#### **OBJECTIVES AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES**

The Brighton & Hove Food Partnership (BHFP) is a not-for-profit organisation that operates a membership structure open to anyone who lives or works in Brighton & Hove. We are aiming for a sustainable food system - one that is healthy, respects environmental limits and supports a vibrant farming and food economy.

#### The Brighton and Hove Food Partnership works to

- Promote the benefits of a healthy, sustainable and ethical food system.
- Encourage healthier and sustainable lifestyles by providing practical training, education, information and support on nutrition, cookery, food growing, health and wellbeing.
- Co-ordinate a strategic approach to food work in the city, brining together community organisations, statutory agencies, local businesses and individual residents.

BHFP acts as a hub for information, inspiration and connection around food. BHFP also delivers a range of community projects such as:

- Cookery courses for beginners and those looking to teach others
- Helping people start new community gardens
- Tips and advice on reducing food waste at home
- Setting up community composting sites across the city
- Healthy eating advice and workshops
- Advice on food poverty and support for food banks
- Weight management programmes for adults and families

The Brighton and Hove Food Strategy Spade to Spoon: Digging Deeper sets out how the city intends to work towards a healthier, more sustainable food system - one that addresses health inequalities, reduces food poverty, supports local businesses and reduces the environmental impact on the way we produce, consume, and dispose of food. Key partners include the city council, public health, the universities, local businesses and the community and voluntary sector. The work on the food strategy is coordinated by the Food Partnership whose role is to drive delivery of the strategy, to support innovation, encourage partnerships, report annual progress and deliver some of the actions. The Food Partnership also holds a seat on a number of strategic boards in the city to help influence other local policies and strategies which have an impact on the food system.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

#### 1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Brighton and Hove Food Partnership is a private company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the Company Information page.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Section 1A "Small Entities" of Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

Income takes the form of grants to provide specific services or towards general support of our costs, or payment in the form of a contract for services provided. Where grants and similar income are for time based projects, or have been paid in advance in any way, the appropriate amount of income has been carried forward within the deferred income account. Income will be credited to the income and expenditure account from the deferred income account in line with the associated relevant costs, or on a time basis, as is most appropriate.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 33% on cost

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

The company has a minimum value of £200 for capitalisation of fixed assets.

#### Funds

The company has various types of funds for which it is responsible:

Unrestricted funds - these funds are for use on the general objectives of the company

Restricted funds - these funds are for specific purposes as laid down by the donor - expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund together with a fair proportion of management and support costs.
