#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Charitable Objects**

- (i) to maintain, improve or provide public amenities
- (ii) to promote for the public benefit the Watchtree site in Cumbria and its environs, in particular by associating local community organizations in a common effort to advance education, to relieve poverty, need and hardship to provide facilities for leisure time occupation in the interests of social welfare, and to conserve and improve the environment.

#### Activities undertaken for the Public Benefit

In planning the activities for the year the Trustees had regard to the guidance on Public Benefit issued by the Charities Commission, activities included:-

Developing Watchtree Nature Reserve as a local community asset managed for and by local people in co-operation with the site owners (Defra) and their Facility Management Company (Interserve) who manage the "Operational" aspect of the FMD carcass disposal site.

The provision of public access and quiet enjoyment of the site and its wildlife by people of all ages and abilities

Provide opportunities for local school and education establishments to use the site for curriculum related studies.

Manage and maintain the created habitats as set out in the habitat establishment plan

Recruiting volunteers to help with the running of the site and its management.

## WATCHTREE NATURE RESERVE Ltd – Annual Report for year 2014-2015 (1st April 2014 to 31st March 2015)

On behalf of the Directors of WNR LTD I am pleased to present my tenth annual report on the work and progress of Watchtree Nature Reserve Ltd.

Watchtree has undergone a remarkable transformation since it was created in 2002 on the former Great Orton wartime airfield (1942) and Foot and Mouth disease carcass disposal site (2001) between those years much of the land was in intensive agricultural use. Given the incredible upheaval the land has endured it is the more remarkable that in just 12 short years it has become a diverse wildlife habitat of some importance in the area and a significant visitor attraction. Notwithstanding that the site is still 'operational' and we continue work alongside Defra's facility managers to achieve this transformation.

Perhaps our main achievement is marrying the wildlife interest with an equally diverse public use of Watchtree. We have over the years encouraged people to use the site and there is no doubt in my mind that public use has had no discernible impact on the wildlife.

Our visitor numbers continue to grow with a total recorded 14,536, which is similar to the figure reported for the previous year. That total comprised:

General Visitors....... 33%

Cyclists ....... 33%

Under 16's ....... 28%

Schools/Education...... 6%

**Watchtree Wheelers** has improved both in the number of people using the facility and the funding which the project has attracted to the reserve. Notably Watchtree celebrated the opening of the new cycle track and training facilities on the 6<sup>th</sup> of August 2014, the event was attended by approximately 500 people including Paralympian Karen Darke and many local dignitaries.

**Schools** made extensive use of Watchtree and the site offers all that any teacher needs to fulfil current curriculum needs from nursery through to 6<sup>th</sup> form studies. At the higher education level we continued to offer Watchtree as a site with much potential for course related studies.

**The Membership** scheme continues to grow and the total number of members in 2014/15 was 142. This consisted of 96 families, 38 individuals and 8 groups. Financially the membership scheme is worth in excess of £3000 and is set for considerable increase in 2015/16.

**Volunteers** continued to provide an invaluable contribution. The Estate and Habitat management team achieved a remarkable work programme doing all but those jobs that need machinery. Wheelers too relies heavily on a core of well-trained people. Visitor reception is becoming ever reliant on volunteers. I thank them all because we could not function without them.

Access for all at Watchtree has become a keystone of our success as a place where anyone of any ability can explore 'Garden Linx' project demonstrates. With European Social Finding through the WEA our Nature Reserve Manager developed a special project for people 'furthest away from the workplace'.

The Nature Reserve has developed into an important wildlife resource and now has the benefit of 10 years of monitoring of Birds, Butterflies, Moths, Odonata, Bats, Amphibians and grasslands. It is a site record that would be the envy of any nature reserve manager. The surveys are informing our management and management plan objectives. We see some birds moving as the new plantations develop and the woodland structure changes. New moth species are recorded every year. However, we are well aware that the original objective for the grasslands is going to take decades to achieve. Woodland plantations are at a stage where we perhaps need to commence management and to consider if they can be managed to yield a small income without compromising the invertebrate fauna. Unfortunately Grey Squirrels have come in, which was not unexpected given how they have colonised surrounding woodlands. We coordinate culling them in conjunction with the Solway area Red Squirrel group who meet at Watchtree. We remain hopeful that one day Red Squirrels will take up residence.

Our iconic mammal the Brown Hare continues to maintain a strong population as does our treasured amphibian the Great Crested Newt. The Dingy Skipper butterfly continues to thrive and our captive bred Marsh Fritillary butterflies provide Butterfly Conservation and Natural England with a public focus, along with nearby Finglandrigg Wood NNR for the habitat conservation and reintroduction programme of this very rare butterfly. We have now recorded 116 species of bird at Watchtree and were delighted to see Reed Warbler back for a second year but our Starling 'murmuration' during the autumn was the key attraction with over 20,000 coming to roost, a spectacle many of our visitors marvelled at.

**Future Strategy** Our Defra funding ends in March 2016 and with day to day running costs far exceeding income, despite the many generous donations the Directors were challenged to make some far reaching and unfortunate decisions during the year. After a long and exhaustive review their decision was that we had little alternative but to cut staffing costs. The outcome was that we decided to create a single new post of Access and Recreation officer to reflect the fact that this is our main income area. After due process our Nature Reserve Manager Tim Lawrence was the staff member who left as we re-focus on wider public access to Watchtree. Tim has given Watchtree almost nine years of dedicated service and we wish him well for the future. We shall be redeveloping our educational service, opening hours, nature reserve management and public access. If we are to maintain seven days a week opening we shall need more volunteers to help with visitor reception and admin duties.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Policy on Reserves

The Trustees have agreed that any excess funds should be set aside in interest bearing accounts to build up reserves for when the funding from DEFRA ceases in March, 2016.

As far as possible the Watchtree Wheelers project is independent of the Defra contract funding and relies on various conventional fund raising. Some of the "Reserve Income" may be used as matched funding against this and other initiatives that the Trustees are developing.

£105,230 is invested in a Guaranteed Investment Account with the Co-operative Bank which will be reviewed every 6 months.

£102,293 is invested in a 40 day notice account with Cumberland Building Society.

#### INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF

#### WATCHTREE NATURE RESERVE LIMITED

We report on the accounts of the Trust for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2015 which are set out on pages 1 to 8. Charity No. 1127029.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the Accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.
