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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2021.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Memorandum & Articles of Association dated 17 April 2007 and amended on 14 April 2008 and 12 July 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

The Charity's objects are to promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community principally but not exclusively in the local government district of South Hams and, in particular, the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, distress and sickness, and in furtherance of the said purposes, but not further or otherwise, to promote and organise co-operation in the achievement of the same and to that end to bring together Council representatives of the voluntary organisations and statutory authorities within the area of benefit.

To meet these objectives South Hams Community & Voluntary Services supports and represents the voluntary and community sector in the district of South Hams and acts as a point of contact with local government and other agencies. Assistance is available to all types of groups within the sector whether social or environmental, large or small, well established or just starting out. One of the main roles of the Charity is to provide these groups with advice and information to help them flourish. It publicises its activities to ensure its services are known in the community.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning the future activities the Charity should undertake. The work flowing from our purposes supports the public through helping develop services and support in their communities and supporting individuals to enable them to volunteer. We receive qualitative feedback and quantitative data which evidences this.

Achievements and performance

The year has, of course, been dominated by the Covid-19 pandemic. Like community and voluntary groups across the district we have had to respond rapidly to the changing environment, helping groups find new ways of providing the support and help that people, especially the most vulnerable and isolated, needed. We helped over 50 voluntary groups to respond quickly to Covid-19, helping to implement home working, find funds, collaborate and respond to the very different needs in communities. Updating and supporting groups with understanding around the Covid-19 guidance as well as digital understanding was crucial at the beginning.

We put a lot of effort into helping groups to recruit and support volunteers who were desperately needed to provide the additional help people in our communities needed to cope with lockdowns and the resulting isolation, loneliness and impact on mental health.

We gave particular support to the new volunteer-led Covid Response Groups which quickly emerged across the district. We surveyed the voluntary and community sector in May 2020, and this revealed that 1,355 new volunteers were recruited by 21 Covid-19 groups which had been established in response to the pandemic. These volunteers responded to over 4,000 individuals' requests, often on multiple occasions.

Across the South Hams, we enabled 100 people to volunteer in 20 different communities. In addition, our Community Connector in Ivybridge signposted over 70 volunteers to help with the local Covid-19 response.

We continued and developed our training programme and shifted it to online delivery. Over 185 different people from 85 different organisations, with over 250 attendances, joined our workshops. These varied from our normal programme, including risk assessment, wellbeing listening, introduction to mental health & suicide awareness and adapted to the changing needs of volunteers and groups. We also provided additional resources and guidance for new volunteers and newly established groups to help ensure safe and effective practice.

Supporting voluntary and community groups and social enterprises to start up, develop and improve is at the heart of our work. As well as the training and volunteer development described, we have continued to provide one-to-one advice and support for groups, provided specific support around funding, including through online funding workshops, and provided updated information, good practice videos and other resources on our own and the Devon Voluntary Action (DeVA) web sites. We were pleased to achieve funding from the National Lottery to support our Core work and this helped fund our one-to-one funding advice and newsletters, the latter reaching around 400 groups across the South Hams. The funding also enabled us to consult with not for profit groups in South Hams in January 2021 and this will inform our strategic plan going forward (see below). We were also pleased to have helped the TQ6 Partnership for the Dartmouth area, secure a 4 year National Lottery grant to build its community hub resources and its long-term future.

Providing opportunities to network and share experience is also a very important feature of our support to groups and we have maintained this online during the year, both as a key part of training workshops and as specific networking events. We have held eight meetings of the Caring Alliances in the Erme/Yealm and Kingsbridge areas and have provided regular information and updates to the 130 people on our Caring Alliance database.

In addition, we have held networking meetings for South Hams Social Prescribers and Community Connectors and a meeting of groups supporting Mental Health in Ivybridge. We launched a networking forum for Climate Action and Biodiversity groups in South Hams' towns and parishes, as well as a Digital Information network in association with Teignbridge CVS.

We have been making greater use of social media during the year, including regular posting on our Facebook pages which now have around 300 followers.

Our new social prescribing and community connector services were launched during the year and soon demonstrated the critically important role link workers and Connectors play in enabling people to access community support and activities and in developing new services where there is a need. Although the link workers only started work during the year and had to deal with the Covid-19 restrictions, which severely limited face-to-face interactions, more than 85 clients were supported. We expect this number to increase significantly during 2021 as the social prescribing programme gets fully embedded in the health and care system and more GPs understand its importance in achieving better outcomes for their patients. Link workers are not just signposting and helping people to access existing services; they have a proactive role too, working alongside other CVS staff and partners to help develop new services where they identify the need.

While responding to Covid has dominated our year, we have also maintained our core services providing: one to one development support for groups; networking opportunities; information; funding and governance advice; and a voice for the voluntary and community sector to engage with and influence the work of our public sector partners. The pressures and demands of Covid make these more important than ever. During 2021-2022 we will be focussing on the changing needs of communities and the groups, working to support them.

In early 2020 we reviewed and re-defined our strategic aims which in summary are now as follows:

- 1. Strengthening local community, voluntary and social enterprise (VCSE) organisations.
- 2. Promoting and supporting life-long volunteering.
- 3. Creating connections between individuals, organisations and communities.
- 4. Being the champion for the sector locally.

These will guide our future development, be the basis for our new Strategic Plan and provide the framework for how we measure and demonstrate the impact we are having on groups and communities and the people they serve. We plan to further develop and finalise our Strategic Plan in 2021-2024, taking into account the experience and lessons learned through the past year.

Financial review

The Charity is primarily funded by an agreement with the South Hams District Council.

There was a surplus of income over expenditure of funds for the year of £43,368 (2020: deficit of £22,181). The surplus in 2021 with a deficit in 2020 arises from the timing of funds received. In particular £43,270 National Lottery funding was unspent at the year end.

The Charity's policy on reserves is to aim for a reserve fund equivalent to six months running costs plus the amount needed for redundancy payments. This figure will allow the Charity:

- a) To have an adequate provision for redundancy and other contractual obligations, and
- b) The necessary time to find alternative funding, or
- c) The necessary time to wind up the organisation.

At all times the Charity will hold enough reserves to cover the statutory redundancy costs and contractual obligations.

Structure, governance and management

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee (registered number 06215893) having no share capital. It is also a registered Charity (number 1124273). Under the provisions of Section 60 of the Companies Act 2006, the company is entitled to omit the word "Limited" from its name. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 17 April 2007 and amended on 14 April 2008 and 12 July 2011, with its registered office being The Mansion, 36 Fore Street, Totnes, Devon, TQ9 5RP. Members of the Trustee Board are all Directors of the company. In the event of the company being wound up the liability of the members is limited to £10 each.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

South Hams Community & Voluntary Services is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is The Mansion, 36 Fore Street, Totnes, Devon, TQ9 5RP.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's Memorandum & Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

These financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis. The Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless they have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Income from donations and grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:

- when donors specify that donations and grants given to the Charity must be used in future accounting periods, then income is deferred until these periods; and
- when donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the Charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met.

Interest receivable is included in investment income when it is receivable by the charitable company.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on the accruals basis and includes irrecoverable VAT. Expenditure is allocated to categories either on a direct or a usage basis.

Expenditure attributable to meeting the aims and objectives, including the support costs, is included in charitable activities.

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the Charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include the costs related to the independent examination and legal fees.

Overhead costs incurred wholly or mainly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity or other trading activities and being an integral part of the costs of carrying out those activities, are separately analysed within Charitable Expenditure in the Statement of Financial Activities as appropriate.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

straight line basis over five years

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The Charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Charity's balance sheet when the Charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Derecognition of financial assets

Financial assets are derecognised only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the assets expire or are settled or when the Charity transfers the financial assets and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to another entity.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including accruals and creditors are initially recognised at transaction price.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the Charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

The Charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

1.12 Leasing

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
