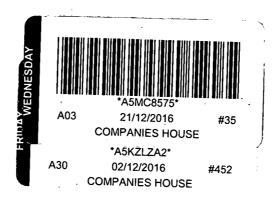

Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2016.

Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. It is operated under the rules of its memorandum and articles of association dated 6th October 2006. It has no share capital and the liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £1.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

New Trustees are nominated at one of the regular committee meetings of the organisation. Potential trustees are encouraged to meet with the management team prior to their appointment.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

To improve the pride, respect and well being of all in our community.

Objectives, strategies and activities

Blurton Farm Residents Association continues to represent our community at various meetings and give feedback at our public meetings. We are constantly monitoring any changes or developments that will have impact to our community. We have just supported many of our local residents with the move to the new extra care development. We are experiencing pockets of anti social behaviour from our local tenants and this is being closely monitored both by local housing officers and the local policing unit on our behalf.

We held our annual Christmas meal and sing-along this time at our community building and 66 local people attended. Everyone was well entertained by our local ukulele group, local school choir, bingo and an all round entertainer that got everyone joining in. All had a great time and we have had fantastic feedback from all who came along.

Our public Christmas event, Rudolph comes to Blurton was attended by over 1400 people, We were inundated with everyone who came to see Santa and his reindeers. Children loved the presents from Santa and the hog roast went down a treat. Punch and Judy kept all ages well occupied whilst others were enjoying themselves in the main hall purchasing late Christmas presents at the many stalls.

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Achievements and performance

We continue to support Blurton Community Hub with the day to day running of the community building. Our kids club is very well attended and we are now getting involved with the Blurton in Bloom competition. We have made lots of changes to the building but particularly the garden to make it more welcoming.

Our volunteers help to run the book lending service (community llibrary) and this continues to go from strength to strength.

The current level of free reserves is £1,767 (2015:£1,569). The charity has no specific policy with regard to the level of reserves.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

1 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Blurton Farm Residents Association meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The charity adopted SORP (FRS 102) in the current year.

Summary of disclosure exemptions

As a small charity the entity has taken advantage of the amendments to Charities SORP FRS 102 contained in Update Bulletin 1 issued February 2016 to exempt the charity from the preparation of a Cash Flow Statement.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Reclassification of comparative amounts

Due to the nature of the Charity there have been no adjustments to the amounts disclosed in the SOFA or Balance Sheet as a result of the transition to FRS102. Governance costs, which were previously shown separately on the face of the SOFA are now include within Charitable Activities expenditure.

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the Charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including independent examination and Trustee meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Taxation

The Charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:
