#### TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

#### YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The Trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019.

Reference and administrative information forms part of this report. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the FRS102.

#### Structure, Governance and Management

#### **Organisation**

Bristol Refugee Rights was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 9<sup>th</sup> January 2006, originally under the name Holding Refugees and Human Rights in Mind, and registered as a charity on 11<sup>th</sup> November 2008.

The charity is controlled by its governing document, Memorandum and Articles of Association. Governance of BRR is through a Board of Trustees elected by the membership at the AGM. The board has final legal authority and is responsible for overseeing the operation of the entire charity and its activities. The Chair and Vice Chair and Treasurer are elected annually and Trustees are elected for a three year term. All new Trustees take part in a formal induction programme and receive regular training.

The Board meets six times in a year. It regularly reviews its structure and the individual and corporate responsibilities of Board members. The Board of Trustees can set up subcommittees (i.e. to deal with detailed finances, personnel issues etc.) but all key decisions have to be taken by the full Board and sub-committees have to report back to the Board. At the moment there are two sub-committees which meet regularly: staffing and finance; and fundraising and communications. Other committees such as premises, Early Years Project meet only as required.

#### **Risk Review**

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Trustees recognise the importance of identifying and putting in place effective arrangements for the management of risk. A risk register has been established and has been approved by the Board of Trustees. It is kept under continual review by the Board of Trustees and any changes to risk are reviewed at each Trustees meeting. Financial risks associated with reducing income streams from the government and trust funding has led to development of income generation strategy which allow for the diversification of funding and activities. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been in place to diminish the risk the charity faces. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

#### **The Directors**

The Board of Directors, who are Trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

#### **Objectives and activities**

#### Objects of the charity

The charity adopted new Objects at their AGM on 11 October 2018. These are as follows: To relieve the needs of asylum seekers, refugees and migrants by the provision of information, advice and support.

To preserve and protect the physical and mental health of asylum seekers, refugees and migrants and the dependants of persons in those categories.

To advance the education of the public in general about the issues relating to refugees and those seeking asylum and persons with precarious migration status.

To provide facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life of those persons who have need of such facilities.

To advance the education and training of refugees, asylum seekers, migrants and their dependants.

To promote human rights (as set out in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and subsequent United Nations conventions and declarations) by all or any of the following means:

- relieving need among the victims of human rights abuse
- conducting research into human rights issues
- educating the public about human rights
- raising awareness of human rights issues
- promoting public support for human rights
- promoting respect for human rights among individuals and corporations.

The charity provides a community hub (Welcome Centre) where asylum seekers and refugees can meet and be supported to play a full part in the life of the wider community. Most of our services are delivered by volunteers including around 40-50% of whom are asylum seekers or refugees themselves. From the Welcome Centre hub, a number of projects operate, all providing services to BRR's members (asylum seekers and refugees):

- Through the Advice Project (formerly known as the Advocacy and Information desk (AID) and Asylum Support Project (ASP)), we offer one to one support, information and where appropriate advice to our members.
- We run several levels of ESOL and computer classes each week through our Education Project (formerly known as BRILL Project). The project also provides members with opportunities for non-classroom based learning and opportunities to learn about life in the UK.
- Our Early Years Project provides a crèche for children from 4 months to 5 years who
  would otherwise not have access to statutory child care; it provides an opportunity for
  children to learn and play.

- Our VOICE project trains and supports members to speak out about their experiences as asylum seekers and refugees.
- Asylum seekers and refugees are supported to become volunteers including volunteer interpreters within the Welcome Centre.
- Our Pride Without Borders project provides specific support to LGBT+ asylum seekers and refugees.
- A new project started in November 2018 working with Young People subject to immigration control aims to find new and better ways of providing support and working with the local authority to achieve better long term outcomes.

#### **Achievements and performance**

Bristol Refugee Rights was set up as a voluntary organisation to uphold and champion the human rights of asylum seekers and refugees. We provide a place of welcome in Bristol where asylum seekers and refugees can meet and be helped to play a full part in the life of the wider community. We also campaign more widely for the human rights of refugees and asylum seekers. Bristol Refugee Rights aims to deliver a 'user-led' service that addresses the practical and psychological needs as well as the human rights of refugees and asylum seekers by:

- welcoming people into a safe place
- empowering people to achieve an independent and productive life
- enabling social inclusion
- focussing public attention on the need to reform the asylum system to remove the abuses of human rights experienced by our service users.

In 2018/19, BRR's Welcome Centre was open 3 days a week, 48 weeks of the year and in total received 10,459 visits from members. 428 new members were welcomed to our services. Our Early Years Project provided support to 94 different children. We held a successful Human Rights Day and trip to the beach. We held 13 classes (English and computing) each week for 44 weeks of the year and 369 members engaged with BRILL projects (classes/trips/courses). We supported 450 members through Advice. 61 members volunteered with us.

During the course of the year we had a number of successful public fundraising campaigns including for our Advice Project. We were also successful in obtaining a grant from Paul Hamlyn Foundation for our new Young People's Project and a grant for a new national partnership led by Refugee Action around "Early Action".

#### Chair's report

This has been a challenging year for Bristol Refugee Rights and for the charity sector as a whole as we faced a difficult funding environment alongside increased demands on our services. But though things have looked daunting at times, I am proud to be able to say that under the leadership of our Director, Beth Wilson, our members, volunteers, staff and supporters have done a superb job in pulling us through.

At one time there was a real threat to our advice services, particularly the unique service we offer in the area of asylum support, but I am pleased to say that a combination of determined fundraising and restructuring of our services has meant that we have been able to continue working for asylum-seekers, refugees and – thanks to having expanded our aims at the last AGM - other migrants in precarious situations.

In partnership with our members and staff, we have adopted a new Vision and Strategic Plan for 2019-22 which stresses participation, inclusion, the delivery of high-quality services, whilst giving voice to the concerns of our asylum-seekers and refugees and enabling them to access their rights and entitlements. Our innovative Early Years Project, which does so much to help the children of our members overcome the disadvantages they face received a positive OFSTED report in February and the team there deserve our congratulations for that. We continue to do great things through English classes, through VOICE and through our innovative Pride Without Borders project as well as providing a place of safety and welcome for our members every week.

Finally, we also need to say a big thank you to those trustees and staff who have left us after years of dedicated service. In particular, Tony Jaffray who has moved on, having led our advocacy services for several years and we wish him well for the future, together with long-term trustees Richard Henderson and James Jatta who have stepped down from the board. The Board has renewed itself with new members: Mano Candappa, Natasha Carver and Maria Williams who bring us a range of expertise from education, law and finance.

#### **Plans for Future Periods**

In 2018/19, we reviewed our vision and mission statement. Our new vision and aims for 2019 -22 better represent the context we are working in and what we are currently trying to achieve.

#### **Our New Vision:**

A society where refugees, asylum seekers and migrants are welcomed, feel safe, live free of poverty and are able to positively build their lives. A society where everyone's rights and entitlements are respected.

#### We've adopted 3 new Aims and Ways of Working to help us achieve our vision:

- EARLY ACTION: We work in partnership with others to combat poverty and destitution and to promote social and legal justice; our focus is on preventing and deescalating crises.
- 2. **EMPOWER:** We empower people; promote inclusion and equality of opportunity through the breaking down of societal barriers.
- 3. **ADVOCACY:** We challenge individual and systemic injustices; we aim to ensure the rights and entitlements of asylum seekers, refugees and migrants are respected.

#### We've also adopted 6 new Strategic Priorities for 2019-2022:

- 1. Participation: Everyone will have the opportunity to take part.
- 2. Quality: A hub of high quality and specialised services.
- 3. Partnership: We will work together to achieve the best outcomes.
- **4. Inclusion:** Asylum seekers, refugees and migrants will have improved opportunities in their communities and society.
- 5. Voice: Asylum seekers, refugees and migrant voices will be heard.
- 6. Rights and entitlements: Services will be provided to those who need support.

#### **Financial Review**

In 2018-19 BRR generated funding of £575,250 and spent £490,286. Most of our funding came from trusts, foundations, and Bristol City Council, while £113,864 of our funding came from individual donors. All funding received has been vital in ensuring that we can continue to be here for our members, and we would like to thank all donors and funders for supporting us.

#### **Public Benefit**

The Trustees have complied with their duty under the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The reserves policy is reviewed at least every 3 years. In 2018/19, the policy was to hold a financial reserve equivalent to 2 months operating costs. This level of reserve was set as it was deemed both reasonably achievable and to be of a sufficient level to ensure continuing operation of the charity, in light of the charity holding a number of multi-year grants.

At the start of 2019/20 the Trustees reviewed this policy following a calculation of the likely actual costs of wind down and have agreed to revise the financial reserve to 3 months operating costs.

The budgeted expenditure for 2019/20 is £462,299 and therefore the target is £115,574 in general funds. Our general reserve at the end of March 19 is £88,213 which is 24% below the target.

#### Funds held as custodian trustee on behalf of others

Some income and expenditure for the registered charity Bristol Hospitality Network (charity number 1138498) has been managed by Bristol Refugee Rights. Funds received and expenditures spent on behalf of BHN are not recognised in Bristol Refugee Rights accounts

During the year we have received £440 as donation for Bristol Hospitality Network. In the year we repaid the full balance of £5,892 to Bristol Hospitality Network. No funds are now held on their behalf. Please refer to note 15 for detail.

#### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also directors of Bristol Refugee Rights for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report (incorporating the strategic report and directors' report) and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102: *The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland* (United Kingdom Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

#### Independent examiners

Godfrey Wilson Limited were appointed as independent examiners to the charitable company during the year.

#### Independent examiner's report to the Trustees of Bristol Refugee Rights

I report on the accounts of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2019, which are set out on pages 11 to 26.

#### Responsibilities and basis of report

As the trustees of the charitable company (and also its directors for the purposes of company law) you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 ('the 2006 Act').

Having satisfied myself that the accounts of the charitable company are not required to be audited under Part 16 of the 2006 Act and are eligible for independent examination, I report in respect of my examination of the charitable company's accounts as carried out under section 145 of the Charities Act 2011 ('the 2011 Act'). #### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### YEAR ENDED 31 March 2019

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### a) Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), and with the 'small companies' provisions of the Companies Act 2006.

The charity is a public benefit entity as defined under FRS102.

There are no material uncertainties affecting the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern.

#### b) Income

Income from donations is included in income when these are receivable, except as follows:

When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred until the pre-conditions have been met.

#### c) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity: this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

#### d) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred. Expenditure includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Most expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities, and has been included in those cost categories. Support cost have been allocated 100% towards the charitable activities of the charity. Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examiner's fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity. Governance costs are included within charitable activity costs.

#### e) Finance and operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating lease agreements where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

#### f) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

#### g) Restricted funds

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

#### h) Fixed assets

Although no assets were held at the year-end, if capitalised, assets would be held at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets costing less than £1,000 are not capitalised.

#### i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

#### j) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

#### Financial instruments

The charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently recognised at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### m) Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. There are no further liabilities other than that already recognised in the SOFA.

#### n) Accounting estimates and key judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

There are no sources of estimation uncertainty in these financial statements.

#### 2 Donations and legacies

#### 5 Government grants

The charitable company receives government grants, defined as funding from Bristol City Council and National Lottery to fund charitable activities. The total value of such grants in the period ending 31 March 2019 was £185,285 (2018: £161,521). There are no unfulfilled conditions or contingencies attaching to these grants in 2018/19.

#### 6 Expenditure on: Raising funds

The increase in raising funds was due to investment in different ways of fundraising as part of our long term aim to become less reliant on trusts and foundations. We invested in Blackbaud, a donor management database, allowing us to track supporters and donors and maintain regular contact with them, which is essential to maintaining and increasing individual giving. We also completed a crowdfunding campaign for our Advice Project during the year and there were fees relating to the promotion of the campaign and payment to the crowdfunding website. Other fundraising costs included fees to Local Giving and Paypal both of which help us manage our donations and ensure Gift Aid is properly claimed; and costs associated with marketing and events.

Early Action

Early Action is a joint project led by Refugee Action and funded by The

National Lottery Community Fund. This is a 3 year project which started in July 2018. The fund contributes to the roles of Director and Operational

Managers to fund change in ways of working throughout the organisation.

These are funds that are restricted to the Early Years project. Funders include Children in Need, Epaphras Trust, Lanydal, Nisbet Trust and

Sylvia Adams.

Welcome Centre These are funds that are restricted to be used in running the Welcome

Centre. Funders include Bristol City Council Impact Fund, Lloyds Foundation, National Lottery Community Fund (formerly known as Big

Lottery) and The John James Foundation.

Main Office These are funds that are restricted to be used in running the Main office.

Funders include Lloyds Foundation.

Young People's Project The Young People's Project is funded by Paul Hamlyn Foundation for 2

years starting in November 2018. The project funds the role of 3 staff members to work with young people subject to immigration control up to

the age of 25.

BRR LARA Fund

These are funds that are restricted to be used to support refugees and

asylum seeking musicians.

Beyond The Borders Picnic These are funds that are restricted to be used in the Beyond the Borders

Picnic project. This project is part of the Bristol Refugee Festival which is run by a steering group that consists of, but which is not exclusive to Bristol Refugee Rights, Bristol Hospitality Network, Tribe of Doris and Refugee Women of Bristol. The funder was the Big Lottery Celebrate.

BRR Bike Appeal Fund

These are funds that are restricted to be used to provide bicycle

equipment for refugees and asylum seekers.

Advice In 2018/19, as our funding for the Advocacy and Information Desk was

coming to an end, we merged Asylum Support Project and Advocacy and Information Desk to become one Advice Project. Funds were raised in 2018/19 for the Advice project which formally launched on 1 April 2019
