for Gift Aid repayment

No trustee during the year in question had any family or comparable relationship with any other trustee, and no employee of the Trust had any family or comparable relationship with another employee or with a trustee

The Cedarwood Trust Report of the Directors/Trustees (continued) for the Year Ended 31 August 2011

Financial Review and Acknowledgements

In the current economic climate, Cedarwood has struggled to replace some key grant funding, especially in respect of salaries, and has ended the financial year in deficit, partly due to replacing some funding with unsecured loans from individuals. The trustees have had to monitor the situation closely and although redundancies have been avoided to date, they will become unavoidable if funds are not obtained very soon. In the current financial year a post has become vacant on retirement and will remain unfilled until further funding can be obtained.

More positively, replacement funding has been granted for the post of team leader, as the longterm funding for the present project leader has now ceased, and the trustees are extremely grateful to David Peel for continuing to work on a voluntary basis until the new team leader is in place. Funding for core expenses is also in place for one more year and this means that the organisation can continue to function whilst more funds are sought.

The Trust gratefully acknowledges the receipt of financial support from the Joseph Strong Frazer Trust, the RW Mann Trust, Newcastle Diocesan Board of Finance, North Tyneside Council, the Institute of Our Lady of Mercy, the Willan Charitable Trust, the Hospital of God at Greatham, the William Leech Charity, the Souter Trust, the Joicey Trust, Church Action on Poverty, the Proctor and Gamble Employee Charitable Fund, the Freemasons of Northumberland and the Tudor Trust Grants were received for particular individuals from the Frank Buttle Trust, and Greggs Trust, and several personal donors provided help for individuals, mostly in kind Donations were received from nineteen churches and church groups, and from many individuals, some by standing order and with regard to a majority of which the Trust was able to recover income tax from H M Revenue and Customs under the Gift Aid scheme. At Christmas, St Andrew's, Benton, St Gabriel's, Heaton and St John's, Longhirst, provided gifts for distribution to all the children known to Cedarwood's workers. To all these organisations and people, many thanks

I have examined the financial statements on pages seven to thirteen, which have been prepared under the historical cost convention (as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets) and the accounting policies set out on page eight

Respective responsibilities of the Directors / Trustees and examiners

As described on page five the Directors are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2011 set out on pages seven to thirteen and you consider that the company is exempt from an audit. The charities Trustees further consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011) and that an independent examination is needed

Basis of Independent examiners' statement

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

1

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2008), and Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) Accounting and Reporting by Charities published in 2005

Fund accounting

The Charity maintained various types of funds as follows

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent grants, donations and legacies received which the donor has allocated for specific purposes

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds represent unrestricted income that is expendable at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity

Incoming resources

Grants

Grants and legacies have been recognised when the Charity is notified of its legal entitlement, the amount due is quantifiable and its ultimate receipt is confirmed

Donations

Donations and all other receipts from fundraising are reported gross and the related fundraising costs are reported in other expenditure

Gifts in kind and donated goods and facilities

Donated facilities have been included at their estimated value and the corresponding expenditure included under the appropriate heading. Where there was no financial cost borne by another party for the provision of donated facilities (including donated services) then no income has been recognised.

Resources expended

The cost of generating funds and governance costs are derived by adding the cost of staff-time expended on these activities to direct costs associated with them. All other costs are incurred in charitable activities.

Fixed Assets

Leasehold Improvements are stated at cost and are depreciated over the life of the 25 year lease

Fixtures, fittings and office equipment are recorded at cost and are depreciated over 4 years in the case of IT equipment, and over 10 years in other cases

Pension Costs

The charity contributed to a defined contribution scheme on behalf of employees who have chosen to join the scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity for the year
