Directors' Report for the year ended 30 June 2020

Structure, governance and management

Faith, Truth and Hope is a charitable company limited by guarantee constituted by a set of Memorandum and Articles of Association incorporated on 5 September 2007. This charity exists to advance the Christian faith and to pursue such other charitable purposes as the trustees from time-to-time think fit.

The directors who are also trustees of the charity are named within this document and have served either throughout or during the year ended 30 June 2020. Dr Kevin Vaughan joined the board of trustees on 21 November 2019.

After the year end, on 16 February 2021, Rebecca Hunt resigned her position as trustee to pursue other interests. She served as a trustee since 2012 and was chair of trustees for much of that time. The trustees are very grateful to her for her many years of service and wish her every success in the future.

The trustees met and communicated with each other throughout the year to manage the affairs of the charity.

Public Benefit

The trustees have a strong desire to preserve the Christian heritage of our nation which is distinctive and of enormous public benefit. The Christian faith has done much to shape our society for good and for the benefit of all.

The trustees have referred to the general guidance provided by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the aims and objectives and in planning current and future activities interest.

The charity has continued to advance the Christian faith by sponsoring activities and by making grants to other Christian organisations.

Reflecting the trustees' commitment to the future, and raising up a generation of younger Christians who will be able to impact the church and the world, the charity has supported leadership conferences for young people. These conferences and the subsequent follow-up days are particularly focussed on undergraduates and young professionals, who are believed to be strong future leaders, and who are already interested in understanding the relevance of the Christian gospel in modern society and are prepared to think through its practical outworking in the future.

As in prior years, grants were made to fund presentations and exhibitions in churches designed to educate and increase awareness of Christian ethics and responsibilities in twenty first century Britain. The trustees remain confident that the Christian faith is being advanced through grants, with significant public benefit both now and in the future.

Objectives and activities

The direction of the charity has remained unchanged in the short term and our trustees will continue to review the activities in future to meet the main objective of advancing the Christian faith.

The trustees are grateful for the faithful support from all donors. During the year, the charity received donations from several hundred donors, with some exceptionally generous support from private individuals.

The charity has supported many events throughout the country which are, in the majority, free to enter, publicly advertised and open to all. The events seek to inform and educate those in attendance about modern ethical and moral issues and the latest political, legal and cultural developments and to interpret them in the light of biblical teaching, particularly where there may be issues of concern to those of the Christian faith. These events, run by Christian Concern, have proved very popular with many being hosted by churches in order to inform and equip their local communities and to increase voluntary action. In January 2020, Christian Concern hosted a conference entitled *Championing Sexual Purity in a Pornographic Age*, open to all supporters which was attended by 65 people.

Christian Concern has continued to run events through lockdown, using Zoom or similar platforms, introducing new formats and engaging with people in new ways. For example, in May 2020, Christian Concern began hosting a weekly online podcast known as *Round The Table* where members of the team and invited guests discuss Christian perspectives on topical issues. Over 100 people on average watch and engage with these events each week.

In a similar way, Faith, Truth & Hope continues to support Christian Concern's work to inform and equip communities online by providing a free education, news and information service.

Faith, Truth & Hope has continued to support the work of the Wilberforce Academy which has held an annual conference each year since 2009. In 2019, the academy once again gathered aspiring young people from across the nation and beyond, including Malta, South Africa and Pakistan, inviting them to be equipped to stand for Jesus Christ and for biblical values both in their public and private lives. The academy's 'refocus' days have grown in quality and attendance, demonstrating a continued commitment from attendees beyond the initial week-long programme. The trustees highly commend this worthwhile ministry and are very encouraged by the testimonies of the growing number of young people who have attended past conferences and increasingly demonstrate evidence of deeply changed lives as their careers continue to develop. We are delighted that a number of Wilberforce Academy alumni are exploring the possibility of establishing Christian schools.

Since the year end, there have been challenging times for the Wilberforce Academy, with the eventual cancellation of the scheduled Academy. However, in other ways it has been a time of growth as their new online 'refocus' days have attracted an increased number of the alumni who found it harder to attend in person. Additionally, the Wilberforce Academy has partnered with Crosslands Training to launch a new programme, the Wilberforce Cultural Leadership Programme, in January 2021, exclusively for alumni, to equip and empower delegates to faithfully engage their spheres and communities. Furthermore, online has been utilised to begin hosting sector networking events to connect alumni from across different years and continue fostering a community for the Wilberforce Academy.

Faith, Truth & Hope continues to be involved in supporting the development of Wilberforce Publications Limited, which publishes books (including e-books) that help and encourage Christians to address the challenges of a secular worldview in the areas of society, culture, politics and philosophy.

One title, *The Moral Case for Conservatism*, by Samuel Burgess, author of *Edmund Burke's Battle with Liberalism – His Christian Philosophy and Why it Matters Today*, was published during the year and received excellent reviews.

Four new titles were published after the year-end – between October and December 2020. These were Clifford Hill's Beyond the Pandemic, Stephen McQuoid's In His Image – A Biblical Guide to Social Ethics, Mary Williamson's Noah and the Nestling (a children's illustrated book) and Jeremy Thomas' The Nation's Gospel Volume 2 (1791 to 1900) Revolution to Revival.

At the time of writing, there are three new titles being worked on, including a study guide to accompany *In His Image*.

During the year, the trustees identified some new partners and opportunities that they intend to support in the near future, subject to funds being available. These include the commissioning of an exciting new book by an established author and supporting an established Christian mentoring and leadership development programme.

The charity has not, so far, been significantly impacted by the effects of Covid-19. There is no evidence of any significant impact on donation income and the trustees would like to take this opportunity to thank donors for their continued, faithful support at this vital time.

Financial Results and Reserves

The charity's policy on reserves is to retain relatively low levels of finance within the company.

The trust disbursed in excess of £555,000 this year with net income of £52,055, leaving net assets of £54,682.

The charity has no significant liabilities or ongoing costs of its own; the trustees therefore consider the risk associated with minimal working capital to be very low. It is important for the charity to sustain and maximise fundraising efforts so that it can continue to support the activities the trustees have identified and is in regular contact with the supporters.

During this financial year, the majority of the trust's income has again been applied to charitable activities carried out by Christian Concern. The following activities of Christian Concern were sponsored by Faith, Truth & Hope during the year:

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) and the Charities Act 2011. The Financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historic cost convention modified to include certain items at fair value when applicable. The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity. Significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Restricted funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the Unrestricted funds

discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have

not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds Designated funds comprise of unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each

designated fund is set out in the notes to the

financial statements.

Restricted funds are those funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and

use of each restricted fund is set out in the

notes to the financial statements.

Donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the charity for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund. The charity does not usually invest separately for each fund.

1. Accounting Policies (cont.)

Income Recognition

Donations are recognised when received. Grants are accounted for when the charity is legally entitled to the amounts due. All other income is recognised when it is receivable. All incoming resources are accounted for gross.

No changes have been made in accordance with these principles to accounts for the previous year.

Expenditure Recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as an expense against the activity for which expenditure arose.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees report.

Governance costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Debtors and creditors

Debtors and Creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Going Concern

The directors consider that the charity remains viable for the year ahead.
