Directors' Report for the year ended 30 June 2022

Structure, governance and management

Faith Truth & Hope is a charitable company limited by guarantee constituted by a set of Memorandum and Articles of Association incorporated on 5 September 2007. This charity exists to advance the Christian faith and to pursue such other charitable purposes as the trustees from time to time think fit.

The directors who are also trustees of the charity are named within this document and have served either throughout or during the year ended 30 June 2022. Brian Henry joined the board of trustees on 24 February 2022.

The trustees met and communicated with each other throughout the year to manage the affairs of the charity.

Public Benefit

The trustees have a strong desire to preserve the Christian heritage of our nation which is distinctive and of enormous public benefit. The Christian faith has done much to shape our society for good and for the benefit of all.

The trustees have referred to the general guidance provided by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the aims and objectives and in planning current and future activities interest.

The charity has continued to advance the Christian faith by sponsoring activities and by making grants to other Christian organisations.

Reflecting the trustees' commitment to the future and raising up a generation of younger Christians who will be able to impact the church and the world, the charity has supported leadership development activities for young people. These are particularly focussed on undergraduates and young professionals, who are believed to be strong future leaders, and who are already interested in understanding the relevance of the Christian gospel in modern society and are prepared to think through its practical outworking in the future.

As in prior years, grants were made to fund presentations and exhibitions in churches and online designed to educate and increase awareness of Christian ethics and responsibilities in twenty first century Britain. The trustees remain confident that the Christian faith is being advanced through grants, with significant public benefit both now and in the future.

Objectives and activities

The direction of the charity has remained unchanged in the short term and our trustees will continue to review the activities in future to meet the main objective of advancing the Christian faith.

The trustees are grateful for the faithful support from all donors. During the year, the charity received donations from several hundred donors, with some exceptionally generous support from private individuals.

The charity has supported many events throughout the country which are, in the majority, free to enter, publicly advertised and open to all. The events seek to inform and educate those in attendance about modern ethical and moral issues and the latest political, legal and cultural developments and to interpret them in the light of biblical teaching, particularly where there may be issues of concern to those of the Christian faith. These events, run by Christian Concern, have proved very popular with many being hosted by churches in order to inform and equip their local communities and to increase voluntary action.

For example, Christian Concern continued to host a weekly online podcast, known as Round the Table, where members of the Christian Concern team and invited guests discussed Christian perspectives on topical issues. Episodes were watched live by an average of nearly 100 people each week and thousands have watched them since. Alongside this, the 'Gospel Issues' series of livestreams continued with invited experts equipping viewers to understand ethical issues in the light of the gospel of Jesus.

The charity also continued to support Christian Concern's work in providing a news update service by email, and other free resources, to inform and equip recipients to engage with contemporary issues.

Faith Truth & Hope has continued to support the work of the Wilberforce Academy. A number of delegates who were due to attend in 2020 (when the Academy was postponed owing to the Covid pandemic) were joined by newly selected delegates in September 2021 for a week of training and equipping in Christian cultural engagement and biblical worldview, with over 90 people participating. The Academy's Refocus Days have continued to see strong attendance, demonstrating continued commitment from attendees beyond the initial weeklong programme. The Wilberforce Cultural Leadership Programme took place for the second time from January to May 2022, in partnership with Crosslands Training. The programme equips and empowers delegates to faithfully engage with their spheres and communities, with participants presenting at one of the Refocus Days.

The trustees highly commend this worthwhile ministry and are very encouraged by the testimonies of the growing number of young people who have attended past conferences and increasingly demonstrate evidence of deeply changed lives as their careers continue to develop.

The charity has also supported Christian Concern's work in the field of education. With the initial grant seed funding and continued support of Faith Truth & Hope, the project of setting up new Christian schools gained momentum during this financial year. Christian Concern's Head of Education connected with and helped many who are interested in starting new, independent Christian schools. Over 25 potential new school initiatives are now being supported in the UK, and two working groups were created to help facilitate this.

The charity also granted funds towards the progression of an exciting new title by a highly regarded scholar and author.

Faith Truth & Hope continued to support the work of Wilberforce Publications Limited, which publishes books (including e-books) that assist and encourage readers to understand different areas of society, culture, politics and philosophy, and apply Christian thinking.

Two titles were published during the year. The first, *Beyond the Odds – Providence in Britain's Wars of the 20th Century* by John Scriven and Tim Dieppe provides in-depth history, revealing the providence of God in the turning points of Britain's 20th century wars. The authors were invited to deliver a presentation at the Oxford Literary Festival in March 2022.

The second, *Ruler of Kings* by Dr Joseph Boot, was released in March 2022. It considers the proper role of civil government in light of biblical teaching.

The charity also granted funds towards the progression of an exciting new title by a highly regarded scholar and author.

Financial Results and Reserves

The charity's policy on reserves is to retain relatively low levels of finance within the company.

The trust disbursed in excess of £715,000 this year with net expenditure of £26,243, leaving net assets of £2,769.

The charity has no significant liabilities or ongoing costs of its own; the trustees therefore consider the risk associated with minimal working capital to be very low. It is important for the charity to sustain and maximise fundraising efforts so that it can continue to support the activities the trustees have identified and is in regular contact with the supporters.

During this financial year, the majority of the trust's income has again been applied to charitable activities carried out by Christian Concern. The following activities of Christian Concern were sponsored by Faith Truth & Hope during the year:

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) and the Charities Act 2011. The Financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historic cost convention modified to include certain items at fair value when applicable. The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity. Significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Funds

Designated funds

Unrestricted funds Unrestricted funds are available for use at the

discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have

not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise of unrestricted

funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the

financial statements.

Restricted funds Restricted funds are those funds which are to

be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the

notes to the financial statements.

Donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the charity for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund. The charity does not usually invest separately for each fund.

1. Accounting Policies (cont.)

Income Recognition

Donations are recognised when received. Grants are accounted for when the charity is legally entitled to the amounts due. All other income is recognised when it is receivable. All incoming resources are accounted for gross.

No changes have been made in accordance with these principles to accounts for the previous year.

Expenditure Recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as an expense against the activity for which expenditure arose.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees report.

Governance costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Debtors and creditors

Debtors and Creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Going Concern

The directors consider that the charity remains viable for the year ahead.
