Structure, governance and management

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee, and is therefore governed by a memorandum and articles of association

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees, who are also directors for the purpose of company law are known as the executive committee under the company's Articles. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the executive committee are elected to serve for a period of two years. They may be elected for a second period of two years, up to a maximum of four years.

Five trustees are elected by postal ballot of the members. The trustees may co-opt two further trustees and the trustees can also appoint a trustee to act as Treasurer. Trustees are required to be members of the Association with the exception of the trustee acting as Treasurer.

Members of the Association fall into the following categories

Founder members - Those who attended the inaugural general assembly of the unincorporated association on 14 January 1989

Ordinary members - Eligible by possession of a doctoral degree or equivalent

Honorary members - Distinguished scholars selected by trustees

Associate members - Those who do not meet the criteria for ordinary membership but are actively involved in the pursuit of social anthropology. Associate members cannot stand for election as trustees or vote in election for trustees.

Student members - those engaged at doctorate level study of anthropology within Europe

None of the members of the executive committee has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the members of the executive committee are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2011

The Charity is organised so that the directors meet regularly to manage its affairs

The directors are members of the executive committee and responsible for any decision making, the Administrators are responsible for the day to day transactions as well as the organisation of the bi-ennial conference

The executive committee have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks

Objectives and activities

The Charity's objects and principal activities are to -

Advance the education of the public in social anthropology in particular but not excusively by

- (a) promoting, undertaking and supporting research and publishing the useful results thereof,
- (b) organising conferences, symposia, workshops and other like events,
- (c) supporting and funding networks of scholars (known as scholarly networks) who are advancing the education of the public in the same, i.e. social anthropology

Anthropology is the study of the origins of human beings and their cultures worldwide. Social anthropology is that branch of anthropology that deals with human culture and society.

The executive committee have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake

Achievements and performance

A principle activity of EASA is to organize a major international conference devoted to anthropology once every two years. This is the largest gathering of social anthropologists outside North America, and is growing steadily on each occasion that it is held. In 2011, preparations were in-train for the bi-ennial conference in Paris, which took place in June 2012. The full programme for this event is still on-line and can be freely accessed at http://www.easaonline.org/conferences/easa2012/. The regular 2011 AGM took place at the French Institute in Athens, October 7 2011 with a keynote address by Antonius Robben, University of Utrecht.

In addition, EASA publishes a scholarly journal Social Anthropology, which is produced and distributed on our behalf by Wiley Blackwell Publishers Ltd, issued four times a year. This consists of original research articles and book reviews. Its home page may be visited at http://www.easaonline.org/journal.htm

A further activity of EASA is to encourage the formation of networks devoted to specific aspects of anthropological research, practice and theory Information on these may be found at http://www.easaonline.org/networks/

Finally, when asked by members, the EASA Executive may lobby on behalf of anthropology and its recognition within scholarly research funding programmes, such as those sponsored by the European Union

Financial review

EASA's income is generated through membership subscriptions, which are collected annually, through conference fees, and to a lesser extent by grants. The only regular grant contributor is the Wenner-Gren Foundation in New York. The journal makes a small positive contribution through Wiley-Blackwell obtaining institutional library subscriptions, but under the present economic circumstances it is possible that this will move to a break-even position after editorial, printing and distribution costs are taken into account. The administration of EASA is undertaken by a professional anthropological administrator NomadIT and EASA itself employs no staff, and owns or rents no building. The Trustees draw no money other than travel expenses at cost to attend meetings, which are usually held twice or three times during the year. It is the opinion of the Trustees that this efficient business model enables EASA to be run for the net benefit of anthropology more widely, and that the Association is financially in a sound position to meet any economic downturn

EASA is a comparatively young organisation when compared with its two largest western counterparts, the American Anthropological Association, and the Royal Anthropological Institute. It has no building, and no assets other than the cash savings in its bank accounts, which double as a reserve. At a minimum, these are set at the cost of one major conference should it fail, and the cost of employing a back-up staff should NomadIT for any reason no longer be available to administer the association.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2011

Funds surplus to the everyday running of the charity are invested in savings accounts and fixed term deposits with ethical banks. It is regarded as being prudent to continue to make a small annual surplus, and reinvest the remainder in anthropological activities such as conference grants, activity grants to networks, and a book prize competition. No equities or investments are held other than the cash deposits. This position is prudently defensive in the current difficult economic climate.

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NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2011

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

1.2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations, membership subscriptions and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable

Investment income is included when receivable

Incoming resources from grants, conferences and workshops are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance. This could result in income from the bi-ennial conferences being deferred until the conference takes place.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis inclusive of any VAT

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the company

As the Charity is under the audit thresholds the charitable expenditure detailed in the notes is by resource classification

14 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources

1.5 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.
