We will operate without allegiance to any political party while promoting, vigorously, policies that are consistent with the Statement of Principles to all political parties and the government of the day

We are pleased to present our report together with the independently examined financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2007

Legal and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, including the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company, established on 4 May 2005 and registered as a charity on 11 August 2005. The charity was established under a Memorandum, and Articles of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charity, and under which it is governed.

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of members is limited to £1 per member in the event of a winding up

Management and governance arrangements

The directors of the charitable company are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the Trustees

The Articles of Association provide for a minimum of three trustees and no maximum. The charity currently has a complement of nine trustees. Requirements for new trustees are identified and appointed by the remaining trustees. The chair of the trustees is responsible for the induction of new trustees, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, and the work of the charity

Related parties

The Trust works with various other charitable and not for profit organisations in the furtherance of its objectives. Amongst these are the following

Sr Maureen Tinkler represents The Vincentian Millennium Partnership (VMP) We run some McKenzie Friends courses jointly with VMP

Matthew Davies represents A T D Fourth World Limited (ATD), a charity with objects surrounding poverty relief. We collaborate with ATD on projects relating to the furtherance of both charities' objects.

Objectives and activities

The principal objects of the charity are

- The relief of financial need of people throughout the world who, by virtue of their circumstances, are in debt, in need of advice or are deprived of housing, food, heating, clothing and any other necessities required for healthy living, in collaboration with them
- The advancement of the education of the public, particularly but not exclusively, by promoting or
 assisting in the promotion of research or study into the religious philosophy of the Christian
 religion and its spiritual traditions in contemporary society particularly as far as its teachings reflect
 or are relevant in the context of the social political and economic circumstances of nations
 throughout the world and to publish the useful results of such research
- The advancement of the Christian religion

Procedures and policy for grant making

Our policy is to give small grants to families and individuals experiencing poverty beyond the scope of State Benefits from our Relief of Poverty Fund, for which we raise money Grants are given at the Chairman's discretion and the trustees are kept informed

Activities, achievements and performance

2007 was the year in which the Trust moved from ten years working as volunteers supporting vulnerable and impoverished debtors to obtaining the funding for an office, a lawyer and an administrator £107,000 a year was raised, the John Ellerman Foundation allowing us to employ Mandy Platt as an administrator/case worker for three years and the City Parochial Foundation funding Alan Murdie LL B, Barrister for two We moved into the office in 28 Ebury Street, Victoria with the help of the Westminster Foundation The Wates Foundation, The John Paul Getty Jr Charitable Trust, the Vintners and Mercers Companies and other charities provided essential core funding

Our work expanded to capacity in the three areas necessary to provide a service to vulnerable and impoverished debtors, we take cases, train volunteer McKenzie Friends and lobby parliament

During the year we started receiving cases from Andy Love MP for Edmonton, at the point where his office can take them no further. We have now developed a "modus operandi", which places us where vulnerable debtors take their problems, such as MPs' surgeries, schools, doctors' surgeries and magistrates' courts. We made plans during the year to increase staff to meet some of an almost unlimited need, CABs are overwhelmed, law centres are closing down and legal aid is crumbling. Alan Murdie has also provided legal advice to other NGOs and telephone advice to individuals.

The McKenzie Friend training expanded during the year. We began to work with the Association of Visitors of Immigrants in Detention, running two courses attended by their members from many detention centres throughout the UK. The purpose of the courses is to enable volunteers, who visit immigrants in detention, to assist in their applications for bail. They are taught never to attempt to give legal advice but only to help prepare a statement of facts and provide emotional support through the trauma. This course is tailor made by a barrister and a solicitor in immigration law assisted by a member. Bail for Immigration Detainees.

Courses covering assistance to impoverished debtors with rent, council tax, fines arrears and tax credit over-payments facing eviction and/or the bailiffs were also run for Anglican and Roman Catholic congregations in Bexley, Tottenham, High Wycombe, Victoria and Carlisle Considering the goodwill and potential capacity in the churches, their attention to the kind of detail we propose with regards to the needs of the poorest citizens when facing the authorities in the UK is disappointing

The year saw a substantial growth in lobbying activity. Experience with cases involving bailiffs provided the vital information necessary to challenge and modify radical changes in bailiff law. Bailiffs were given the power to force entry to domestic premises to enforce fines and debts and to use force against persons in the Tribunals Courts and Enforcement Act 2007, ending four hundred years where they had previously to enter peacefully and never to touch debtors. The Trust drafted amendments to protect vulnerable debtors which were tabled, debated and supported for all parties by MPs and Peers. The detail remains to be drafted in regulations.

Discussion with Ministers, in which the Trust opposed force against the person, led to an assurance that regulations would not be enacted if no one wants them. The Enforcement Law Reform Group comprising bailiffs, creditors and advice sector unanimously supported the Trust position and informed the Government that we all are satisfied with the current right to self defence which protects both debtor and bailiff

The Trust is now engaged in discussions with the Ministry of Justice about the drafting of regulations as a principal stakeholder. A petition against these changes was mounted on the 10 Downing Street website, it attracted 2000 signatures and was read to the House of Commons by Andy Love MP.

The Ministry of Justice refused to answer the question "what are the circumstances under which a bailiff will break into domestic premises as a last resort and who makes the decision." A complaint was made to the 'access to rights unit. Their reply was to send the Trust the "Magistrates' Courts Guidance – Search and Entry Powers (Domestic Violence, Crime and Victims Act 2004), all references to arrears obliterated. The issue was referred to the Information Commissioner in April 2007. At the time of writing this report (September 2008) there has been no decision.

The Trust also supported the End Child Poverty campaign in opposing at a meeting with officials at the Department of Work and Pensions the extension of sanctions against lone parents, who do not take work and whose incomes are already below the government's poverty threshold

The Trust convened a meeting of Chief Executives of NGOs to see if there was any will for joint campaigning against poverty. It was well attended As a preparation they were asked to answer the question "What are the three things government can do substantially to reduce poverty in the UK?" The top three answers were increase incomes, sort out the housing market and simplify the welfare system. In the event there are now three national campaigns against poverty, the National Pensioners Convention, End Child Poverty and the Get Fair Campaign.

2007 was a special year in the development of the Zacchaeus 2000 Trust, we have seen what needs to be done to tackle poverty by directly helping families and individuals, in training volunteers and in lobbying at national level, and had some success in doing it. Our tasks are to continue to develop along present lines, to increase our staff and to raise the funds to make that happen

Financial review

The charity received grants and donations totalling £59,081 in the year including £7,064 specifically for the relief of poverty fund. Investment and other income amounted to £1,082, giving total incoming resources of £60,163.

Expenditure for the year totalled £63,891, giving net outgoing resources for the year of £3,728 Expenditure included £5,335 in direct relief of poverty grants

Total funds carried forward at 31 December 2007 amounted to £17,123

Incoming resources and resources expended have increased considerably over the previous year, reflecting the growth and development in the Trust's work. This trend will continue into the next financial year.

Principal funding sources

The charity is dependent upon donations from individual donors and institutions. A full list of grants and donations received is set out in Note 2 to the accounts.

Investment policy

The charity's Memorandum of Association does not confer any specific rights or restrictions on us as trustees in respect of investing its funds. The funds received by the charity during the year under review were not sufficient to justify separate investment, other than to be placed on deposit with the charity's bankers.

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain an amount on general fund equivalent to three months' running expenses, although this is dependent on the level of donations received

Future plans

With our administrator and lawyer in place, and our CEO joining us in October 2008, we are well placed to increase the level of our activities in all core areas

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its financial activities that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departure disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue on that basis

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and in accordance with the special provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small entities

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the previous year.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements comply with the requirements of applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice. Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005), and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2005 issued under the Charities Act 1993.

Fund accounting

Restricted donations are available for the charity's use only in accordance with the terms under which, and for the purposes which, the funds were donated to the charity

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular use

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable

Investment income is included when receivable

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT which cannot be recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. estimated usage, as set out in Note 3.

Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets with a cost in excess of £100 are capitalised. Depreciation is calculated so as to write down to estimated residual value the cost of all other tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows.

Designated funds

The fixed asset fund represents the net book value of tangible fixed assets, and has been designated by the trustees to reflect the fact that these funds are not in a liquid form and so are not expendable funds

Restricted funds

The Relief of Poverty fund comprises donations received from individuals and organisations. The funds are used to defray the debts of the poorest and most vulnerable members of society, with a particular slant on arrears of housing costs. Direct donations to individuals are also occasionally made to relieve poverty.

The McKenzie Friends training fund represents funds provided by charitable trusts and foundations following the work done by the professional fundraiser. These funds are to be used for and in connection with the training of McKenzie Friends.

The lawyer, administrator and office and premises funds were raised to fund those specific costs. Grants were received from The City Parochial Foundation, The John Ellerman Foundation and The Westminster Foundation respectively.
